New Occupational, Beverage Licenses On Sale Tomorrow

Beverage and occupational licenses for the year 1956-57 will go on sale tomorrow morning according to John L. Galloway, county tax collector.

"Notices are being mailed to all those who had licenses for the year 1955-56," Galloway said. He expects to sell approximately 150 occupational licenses and 160 beverage licenses.

Galloway pointed out that under the new law holders of beverage licenses must present the license for the current year in order to obtain a new one. Also, if they operate within city limits they must show their city licenses for the year 1955-57. The new license must be obtained by Oct. 1. Galloway said if a beverage license is not renewed by that date a new application will have to be obtained from the state Beverage Department.

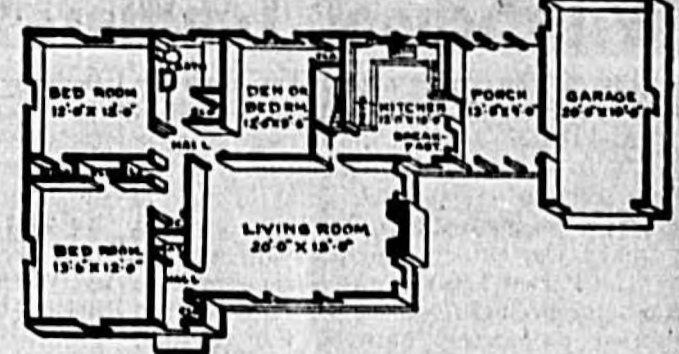

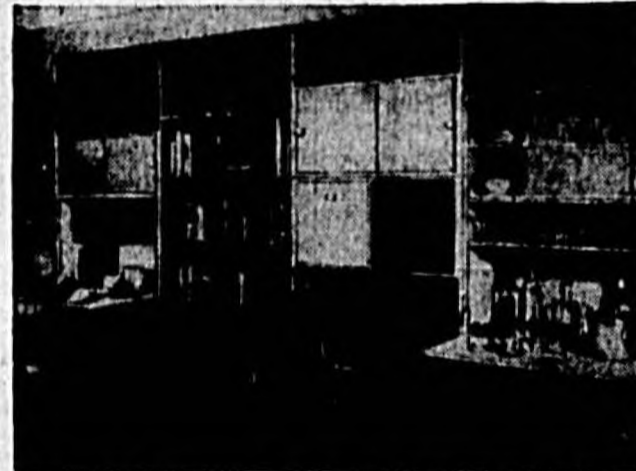

Frank Gore, handling the backfield, starts his first year coaching after recently graduating from the University of Florida. "It's wonderful to have the drive, enthusiasm, and good cooperation these two have given me," Coach Payne remarked. "And the boys have taken to the Split-T like duck to water."

Harold Wittern and Jim Buckler co-chairmen of the Peanut Bowl committee had questionnaires sent out last week to the pupils' parents, and from the results of the one, and from the results of the returns a large turnout is expected. Seminole JV mentor Dick Silvers has registered concern over the imposing Lyman starting lineup, but Coach Payne said, "We don't want any undue injuries in this game, and we're going to do what we can to avoid it. We, of course, want to win the game, but at the same time we want to put on a good show for the fans. We don't have many reserves, and those have no game experience; but they will have after Saturday night."

Naval Academy Plans Expansion

ANNAPOLIS, Md. —The U. S. Naval Academy, which has long suffered growing pains, is ready to take another step into the Severn River.

Starting in February, it will fill in enough land to add 60.5 acres to the present grounds. This will be the fourth major landfill since 1898 and will nearly equal all previous ones combined.

The new landfill, to be completed in 1959, will make room for construction of two more wings on Bancroft Hall, the huge midshipman dormitory; a barracks for enlisted men now crowded aboard a temporary station ship, and expansion of construction recreation and drill fields.

In addition, plans are afoot for a new football stadium to be constructed outside academy grounds within the next two years. It will replace antiquated Thompson Stadium, now taking up six valued acres of land inside academy walls.

These moves will relieve the academy's congestion but not cure it.

"We are hemmed in on all sides," says Adm. William R. Smedberg III who took over as academy superintendent in March.

"There are less than 400 acres in the immediate academy area within our boundaries," he said.

West Point has 15,000 acres. The Air Force Academy has 27,300. The most urgent is the expansion of Bancroft Hall, the world's largest dormitory. Built to house 2,500 midshipmen, it will have 3,600 crowded into it this fall.

The 7½ million dollar landfill, requested in 1948 but not approved until the 1956 session of Congress, will pave the way. The project calls for removal of 2½ million cubic yards of dirt from the bottom of the river to fill in a new academy border ranging up to 200 yards into the river.

The Navy started with a purchase of about 10 acres in 1845 and has bought 167 acres over the years. The other 67 have been acquired through five different landfills into the Severn since 1898.

Adm. Smedberg says the current growing pains were brought on by an expanded enrollment during World War II.

As long as the Navy maintains large forces, the academy will need to graduate 600 to 800 officers a year as permanent career men, he says.

NEW YORK —Ellis Island will be put up for sale to the highest bidder for commercial use.

The 27½-acre island, gateway to America for millions of immigrants for a half century, was given up by the Immigration Service Nov. 12, 1954.

Decision to sell the island was announced by Walter F. Downey, regional commissioner for the General Services Administration of the federal government.

The announcement ended hopes that the historic spot—once a picnic ground for Dutch settlers, a gallows site for the pirate gibbets, and the site of a harbor defense fort—might be preserved as a public area.

said. "Recorded history will not come within the parallel of it."
Rev. Fr. Daly said "We've heard of the struggle between the East and the West; between tyranny and freedom; between atheism and religious liberty; the whole world is pulling first one way and then the other."
"We are going through the gravest period of productivity the world has known," he said. "We've been able to master nature and have wrung from the bowels of science some of nature's secrets."
"There is hardly a home in the world we call society which isn't touched by this upheaval," Rev. Fr. Daly said. "One of the greatest crosses we have to bear is the stress of the emotionally disturbed, do not speak in the field of medicine or psychiatry, but I do speak in the field of morality."
Speaking on Love-Peace-and-Faith, Rev. Fr. Daly said that "We rub elbows with those of emotional disturbance who cannot discern between right and wrong."
"They have injected materialism into love. It is played up in such magnitude that they feel the essence of love is sex alone," he said.
"Because of the constant flux they become confused and because they cannot find love, they slip over into the opposite—hate, greed and disrespect. Disappointed in love, because they do not get what they want, their homes start to crumble."
"Love is not what you get but what you can give," he said.
Striking at the search for peace, Rev. Fr. Daly stated, "we're looking for peace but yet peace starts from within the individual. Peace is not for a the outside but from the inside—it is a spiritual thing."
Pointing to the symbols of the times he said that those outward things "such as jazz and other exhibitionism come and go."
"And in our lack of faith," he said, "we've been taught that medicine, science and education are a panacea." And added, when they find that the couch isn't as comfortable as it should be they become disillusioned at the whole world."
"These things, as we analyze them today, are not new. There have always been men who were confused in love, who sought peace and who lacked faith," said Rev. Fr. Daly. "We are one day lost the pitch—the moral tone is not there at all."
"This is your time now—for in times of great peril—the sign of the times was the thing that led men through great battles," he said.
"The pickfork that brings back the tone is the cross."
Rev. Fr. Daly pointed out that men should be honest in business, have charity in speech, have respect for authority, be registered voters, and give civil authority your support.
He warned, "men and women are wandering around not knowing where they are going—disillusioned in love—disappointed in peace—and without faith."

Lund Denounces Of Meeting Places Herlong's Choice

Arnold Lund, Republican nominee for Congress of the Fifth Congressional District denounced Congressman A. B. Herlong Jr's use of post office buildings and city halls as meeting places during a political campaign in a speech before the Marion County Republican Club at Ocala Friday night.
"Use of post offices and city halls as a meeting place by politicians during a campaign is certainly in poor taste," Lund declared, "The law that gives Congressmen the right to meet their constituents in post offices was designed to make it easier for the public to present their problems to their representatives. It was not intended that they should be used as a campaign headquarters during a campaign."
"Had Mr. Herlong been concerned about meeting the people and finding out their problems," Lund stated, "he had plenty of time immediately after Congress adjourned to make this visit. If he had done it then, it would have been meritorious and no one would have complained. Instead, however, he postponed his visit until the campaign for reelection is beginning. Does he believe anyone is being fooled by this delay."
"I don't believe tax-payer's resources should be used indirectly to gain reelection. The law should be amended to prevent practices of using post office buildings for political purposes. If this cannot be done, the law ought to be repealed. I think any conscientious congressman can find ways and means to meet the people and hear their problems without making the public pay for it," he said.
"And that goes for members of both parties."
Lund pointed out that the small farmers of the type prevailing in this area of Florida ought to have special favor.
"The small farmers of this district needed help to establish their economic balance," Lund said, "their economic position must be strengthened because they cannot compete with the rich farm areas elsewhere. Instead of being too concerned over Foreign economic aid, let's be sure we take care of the forgotten small farmer of the South."
"During eight years in Congress," Mr. Herlong has done nothing about this. The small farmer has been crying loud and long for some help but Mr. Herlong has not heard them. He had not introduced nor sought for any legislation that they need and must have," he added. "The economy of our rural communities directly affects every town and city in this district. Therefore, we must have such legislation to better the economic stability of the entire area."

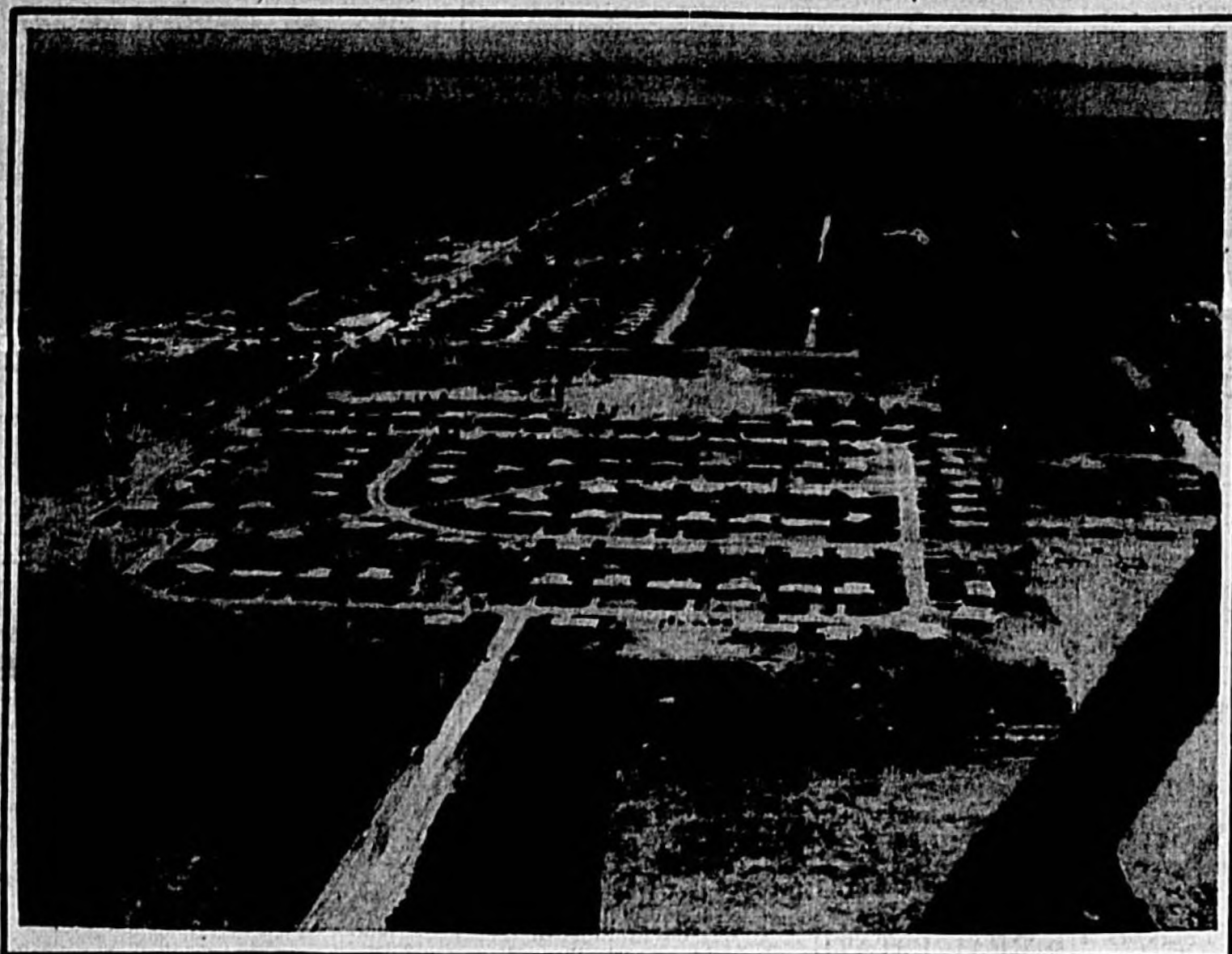

Equalization Board Refuses To Reduce Tax Assessments

The Board of Sanford City Commissioners, sitting as an Equalization Board last night, gave nine complainants the same answer: "The assessment will stand as is."

However, only two of the taxpayers who objected to assignments appeared before the board to argue their objections.

M. R. Strickland, representing American Oil Company objected to the assessment made by the city on merchandise inventory at the Sanford bulk plant.

A. H. Gaede, representing the Sanford Gas Company, again asked for a reduction in the assessed valuation on both real and personal property.

"I believe that our distribution system is grossly overvalued," Gaede told the commissioners as he presented pictures to describe real estate holdings also claimed as overvalued.

He said, "We have abandoned over two miles of main lines when French Ave. was built and no reduction was made in personal property values."

"All we want is to be treated on a fair and equal basis," Gaede said, "that's the reason I come back here year after year."

"I don't believe we have yet received a fair tax," he said. After reviewing the tax assessments on real and personal property of the Sanford Gas Company, the Board of Commissioners, as an Equalization Board, refused to reduce the assessments.

H. N. Sayer, the city's Tax Assessor, said that the company's overall tax was reduced \$33.05 over last year.

Gaede said, as he left the city commission room, "I'll be back next year."

Mother Says Parris Island Marines Are Living Under Fear

NORWALK, Ohio (AP)—The mother of a Marine recruit, who claims he was hit in the stomach by a corporal for failing to say "sir" to her, said today that Marines at Parris Island are "living under a fear—a nervous fear."

The South Carolina training station is where six Marine recruits drowned in a marsh during a night march this summer.

Mrs. R. L. Hammar, mother of six children and wife of a World War I Army veteran, said she had been at other camps but had never seen such "fear" as evidenced at Parris Island.

She claims her 20-year-old son, Donald, was hit by a corporal for not saying "sir" to the non-commissioned officer during a mop bucket demonstration.

Hammar underwent an emergency hernia operation. The Marine Corps, which is investigating the whole incident, said the recruit had a congenital hernia and it did not know whether any blow aggravated it.

Mrs. Hammar said Donald "wanted out of there"—the Marines—but did not know whether he would formally apply for such a release. She said she was not planning to ask for any release and that such a step was up to him.

Prisoners Protest Food; Slash Selves With Razor Blades

WUNTSVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Twenty-eight of the toughest inmates in the Texas prison system slashed themselves with razor blades last night in a protest against prison food.

They were among the 70 involved in a strike in the maximum security unit last week in another protest involving the food. Prison General Manager O. B. Williams said 10 of the men covered their head tendons and 20 inflicted superficial wounds on arms and legs.

Williams said the prison food is as good as any in the best prisons. Men in the maximum security unit do no work and are served two meals a day with a sack of candy.

Williams said the demonstrators will be deprived of movie and other privileges.

DE BARY — "Hear the lions roar!" shout the children on Saturday morning at the zoo. Shivering delightfully they crowd around the cages where the restless cats oblige by scolding off in deep, ferocious bellows. Next to the king of beasts, Bill Compton, vendor of popcorn, peanuts and novelties does the best carnival trade. The youngsters mill around, grasping balloons and feathered monkeys on sticks so firmly that mothers, dad and granddad have to part with coins and join the joyous hubbub.

The full 37-member commission will decide on the draft of the proposed new Constitution it will recommend to the 1957 Legislature.

If approved by the Legislature, the Constitution would be submitted to the people in the 1958 general election.

The present Constitution provided for 26 Senate districts and for a 35 member House. The reapportionment amendment calls for reapportioning the House on a population basis.

The present Constitution calls for the Legislature to be held in extraordinary session until it reappears if it fails to accomplish reapportionment during the regular session of a reapportionment year.

The 1945 Legislature failed to reapportion the Senate during 116 days of extraordinary session. It then went into a series of extended recesses, the last of which runs up to Nov. 8 general election, with the result that Senate reapportionment still hasn't been accomplished.

The preliminary draft of the new Constitution provides that if the Legislature fails to reach agreement on redistricting the Senate during the regular 8-day session the job shall be turned over to a commission composed of the governor, secretary of state and attorney general.

And if these fail to agree within 30 days after final adjournment of the Legislature, the governor would be empowered to do the redistricting.

The formula for House reapportionment would be as at present—that the five most populous counties get three representatives each and all other counties one each.

The larger counties would get an additional representative for each 100,000 population.

On the basis of the 1950 federal census, the house would have 110 members, with Dade County having eight; Duval six; Hillsborough five; Pinellas and Polk four each and Escambia, Orange and Palm Beach three each.

Representatives would serve four year terms. The plan also calls for legislative salaries amounting to \$300 a month instead of \$100 a month they now receive.

City Adds Aircraft Damage Coverage To Insurance Plan

The City of Sanford increased its fire insurance coverage and added coverage for aircraft damage to all city property at its special meeting last night following the Board of Equalization meeting.

Added cost to the city will be approximately \$500, according to Andrew Carraway, who was named Supervising Agent for the city's insurance program.

In the centralization of the city's insurance program, 12 insurance agencies will share in the commissions, with only one policy written to cover the city's fire damage instead of the ten policies as in the past.

The insurance committee setting up the centralized plan under a supervising agent was composed of: Andrew Carraway, of Carraway and McKibbin; B. B. Crumley, of Crumley and Monteth; and H. James Gut, of the H. James Gut Agency.

The new plan for the city's insurance coverage was approved by City Manager Warren E. Knowles and City Clerk H. N. Sayer before its presentation to the Board of Sanford City Commissioners last night.

Five insurance agencies under the new plan, will be written on the annual renewal plan. However, the aircraft damage policy will be written for a three year period.

HOUSEPAINTER CHARGED IN HIT-RUN DEATH

TAMPA (AP)— Sheriff Ed Blackburn has reported charging Richard Vanzant, a housepainter, with manslaughter, reckless driving and leaving the scene of an accident in the hit-run death of 10-year-old James Wayne Jeffcoat. The boy was hit by a truck Saturday night while wheeling a gift bicycle to a filling station to get the tires pumped up.

Sendoff Breakfast Is Held

WASHINGTON (AP)— President Eisenhower told Republican campaigners today that they need only to tell the truth about his administration to win the election. Eisenhower spoke at a sendoff breakfast for Vice President Nixon and other Republican leaders setting out on campaign tours.

"We do not need to indulge in the exaggerations of partisan politics. I do not claim perfection for this administration but where we have failed it was not from lack of trying."

Sounding a peace theme, Eisenhower said it is difficult to be as peaceful in the present day world as Americans would like to be. He said that while we may be as peaceful as possible, someone else may make an aggressive move that would disturb that peace.

"While it is not a secure peace that we have," he said, "there are many, many thousands of American mothers that are mightily thankful their sons are not involved in any shooting."

Eisenhower, wearing a beaming smile, walked into the dining room with GOP National Chairman Leonard W. Hall.

Eisenhower chatted animatedly with Nixon as he ate. Secretary of Interior Fred Brown, Sen. Knowland of California, Rep. Joseph W. Martin Jr., and Rep. Charles Halleck, also embarking on tours, were seated at the head table.

Nixon, speaking briefly after Eisenhower finished, urged the Republicans to follow the advice of a Democrat, the late Al Smith, who used to say over and over again: "Let's look at the record."

That, Nixon said, is "what we are going to do."

"We don't have to embellish it with clever quips and fancy phrases," the vice president said.

While misrepresentations or distortions will have to be answered, Nixon said, "We have something better to offer the American people than mere personal abuse and vilification of our opponents."

The Republicans, Nixon said, have the record and it can be summed up in one sentence: "The American people, under the Eisenhower administration, have had the best four years of their lives."

Nixon and his party took off at 9 a.m. Just a few minutes after the vice president finished speaking.

Starting with a noon meeting today in Indianapolis, Nixon's campaign will take him 18,000 miles into 23 states during the coming two weeks.

Eisenhower will swing into action tomorrow night with a major televised address on the subject of world peace from CBS studios here.

Weather Patrol Plane Is Forced Down In Pacific

HONOLULU (AP)—A Navy Constellation weather patrol plane was forced down in the Pacific 100 miles south of Guam early today but all 18 men aboard were rescued.

Two were picked up by a Navy helicopter, which flew them to Guam. One, A.T.R. B. W. Holladay of Lebanon, Tenn., had slight head cuts. The other, A.T.R. T. S. Bodak of Shavertown, Pa., was not injured.

Sixteen others were taken from two lifeboats by the Coast Guard cutter Curlew and a Navy landing craft. None of these were injured.

The big plane came down from unreported causes.

Professional Planning Sought By McKibbin

Clifford McKibbin, president of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, asked the Sanford Board of City Commissioners to set aside \$7,500 in the forthcoming budget for a professional planner.

McKibbin, armed with information from an unnamed firm of engineers, outlined a comprehensive plan of Sanford.

"Good city planning takes at least two years, and faced with the present continuing growth," McKibbin said, "we need to get into this project now."

The study by a professional planner, in order to provide a master plan for the city's growth, will include, he said: making necessary investigations and studies; provide a program that the people will back as their own program; and the master plan for a pattern to follow, public buildings, schools, traffic control facilities, public transportation, public utilities and industries.

"This is the scope of what competent engineers will furnish to the city," McKibbin said.

As he asked the Board of Commissioners to set aside \$7,500 for the purpose of professional city planning, McKibbin told the board "It seems like a lot of money but City Commissioners in the future will thank you for it."

"I for one don't think that the Zoning and Planning Commission is taking any progressive attitude," he said. "We're going to have some fast growth in Sanford and we need to prepare and plan for it."

This is the first proposal to employ professional planning engineers to furnish the city with a master plan for growth and expansion.

Mayor F. D. Scott asked McKibbin "What will happen with our expansion?"

McKibbin told the board "The planning engineer will plan and design the city to compare with the city's growth. Certainly it will help in that the master plan will show the need for expansion."

Four Navy men attached to the Sanford Naval Air Station were injured early this morning in an automobile accident. Five miles west of Daytona Beach on Highway 32.

No details of the accident were released. However, officials stated that the automobile in which the four men were traveling was a 1956 Plymouth.

Commission Okays Official Election On Raceway Ballot

At this morning's meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, Dr. Henry McLauchlin reminded the Board of Sanford's need for an airport and stated that he had talked to the Navy regarding the requested airport for Sanford.

W. Davis told the commissioners his home on Lake Monroe is cut off since the A. C. L. Rail road tore up the road leading to it and as yet, has not built the new one they promised him. Commissioner John Melisch advised that he keep after the railroad until they build the road.

Martin Brewster, of Orlando, who desires to build an extension of Chapman Road, which is south of Ovidio, in an easterly direction, told the commission that he had obtained all the property adjoining the proposed extension, and asked the commission to accept the deeds, which they did. The proposed extension will be a little over a half mile long. Brewster also proposed that the name of the small lake, also near Ovidio, now known as Bath Lake be changed, and suggested Lake Seventh Heaven as a possibility for a new name.

Clerk O. P. Herndon read the ballot for Seminole Park Raceway which reads as follows: "On the question of whether or not the permit issued by the State Racing Commission of Florida to Seminole Park Raceway Inc., a Florida Corporation, dated the 13th day of August, A. D. 1956, for operation and conduct of harness horse racing in Seminole County, Florida, shall be ratified or rejected and to decide whether such permit shall be approved and license ratified and race meetings permitted in said county." This ballot will be submitted to the voters of Seminole County on Nov. 6.

Herndon also brought up the question of the jury box which is about exhausted, and after much discussion it was decided that they would wait and let the circuit judge issue an order when he required more jurors.

Herndon then told the commission the approval of a new nurse, Grace W. Fisher, and also brought up a letter from Mrs. Abbie W. Boyd who asked the County Commission to petition the State Welfare Board to increase the provision on State grants to include nursing care for recipients.

A contract was signed with the A. C. L. Railroad permitting the county to erect a 50 ft. crossing near Mylan Lake on Dixon Road.

O. P. Herndon then read the commissioners a list of state-maintained secondary roads in Seminole County.

Incomplete Roster Prevents Adoption Of Pay Schedule

The Board of Sanford City Commissioners struck a snag last night in their discussion of a pay schedule for city employees.

Titles and salaries, either on the proposed pay schedule or not on the schedule prevented the adoption of the proposed plan.

Commissioners, not being able to reach a decision, and confronted with the proposal of the 1956-57 General Government budget, set a special meeting for tonight.

The Budget, proposed for the coming fiscal year, was presented to the board of commissioners for their study and discussion.

Commissioner John Krider commented: "There are some questions I'd like to ask about the budget."

The meeting is set for 8 o'clock tonight in the city commission room.
