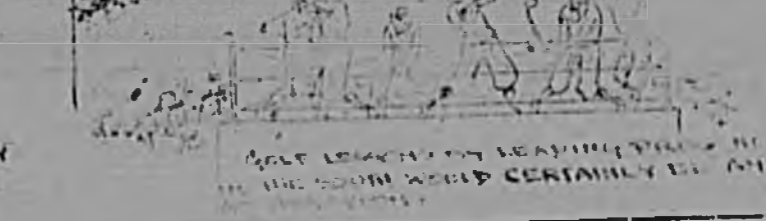

Our Changing Language

We have often heard arguments between the younger and the older generations regarding the spelling or pronunciation of some word. The older declares it is thus and so, while the younger invariably looks with eyes of disdain and declares that it never was that way, that it was this way. Son and daughters think their parents are old foggyish and perhaps never had any education any way and are merely stalling when they insist that pronunciations have changed since they went to school.

But the English language is nevertheless constantly changing, in spelling, in pronunciation, in diction itself. We are not of the ultra-modern school which now spells "write" "rite", and "thorough", "thoro", but we have no doubt that the time will come when simplified spelling, as abundant as it may be, will hold sway throughout the English speaking world. We can remember when a plane was a carpenter's tool; now within a few short years, it is nothing else, as far as ninety percent of the people are concerned an aeroplane.

To prove our contention that the English language is constantly changing, we have only to go back a few hundred years and cite some examples of what it was then. For instance, at about the time Columbus was discovering San Salvador, William Caxton, the first newspaperman in England, was sending out to an eager public such lines as these: "There was a child of Rome that was named Lapirus that on a tyme went with his fader whiche was a senator into the chambre where as they helde their counceyll", which was considered good English in that day.

Geoffrey Chaucer was an Englishman who lived in the latter part of the fourteenth century, and naturally enough spoke English, but few of us would recognize it as such today. How hard have we tried to translate: "Whan that Anrille with his shoures soote The droghte of Marche hath perced to the roote, And bathed every vyne in swich licour; Of which vertu engendred is the flour;" And those lines from Spenser's Faerie Queene: "Lal the man whose muse whyvyns did make, As lime her taught, in lowly shophards weeds, Am now enforst, a farrre unfetter loken, For trumpets sterne to chaunge mine outen reeds, And sing of knyghts and ladies gentle deed;"

Pronunciations do not change? Spelling does not change? English does not change? Somewhere in Shakespeare, we remember a line which read, "It stinks! and said 'Aye!' English, mind you, but do you know what it means?"

Appropriation Needed

Seminole County citizens who have probably had about as much experience with the Mediterranean fruit fly as those of any other section in Florida, are much interested in this congressional investigation committee which proposes to find out how the last government appropriation was spent and how much money is needed for the next appropriation. The Tampa Tribune points out that it is a foregone conclusion that fifty million dollars are required, as follows:

"A congressional investigation of the fruit fly situation is proposed in a resolution adopted by the House, at the instance of Chairman Wood, who declares he has evidence, from Secret Service sources, of 'damnable and condemnatory' conditions. Wood's statement is not surprising in view of his well known attitude toward the fly campaign.

"The investigation is to be made by the House Committee on Appropriations (Wood's Committee) through a delegated subcommittee. It is proposed to ascertain how the money already appropriated has been spent and how much more is required. This should not be at all difficult. It is a matter of easily produced record how the money has been spent and it is a matter of ready reckoning how much more will be necessary.

"Indeed, the latter question has been answered by the Department of Agriculture and President Hoover, who has submitted an estimate of \$15,000,000, based on a careful study of the situation. The House Committee probably will find the same conditions, needs and figures of amounts mutually the same. Several other committees or boards have made full investigation on the ground and reached the conclusion that the work has been well done and should be continued.

"Mr. Wood's hope, doubtless, is to obtain verification of the charges he has made regarding the fruit fly campaign. Florida will welcome the investigation, with the fear only that it will be indefinitely prolonged, while the campaign lags or ceases for lack of financial support."

WASHINGTON DAY BY DAY

For no good reason at all there is a terrible hullabaloo in Washington over the selection of James West, White House correspondent of the Associated Press, as a substitute man for the Republican National Committee.

I am told that a committee of even-tempered newspaper men sent to Senator Watson of Indiana, the Administration floor manager in the Senate to protest, I know something of the shortcoming of professional jealousy in Washington. I am amazed that Senator Watson gave rise to such etymology.

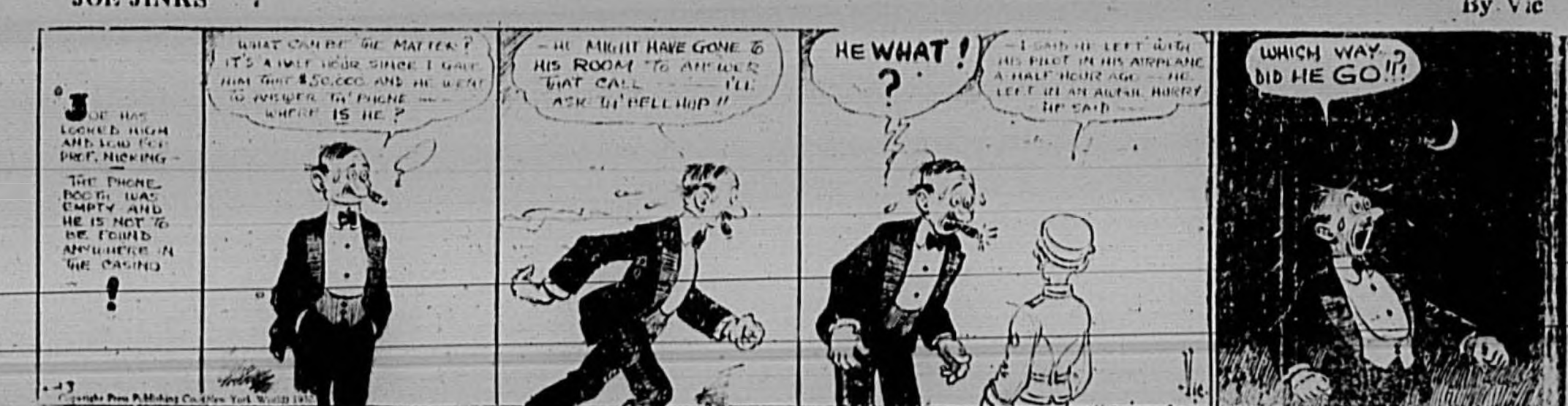
