



No shooting will be permitted within 200 yards Danny Tarlton of any main shoreline during the scaup-only season.

Areas selected for the special season are populated by a high preponderance of scaup and there is only slight danger that other species could be shot. Hunting will be mostly by layout boat, sneak boat, or off-shore blinds. Some shooting will be done from the mangrove islands within the delineated



The Florida Budget Commis-sion already bombarded with requests from 10 state agencies -was set today to hear Gov. Claude Kirk's reasons for wanting to more than double his apending.

Requests presented as the week-long hearing began Monday totaled \$69.5 million and, Although the commission did not commit itself about any of the proposals, a schism appeared to be developing between at least two Cabinet members about how the Budget should be forwarded to the Legislature. Kirk's proposed budget for the coming biennium totals \$2.3 million, a 163.8 per cent increase over the governor's budget fo the last two years.

Kirk has said he needs the money to hire a staff for the lieutenant governor and to stop the oft-criticized practice of borrowing from other agencies un der his control.

"This precedent setting budget will finally bring an end to the borrowing of personnel." the governor said in his written budget protosai.

"This budget request is based upon the premise that it is neither proper nor desirable to continue this type of arrange ment with other state agencies."

The Cabinet, sitting as the Budget Commission, is supposed to give agency heads a chance to explain their requests, which are excected to top \$3 billion. The Cabinet will then make a recommendation to the Legisature.

State Comptroller Fred Dickrson said he he feels the Legslature should be handed a balanced budget for 1939 at and a list of priority programs that cannot be accomplished without hiking taxes should be attached. Sin e Schon Supt Floyd Christian sooke out against this approach claiming this would mean that the commission actual have to cut some eruca tion programs that it does not have in authority to touch in bring the figures into balance. The disgute was not settled. but all Cabinet members-in cluding Kirk - seconed to agree that they were submitting a bienniat budget. Leading lowmakers have said they intend to approve an annual budget now that the Legislature will meet every year under the new construction.

The Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement proposed a \$13.8 million budget, including \$2.1 million to Lutic a new head quarter: in Tallahassee and a laboratory in Orlando. A total of 141 new employes were requested.

The School for the Deaf and Blind in St. Augustine asked for \$9.4 million. The proposal included \$1.7 million in construction funcs. An \$8.7 million budget-an

increase of \$3.1 million over the last biennum-was requested by the State Beverage Department. Director Ad Brautigam. claiming the state was losing \$150,000-a month because of cigarette boo''egging, said he needed the extra money to beef up his enforcement capacities.


The State Planning and Budget Commission submitted a '969-71 proposal totaling \$6.3 million and the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission said it needed \$4.5 million for the next two vears.
