

Police search for mother, infant

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sherift's Office is searching for a missing infant and his mother, who has a history of substance abuse

Elba Rosa Marrero, a 41-year-old Winter Garden resident with no permanent address, and her 19-month-old son,

Javier have been missing since Tuesday. Investigator William Gosch of the Sheriff's Office believes Marrero may be frequenting known drug areas.

Marrero's mother, Elba Corretjer of Maitland, had court-ordered, temporary custody of Javier, but let Marrero take

Javier for a time while she went to the hospital to be treated for chest pains

Marrero was in possession of her mother's tan, 1998 Ford Escort station wagon, Florida tag C45-FfL

"Family members believe she would do nothing to intentionally harm her son," said Steve Olson, a spokesman for

the Sheriff's Office. "However, they fear for Javier's welfare because of Marrero's history of substance abuse."

During a dependency hearing in Seminole County Juvenile Court, Corretjer was awarded temporary custody of her daughter's three children. Javier is the youngest of the children. Marrero was limited to supervised visitation, according to the Sheriff's Office incident report.

Corretjer told investigators that Marrero transported her to the Florida Hospital Altamonte emergency room on Tuesday. Elba Marrero was in the company of her husband, Leo Marrero

According to Corretjer, while she was in the emergency room her daughter said that she had to transport Leo back to a Sanford rehabilitation center. Corretjer agreed to let ber daughter take Javier with her with the understanding that she return with him immediately, and they left at 10 p.m.

Expansion of 417 expected to slow traffic in Sanford

SANFORD — Motorists on Airport Boulevard in Sanford will face lane shifts beginning Tuesday because of the ongoing expansion of the Seminole County Expressway.

The Expressway is undergoing a 5.4 mile expansion, with construction scheduled to be complete in late 2003.

Work is underway on the 2.6mile second phase of the Seminole Expressway project that will connect State Toll Road 417 with Interstate-4. Construction on this portion of the Expressway began Jan. 17,

This second phase will complete the eastern beltway around Orlando, providing drivers with a continuous limitedaccess toll facility from 1-4 south of Walt Disney World to Orlando International Airport and the University of Central Florida, then reconnecting to 1-1 near Sanford.

"This will help relieve traffic on a heavily traveled portion of I-4," said Stefany Strong, a spokeswoman for the Florida Department of Transportation.

Lanes will be shifted on Airport Boulevard through April while workers construct a bridge over Airport Boulevard between U.S. Highway 17-92 See Traffic, Page 6A

Oviedo police begin innovative program

OVIEDO - Few things spoil a vacation like finding that the family home has been struck by burglars.

Oviedo residents planning to go on vacation can take an extra precaution to ensure that their homes will remain secure. Under the Oviedo Police Department's House Watch program, police will perform regular perimeter checks on the home throughout a resident's vacation, making sure that the doors and windows are locked.

The only thing residents need to worry about is filling out

forms with the police to enable the perimeter checks, complete with a list of emergency phone numbers and contacts.

Similar services are also available to Oviedo businesses. Police will look for unlocked windows and doors, then contact representatives of businesses that provide contact numbers if a problem is found.

Oviedo police are increasing their presence within the community, thanks to the hiring of two new Community Resource Officers in January.

"We're starting to do a lot more this year," said Lt. Tony Velez of the Oviedo Police See Oviedo, Page 10A

Victim services available but victims not showing up

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's office periodically conducts seminars for senior citizens, telling them how the State of Florida can compensate them if they are victims of crime. However, Victim Services Coordinator Sherry McGrew has noticed that many people are either unaware or unwilling to take part in the program. "And that's a hard sell," she said.

McGrew believes many seniors are intimidated by the forms they are required to fill out, the information they must give, or other questions. She commented, "Our Victim Services Representative's job, and it's a daunting one at time, is to overcome these obstacles and help the seniors to apply."

State law provides that a victim over 60 years of age, and/or one who is disabled can be compensated for crimes, which affects their quality of

life. Many of these crime victims live on fixed/low incomes, and could benefit greatly by taking part in the program. Reimbursement for property loss could be as much as \$500. The program also provides reimbursements for medical bills and replacement of such items as glasses, if there are injuries, damage or losses connected to a crime.



Signs are great idea Let's just make sure we can read them

The City of Sanford has approved placement of 24 new directional signs surrounding the Orlando-Sanford Airport. EXCELLENT! But let's be certain people can read them. Anyone who has attempted to find their way through the myriad of streets that circle the Orlando International Airport know full well the importance of readability. After all, people are in moving vehicles at the time they pass or drive under the directional signs. Not only are some of the signs so cluttered with wording that they are confusing, but the motorist may be trying to keep his eyes on the road while reading the signs. Let's face it — we have two eyes but they both go in the same general direction at any given time.

Then there is often confusing wording. While some may know, others may not — what is meant by "Baggage terminal?" Does it mean depositing bags or picking them up, or is it a facility for people who have baggage?


Then too, there are times when a person is driving, perhaps in the center of the three lane access road, and suddenly finds the need for a right or left turn due to a lack of pre-warning signs. In peak traffic times, this is impossible and often causes accidents.

Some of the signs at the Orlando-Sanford Airport include directions to PanAm, which flies passengers out of the city. Others deal primarily with tourist flights from and to Great Britain. We Americans cannot, at the present time, board those overseas flights. (Maybe we will be able to in years ahead). As such, the signs containing that type of flight information may not be currently of much value to local residents. They are, however, highly important to visitors who don't know our area, and who may be bringing that rental car back to the airport. For tourists who may arrive in town late, that could conceivably mean loss of a flight back home. We wouldn't want to be in their shoes if it happened.

The sign concept is great. Let's just be certain they are capable of being read, and as such, will serve the purpose for which they are intended.

But while we're on the subject, isn't it time we started looking at some of the other type signs we have around the city and along the interstate. Let's tell folks where we are, and how to get here. Then, once they get here, let's give them a reason for enjoying a visit to Sanford. If we are going to brag about our "Historic Downtown" area, let's be certain there are signs placed appropriately to let visitors know why a certain area or building should be considered historic.

Signs are an excellent form of education, but only if they are readable, such as airport signs, or of value, such as historical markers.

"If they want to give me money, that's fine," he confesses to the charge of taking lobbyist money, "but that doesn't mean tha

I'm doing anything for them.

My message is clear. If they don't get it, they've been on Mars!"

Like young Jefferson Smith of movie lon he now feels the white heat reserved for those to dare to challenge a political machine. Watching to see who buckles first this man McCain or the Republican elector machine, has given us the highest political drama since the 1960s.







ty would involve a northward extension of a Western Expressway being built by the Orlando-Orange authority and the turnpike district.

The first leg of the expressway will open this summer between U.S. 441 in Apopka and S.R. 50 in Ococe. Another section is being designed to run 22 miles south of S.R. 50, west of the Disney property to connect with 1-4 in Osceola

Meanwhile, to alleviate traffic on I-4, a 10-mile lane is planned from Altamonte Springs to Central Parkway in Orlando, according to Florida Department of Transportation spokesman Steve Homan.

The plan involves the addition of a HOV (high occupancy vehicle) lane. This would be one lane, put on land which presently serves as the median. The HOV lanes are for vehicles containing two or more people.

Homan said in order to accomplish this re-direction of traffic, barrier walls would be

placed on both sides of the lane, to be closed after each rush hour, then reopened in the opposite direction for the next.

According to latest traffic estimates, Homan said there were approximately 130,000 to 175,000 vehicles per day traveling over that 10-mile stretch of

Construction is expected to begin in 2001. The project is expected to cost about \$40 mil-

Regarding other plans for I-4, Homan said work is still continuing.

In the meantime state transportation officials plan to construct three lanes in each direction for the bridge over the St. Johns River, between Seminole and Volusia Counties.

Construction is expected to commence in 2003 to 2004, although the State Legislature has been discussing giving the DOT a \$600 million dollar surplus it has, which could advance the bridge project to 2001.

Sanford police crack down on school zone speeding

SANFORD --- The intersection of 20th Street and Hayes Drive near Goldsboro Elementary School is one of several congested school crossing zones where police are watching for speeders.

Sanford police on Friday began a cracking down on speeders at the intersection. No children have been injured at the intersection, but parents have complained about speeding drivers in the school zone, said police spokeswoman Cleo-Cohen

"All of the other school zones in the city will also be strictly enforced," Cohen said.

The intersection is not alone in causing concern for parents as children walk to and from school.

According to Margaret Levins, a Community Services and Safety officer with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, there are several intersec tions in school-zones countywide that are considered to be particularly congested.

The intersections include State Road 434 and Sand Lake Road, near Lake Brantley High School and Forest City Elementary School. In addition, Red Bug Lake Road and Dodd Road, near Red Bug Elementary School, is also congested.



The following is a continuation of parts of an article found in a 1909 edition of The Outing Magazine. It is titled "Truck Farming in Florida" and was written by E.P. Powell. The majority of the article gives the author's impression of farming in and around Sanford.

"The insect danger is few, and there remains just one great danger, a freeze. You may be sure there will be a touch of frost once or twice a winter and there is pretty sure to be a bad freeze every. four to five years. Occasionally, a whole crop is swept out; thousands of dollars by a single breath. of a Northern blizzard. The next day the sun comes out warm and the wind blows in from the ocean, but the mischief is done lots of work put to naught in a night. The Grace Marie truckers can afford this once in a while, but not too often. I do not know of any other place where gardening literally covers the face of the earth, but here in Sanford the dooryard is a celery bed and the backyard is another.

"I was invited by a doctor from: Pennsylvania who had gone south for his health, to go out a couple of miles and visit his cucumber houses. I found that my friend had erected very substantial sheds covering something over an acre and a half. Instead of roofs he had arranged rolls of canvas and a bandy mechanical contrivance. to unroll these and draw them over the shed in case of danger

"The cocumber sheds were supplied with

brick heater, in which a fire could be quickly started, made of pine knots, heat generated sufficiently enough to keep the atmosphere considerably above the freezing

"He was planning to grow the new American Wonder Lemon, a remarkable

affair that bears lemons weighing from one to two pounds each on bushy, trees not more than tenfeet in height. This lemon was originated in Baltimore a few years ago, and up to the present. time, is grown mostly in pots in Northern homes

"You cannot drive anywhere about Sanford without coming upon yards that are filled with golden fruits. Grapefruits hanging in huge clusters sometimes bend the trees over to the very soil. Peaches are as common as oranges. In March you will find a few ripe fruits, but the marketable crops come not earlier. than April and May. The mulberry fills up March, and is the first of the Southern

fruits to ripen. This is the way with Florida; while one industry predominates, there is enough going on to widen our life and make a complete home. With all the rest, of course the St. Johns River furnishes a magnificent fishing ground. With the celery and the lettuce are shipped carloads of eggplant and more or less Irish potatoes. One lot on Celery Avenue reports one acre in egg plants, shipping 403 crates and netting \$1.25 per crate; one acre in cucumbers, shipping 500 crates.

netting \$1 per crate, one acre in cauliflower, shipping 300 crates, netting \$1.75 per crate.

But, mark you, these three acres were all one acre, and the crops were raised in succession. The rule is the same with celery and lettuce, that after shipping three crops, crab grass comes up spontaneously, making splendid autumn fodder, after which the grass is plowed under to add humus to the soil. Another grower reports that he had four acres of celery, from which he shipped 2,000 crates, that netted \$1.25 per crate. The same grower had ten acres in tomatoes, from which he shipped 2,000 crates and netted \$1.40 per crate.

"Around Sanford I noticed that the fields are supplied about equally with blacks and whites as laborers. A good many Germans are found there at work, and they invariably make a good thing of it. An Italian is a novelty, but he is gradually working his way Southward. The speculative interest in Florida has very largely left the orange growing sections and concentrated about truck growing. Yet for the most part, these lands are owned and run by residents.

"Trucking is quick work and the results: are immediate. One can always buy land that is already broken and ready for cropping. Profits will be much higher and profits will accrue in like proportion. In the hilly sections good homesteads can be secured. from \$10 to \$40 per acre; around Sanford, good celery lands runs up into the hundreds, and I am told even thousands per acre. In neither case should northerner believe the advertiser and make an investment of any size before he has seen the property involved."

"We're not a one-player team, but when Nandi isn't on the field, the rest of the girls seem to get more tense," said Lake Howell assistant coach Jean Varas. "Nandi's presence and composure raises the level of play of everyone else, if for no other reason that the rest of the team relaxes a bit."

Pryce's presence also creates at least one extra step of space for her teammates. A U.S. national team player, Pryce occu-pies the minds of Lake Howeli's opponents, who often make special adjustments to try to contain her.

Meanwhile, the Raiders (26-1-2) did what they do best: they waited for their chance and setzed it when it came.





Mike Wallace wins truck series debut at Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH - Mike Wallace avoided six cautions, including one that resulted in a more than two-hour red flag, to win a wild NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series debut at Daylona

International Speedway Friday. Wallace, who started second and led a total of 59 laps, was running near the front when a 13-truck accident occurred on lap 56. The accident stopped the Craftsman Truck Series season opener for 2 hours, 23 minutes. The accident also sent NASCAR Winston Cup Series veteran Geoffrey Bodine and Jimmy Kitchens to Halifax Medical Center.

Five speciators also were transported to Halifax after being struck by debris from Bodine's truck. Only two were held overnight, and none of the spectators suffered

threatening injuries. Bodine, who was admitted to the intensive care unit, suffered a concussion, a fracture of the right wrist, multiple bruises and lacerations and a minor fracture to his midback. The back injury will not require surgery. Kitchens underwent undisclosed tests and was held

for observation.

"I was fortunate enough to be ahead of the wreck," said Wallace, whose victory was his third career win in the Craftsman Truck Series. "They came on the radio and told me there was a caution. I looked in my mirror and saw a big ball of fire. "I could tell it was a big

wreck. Fortunately, no one was seriously injured. It's a shame that wreck happened because it was definitely an exciting race. This was a big win for LIB." "I've never had a wreck like

that in my life," Bodine said. "I was fully aware of the trouble down on the inside of me. I saw that they were coming up into me, and then I just went on a wild ride. 'My concerns are with the

fans that were injured, and I wish them all the best." Once the 100-lap event re-

started Wallace battled with Andy Houston, with Houston taking the lead on the final lap at the exit of turn two. Wallace. however, was able to regain the lead as the top five exited the fourth turn. Rookie Kurt Busch was able

to overtake Houston for second, while Terry Cook and Kenny Martin rounded out the top five. The first five finishers

were separated by only .348 seconds.

"I really thought it was an exciting race," Wallace said. "I was kind of in awe during that last lap. I went from hero to zero then back to hero. I lost the lead going into turn one and then got it back coming out of turn four.

This is a great win for me, and I thought it was a great race for the Truck Series. If you take out the big accident, it was one of the best, if not the best, race the Truck Series

To add validity to Wallace's

comments, 12 different drivers swapped the lead 31 times. Before Friday, the most lead changes in a Craftsman Truck Series event was only 17.

Wallace led 12 times, while Houston led five times for nine "I did have a strong engine,

but it was total package," said Wallace, who won \$80,087. TMy truck was handling so well. There was very few times I had to lift going into the corners, and that allowed me to go to front."

"I saw Jeff Burton and Mark Martin lining up and I knew he was going to come up there, but experience







he 310 -mile long St. Johns River was once the first "highway" through the interior of Florida. Today, the health of the state's longest river depends upon the delicate balance between preservation and development.

"River of Lakes," written by environmental journalist and filmmaker Bill Belleville who lives in Sanford, explores the length of the St. Johns, which flows south to north along Florida's east coast from Lake Okeechobee to the Atlantic Ocean. Lake Monroe is a northern tributary to the river.

Released this month, the non-fiction book has risen to the No.2 best selling spot in Florida on Amazon.Com.

"The St. Johns River has a fascinating history and a captivating beauty for those willing to seek it out," Belleville said, "But, we don't protect what we don't understand and don't use."

In the book, Belleville describes his journey down the length of the St. Johns, kayaking, boating, hiking along riverbanks, and exploring underwater caves.

Drawing on the expertise of scientists, environmentalists, fishermen, cave divers, and folk historians, Belleville explores the history of the river and the dangers it now faces from encroaching development.

The loss of natural habitats poses a dangerous threat to the river, according to Belleville.

"The area along the tributary that runs to the Wekiva River represents valuable river front property, even though it is well protected," Belleville said. Another threat to the river addressed by Belleville is

storm water runoff. "When it rains, water rushes off of lawns carrying

pesticides and manure," Belleville said. "Many of the drains enter into Lake Monroe. That's about as nasty as it can be in terms of the health of the lake."

In addition, Belleville is concerned that the St. Johns may have become a forgotten river.

"That underlies a lot of the other

issues," Belleville said. "There just doesn't seem to be a widespread appreciation for just how important the river is to us."

A. Many cities would kill for an airport like we have. But it's not doing proper noise abatement. It has to expand even further, but


there is no reason why noise should be a problem if properly handled.



"Settlers were living on its shores in 1562, 15 years before the founding of Jamestown.

DEAR VALERIE: Thanks for your faith in us! A wonderful catalog called A Conk's Wares, 211 37th St., Beaver Talls, PA 15010 (800-915-9788) carries a tinned steel 1.5 quart Steamed Pudding Mold titem No. 7290) that holds up to 6 cups of batter. The description reads: "Fill 2/3 full of batter to allow for expansion, secure lid, and steam on a rack with water 1/2 way up the side," The price is \$16.50 plus \$5.50 shipping.

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: A group of us at the retirement. home have a question for you. since we have learned that you have or will get the answers.

It primes are dried plums, how do they make prune juice? Or should it be "plum juice"?

We are anxiously waiting your reply. — TABLE NO. 13, North Manchester, Ind.

DEAR TABLE NO. 13: According to the recipe in a book called "Putting Foods By," plum and prune juice are made in exactly the same way.

The prunes or plums are cut into small pieces and placed in an enamel or stainless steel kettle: one cup of water is added for each cup of prepared fruit.

The fruit is then cooked at a gentle simmer until soft (about 15 minutes) and strained through a jelly bag. One-quarter cup of sugar is added to each two cups of juice (or to taste) and re-heated to a 200-degree simmer until the sugar has dis-

The difference between the two juices is that prune juice is much stronger in taste and darker in color than plum juice as it is made of dried, rather than fresh fruit.

Here's some food for thought at Table No. 13. "Prune" is the French word for plum; "raisin" the French word for grape. The words for meat on the hoof (pig, cow, steer, calf) are Old English in derivation, while the names for cooked meats, pork (porc), beef (boeuf) and veal (veaux) are all French. Supper (souper) and dinner (diner) are of French origin while breakfast is Old

English. Possibly, this is traceable back to the Norman Conquest in 1066, which resulted in the colonization of England by the French. When the poor old Saxons were relegated to the level of serfs, the language of the barnyard persisted, while the many french names for things, used in the castles where the Normans held sway, were eventually adopted into the Anglo-Saxon (Old English) vocabulary.


