# Reds Slacken Khe Sanh Siege

About 25 miles east of Khe Sanh, South Vietnamese infantrymen and armored cavalrymen reported 194 enemy soldiers killed in a two-day battle that ended Tuesday night five miles north of the U.S. Marines headquarters at Dong Ha.

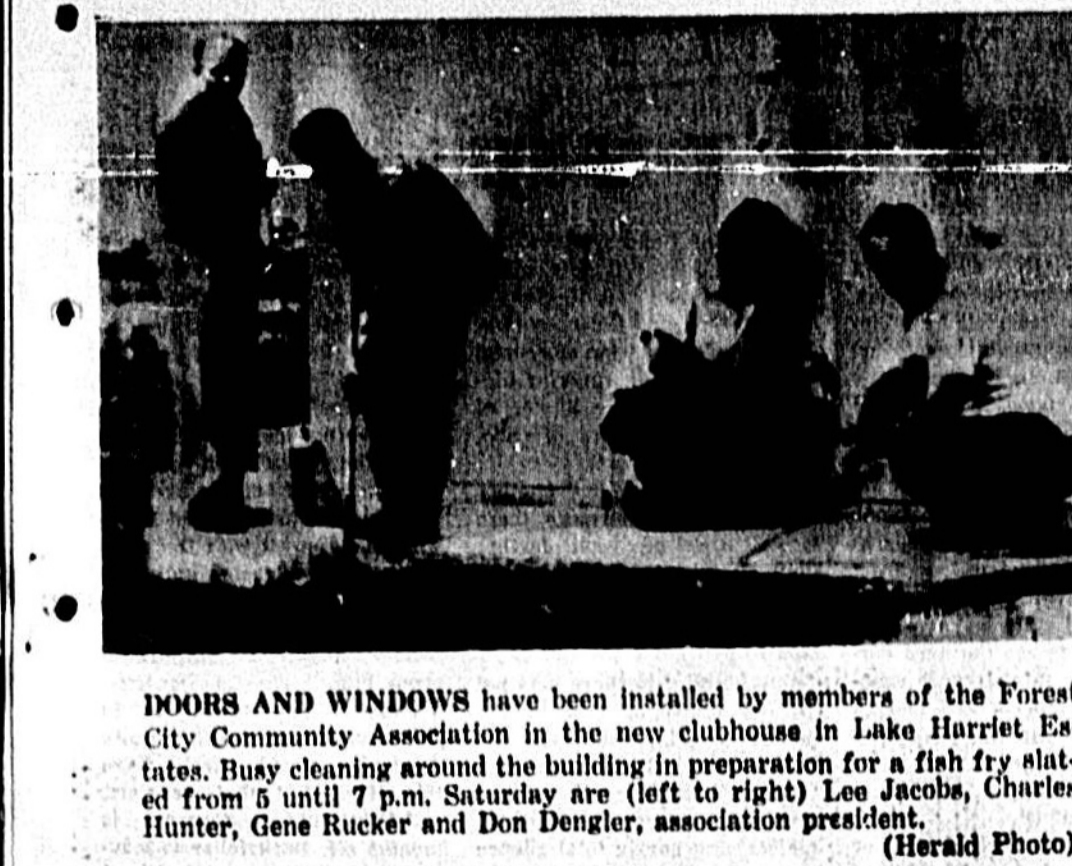

# Hospital Services Are Outlined

New programs and facilities at Seminole Memorial Hospital in Sanford, and procedures for collecting Medicare and other health insurance claims, were explained for the Delbart Chapter, American Association of Retired Persons.

Speaker was Robert T. Besser, administrator for the hospital, who also reported on the intensive care unit which has been added to the hospital for cases requiring this service.

He advised that in the upgrading of hospital equipment, an X-ray machine costing \$55,000 has been installed and reported that increased hospital costs are due, in large part, to increases in payroll, which represents 60 per cent of total operating costs.

Forty per cent of hospital cases are patients covered by Medicare, he stated.

# New School Site Needs Stifled

## \$25 Million in Building Looms

Building boom scheduled to hit South Seminole County in the next 12 months will further complicate the problem of overcrowded schools in the south end and make even more difficult the finding of school sites for new facilities recommended by the State Board of Education survey team.

New construction planned, valued in excess of \$25 million, includes six subdivisions, four garden-type apartment buildings and a 302-unit apartment complex. All of the new development will be built in four of the areas recommended by the state for new school sites.

Three of the developments will go inside the city limits of Casselberry causing further overcrowding of the already overtaxed facilities at 17th and South Seminole Junior High and South Seminole Elementary.

South Seminole sites recommended for new elementary school construction include one in Westchesterfield on 20 acres of property owned by the School Board south of SR 436 and west of Interstate 4 at cost of \$727,850.

Two other proposed sites have not as yet been acquired. These include a 15-acre one southeast of English Estates, with east of elementary school construction estimated at \$727,850 and another junior-senior high site west of Interstate four, north of SR 436 on 40 acres at estimated cost of school construction at \$1,941,408.

Kiplinger's Newsletter, just released, predicts that during the next decade Seminole County's population growth will be from 75,000, estimated as of last Jan. 1, to 129,100 on Jan. 1, 1978, or 68 per cent. All Florida counties are expected to grow but the estimate of Seminole tops the entire state, percentage-wise.

An earlier reported by The Herald, it is recommended all phases of the new Lynn High School be completed as soon as possible at estimated cost of \$2,928,702. Contract for construction on the first phase of the school plan is expected to be let on April 11.

New construction of housing developments includes: Carriage Hill, located on SR 436, north of Howell Park in Casselberry. A total of 294 units will be built when construction is completed by Greater Construction Company. The single family dwellings range in price from \$18,800 to \$28,900. The subdivision is to be constructed in three units with unit one having opened Nov. 8, 1967. Processing of unit two has begun and unit three is expected to be underway by the end of this year.

Indian Hills, located south of SR 436, also in Casselberry and consisting of 68 lots is almost filled at this time, Laurel Homes Builders, developers of the tract, report. Official opening was Nov. 18, 1967 with prices ranging from \$20,000 to \$28,000.

The plan for a 118 home subdivision, dubbed Summerest North, and located north of Red Bug Road and east of SR 436 has already been submitted to the City of Casselberry for approval and recording. The developers, Summerest North, a subsidiary of Greater Construction Company, expect to open the subdivision which will contain homes in the \$15,900 to \$19,000 price range the last week of April.

Laurel Homes further has under construction at this time south of SR 436. The development opened the past Jan. 7 with 11 homes completed and 16 under construction with price range of \$16,200 to \$18,800. Another project of Laurel Homes is Robin Hills, north of SR 436 off Red Bug Road. 200 to 300 homes to be constructed are in the \$20,000 to \$28,000 price range.

The hundred and eighty-five acre north of SR 434, one-half mile east of Interstate four have been selected by M & L Construction Company as the site of their 400 home development. The first phase will have eight one-bedroom, 56 one bedroom, 12 three-bedroom; two three bedroom one story and four four-bedroom units. Rents will be from \$135 to \$265 a month.

Tracts in the South Seminole area have been zoned for four garden type apartments, Robert Brown, county zoning director reports. A two-story, 98 unit apartment building is almost completed on SR 436, east of Interstate four and west of Altamonte Springs School. Other apartment buildings are proposed for construction west of the new SR 436 and east of Casselberry, subdivision, and east of Altamonte Springs School, north of SR 436 and west of Lake Orlena.

"Country Club without a golf course" is the billing being given the new \$2.1 million, 262 unit apartment complex being constructed by Plantation Construction and Development Ltd. on a site northwest of the intersection of Lake Howell Branch Road and SR 436.

First phase of the complex will consist of 102 units and is scheduled for completion by December. Some of the apartments are expected to be completed by the end of July.

The exclusive complex of colonial style, family type development will include when finished a complete series of recreation facilities, consisting of three swimming pools, tennis courts and many other recreation amenities.

The first phase will have eight one-bedroom, 56 one bedroom, 12 three-bedroom; two three bedroom one story and four four-bedroom units. Rents will be from \$135 to \$265 a month.
