Refugees Surrender In Peru

LIMA, Peru (UPI) - A group of more than 150 Cuban refugees who attempted to hijack a Braniff DC-8 from the Lima airport to Miami released their 15 hostages unharmed and peacefully surrendered to authorities Saturday nearly 24 hours after seizing the aircraft.

The hijackers decided to abandon the plane after receiving assurances Peruvian authorities would move them to a refugee camp with better facilities, said Joseph Marek, a U.S. Embassy

The release of the hostages, including seven Americans, came at apfollowing negotiations between the Cubans, the Peruvian government and

Chinese Premier To Resign; Deng Protege May Get Post

PEKING (UPI) - China announced officially for the first time Saturday Premier Hua Guofeng will resign during the forthcoming two-week meeting of the National People's Congress and will choose his own successor to lead the government of the world's most

The ruling Communist Party newspaper, People's Daily, announced in a brief article Hua would resign, ending months of speculation surrounding the future of

The article did not say who will replace him, but Chinese officials said it almost certainly will be Zhao Ziyang, a protege of China's current strongman, Vice Premier Deng Xiaoping, and a charismatic economist with a record of bold innovations and outstanding

Iran Executes 25 People

Despite an appeal from Amnesty International for an end to summary executions, Iran sent 25 more people to their deaths before firing squads, including 11 convicted of plotting to overthrow and kill Ayatollah ruhollah Khomeini.

Tehran Radio said 11 people convicted in the July coup attempt were executed Friday night., Their deaths brought to almost 90 the number of people shot by firing squads in the alleged plot, in which air force officers reportedly planned to bomb Khomeini's residence in an attempt to kill him.

Irag Plane Sale Blocked

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Iraq has lost a bid to buy five commercial transports from the Boeing Co. because Congress and the State Department suspects the radical regime is still involved in international

Iraqui Airways had five representatives at Boeing's Seattle plant Friday, ready to take delivery of a 727 on which they have about a \$5 million deposit. But Boeing's application for an export license, submitted to the State Department this summer, was denied.

Muskie Praises Hostages WASHINGTON (UPI) - The 52 Americans still held

Texas Drilling Rig Explodes PORT O'CONNOR, Texas (UPI) - A drilling rig exploded and burst into flames early today off the Texas coast and several crewmen were reported missing. A Coast Guard spokesman at Port Iavaca, Texas, said oreliminary figures indicated 14 crewmen were aboard the drilling rig "Ocean King." He said 11 apparently were

rescued and three were missing.

Survivors were taken by helicopter to hospitals in Corpus Christi and Galveston. "We don't know if it's an oil rig or a gas rig," said Don Brown, the Coast Guard spokesman. "We're working here getting people off. It's a rig and it's on fire. Once we get people off, we'll worry about the fire."

The explosion and fire occurred at about 6:15 a.m., some 30 miles off the Texas coast in the Gulf of Mexico.







Foot Patrolman: **Worthwhile Move**

One of the more important aspects of any agency which deals extensively with the public is community relations.

To that end, the Sanford City Commission approved a Sanford Police Department experiment to place foot patrolmen in at least one section of the city. If that gets positive results, Chief Ben Butler intends to ask for more footmen to patrol other areas of the city. Probably before the end of

Not only is the experiment a good idea, but the thought of patrolmen in other sections of the city sounds like a capital idea as well.

John Morris, police liaison officer in his position as a city commissioner, said if the experiment with foot patrol officers in the Goldsboro section of Sanford is a success, the chief will ask for about four more men to patrol the Sanford and Zayre to the federal government and expenditures plaza areas as well as the downtown section of the



On the face of it, Ronald Reagan would seem to possess insurmountable advantages in the race ahead. Consider, to begin with, the two conventions

Ahead

we witnessed. In Detroit, the Republican delegates were enthusiastic about their candidate and optimistic about November prospects. A Madison Square Garden, Carter was swallowed like a dose of castor oil. Emotion toward him included pity, contempt, grudging support, but hardly spontaneous enthusiasm. About the November prospects, the mood in New York was one of virtually unrelieved gloom.

At both conventions, moreover, the winners knew that they had the task of pulling together united parties in support of the eventual tickets. Reagan succeeded in Detroit, while Carter pretty much failed in

Reagan knew that he had to propitiate Northeastern and other "moderate" Republicans. He also knew that he had on hand a powerful faction from the New Right intensely concerned with ERA, anti-abortion moves, and other such issues. But both of these faction are united on defense and on the economy, and in the end Reagan was able to split the difference. The "moderates" got George Bush and the New Right got their favorite themes in the platform. Jacob Javits and Jesse Helms both support the ticket.

Even the rather messy courtship of Gerald Ford probably helped, on balance. It proved to the moderates that Reagan is not a narrow exclusivist, and that he is seeking a united and optimistic party for the presidential race. Carter's attempts to mollify his left wing fell far short of complete success. The delegates were gloomy and mutinous;

gallows humor prevailed on the convention floor. The high point of the show was Kennedy's emotional but anachronistic speech. which, for all its relevance to 1980, might as as well have been a speech by Henry Clay. At the conclusion, Kennedy humiliated Carter, his poisonous coldness in the podium scene remaining firmly in one's mind. Reagan's acceptance speech was superb,

PINEHURST, N.C. (UPI) — After playing almost five full rounds of golf in 31/2 days, a man facing an opponent 11 years his junior might have a few qualms about his stamina. Recipient Of SMH Humanitarian Award

'She's A First Class Lady'

Winning an award is always a pleasure and an honor, but that honor is doubly meaningful when it is

presented by one's peers. A Sanford woman has been honored for her humanitarian work at Seminole Memorial Hospital and was selected by other health care professionals

Naomi Forbes, registered dietician, has bee selected as the hospital's 1980 recipient of the Dr. Thomas F. Frist Humanitarian Award. The award is sponsored by the Hospital Corporation of America, which recently purchased SMH, as a living tribute to Dr. Frist, one of its founders and first president who today serves as Chief Medical Officer and Vice

The awards on a local, divisional, and national level recognize outstanding HCA employees who exemplify Dr. Frist's committment to quality health care, understanding and compassion for the patient, family and fellow employees.

Every full-time employee was eligible for nomination and those submitting ballots were asked to nominate the person they felt had a positive effect on other people, the person who has made a significant contribution to the improvement of patient care, and whose day to day performance has been dependable, consistent and people-oriented. They were to look for someone whose contributions

might have been overshadowed because of personal modesty and humility, and for someone who has demonstrated unusual concern for the welfare and happiness of patients. Extraordinary acts of kindness were another criterion.

Five separate ballots were submitted nominating Mrs. Forbes who has been with the hospital since 1967. A committee representing all shifts and levels was selected to make the decision choosing the employee of the year nominated by the other employees. Kathryn Otto from Nursing, Mary Rife from Food

Service, Lisa Baggs from the Laboratory and Susan. Pascoe from the X-ray Department were given the task of selecting the winner. They were helped by the glowing comments included in the ballots. One anonymous ballot read: "Mrs. Forbes shows a concern for her patients and fellow employees that

goes beyond the requirements of her job. "I know of many occasions in which she has taken an extra moment to spend with a patient requiring special understanding or gone out of her way to find a special resource for a problem situation. Her commitment to her professional duties, as well as to her patients and colleagues, is consistently evident. Although faced with personal tragedy, she has remained an inspiration

"I also try to combat food misinformation," Mrs. Forbes said, "and food falacies. Everybody eats, so everybody's a food expert." Some people have the misinformation it is alright for diabetics to use

powdered sugar or honey. Others feel flavor enhancers, such as Accent or Zest, are good substitutes for salt, though both contain large amounts of sodium and neither should be used in low sodium diets, Mrs. She teaches many out-patients in evening classes






