

Poland, Strikers Sign Settlement

GDANSK, Poland (UPI)—Strikers and Polish government negotiators Saturday signed a settlement giving the workers "self-ruling" unions and the right to strike.

Strike leaders cautioned, however, although an agreement on their key demand of free trade unions was settled, it did not mean an immediate end to the country's 17-day crisis.

A spokesman for the state news agency Interpress said the 50,000 workers at Szecczin will return to work "as soon as possible."

The deal included a provision in which the strikers recognized the leading role of the Communist Party in all affairs of state.

Official sources in Warsaw confirmed the central committee would meet this afternoon. In Gdansk, sources said Jagielski would present the agreement at that meeting.

LATE Friday, the leaders of the country's 350,000 defiant strikers said an agreement was "90 percent" settled.

The leader of Poland's 350,000 striking workers jubilantly told fellow strike organizers Friday night to return to their factories with the "good news" an agreement was near on their demands for free trade unions.

The dramatic announcement by strike organizer Lech Walesa was cheered and applauded by hundreds of colleagues at the massive Lenin Shipyard in the Baltic port where the strikes erupted 17 days ago.

It came amid reports the labor unrest has spread to the critical coal mines of lower Silesia, one of Poland's most important industrial zones.

Although Walesa said agreement was near on the workers' top demand for free trade unions, he cautioned delegates from 500 factories the government still could raise last-minute objections when talks resume Saturday.

Walesa added, "We are making progress. We've begun to understand one another."

Crafty Dogs Hold Resident Hostage

Canines Become County Menace

The two dogs ran toward the mother and her two small children. The dogs barked, growled and lunged until the woman fearfully scooped up her children and made a dash for safety behind her backyard gate.

For two weeks Diane Crapps, 1900 Magnolia Ave., Sanford, saw the large German shepherd guard dogs roaming her neighborhood. She said she was fearful for the small children going to South Side Elementary School and the elderly people who walked in the area.

When the dogs chased her, her 11-month-old baby and three-year-old daughter, one dog had a chewed off rope hanging from its neck.

"I figured the dogs had been penned up and now that they had gotten free they meant business," she said. "One looked particularly vicious."

Later, Mrs. Crapps found out the dogs had also chased a jogger and scared other neighbors.

But the past Monday was the last straw.

The dogs wouldn't let her out of her house, she said. She looked out and one was standing in her daughter's small swimming pool.

She called the police and she called the Seminole County Animal Control Department. The police arrived and an officer witnessed the dogs on her property. But by the time an animal control officer arrived, the dogs had retreated to their owner's property.

At that point nothing could be done.

Despite a county ordinance that prohibits an owner to allow an animal to run at large on public property or the private property of others, animal control officers are not allowed to pick up a dog if it runs back on its owner's property.

"Animal control is a farce to me," Mrs. Crapps said. "I don't think it's organized, it's a waste of taxpayers money and I think they side with the animal. But some dogs are going to be vicious and if I can't go out my back door, that's unfair to me."

Because two animal control officers were removing a dead horse in Oviedo, it took about 30 minutes to respond to Mrs. Crapp's call. Animal Control Supervisor Bob McIntosh said. By that time the dogs had fled.

But because of earlier complaints about the dogs, McIntosh said he had a good idea who they belonged to: his father-in-law, James Shannis, of 110 W. 19th Street.

Monday morning a witness identified Shannis' dogs as the ones that had been Magnolia Street. Later, McIntosh said Shannis agreed to give up the dogs he had

two weeks earlier acquired to protect his house.

But while the problem of Mrs. Crapps and other residents in her neighborhood had a satisfactory ending, similar incidents occur many times a day in every part of Seminole County. And often they end in pain or tragedy. A child bitten by a dog requires a series of painful rabies shots, or worse, plastic surgery to repair the damage.

On the morning Mrs. Crapps called animal control, McIntosh said by 11 a.m. he had already received 13 such calls.

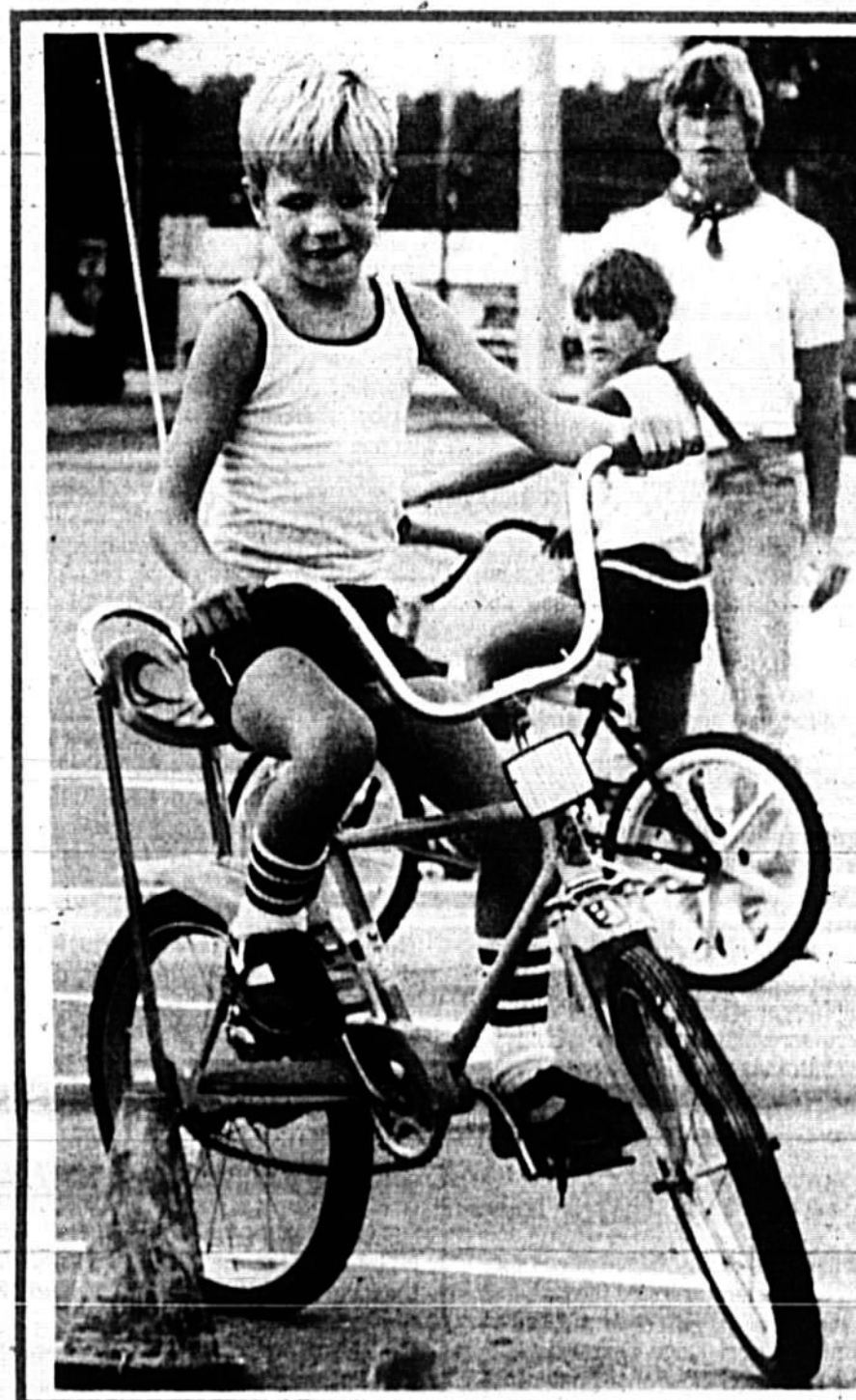
And at Seminole Memorial Hospital, emergency physicians see an average of one dog bite case every other day, said hospital Public Relations Director Kay Bartholomew.

Part of explanation for the large number of dogs that run loose in Seminole County is that many dog owners are unaware of the requirement that their dogs be leashed or under verbal command when off their property, McIntosh said. Others believe dogs should run free and defy the ordinance.

But another reason is that Animal Control does not have the manpower or money for full-scale patrols, according to Ralph Willis, director of the Seminole County Animal Control Department.

Adding to the problem, he said, is that the ordinance "lacks teeth."

Mrs. Crapps said had Shannis not agreed to get rid of the dogs or take other action to make sure they would not be free to roam the neighborhood, she would have pursued the matter in court.

Refugees Surrender In Peru

LIMA, Peru (UPI)—A group of more than 150 Cuban refugees who attempted to hijack a Braniff DC-8 from the Lima airport to Miami released their 15 hostages unharmed and peacefully surrendered to authorities Saturday nearly 24 hours after seizing the aircraft.

The hijackers decided to abandon the plane after receiving assurances Peruvian authorities would move them to a refugee camp with better facilities, said Joseph Marek, a U.S. Embassy spokesman in Lima.

The release of the hostages, including seven Americans, came at approximately 11 p.m. (midnight EDT) following negotiations between the Cubans, the Peruvian government and U.S. Embassy officials.

Braniff made arrangements to house the passengers overnight in Lima, then fly them today to Los Angeles, their destination before the takeover, Braniff Vice President Jerry Cox said in Dallas, Texas.

Antonio Barona, a Cuban who spoke to the refugees inside the plane during the negotiations, said he told them their action was only hampering their chances of traveling to the United States.

The Peruvian government, he told them, "has pulled all the possible strings," but could not convince the United States to admit them.

Women Gain Political Muscle

Local Female Office Holders Expect Ranks To Expand

It has been well-known and acknowledged even by men for years now that women control the majority of wealth in the United States.

Women have also assumed control of the ballot box as well, at least here in Seminole County.

When Sept. 8 primary election day rolls around, there will be 5,198 more women qualified to cast ballots locally than men.

Of the total number of registered voters in Seminole — 57,814 — 31,308 of them are males while 26,506 are females. Does that mean women will form a united front to elect certain candidates?

"No," said Pat Southward of Lake Mary. Mrs. Southward, a former Lake Mary city councilman and now a Democratic candidate for the Florida House of Representatives, said the political philosophy of women, just like that of men, runs the entire gamut.

To prove her point, she noted how diverse women's interests are. She said one national organization — The National Organization for Women — believes one way women will be the Happiness for Women organization (HOW) believes another way.

Do male candidates seeing that the majority of the voters are female gear their campaigns to the positions they believe women favor? Almost all of the current candidates are stating positions on the equal rights amendment and abortion, both of which are issues of interest to and vitally affecting women.

Altamonte Springs City Commissioner Dolores Vickers said "I feel on those particular issues cited, male candidates are responding to the concerns of single-issue groups. Each male candidate is responding as he is philosophically guided or as he may feel most expedient."

Do women make better public officials than men? "Of course," said June Lorman, a Longwood city commissioner for the past seven years. "Women are more people-oriented than men. Men tend to look at everything in a business-like way."

What role will women play locally in this fall's campaigns?

"In the local races there are not that many women," said Sandra Glenn. Mrs. Glenn is serving her second year on the county commission, the first woman ever elected to the county commission in Seminole County's 67-year history.

Should more women run for public office? "Certainly if a woman is qualified she should run for public office," said Mrs. Glenn, who served two terms on the Altamonte Springs City Commission prior to running for county office. "I'm more interested in qualified people running for office, than in whether they are male or female," she said.

She said she sees women playing a larger supporting role for candidates than ever before, adding women have the "particular ability to organize and the time to produce what it takes to run a successful campaign."

"I think we are going to see more emphasis placed on campaigns on issues related to women, whether they are professional women or women who devote themselves to interests centered in the home, on family and with school," Mrs. Glenn said. She said both political parties are speaking to such issues as schools, housing, PIRA, abortion and prayer in the school, all of which are of interest especially to women.

Women candidates will make surprisingly strong showings in the upcoming elections this fall," Mrs. Vickers said, adding the showing will be much stronger than what is anticipated now.

"Speaking to the question of women's roles in politics, I don't think politics will be the forerunner or the main focus of social change. We will also be experiencing a change in politics. As women are ascending to positions of responsibility in industry, we will see women ascending to elected positions as well," Mrs. Vickers said.

Mrs. Southward said at this time opportunities are available for women to play as large a role in politics as they care to play. Women have always been essential, in fact crucial, in campaign staffing entertaining for candidates and working in the campaign offices.

Porter To File Petition To Block Foe

Seminole-Brevard Public Defender David M. Porter said he will file a petition with the Florida Supreme Court Tuesday seeking a court order directing the Secretary of State George Firestone to remove his Republican opponent's name from the November ballot.

Porter, who is seeking re-election, originally said he would file the case by Aug. 8, but this past week said the delay was due to the large amount of research necessary to seek a writ of mandamus, a court order directing a public official to perform duty of his office.

It is the duty of the secretary of state to place names of candidates on the ballot, Porter said.

Porter is seeking to prevent the name of Cocoa Beach Attorney James F. Russo Jr. from appearing on the November ballot, although Russo's official qualification papers have been accepted by the state elections office.

Porter contends Russo is not a legal candidate for the public defender post because he does not meet the requirement that a candidate must have been a member of the Florida Bar for five years preceding taking the office.

Russo was admitted to the bar Jan. 8, 1976. The public defender's term starts Jan. 6, 1981.

Russo said he will complete his five years as a member of the Florida Bar on Jan. 7, and could actually be sworn in as public defender one minute after midnight Jan. 6.

But Porter said the candidate is two days short.

"Where do you draw the line?" Porter said. "The Constitution says you have to have five years."

Russo, however, points to Article 10, Sec. 3, of the Florida Constitution which he says gives a candidate 30 days from the day the term starts to "qualify" for the position and take office.

Porter said 30 days is provided by state statute, but not the Constitution. And, he said, statutes cannot override the Constitution.

Porter said he is pursuing the matter not to "nit-pick" but because if, "by some small chance," Russo should win in November, he might later be declared ineligible to take office.

"This campaign is costing me \$20,000," Porter said. "I don't want to see it wasted." — DIANE PETRYK

Abscam Jury: Myers Guilty

NEW YORK (UPI)—Rep. Michael Myers and three confederates were found guilty today of all charges in the first trial to result from the two-year Abscam political corruption probe.

The four — including Camden, N.J., Mayor Angelo Errichetti, Philadelphia Councilman Louis Johnson and Philadelphia lawyer Howard Criden — were convicted of accepting a \$50,000 bribe in return for helping a phony Arab sheik enter the United States.

Defense attorneys said they would appeal the convictions. Errichetti said he expected to resign as Camden's mayor.

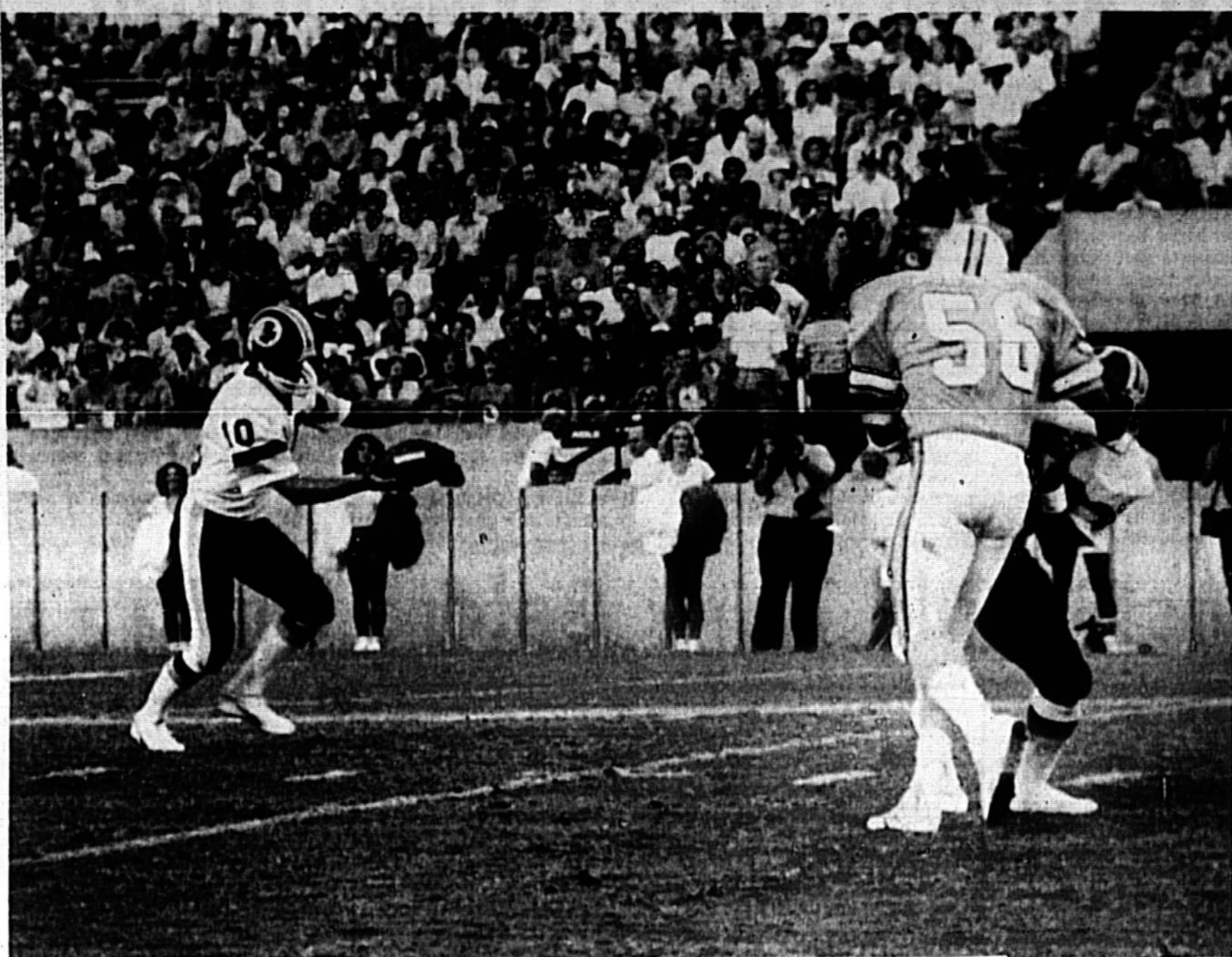

Another school year was underway for Ada Bilbrey — Miss Ada — a greying 61-year-old widow and grandmother of five

who runs Duette School, the last one-teacher public school in Florida.

Although Mrs. Bilbrey is the only Manatee County teacher at Duette School, she has two aides who work with the students under her supervision and a combination custodian cook.

Mrs. Bilbrey also principal of the school and has to handle the myriad of reports every school administrator must file.

"I'm working on the annual progress report now and it must be done by Sept. 15," she said. "And we've got more new forms to make out this year. I have to make every report that principals in the bigger schools have to make."

Mrs. Bilbrey's flock of students this year include seven in kindergarten, six first-graders, three second-graders, three third-graders and 11 fourth-graders.

Another kindergarten student will enroll as soon as he gets over the mumps and Mrs. Bilbrey said she expects to have

three or four more enrolling after the Labor Day holiday.

Mrs. Bilbrey began teaching at Duette School in the late 1950s when it had three teachers. It became a one-teacher school in the mid-1960s.

"You get to see each child grow and you get to know their good points and their bad points," she said when asked why she remained at Duette rather than teach in one of the elementary schools in the Bradenton area.

Many of the people living in the rural area around Parrish attended Duette School themselves as youngsters, including one of the aides — Eleanor Parrish — and the parents of several students now attending classes at the white, one-story school.

The drawback of a one-teacher school, Mrs. Bilbrey said, is that "you can't do some things as extensively as you would like."

Recipient Of SMH Humanitarian Award

'She's A First Class Lady'

Winning an award is always a pleasure and an honor, but that honor is doubly meaningful when it is presented by one's peers.

A Sanford woman has been honored for her humanitarian work at Seminole Memorial Hospital and was selected by other health care professionals working there.

Naomi Forbes, registered dietitian, has been selected as the hospital's 1980 recipient of the Dr. Thomas F. Frist Humanitarian Award. The award is sponsored by the Hospital Corporation of America, which recently purchased SMH, as a living tribute to Dr. Frist, one of its founders and first president who today serves as Chief Medical Officer and Vice Chairman Directors.

The awards on a local, divisional, and national level recognize outstanding HCA employees who exemplify Dr. Frist's commitment to quality health care, understanding and compassion for the patient, family and fellow employees.

Every full-time employee was eligible for nomination and those submitting ballots were asked to nominate the person they felt had a positive effect on other people, the person who has made a significant contribution to the improvement of patient care, and whose day to day performance has been dependable, consistent and people-oriented.

They were to look for someone whose contributions might have been overshadowed because of personal modesty and humility, and for someone who has demonstrated unusual concern for the welfare and happiness of patients. Extraordinary acts of kindness were another criterion.

Five separate ballots were submitted nominating Mrs. Forbes who has been with the hospital since 1967. A committee representing all shifts and levels was selected to make the decision choosing the employee of the year nominated by the other employees.

Kathryn Otto from Nursing, Mary Rife from Food Service, Lisa Baggs from the Laboratory and Susan Pascoe from the X-ray Department were given the task of selecting the winner. They were helped by the glowing comments included in the ballots.

One anonymous ballot read: "Mrs. Forbes shows a concern for her patients and fellow employees that goes beyond the requirements of her job."

"I know of many occasions in which she has taken extra moments to spend with a patient requiring special understanding or gone out of her way to find a special resource for a problem situation. Her commitment to her professional duties, as well as to her patients and colleagues, is consistently evident. Although faced with personal tragedy, she has remained an inspiration to her fellow SMH employees. She exemplifies the characteristics of a true humanitarian."

Living with her husband, Richard, at 153 Pinecrest Drive, Mrs. Forbes first came to Sanford in 1956 and started teaching in the school food service program in Orange County. As a dietitian she did consulting work with several area hospitals and nursing homes. After 11 years her part-time work at SMH became full-time in 1978 although she still teaches a night class training school lunch personnel.

"My true love is teaching," Mrs. Forbes said, "diabetic teaching and working with the patients." Many diabetics must be taught the value of proper nutrition in dealing with their disease and Mrs. Forbes helps them with their diet and encourages them to stick to it.

Being put on a low sodium diet is extremely difficult for many diabetics, but their bodies simply can not accept salt. Mrs. Forbes helps them realize that many prepared foods contain large amounts of salt and simply refraining from using table salt is not enough.

"I also try to combat food misinformation," Mrs. Forbes said, "and food fallacies. Everybody eats, so everybody's a food expert." Some people have the misconception it is alright for diabetics to use powdered sugar or honey. Others feel flavor enhancers, such as Accent or Zest, are good substitutes for salt, though both contain large amounts of sodium and neither should be used in low sodium diets, Mrs. Forbes said.

She teaches many out-patients in evening classes and hopes to start a local chapter of the American Diabetic Association.

Weight control helps with many diabetic symptoms.

It was mainly a blue jean and T-shirt crowd that had drifted into Frank Black's pub. Cowboy hats and ball caps sat easy on the heads that tipped back to finish off a brew. Hands clapped, boots and jingling shoes tapped in time to the music being made by the five men on the Ark's small stage.

Most of the five are craftsmen by day, building with brick and block, but at night, they become artists turning out toe-tapping bluegrass music with guitars, fiddle and banjo. Known to thousands of fans as the American Bluegrass Express, they are known to many people in Sanford simply as neighbors.

Twenty years ago Kenneth Raybon moved to Florida from Alabama and brought with him his fiddle which had earned him a respectful reputation in country music and bluegrass circles. Champion, Ron Rimmer. The Raybans have their own construction business while Rimmer, from Lakeland, is a business management student at the University of South Florida.

The group started in 1974 and were known as the Florida Travelers, but a producer suggested their current name, under which they cut a 45 rpm record and won their first festival in Bradenton.

The Sanford group soon began to tour and played throughout the state, the Southeast and up through Indiana. They stopped off in Nashville and put in an appearance at the Ernest Tubb Record Shoppe.

In 1978 they won the State Championship for the first time, competing against the finest bluegrass bands in the state. In later tours they played on the same stages with country music greats like the Lewis Family, Lester Flatt, the Osborne Brothers and Bill Monroe.

In 1979 the Express again won the Florida State Championship and performed in a couple of films. One was an educational film for cultural studies, distributed to colleges throughout the nation, and the other was a music appearance in a film entitled "I Fell from the Sky," which is currently being put together as a television movie.

In Apurubstante this year, the Express won their third State

Championship and their banjo picker, Ron Rimmer, was named top banjo player in the state.

Tours to college campuses, bluegrass festivals, appearances on radio and television program, plus three record albums have won the Express many fans across the country. They are still almost unknown to the folks at home. They have an organized fan club with 600 dues-paying members, plus another 8,000 fans on their mailing lists.

Yet they are relatively unknown in their hometown. 1975 was the first time the Express played before the hometown crowd, said Marty Raybon, lead singer, songwriter and spokesman for the group. They played at a bluegrass festival held at the Police Benevolent Association. That was their first and last appearance in Sanford until they turned up at the Ark.

The band averages more than 100,000 miles on the road each year. "We played 46 festivals and colleges in 1979 alone," stated Raybon, but the band hopes to stick a little closer to home. "We'd like to play in town. We've got a lot of friends in Sanford."

The Express' music and showmanship are first rate. They have had good exposure, fan clubs, T-shirts and record albums, but they are missing that one elusive, hard to find element: the Big Break.

Until they break into the bigtime, the Raybans plan to hold on to their construction work to provide the bread and butter, though it often means getting to bed at 5 a.m. and being at work by 9. "We just can't depend on music," Marty said, then he laughed and added, "Of course, you can't depend on construction work, but it's halfway steady."

Next summer may be the turning point for the Express. "We're going to get a shot at the (Grand Old) Opry next year," Marty said. Performing at the Mecca of country and bluegrass music in Nashville may be just the spark the Express needs to get them high-balling down the main line. They have put in the hours of practice perfecting their talent; they have worked hard for what they have achieved. The dues have almost been paid.

The crowd at the Ark knew something good when they heard it. During such songs as the Express' version of "Fox on the Run," every pair of hands was clapping to the beat and when the song was finished, those hands kept on clapping, demanding an encore.

They have come a long way and they are better than ever right now, picking up steam like the locomotive they use as their logo. Picking up steam and picking up fans in their hometown. The owner of the Ark liked them, too. "I'll guarantee I'll have them back," Frank Black said.—TOM NETSEL

but getting patients to lose weight can be difficult. "It's frustrating," she said, "trying to get people to change their food habits. You need to be a good salesman to sell these people on the necessity of it."

Many people enter the hospital angry, obstinuous or sullen, determined to give the staff a difficult time. Mrs. Forbes said she realizes many of these people are simply scared and lonely and they need someone to sit down with them, talk with them and help them accept their illness. She will often use her own time to do this and even bring them bouquets of roses from her husband's garden.

"I try to put myself in the patient's shoes," Mrs. Forbes explained, "and I think after what I've been going through recently, I'll be better able to do it." Mrs. Forbes recently underwent surgery for cancer and is presently taking a series of chemotherapy treatments.

Before the operation in June, doctors warned her she might lose the use of her right arm, or the arm entirely, as a result. The surgery did leave the arm weak but Mrs. Forbes is receiving physical therapy and she has plans to learn how to play the harpsichord she and her husband bought recently.

"Even when she was having her own personal problem with her present illness," reads another nominating ballot, "she continued to carry on her duties without complaints, never letting her patients know of her own personal problem or discomfort."

Other members of the medical profession are proud of Mrs. Forbes and quick to praise her skill and dedication. "She's as dedicated as any doctor I know," said Dr. M. V. Parker, "in trying to help people realize what they can do for themselves in nutrition." "He went on to say she is a very "giving person."

Dr. Thomas Largent said she is dedicated, hard-working and always smiling. "She's one of the finest ladies I know. She makes you feel good after you've met her. I can't say enough about her."

"She's a well-trained nutritionist who has been nothing but an asset to the hospital as long as she's been there," stated Dr. R. M. Rosenmund. He mentioned the many hours Mrs. Forbes has given of her own time to counsel patients.

"She shows much compassion for people," he added. "She's very active in updating a patient's education as far as diet is concerned."

He summed it up by saying, "She's a first-class lady... a plus factor in the whole community."

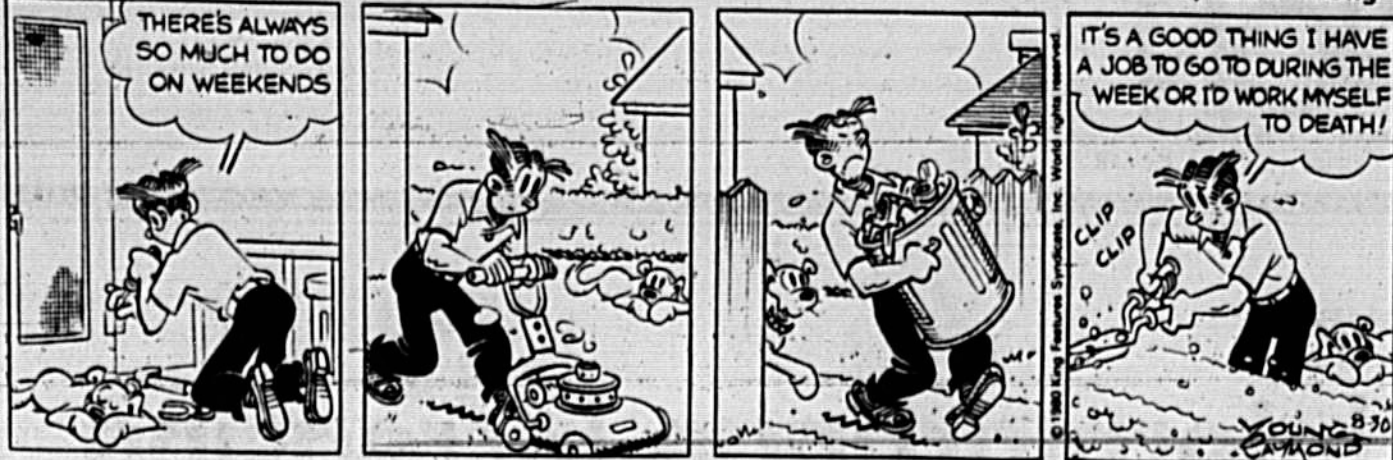
