

The Interstate Commerce Commission has entered upon a general investigation into the interstate rates and charges of express carriers for the purpose of determining whether such rates and charges, or any of them, are unreasonable.

The American Railway Express Company has also filed its application with the Interstate Commerce Commissio nto increase its rates, and such application has been consolidated with the General Express Investigation for the purpose of hearing.

This case has been listed under I. C. C. Docket No. 13930, and the matter has been set down for hearing before Examiners Barclay and Mullen, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, and Examiner Harriman of the California Railroad Commission, sitting as the representative of the State Commissions. Hearing will be held at the United States Court o'clock n. m., on Feb. 19, 1923.

This commission requested that one of the hearings in this case be held at Jacksonville, so that the Florida shippers could present their testimony at a minimum of expense, but the Interstate Commerce Commission, having set down hearings at ten different points in the United States, found that only one hearing could be held in the southeast, and held that Atlanta was most centrally bested wit hreference to that territory.

This hearing in Atlanta will be the only opportunity offered to Florida shippers to present their testimony to the Interstate Commerce Commission, and shippers who are of the opinion that the present express rates are too high should avail themselves of it.



It must be hitched on to E. business properly. Then it must be utilized with intelligence When these conditions are fulfilled it does a type of work for which there is no efficient substitute.
