Sanford's City Commission deserves a vote of thanks for \$10,000 worth of progressiveness in voting to match a like sum contributed by Chase & Co. for the construction of a municipal swimming pool. This leaves us just \$15,000 away from a convenient place to swim. May be there is someone else in Sanford who will come forward with another \$10,000, or perhaps there are 15 citizens of our fair city who would give \$1,000 each for a place to swim during the noon hour next summer.

The City of Ocala is planning a \$250,000 sewage disposal plant which Sanford can't afford and so indignantly cultivates an epidemic by dumping its sewage into Lake Monroe. When the Sanford Naval Air Station came here, its engineers decided it would be worth while to build a disposal system big enough to more than accommodate the two thousand people at the station. It was not too expensive for them. It might pay Sanford citizens to find out how Ocala and the Naval Air Station do it.

We hope Sanford citizens have noticed, in these days of manpower shortages and million dollar yard men, how well maintained Fort Mellon Park has been during this war. We remember shortly after Pearl Harbor falling by there and bemoaning: "Well, there goes our Park. All those beautiful trees will be gone before this war is over." But they aren't. In fact, if the conditions in our own garden had been as few proprietors as we would be very proud. Superintendent Parks Houghton has done a good job under difficult circumstances.

Somewhere or other all this talk about cancelling Lead Lease to the British and making them an additional outright loan so that they can continue to buy goods from this country doesn't appeal to us as sound economics. Of course, we know that sound economics is something that goes out of fashion years ago, but at the same time we don't think much about it. We think we should be making our own money and then we can buy the things we need.

The School Bell

Ring out the old, ring in the new. It is not Christmas yet, but it is almost as good to hear the school bells ringing and millions of children answering to the call. For a little while, at least, the children frankly like it, and the beginning of the school year gains the dignity and interest of a national festival.

Well may all those students and their parents rejoice, and the world of travel and business and labor rejoice with them. For in millions of homes, the world over, the men as well as the children are going back to their jobs. And though the human and material losses are great, at least the civilized world, rescued from chaos and destruction, is starting the long but welcome task of getting back to normal.

With God's help, it will be a new normal, operating on a higher rather than a lower plane. For the loss and terror into which the human race was plunged has made clearer than ever the ancient truths and values which our age so nearly lost. For a long time now, every school, every church, every home, every gathering of normal men and women doing normal and human things in their own free way, may seem like a special, divine gift. May such gratitude and appreciation long endure.

Fewer Air Bumps

There's a happy day coming—for air travelers, at least. That's the prediction of A.J. Earling, vice president of the Chicago & Southern Airlines. Through many long and weary years, those forced for one reason or another to travel by commercial plane have learned the truth of the wartime slogan—"If you have plenty of time, travel by air." They have been refused from the beginning, or "bumped" at any old stop along the way to make room for those who had more urgent government orders. But their day will come—the signs are sure.

True, Mr. Earling says, a limited priority system may still eliminate some travelers before they begin their trips. But once on their way, there may soon be no more "bumping." They'll go on until their destinations are reached.

This in itself will mean a tremendous saving in civilian time, not to mention the energy of many a patient and long-suffering priority clerk.

Scientific Peace

The airplane was created in America, and its chief uses, for both war and peace, are still furthest advanced in this country. So true is this that an American correspondent and air official familiar with the big war fronts in Europe says: German civilians still get the shakes when you talk about American air power, and show signs of personal fear when they discover that you were a part of the United States air force.

This fear is a very wholesome thing, when considered in the light of past and present history. And our American military authorities are showing notable wisdom and foresight in forbidding Germans hereafter to make or use of the future for military use, whether offensive or defensive, and it will be necessary to keep our enemies grounded until there need be no more fear of their abusing such power, as they have done. This deprivation may have to be enforced on the Germans, or any other international law-breakers, for at least a generation or two.

The days of scientific peace, as contrasted with scientific war, may operate more effectively and quickly than most of us have expected. An American official says: "German scientists who a few months ago were devising new airplanes and weapons to kill us with now seem eager to work for us."

A Swimming Pool

Orlando Jaycees are grateful to see that the City Commission has taken cognizance of the fact that if Orlando is to keep pace with other Florida municipalities in growth we must provide adequate swimming facilities for our citizens. As a starter the city engineers are purifying the water in Lake Lorna Doone with the view of making this body of water safe for swimmers. According to plans outlined by the City Fathers the lake will be cleaned out thoroughly and a bathing beach with adequate bathing facilities installed. This is a step in the right direction for Orlando's lakes, in their present condition, are unfit for public swimming. However, if it is the aim and purpose of the city to clean out and purify the waters of several of its beautiful lakes for swimming purposes the cost of such undertakings will result in the expenditure of thousands of dollars. But can Orlando afford to be without a municipal swimming pool? Yes, our lakes are beautiful and there is no doubt that they can be made safe for swimming.

But so are the lakes in and near Lakeland and several other progressive Florida cities just as beautiful and could be made fit for swimming. There must be a reason for these municipalities having a municipal swimming pool? If other Florida municipalities can provide swimming pools for their citizens and visitors, then why not Orlando?

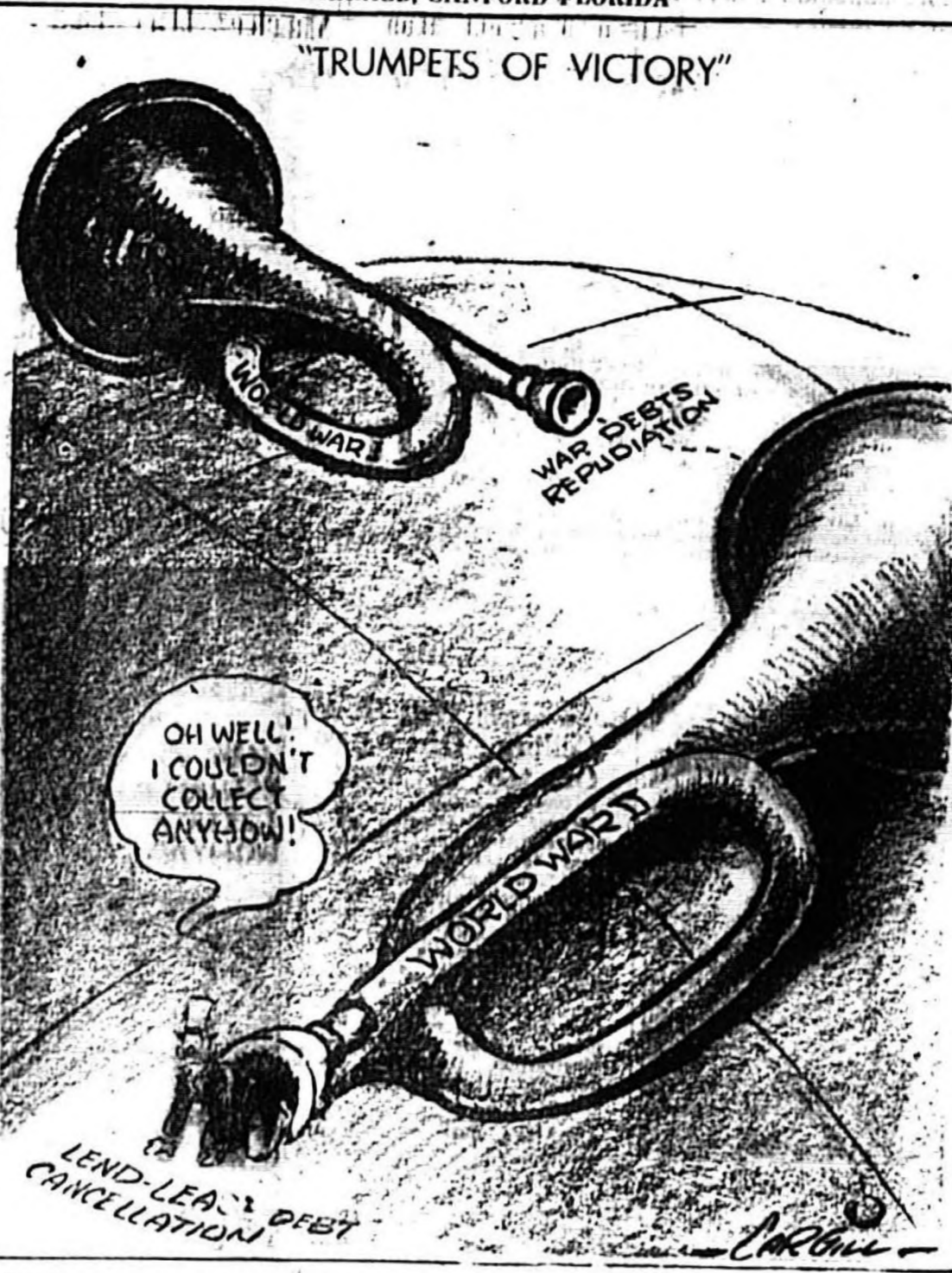

It is the people's choice and if you can't take our word for it, City Fathers just poll your fellow taxpayers and voters? We are confident you will see the light and give Orlando citizens a swimming pool which will be second to none!

We have in our possession a booklet from the Portland Cement Association of Chicago, which tells how other American cities, some much smaller than Orlando have constructed modern, up-to-date swimming pools which are self-supporting. It can be had for the asking.

productive gas in the world. Drilling has begun on Mifont No. 2, and, nearby, Las Norias No. 1 has been rigged up. And elsewhere in northern Mexico will be alleviated by Mifont No. 1, a Pemex spokesman says. Everett L. De Golyer, Dallas geologist, heads Pemex's "strategic board" in the search for oil. Among 30 exploration crews at work, four are U. S. geologists, and three are U. S. drillers, too. Exploration is under way in six untested zones.

Will Yanks Return? Since wildcatting is expensive and Pemex is operating at a loss, the possibility of Mexico's permitting U. S. oil companies to return, forming subsidiaries in which Mexico, capital predominates, has been discussed. U. S. promoters, however, are finding oil in Venezuela, Colombia, Peru and elsewhere, and informed persons prefer their return unless Mexico offers adequate guarantees against expropriation.

Pemex is holding production to 120,000 barrels daily, as compared with 2,192,512 barrels daily in Texas alone. A \$100,000,000 expansion program, including the country's largest ethane refinery, a cracking plant



at Ponta Rica and enlargement of the pipeline from there to Mexico. The U. S. government advanced \$10,000,000 for the project. Six U. S. geologists, including Phillips Petroleum, are helping with the construction.

More than 12,000,000 documents of the governments of the United States and Great Britain in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations are being duplicated for historical records.

Spitalny's Violinist Has A New Fiddle

NEW YORK — Chances are you won't be hearing it on the Hour of Charm radio program, but Evelyn, Paul Spitalny's violinist, has a new fiddle.

It is made from a potbellied mahogany walking stick—a novelty popular with German and Hungarian musician carpenters 150 years ago. Collectors say the instrument is rare today.

The case becomes a violin when a center panel is removed, revealing the strings. The handle unscrews to open a hollow shaft where a bow is kept. When it is replaced the curved handle fits under the chin.

Evelyn says the violin can play about everything a score would call for, from pizzicato to harmonics.

The fiddle was sent to her by Fred Wright of Ajo, Ariz., a weather-beaten Irish prospector 77 years old. Wright says his brother, now dead, brought it to this country from Africa in 1911. He sent it to Evelyn, he says, because she's his favorite violinist.

Gen. MacArthur Clamps Censorship On Jap Press, Radio

Pending the arrival of American troops, the Japanese were directed to maintain order and disarm their soldiers in northern Japan, where naval patrol boats and carrier planes mounted guard.

MacArthur issued two statements yesterday, one pledging that Japanese militarism would be stamped out the other assuring his troops they would be sent home as quickly as peace could be secured.

In the first he declared that the Japanese would be given a chance to rule under his orders but with the ever-swelling occupation forces prepared to back his decrees.

Administrative Troops

In the second he admonished his troops to respect the rights of the vanquished Japanese people, declaring that "looting, pillage, rape and other deliberate violations of universal standards of human behavior would be but a stain on your own high honor."

Although the American flag flew over Tokyo, there was little to remind the vanquished people that there were conquerors about as MacArthur put into practice his plan to use his forces of occupation only as trouble shooters.

No American troops were to be seen at bridges or docks, nor was to be in the principal streets, nor did they stand guard around Government buildings or other vital installations.

But more and more soldiers were landing by air and sea in the Tokyo-Yokohama area, cavalrymen were operating as far as 15 miles west of the capital and other troops were ready to embark for Japan.

Lieut. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger said that part of his U.S. Eighth Army of occupation would continue moving north of Tokyo and two divisions would land on the northernmost home island of Hokkaido about Oct. 5.

MacArthur announced in a statement yesterday the policy of his command, under which his occupation forces would act primarily as an agency upon which he may call to enforce obedience to his instructions.

This statement said every opportunity first would be given Emperor Hirohito or his government to carry out orders without compulsion.

Liberal Trend Encouraged

While he set forth the abolition of Japan's militarism and militant nationalism as the first post-war objective, MacArthur said it would be the purpose of the occupying forces to encourage liberal tendencies.

Freedom of speech, press, religion and assembly will be limited only by the need for maintaining military security.

Market Director Sees Big Future For Cattlemen

Some things at a profit in competition with any outside sources.

Nathan Mayo has emphasized the possibilities for cattle industry expansion for a long time. This expansion was naturally curbed and hampered as long as the cattle tick menaced our animals. This enemy of the industry has now been definitely conquered and the recent expansion of pure bred herds has been rather amazing.

A survey conducted recently has revealed that there are 163 pure bred beef herds in the State. These include Brahmas, Angus, Polled Hereford, Short Horn, Hereford, Red Polled and Devon cattle. The Brahmas lead in numbers of herds, with Angus and Polled Hereford taking rather close second and third place.

Plans for the development of a strong fine new show ring, advantageously located over the State are progressing satisfactorily under the sponsorship of Commissioner Mayo. The Commissioner has called a meeting in Winter Haven for next Friday to confer with cattle industry leaders from Orlando and the adjacent territory. At this time show ring plans, other matters of local interest, and the entire Florida livestock industry will get attention. Barlow is expected to have a good delegation present. It is a county organization having already secured the building of one of the show rings in that city.

It is becoming increasingly apparent that from the standpoint of the cattle industry fields and standing possibilities for Florida. This State's mild climate and the fact that excellent grazing can be provided throughout the year combine with other factors to attract attention and foreign producers.

Apparently San Island cattle is the favorite breed of the Florida stock raiser. It is estimated that 100,000 head of this breed are in the State. The Central Florida Cattle Raisers' Association has endeavored to grow small range cattle, a desirable crop to be established during the off season for their principal crop. In other areas they say it is possible to raise profitable range cattle on a small acreage.

to those countries which require it to get back on their economic feet. The case of France is probably most urgent of all although The Netherlands and Belgium have pressing need to keep imports going into their countries.

Along with all the other nations receiving lend-lease during the war, France suffered a severe economic shock when sudden victory over Japan brought an end to lend-lease supplies. The French, however, have an agreement to keep making supplies on credit. What they have needed is someone to finance the credit.

For this purpose the Government has expanded the lending program of the Export-Import Bank to a total of \$3,000,000,000. Of this approximately \$2,000,000,000 is available for lend-lease and most of it, bank officials say, will go to finance the lend-lease purchases in this country.

Some official estimates made by authoritarians familiar with what foreign governments are making say that the United States has requests for more than \$6,000,000,000 during the next 12 months to finance purchases in this country, and that additional billions will be sought over the succeeding two years.

At the moment the Government has developed no clear policy on lending except that it intends to give financial help to the extent of the nation's ability.

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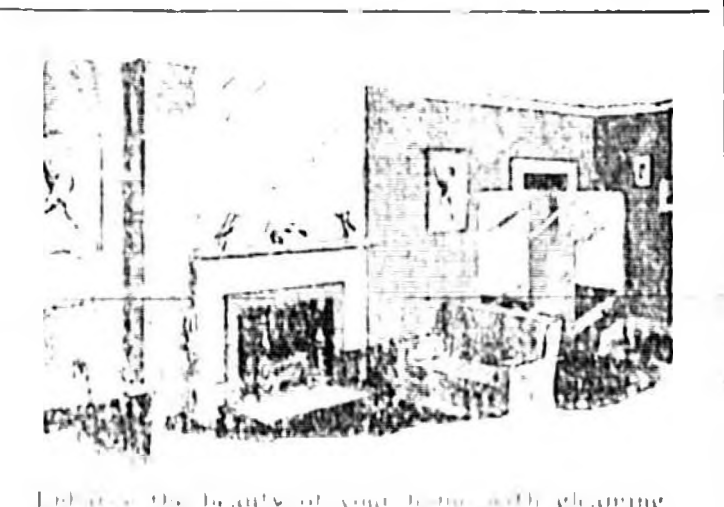

Japanese Now Picture G. I.'s As Gentle Fellows

Propaganda To Own People Drops Stress U. S. Barbarity

YOKOHAMA, Sept. 9. (Special)—Japan's noisy but not always well oiled propaganda machine has been converted since the nation's capitulation from the production of hate to the production of sweet good will. The official "line" today is to expose the mistakes and faults of the war and persuade the people that their only course now is to play correctly the role of defeated nation.

The first concern in the mind of the government seems to be to put the people in the proper frame of mind for hospitable reception of the Allied occupation army. After several years of emphasis on American "barbarity" Japan's propaganda has suddenly discovered that American soldiers are just nice, gentle fellows, after all.

Tokyo's English language newspaper, "The Nippon Times," sent to some towns to point out that when the troops of the 11th Air-Borne Division landed at Atsugi Airfield, they "picked wild flowers and pinned them on their breasts." News reports have repeatedly referred to the friendly attitude of the American troops.

Appeals to Officers. As officers of the Japanese Army are potentially the main source of indoctrination of the government's programs, special efforts are being made to convert them to a recognition of the harsh realities of Japan's plight. The war Ministry yesterday issued a special appeal to the officers and sergeants to "offer every convenience and kindness to the occupying forces." The appeal is based on loyalty to the Emperor.

While the majority of Japanese troops accepted the orders unquestioningly, the War Ministry admitted that some of them were not pleased to take the quieting action or desert their barracks. But "in no time," it added, "did they come to realize the great and far-reaching benefit of his imperial majesty."

Lieutenant General Kamei Ichihara, in another appeal made through the Tokyo press, declared that "the greatest cause of defeat was a decay of morality among the people." He said, "The Japanese people, production and the life of the people, and threatened by the armed forces. He described the situation as a "total defeat" but said it had been defused by those who sought to use it to selfish ends.

Ichihara forecast an attempt by the Americans to "conquer Japan, and saw an added threat to traditional Japanese thought from British and Soviet ideas. Nevertheless, he advocated the "highest freedom of thought and opinion, and the divesting of Japan's garment of self-deception."

These official comments give only a faint hint of the bath of criticism which Japanese officials and propagandists are now providing for themselves and their listeners.

Church Members Are Reported Now At All Time High

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Church membership in the United States has reached an all-time high of 72,192,667 persons, more than 52% of the population, according to the 1945 edition of the Yearbook of American Churches, published under the auspices of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.

In announcing its publication today, Dr. Benson V. Landis, secretary of the Yearbook, pointed out that the total membership figure is officially reported in 256 religious bodies in the continental United States, representing an increase of 1,941,481 over that reported for the previous year. Total church membership as well as the proportion of church members in the population has been a steady increase since 1920, when 51,291,141 members of 256 religious bodies reported.
