I would like to correct a false article that appeared about me on July 22 in the local newspaper. The article stated that I had dismissed a number of narcotic cases on a legal technicality that left law enforcement officers confused.

Today the processes of criminal investigation are very complicated. Recent events that have come to light in the past few days tend to cast a shadow of doubt on the relationship between my department and our local courts.

The ability and integrity of Judge Wallace Hall and his court was in no way intended to be the object of any criticism by my office.

In working with Judge Hall, I have found him to be as concerned as I am about the drug traffic and exploitation of our young people.

My most recent narcotic hearings were on June 15th and 19th. I had issued a search warrant on May 23rd that started the cases, and I was extremely pleased as a result of the evidence presented to establish a case.

County Commission, State Legislators Meet

By MARION BETHEA In an informal luncheon yesterday at the House of State, State Representative William Gibson and William Gorman met with county commission members to discuss problems of this area. Both representatives are members of the Committee on County Government. A third member, Lin Wood, was unable to attend due to a previous commitment.

Commissioner Greg Drummond contended that this is a two-fold problem; first that it causes additional costs to the taxpayer, and secondly that delinquency are caused from malfunctioning traffic signs which result in unsafe conditions.

'I Die For You'

In moments of truth we are not sure who we really are. At heart we know that we are neither hero nor villain. We are not the most valuable or the most insignificant persons on earth. We are less than ideal, but more than zero. We need someone to tell us who we are because we desire destiny, meaning and purpose in our life.

But how true is the portrait reflected back to us by others? Although we are foolish to completely disregard ourselves as others see us, yet their portrait of us is not completely accurate. Others hold an image of us which is distorted by their selfishness. Each one sees us partly as he wants to see us or needs to see us. His inner state shapes his image of us. Furthermore his image of us is limited by his experience, knowledge, and change that may have occurred in us. At best his picture is only partially correct.

Each of us needs a mirror outside ourselves which is not distorted by selfishness, nor limited by human experience. We need a mirror outside ourselves, a person, who can give us an objective, honest picture. In short, we need to see ourselves as God sees us. Many religious writers have indicated that we come to a true knowledge of ourselves only as we come to a true knowledge of God.

But how does God see us? How can we possibly know how God sees us? He gives us an identity by giving us His life. Which is similar on a much grander scale to this story which comes from World War I. In a dugout one dying man calls to another wounded: "Listen, Dominique, you've had a bad life. There are no courtesans against me. There is nothing on the books against my name. Take my name. Take my life. I give it to you. Straight off you've no more convictions. Take it, go on and hand yours over to me, so that I can carry all your crimes away with me."

On an infinitely high level this is what God says to you in Jesus Christ: "Take my life. Take my name. I die for you."

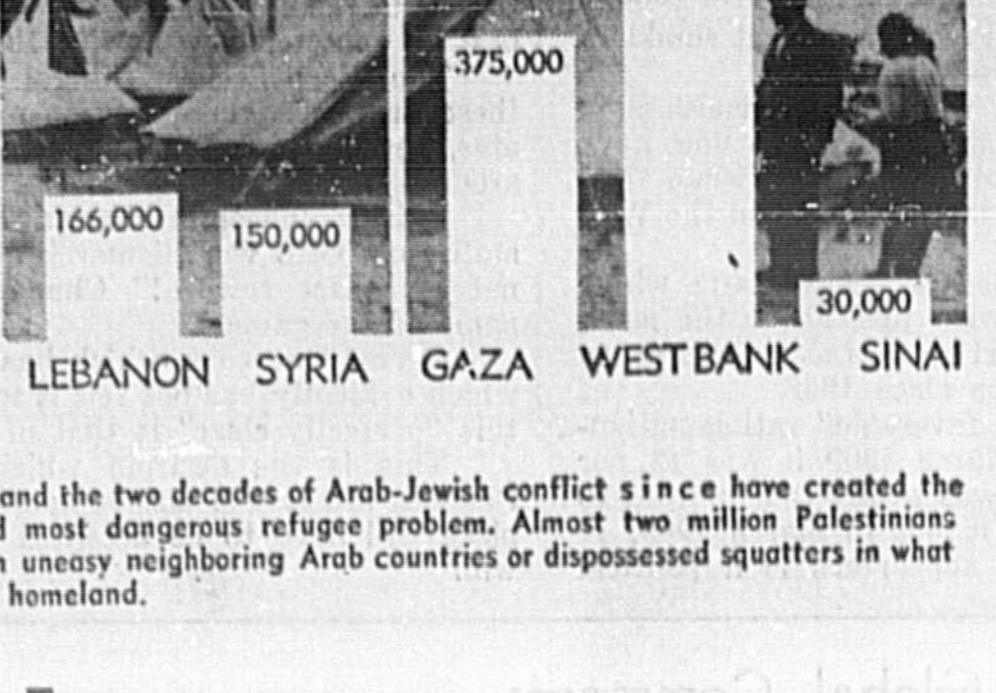

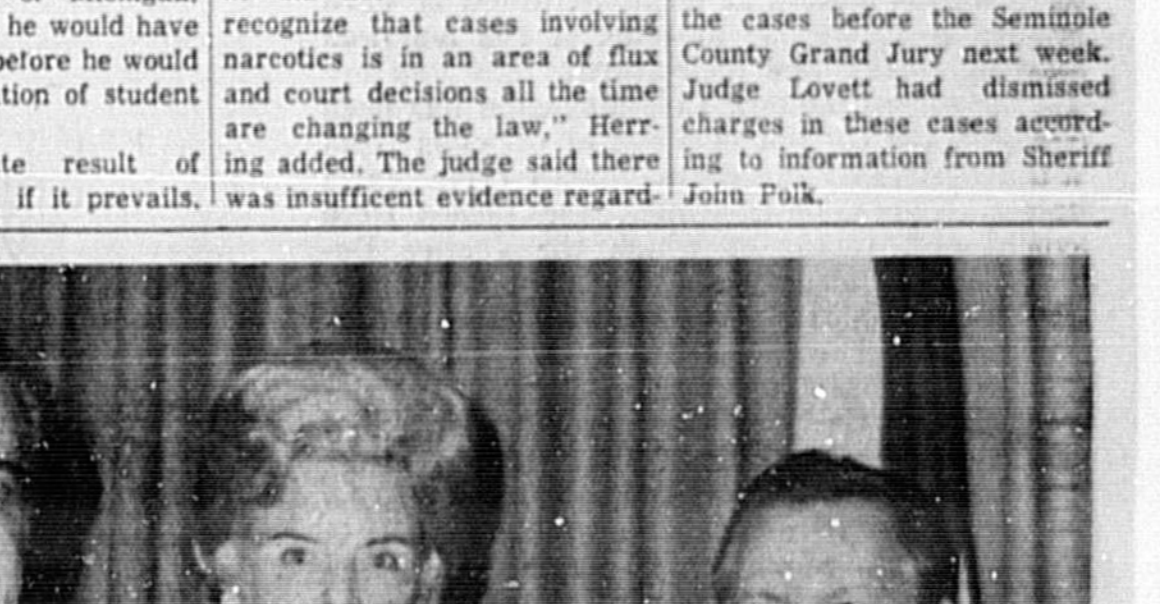

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Comments On New Auto Safety

Editor, Herald:
According to published articles, Ford, General Motors and Chrysler have developed anti-skid devices to give drivers some new model cars, automatic mechanical help when they make panic stops. Ford also has a unit ready. American Motors is testing and there are expected to follow leaders.

Safety officials have said that such devices can make new model cars the safest ever. Engineers have proclaimed them to be the greatest advance ever made in auto safety. Ralph Nader deplores the fact that they are not offered as standard equipment and extensively advertised. The National Highway Traffic Safety Council thinks they are a significant cause of highway fatalities.

The importance of anti-skid devices was firmly established when Ford made its devices standard equipment on the Continental Mark Three for 1970. It is freshly predicted that anti-skid will be standard on all new cars within the foreseeable future. The movement toward anti-skid was started by the auto makers themselves. Ford made this clear when he said, "I'll show you what auto makers do for safety on their own without government prodding or new laws."

Since the auto makers have provided a proven means of helping new car owners eliminate needless skidding accidents, common sense dictates their use on all new cars. While anti-skid devices were developed without new laws, Congress can be expected to require such equipment in all new cars unless auto makers do so voluntarily. Public safety demands it. It is the greatest advance ever made in auto safety.

The car makers did not introduce their anti-skid devices until 1969 although Motor Trend Magazine reported that such devices have been under consideration since 1952. By 1969 the highway slaughter had become so convulsively that balloons, slogans, propaganda, driver education, suggestions and warnings to drive defensively did not give the drivers the automatic help they needed when their tires blew out and their cars were added out of control.

Since the car manufacturers have provided a means of eliminating many needless auto accidents when through cars are equipped with anti-skid devices, common sense dictates that an entirely new

approach to auto safety be established immediately. The records show that something more than the conventional control on automobiles are needed in a panic situation; something that works automatically and mechanically, independent of the driver. The only known accelerator has produced several additional jobs such as tractor and truck driver and at higher wages scale than harvest labor. I feel that when you do a disservice to Mr. Syme and the Seminole County agricultural industry with the caption under last Friday's picture of the entailed harvester at work.

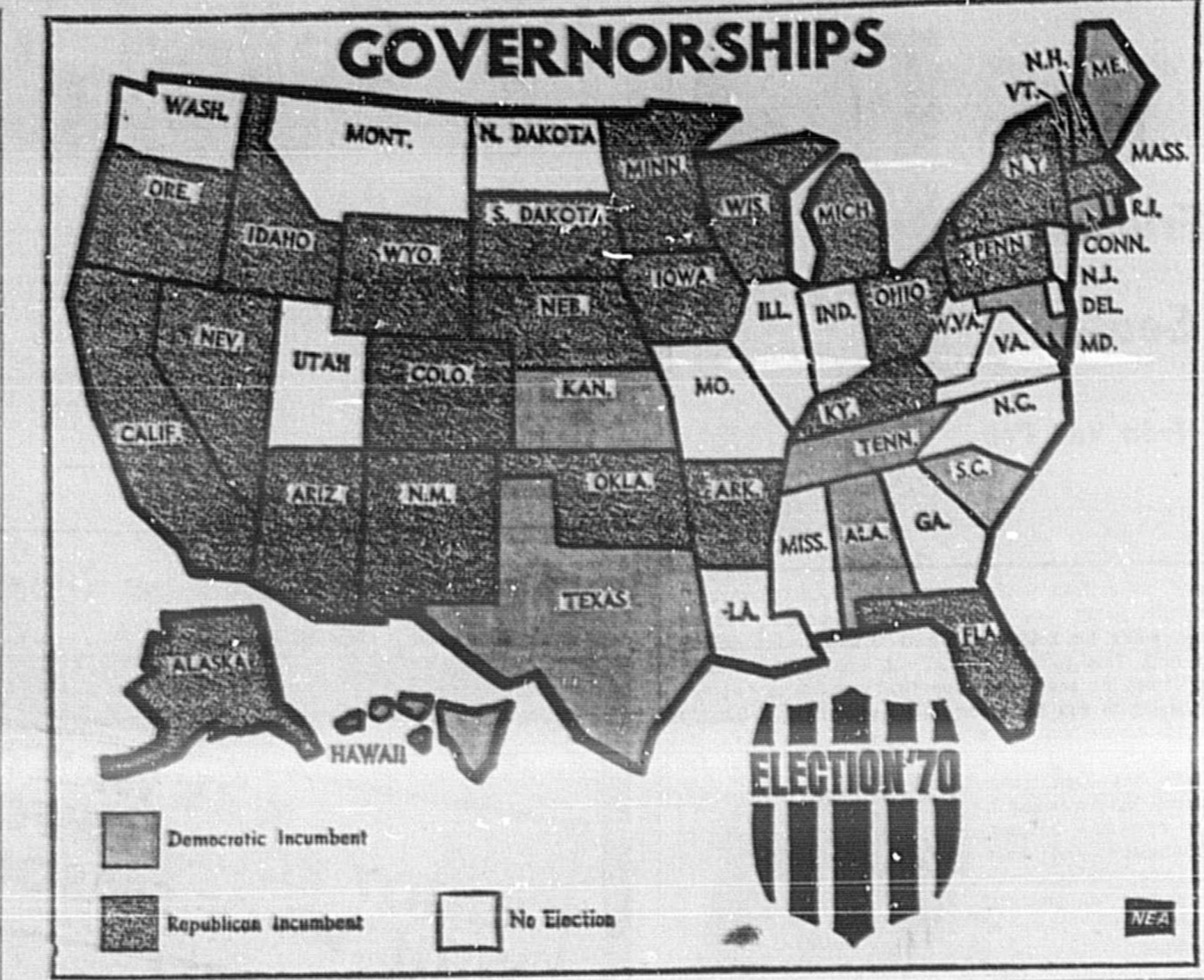

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Orange Grove Setting, Theme For Center

The setting for the Florida Living Nursing Center was cut out of an orange grove," said pretty Mrs. Connie Grove, the interior decorator for the center. "It was the natural thing, then, to use the colors of the grove in the decoration of the center—orange, lime and grapefruit."

Remond A. Wright, the retired president of the Southern Missionary College in Tennessee, a Seventh-day Adventist school, once owned the land the Florida Living Retirement Community and the Nursing Center now occupy. He lives in Forest City. It was his idea to retain the "feeling" of the orange grove. The theme dominates the design of the interior of the center and the landscaping of the beautiful grounds which surround it.

Mrs. Grove, an interior designer with Park Avenue Interiors, Inc. (formerly Flambro Interiors), 401 Park Avenue North, Winter Park, specializes in the decoration of commercial buildings. Her talented touch has made the nursing center a comfortable, functional home for the elderly patients who reside there.

"The design revolved around the idea that the home should be home like and strictly non-institutional. It's a home away from home," she said emphatically.

"Thus, each room was individually designed and no two rooms are alike."

"There are over 300 pictures in the center and no two are alike," she said, emphasizing her point.

The comfort of the patients is enhanced by the wall to wall

carpeting in each of the rooms. Each wing and the large, honey living-quiet area in the center of the home are comfortable and spacious. Wheelchairs are easily accommodated in all parts of the center.

"There are three color televisions," said Mrs. Grove. Her special pride is the game tables found in the lounge. The wooden tables with built-in chess-checker boards, have no legs! The table is suspended

from the right arm of each swivel on casters. Thus they are easily accessible to geriatric patients in wheelchairs since there are no legs to hamper the patients. The table won't tip (even when I jumped up and down on the corner of it. "I test it!" she remarked.

All phases of the patients' lives have been considered by the designers of the center. A meditation chapel, located near the entryway, provides them with a quiet interlude whenever they feel the need for the special peace found there. The cathedral window and the famed enormous head of Christ by Solomon are visible from the entrance.

The colors of orange, grapefruit and lime are apparent throughout the center. "You won't find any blues or reds, unless its in a picture as a background color, anywhere!" said Van McGlawn, administrator of the center.

The carpets in the public areas are lime green. And at each of the two nursing stations a large orange semicircle is set into the lime carpet. To complete this scheme a large, three foot in diameter, orange is applied into the lime carpet of the entry way. Thus the orange grove which occupied the site is still very much in evidence at the Florida Living Nursing Center.

Mrs. Grove (very appropriately named for this project) is also designing the interior of the NCO Club at McCall Air Force Base. She has done the interiors of highrise apartments in Deland, West Palm Beach, as well as many other well-known projects in central Florida.

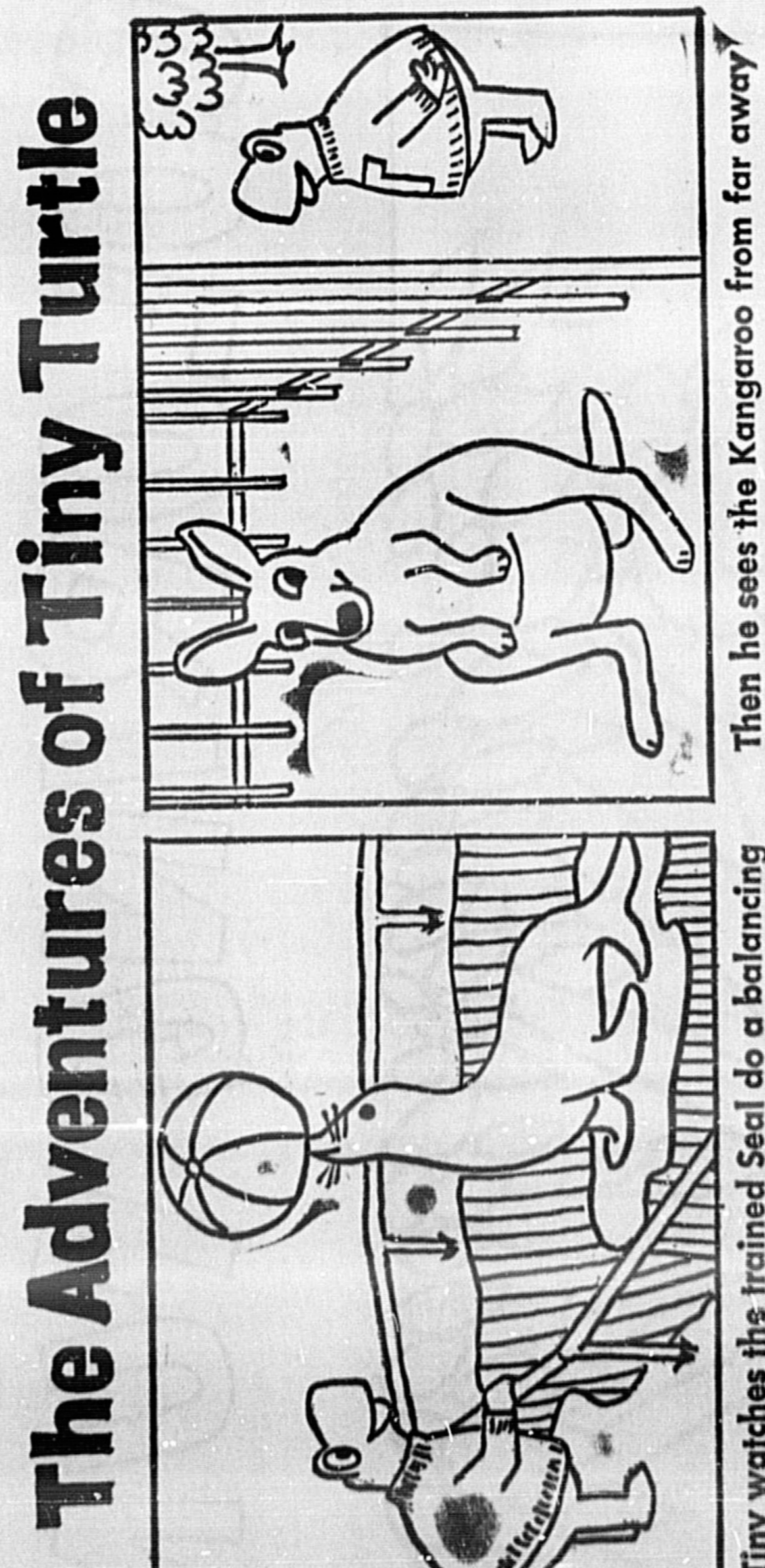

Midway Man Killed; Sanford Man Is Jailed

A Sanford man has been jailed on murder charges after the shooting death of a Midway area resident in a Sunday morning incident. Stephen E. Boston, 31, 1720 Strickland Avenue, was charged by Seminole County investigator L. J. Kriz with murder after Tyrone Henderson, 23, was killed in a 4 a.m. affray that occurred on U.S. 17-92, south of Sunland Estates.

Kriz reported Henderson was dead on arrival at Seminole Memorial Hospital at 4:30 a.m. from a gunshot wound.

He stated Boston was arrested shortly afterwards by Deputy O'Dell Hunt and placed in the county jail without bond.

The incident occurred, Kriz said, after Henderson, accompanied by Boston's wife and four other persons, including a sister-in-law, were riding in Boston's car to Eatonville to a night club.

When they returned, they met Boston in another car just south of Sanford and turned around.

Boston also saw his car and he stopped on the highway to allow Henderson, the driver, to return.

According to Kriz, Boston is alleged to have shot Henderson after the man alighted from the car.

The dead man reportedly had been dating Boston's sister-in-law and had been permitted to drive Boston's car by the accused man's wife.

Tom Speer, assistant state's attorney, has requested an autopsy in Henderson's death, Kriz said.

In another incident, Odessa Delpha Oliver of Midway was jailed on aggravated assault charges after she is alleged to have stabbed Beatrice Davis, Hughley Street, Midway, with an ice pick.

The Davis woman was removed in "fair" condition to Seminole Memorial Hospital.

State's Attorney Has Re-Charged Six 'Hippie' Narcotic Offenders

Six persons have been re-arrested and charged with narcotics violations as a result of direct information filed by Seminole County State's Attorney Abbott Herring, last Friday, said Judge Hall said the charges were dismissed by him "as a result of the evidence presented and the laws of Florida and the United States," after June 15 and June 19 hearings.

Arrested in the May 29 raid were Vicki Dale Williams, Leonard Schilderhouse, Charles Robert Cloud, Debra Lynn Fritch, Dwight Moore Mason, Joe Fuller Cloud, Debra Lynn Capps, Charlotte Christine Thompson, Richard Thomas Helms, Charles Harold King, Richard Dale Hash and Tom A. Fisher. Only Hash was bound over on a possession of marijuana charge by Judge Hall. As a result of the filing of direct information, the following have been re-arrested on possession of narcotics and possession of control of a central nervous system stimulant charges. Noted Speakers At FTU

Two of the most popular causes taken up by students across the country are scheduled for some professional comment at Florida Technological University this coming school year.

The subjects, ecology and women's liberation, will be aired by two acknowledged experts: former Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, and author Betty Friedan, founder of the National Organization for Women (N.O.W.).
