2 Killed, 2 Hurt In Mobley's Corner Crash

Tot May Not See First Birthday

Little Jeffrey Todd Lyons has a poor chance of seeing his first birthday.

He's almost 10 months old—will be on June 23—but medical experts foresee an early death.

Jeff is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Loren Eugene Lyons of 122 Country Club Drive. And he's got heart trouble; bad heart trouble.

Not only is his heart located on the wrong side of his body, it has several defective parts, doctors tell the parents.

Tuesday the tot is to be taken to the University of Florida's Medical Center for possible surgery. Mrs. Lyons says the doctors hold no hope of correcting the condition; only a faint hope of letting Jeff reach his first birthday.

Last March, Jeff was taken to the naval hospital in Bethesda, Md., and doctors said the condition is so rare that no surgical experience has been had.

The boy's father is assigned to VAH 3 at the Sanford Naval Air Station and he will go along with Mrs. Lyons to Gainesville Tuesday. If the surgery is performed, Lyons will seek leave from his Navy duties so he can be with Mrs. Lyons during the ordeal.

Mrs. Lyons called The Herald Thursday, explaining the situation. "We had planned to have his picture in the paper when he had his first birthday," she said, "but doctors tell us he might not live until then."

She asked if his picture could be put in the paper, even though it wasn't his birthday. It could, she was told, and it is.

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Rapid Growth Seen Around Port Site

"The minute you buy property and put a port on it you will have contiguous property growth."

Members of the Port Authority Committee of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce were given this advice Thursday afternoon in a series of interviews with heads of four engineering firms.

They were checking on the cost of a feasibility report to determine the steps to be taken in establishing a port authority along the St. Johns River.

The "contiguous growth" remark was in answer to a question on how much property the authority should acquire if the feasibility report is favorable.

The representative advised the committee to acquire enough property for immediate use, for almost immediate growth and for long-range planning.

He said the surrounding property will become extremely valuable once the port site is selected. Industry, warehouses, and other factors will move into the area "almost at once" when the port is set up, he said.

The committee, headed by Francis E. Roumillat, conferred with representatives from Howard, Needles, Tammen & Bergendoff, Lockwood & Greene Engineers Inc., Rader & Associates, and Reynolds, Smith & Hills.

Some submitted cost estimates for the project while others asked for additional time to analyze the exact requirements of the committee. Their estimates will be given to the committee in a few days, according to Roumillat.

The Howard, Needles firm was represented by Pete Peterson of Orlando, the Lockwood firm by Tom Friday of Spartanburg, S. C., the Rader firm by General Robert G. Lovett of Miami, and the Reynolds firm by Norman Bryant of Orlando.

The representatives discussed all phases of the project and offered some tips not thought of by the committee. These included the use of the port facility to handle lime-rock now being mined in the Ocala area and which must be transported over land.

Hams To Help In SOS Operation

Local amateur radio operators (hams) are being asked to set up emergency communications at the 12 Sabin Oral Sunday (SOS) feeding stations this Sunday from noon to 5 p. m.

Clyde Long, president of the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees, sponsors of the clinics with the County Health Department, said the communication setup would prove of value to the project in case a shift in supplies is needed.

Al Case, local radio ham and emergency coordinator for Seminole County, reports he will have all areas covered with units and manned by licensed radio amateurs. Two operators will be women and they will be stationed at the Jai-Lai Fronton and Wind-Dixie on Highway 17-92 at Longwood, Case said.

According to the Federal Communication Commission's rules, Case said, the amateurs are the only ones authorized to provide this type of service to the public.

Local amateurs participating are Walt Long, Bill Henaley, Damon Morrison, Horace Paul, James Long, Al Case, Jess Morfield, Gayle Morfield, Charles Leffer, Charles Scudder and Claudine Case.

The radio operations will be coordinated with the Orange County amateurs who will have a station at the Allen Drug Company in Orlando where the vaccine will be stored.

Only radio communications will be allowed to the drug company, under instructions of the Central Florida Civil Defense radio officer, Wes Gardner of Winter Park.

Truck-Trailer Demolishes Speeding Car

Two lives were snuffed out at about midnight last night when the car in which the persons were riding collided with a tractor-trailer on Highway 17-92 and 434, known as Mobley's corner.

Two other persons were injured in the crash called by Highway Patrol Trooper Dan Oaks "one of the worst I've seen."

Dead on arrival at Seminole Memorial Hospital were Coy Seals, 22, of Plymouth, and Marie M. Vicks, 19, also of Plymouth. Being treated at the hospital are Elaine Joyce Parkhurst, 19, of Zellwood, and Romeo Estep Jr., 22, also of Zellwood.

The conditions and extent of injuries to the two could not be learned late this morning at the hospital.

Trooper Oaks credited the truck driver, Alvin Johns, 62, of Ft. Myers, with trigger-like action in trying to avoid the accident and with saving the lives of the two injured persons.

Oaks said Seals was driving west on 434 and attempting to make a left turn onto 17-92. He estimated the speed of the car at about 60 miles an hour.

The trooper said Johns was driving north on 17-92, saw the car in front of him and swerved sharply to the left in an effort to avoid the crash. Instead of striking the car in the middle, the heavy truck hit the front portion.

Seals was thrown out of the vehicle and crushed by the truck wheels, Oaks said. He added he was on patrol directly behind the truck and saw the accident.

When Johns swerved his truck to the left, it collided with a car stopped in the crossover. In that car, but not injured, were Marcelito Tony Caro, 21, of 702 Cherokee Circle, Sanford, and Thomas E. Coker, 25, of 127 Lakeside Drive, Sanford.

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
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

Goldwater Victory Helps Dixie Cause

By NICHOLAS C. CHRISS
ATLANTA, (UPI) — Those Southern Republicans who have worked long and hard for Sen. Barry Goldwater have found their task akin to ripping a telephone book in two.

The hardest part was getting started. After that it got easier. Made up primarily of amateurs, the movement for the Arizona conservative in the South has literally ripped its way into leadership in Dixie. As is true for many other parts of the country, Southern Goldwaterites made up for their lack of professionalism and finesse by plain hard work. Eventually the party regulars found themselves outside looking in.

The Goldwater victory in the California primary, while not overwhelming, gave the Goldwater movement in the South the boost it needed—just when some supporters were getting edgy. Goldwater's comment on defoliation of the shrubbery in Asia and his reversal of the federal use of troops in integration crises had an adverse effect in Dixie. Now the GOP South is lined up almost unanimously for the Arizona states rights advocate.

The only two Southern states that wavered are now gradually moving into the Goldwater line-up. Goldwater could easily end up with all 80 of Virginia's delegates after that state's convention June 13. In Florida, where feuding has split the GOP ranks, he may garner as many as 23 of the 84 delegates at its convention Sunday.

Texas will add another 56 after its convention June 16. Alabama, never in doubt, will give him 20 at Tomorrow's state GOP convention.

There was a time when Virginia GOP Chairman Horace Henderson refused to take sides in the Goldwater-anti-Goldwater movement. But after the California primary he noted: "Possibly Goldwater will be the nominee on the first ballot. I am confident the Virginia delegation will be strongly favored for Goldwater."

With a little bit of diplomacy, Goldwater could probably heal the rift in Florida and take all 34 delegates by convention time.

Almost any way you look at it, Southern Republicans have achieved their strongest voice ever in choosing a presidential nominee, after being ignored for decades.

Fish Experts War On Lake Jessup Algae

Fresh water fishing experts descended on Lake Jessup Thursday for an all-day fight to rid that huge body of water of fish-killing algae. They used boats, airboats and seaplanes to spread 4,000 pounds of copper sulphate over the water to stop the kill which has reached tremendous proportions with thousands of rough fish already dead.

The dead fish and accompanying odor has attracted thousands of predatory birds which are circling the dead masses.

The kill became apparent about a week ago and members of the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission took immediate steps to correct it.


The algae population exploded and covered the water with a greenish hue, one fatal to most of the rough fish in the lake.

"We're expecting that the bluestone (copper sulphate) will take care of this algae," one official said. But, he admitted, "we'll have to come back in and treat the lake again to keep the algae down."

Biologist Harold Moody and Harold Vanness of the state commission say sport fishing will be better than ever once the present condition is corrected.

Experts estimate that about 90 per cent of the dead fish are gizzard shad, stingers, mud fish and other rough varieties.

Exile 'Phantom Raid' On Cuba Publicity Hoax, U. S. Finds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The defense department said today that a "phantom raid" allegedly conducted from Miami May 25 to drop supplies in Cuba was a publicity hoax. The department's defense intelligence agency (DIA) made a thorough investigation of the episode because of the implication that such a raid could be conducted without U.S. radar detection.

A department spokesman said the incident was a "complete and utter hoax" and that radar coverage in the Florida area is "very effective."

Deputy Defense Secretary Cyrus R. Vance simultaneously sent a letter to Rep. Carl Vinson, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, stating: "One of the individuals involved in the alleged 'phantom raid' has indicated to our investigators that the raid did not take place. Mr. Frank Florin, president of the International Anti-Communist Brigade, which allegedly conducted the raid has signed the following statement:

"To the best of my knowledge a so-called 'operation phantom' raid on Cuba on May 25, 1964, did not take place. I declare that U.S. radar defenses were not violated while leaving or entering U.S. territory."

The spokesman said Florin, a U.S. citizen and free-lance pilot, participated in preparation of the publicity release. It was put out in collaboration with the Cuban 30th of November Revolutionary movement.

The purpose was to get publicity for the Cuban revolutionary movement, the spokesman said.

Howdy again! It's good to breathe good, fresh air again after two trips to Lake Jessup. It's just about all a fellow can take, WOW! What an odor.

But don't fret. The Fresh Water Fish and Game Commission is right out there in the middle of all those dead fish, spraying and spreading copper sulphate to kill the poison algae that has formed in the lake.

We talked to Harold Moody Fisher, biologist for the state, and he tells me that the algae multiply because of the sun and the lack of rain. The copper sulphate being used will take effect after it is distributed throughout the lake, so we should know within the next few days how the stuff works.

There is some fishing being done in the lake but we wouldn't recommend eating any fish out of Lake Jessup until the algae clears up.

Some of the fish found dead in Lake Jessup are gizzard shad or stink shad, non-edible fish, a few gar, a lot of nice bass ranging from one to 15 pounds, specks, bream, catfish, mullet, sting ray, man-haden minnows, shell cracker and eels.

Got some good news from Wekiva River Haven. It looks like the fishing is pretty good up there. John Roberts caught himself a nice eight-pound 14-ounce catfish, while Jimmy Altman and Jim Johns caught 63 bream and 10 catfish. Also noticed that the bream were biting real good on the flats in the Wekiva out from Herbert Muse's fish camp. We had some real good luck there last year fishing with the may fly or the willow fly which is the same.

The Schlitz Fishing Derby in Central Florida's Zone 3 went past its half-way mark this week with sportsmen in the area pocketing \$6,175 in cash awards for returning 243 tagged fish to state conservation agencies through Schlitz wholesalers.

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Koufax Now Is Only One Notch From Milestone

Sandy Koufax still was one pitch away from perfection today, but the dandy southpaw is steadily scoring in on that baseball milestone.

The 23-year-old Koufax twirled the third no-hitter of his career Thursday night in pitching the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 2-0 victory over the league-leading Philadelphia Phillies and missed a perfect game by inches when his 3-2 pitch to rookie Richie Allen sailed low and outside in the fourth inning.

In his first hitless performance, Sandy allowed the Mets five walks on June 30, 1962, and he limited the Giants to only two free passes on May 11 of last year.

"I have this to say," Koufax said after the game. "This was the best of the three."

The Brooklyn-born Koufax who will receive the Babe Ruth Award tonight at New York's Shea stadium as the outstanding player in the 1963 World Series, joins a select trio of Larry Corcoran (1906), Cy Young and Bob Feller who have pitched three no-hitters. No pitcher ever has pitched four no-hitters in a career.

Koufax pitched to the minimum of 27 batters and struck out 12 men, marking the 54th time in his career he had struck out 10 men or more.

That tied him with Feller and Rube Waddell for the major league record, which is unlikely to stand long with Koufax around.

Frank Howard provided Koufax with all the runs he needed in the seventh inning when he hit a three-run homer on the left-centerfield roof, his 14th of the year.

Pittsburgh defeated San Francisco, 4-2, Cincinnati stopped Milwaukee, 6-3, despite a triple play by the Braves, Chicago edged the Cardinals, 3-1, and Houston outlasted the Mets, 7-3, in other National League games.

Over in the American League, the Yankees overpowered Minnesota, 9-7, and the White Sox beat the Indians, 5-1. The only other scheduled game, Baltimore at Kansas City, was rained out.



He owns a tricycle but is too little to operate it. He is about 3 and lives, I think, in rooms at the rear of his father's laundry shop. He is Chinese. Always when I have seen him, it has been with the splendid unmailed tricycle beside him, the child, chin in hand, sitting on the step before his father's shop, lost in sad meditation on the fruitfulness of wishing his short legs were longer.

Yesterday I spoke to him for the first time.

He was in his usual place as I approached and looked such a disconsolate morsel of childhood that I stopped. Talking two diffidulous and a pussy yellow spring from the bouquet I had just bought, I offered them to him, saying, "These flowers are for you."

He stared at me. Then, as he understood, delight flushed

into his face. Clambering to his feet, he took my flowers, bent from the waist in a formal bow and said, "Thank you. Oh, thank you very much."

In his courtesy there was no strain, no faleness, no artificiality—none of the reservations we are told must characterize the good manners of little children.

And I think I know why. I think that his parents know not only how to wait for a desired moment to come—but how to seize it, too. You and I have been afraid of trying to teach manners to small children by psychology experts who are sensitive to the evil results of forcing youngsters to say things they don't mean.

But a "thank you" need not be unmeaning. It can be as natural as sunshine if we are willing to wait for the moment of great joy—and then to say, "Darling, the words that this happiness you feel are 'Thank you.' When any one is as happy as you are to be going to the circus for the first time, he yells 'Thank you, thank you, thank you!' It makes him feel much better, and he doesn't have to just squirm with happiness. He can say it. . . ."

Record Shop Italian Pops Into U.S. Picture

NEW YORK—Rita Pavone, an 18-year-old Italian girl who looks like Huckleberry Finn, is perched on the launching pad about to be orbited into fame and fortune in the United States.

Italy's most popular singing star, a rock 'n' roller who is even liked by parents, already has fame and fortune in her homeland, Germany and South America. She earns \$21,000 a week. Her first album sold 150,000 in Italy, a country where the average album sale is 5,000 copies. She has sold over 2 million singles in Italy.

Two years ago Rita was earning \$2 a week as a "policlinic," a seamstress' assistant. She loved to sing, and her father loved to have her entertain. But her mother wanted her daughter to stay in a nice, steady job.

"Her father would not fight with her mother," Teddy Reno, Rita's manager and discoverer explained. "But he would sneak his daughter to places where she could entertain. I am talent scout in Italy for RCA Victor, and he saw an ad I placed in papers, seeking unknowns. He sent in a tape recording of her voice, and Rita was picked as one of the ten finalists in a Rally for Unknowns. The night of the competition in September 1962, she had a fantastic success. Overnight she be-

came a star.

Rita stands one meter, 50 centimeters tall (that's about 4 feet 9) and she weighs 42 kilos with her boots on (that's a shade over 90 pounds). She has tanned, curly light brown hair, cut in sideburns; huge, dark brown eyes; a nose that tilts upward and a mouth that curves upward; dimples and enough freckles for a Boy Scout convention. When she appeared at the talent contest rehearsal, she was wearing pants, a shirt and suspenders. "I insisted that she wear that outfit to perform," Reno said. "Now it's her uniform."

Rita's English is limited to "I'm sorry, no" at the moment. During the interview, Reno translated her few words and told her story.

RCA Victor has signed her to a contract, and her first single and her first album are nearing release. You wonder if she is excited, and Reno asks her. He translates her answer into, "Can't you tell from my face I'm happy?"

How has the sudden wealth affected Rita? She shrugs, smiles and says something in Italian.

Reno laughs as he translates. "She says it doesn't matter, she still gets only \$2 a week allowance."

ALBUM OF THE WEEK—"The Pink Panther" (RCA Victor) with Henry Mancini conducting the score he com-

posed for the Peter Sellers picture. The music is blue ("Royal Blue"), jazzy ("The Tiber Twist"), tuneful ("The Lonely Princess") and funny ("Shades of Senect"). High Class—Wagnerian music lovers will be delighted with two fine recordings with Klempner conducting the Philharmonia Orchestra. Both are Angel releases. One consists of Wagner Overtures ("Rienzi," "Flying Dutchman," "Tannhauser" and "Die Meistersinger"), and the magnificent Prelude and Liebestod from "Tristan und Isolde."

Single-Ohs—"Listy Louie," Larry Gordon (Mercury); "Your Guy," Bobby Wells (Mercury) and "Howlin' in the Wind," Stan Getz (Verve).

South won the first trick with the queen of spades and went right after the diamond suit. When West showed out on the second diamond, South allowed East to win the trick. East knocked out dummy's ace of spades and the diamonds were run.

West had to make a total of five discards on diamonds, but he was equal to the occasion. He discarded two hearts, two clubs and a spade. This meant that he had blanked his king of clubs, but he was not really worried. It was most unlikely for South to hold both ace and queen of clubs in addition to the king of diamonds and queen of spades. After all, South had merely responded one no-trump to his partner's

opening bid and even if he had all these cards, he might try the club finesse rather than try to drop the king.

As it was, South had to

lead a heart and West set the contract with the ace of hearts and three spade tricks. Once more, South had not won with misfortune, but he had brought it on himself. South did not have to play diamonds right away. Instead, he should have led a heart to dummy's king-queen. If West ducked, South would be able to attack diamonds and make his contract with five diamond tricks only. If West took the ace, he would have lost the immediate entry for his spades.

Incidentally, South could have saved the hand when diamonds failed to break. He could have taken dummy's ace of diamonds and led a heart instead of ducking to East.

NEW YORK (NEA)—Paul Blackman has a theory that men should take fewer showers and use perfume. He is not talking about after-shave colognes, either.

"From the first days in the crib we become aware of odors, even though we tend to shortchange our sense of smell in later life. How many times have you smelled, say, a certain motor oil and immediately remembered a fishing trip 20 years ago?"

"In the animal kingdom, we know, body odor is vital to the attraction of the opposite sex. A little more natural fragrance, plus some woody, masculine scent would do wonders for a lot of guys."

Blackman, a direct, businesslike man with a fondness for jokes, at first does not seem like anyone who has made perfume his life's work. He heads a distinguished company (Parfums Cappelletti) which distributes two women's fragrances (Graffiti and Parce Quel). In about a year he plans to enter the men's market with a perfume for men (Forum).

Perfumes are extracted from three basic elements: (1) All the flowers; these are the "sweet perfumes." (2) The grasses; which are bark, dry grass, leaves, herbs and roots. (3) Synthetics; which may or may not be duplicates of natural scents.

Unnecessary Calls Add Up

This machine age has some housewives kicking the message for not following directions and having to pay a service man \$5 to \$7 to push a button for them.

This is the approximate charge made, for example, to correct an overloaded garbage disposer. When the unit overloads, it turns off automatically. Then, the housewife should push the reset button. The unit turns on after about a three-minute rest. But, often a call is made to the serviceman because the housewife never read her instructions.

There are other bad habits especially where the disposer

and dishwasher are concerned that cost money during the year. Most relate to not reading the instructions when the unit is installed.

And speaking of the installation, sometimes the person who installs the unit can cost you money for a service call. An expert in the field reveals her firm gets many calls to take out a dishwasher that just doesn't work. Usually the company serviceman finds the installer didn't turn on the main water valve. If you didn't call the manufacturer for its free service, you could pay as high as \$7.50 just to have someone turn on the valve. So, ask the

installer if he did turn it on, before he leaves your home.

Another common habit, both for old and new dishwasher owners, is loading the unit incorrectly. The minimum service charge for repairs when the machine balks at this treatment will be \$5 to \$10.

Unless you are looking for someone to chat with, save yourself money by reading and following manufacturers' instructions.

Don't panic and run for the telephone to call for help as soon as the machine acts up. Check first to see if it is something simple you can handle, such as pushing the reset button.

The Doctor Says: Baby Bottle Controversy

To heat or not to heat the baby's bottle? This is the question confronting mothers today.

For many years, mothers religiously warmed all bottles to body temperature for fear of chilling the baby's delicate stomach.

Since the baby does not swallow cold milk in a series of large quick gulps, there is little danger of chilling the stomach. The milk is warmed to body temperature before it passes the upper portion of the esophagus.

A few of our more daring baby doctors about four years ago tried not warming the bottles before feeding in a hospital nursery. They even tried it on the premature infants.

They found that the babies loved the cold milk, slept well after a cold feeding and gained weight at the expected rate. There was no difference in the body temperature of the babies before and after feeding. Furthermore, there was no difference in the amount of burping or spitting up.

Mothers who were brave enough to give their babies cold formulas right out of the refrigerator—no doubt when grandma wasn't looking—were enthusiastic. It meant less work and there were no apparent disadvantages. Now some doctors are advancing the idea that allergy to milk is more likely to occur when the milk is given to babies without warming it. All the evidence isn't in yet, so your best bet is to follow your doctor's advice in what has become, for the moment at least, a controversial matter.



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Grave Charges

Shock waves from that delayed action bombshell — the now-it-can-be-told interview given by Gen. Douglas MacArthur to Scripps-Howard reporter Jim Lucas in 1954 — are still echoing throughout the land.

The most serious charge in this latter-day "J'accuse" is the late general's allegation that all his plans regarding Korea were relayed from Washington, through the British, straight to the Red Chinese.

"The Chinese Communists decided to come into the Korean war," Lucas recorded, "after being assured by the British that MacArthur would be hamstringed and could not effectively oppose them."

All the rest pales into insignificance beside this, and the ghosts of 50,000 dead American soldiers in Korea demand an answer.

The standard explanation that MacArthur was relieved of command in Korea because his insistence on winning the war with the Chinese would have set off World War III rings phony in the face of MacArthur's statement that the Chinese would not have entered Korea at all but for this "Great Betrayal."

Unfortunately, there is an overshadowing aura of extremity in the MacArthur revelation. It is replete with words like "Anglo-Saxonophile," "welfarist press," "conspiracies," "perfidy," phrases like "those fools in Washington."

The MacArthur document is all black and white. He was right and nearly everyone else was wrong. That may well have been the case of course.

But why did he not speak out at the time? Why did the others he named who agreed with him, Gen. Mark Clark for instance, hold their tongues as well?

Is our democracy so delicately constituted that it would have collapsed under the stress of controversy? Or did more important considerations — the preservation of Western unity and harmony, perhaps — cause the general to keep his silence unto death?

MacArthur did not say, and we will never know.

"Of the dead speak nothing but good." But a dead general has reached back from the grave to accuse the living, who now cannot call him to account for his words.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — President Johnson is getting pretty deep into the thicket of problems that go with filling important federal judgeships. No Chief Executive escapes this involvement for long.

His really thankless assignment is choosing a replacement for Judge Ben Cameron, of Mississippi, Cameron, who died several weeks ago, was one of the nine judges serving on the U. S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit covering Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Florida and the Canal Zone.

Cameron's one-man rulings frequently slowed or blocked court desegregation orders issued by other judges in school cases. He was a key figure in delays which preceded entry of Negro James Meredith into the University of Mississippi in late 1962.

Though recommendations have been quietly filtering in from senators representing some of the affected states, as well as from outside sources, no action on the Fifth Circuit vacancy has been taken or seems likely in the early future.

The choice will not be easy. Civil rights groups are saying plainly they do not want another Cameron. Militant segregationists will resist a moderate choice. If talent scouts should consult both camps in the search for some sort of compromise, the result could be merely to fan their mutual suspicions and make any selection unpalatable to both.

The problem over the Cameron appeals court vacancy is further aggravated by a current move to split the Fifth Circuit into two smaller circuits. The present circuit is the second largest geographically, and has the largest work load of any appellate region in the United States.

The Judicial Conference of the United States, headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren, recommended a split many months ago. This official body of top judges suggested the Fifth be divided so as to include Texas, Louisiana and the Canal Zone in one circuit, with Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia and Florida in the other.

A draft bill embodying these proposals is due for Senate committee study. But, once again, civil rights and segregationists force a each suspicious they will somehow suffer if this or perhaps any division is decided upon.

One Justice department lawyer comments that, even without the controversy over a possible division, choosing a new judge in a difficult area like the Fifth Circuit can be tougher for the President than naming a new Supreme Court justice.

Not all Johnson's dealings with the judiciary are this troublesome. Thus far in 1964 he has nominated, and had confirmed by the Senate, seven federal judges. He has named another seven on

which action is pending.

There are ten spots to be filled on the federal bench at the district court level, and five in various appeals courts from coast to coast.

Four of the vacancies are the oldest on the list, dating from the creation of 73 new federal judgeships in late May of 1961. These posts, in other words, never have been filled. In two of these cases, work loads are not great enough in the area to create heavy pressure for presidential action.

Changes Reported In School's Role

Graduates of Seminole High School can look back to a number of events which have occurred during the past year—some of them new, some of them a continuation of previous years and some of which have been merely routine in getting an education.

Principal Andrew J. Bracken paused at his desk the other day and recalled some of the highlights of the past year.

The school had its evaluation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools last fall.

The school has expanded its technology course and emphasized a fast-growing course in drafting. This was started during the previous school year but, since it is a two-year course, the seniors this year will be the first to receive full benefit from it.

Nevertheless, Bracken says, many of the one-year students have acquired positions with area firms after having completed the initial period of the course.

Other, more fortunate students who have completed two years of drafting study have a far more formidable chance to acquire quick employment.

The Student Body issued a "handbook" during the start of the school year. In it were listed names and addresses of all students; the officers and activities of the various school organizations and generally an orientation of the school and its facilities.

The Student Council operated a bookstore with marked success, Bracken recalls.

Members of the Key Club had a walkway built to the library and many other improvements were made by a variety of groups in the school.

Bracken, looking to the future, says the school will function on a different daily schedule next year. There will be five classes daily of 70 minutes duration each.

This season the school had six classes daily of 55 minutes duration each.

The change, it was pointed out, will give far more concentration on individual courses and allow the instructors and students to have additional time together in following the education pattern of each student.





The 1963-64 term at Oviedo High School has been one of the most outstanding in the school's history with records set in academics, athletics and club activities.

Clyde Holder, principal, points with great pride to improvements in the academic field, listing additions of courses in higher math, speed reading, driver education, shorthand and industrial arts, some of which are in the second year. One of Lyman's students is a member of the advanced studies program at Rollins College. Roger Schmidt, a National Merit finalist also attended the advanced studies summer program at Stetson University.

Stations May Be Cut To 5 Next Sunday

An estimated 10,000 persons received their second and final doses of Sabin vaccine Sunday at 12 "feeding stations" throughout the county.

Known as Sabin Oral Sunday, the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees spearheaded the drive in cooperation with the County Health Department.

The 12 stations were manned from noon to 5 p. m. and this time the one at the A & P Grocery Store drew the largest number of persons, Jaycee officials said.

Last April when the first of the two-part project was held, the station drawing the greatest number was Florida State Bank. The total taking the vaccine Sunday compares favorably with the total on the first Sunday, Jaycee leaders report.

Jaycee President Jim Smith said his group is considering reducing the number of stations for the makeup Sunday to about five. He said the five may be able to handle the persons based on experiences gained during the first makeup Sunday.

Everyone except those who received the vaccine yesterday may take part in the makeup Sunday next week, officials say. They are urging all persons to take the vaccine even if they missed the April feeding.

After a suitable waiting period the persons taking the vaccine for the first time next Sunday then can get the second dose from private physicians, it was reported.

Jaycees are seeking a donation of 50 cents for the dosage but emphasize this is not compulsory. The 50 cents will help defray the cost of the vaccine, they explained.

Amateur radio operators were on hand for Sunday's project and kept the communication setup working in fine style, Jaycees say.

Picket Lines Up Again At Cape

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — Picket lines were thrown up at every entrance to the nation's space port today, threatening the third work stoppage this year on building for America's probe to the moon and the program to orbit a manned space laboratory.

At least some of the 1,000 construction workers building a giant, \$110 million vertical assembly building for the moon launch and a \$40 million complex for the Titan-3 program honored the picket lines, but the exact number was not immediately determined.

The pickets were members of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees renewing a protest by unions over the use of a government-owned spur onto the Merritt Island space complex by the strikebound Florida East Coast Railway.

Bids On SR-427 Asked June 25


Bids will be opened by the State Road Department on June 25 for work on a number of highway projects in the state, including work on Interstate Routes 95 and 4.

Williams Denies New Trial For Lowdermilk

Circuit Judge Volie A. Williams has denied a new trial to C. R. Lowdermilk of Altamonte Springs who was convicted last December on five counts in an alleged citrus swindle at the Hi-Aeres concentration plant.

The case involved a Florida Department of Agriculture employee, Alta Tyndall Hall of Orlando, who turned state's evidence and testified against the defendant.

Lowdermilk's two attorneys, Ed Kirkland and Martin Segal, both of Orlando, filed an extensive 17-count brief specifying grounds in support of the motion for a new trial. All were denied by Judge Williams.

In conclusions presented with the decision against granting a new trial, Judge Williams listed 12 different objections.

During the trial Hall confessed that he and Lowdermilk had an arrangement in which Hall juggled pounds of solids reports on Lowdermilk fruit going into the Hi-Aeres plant to reflect a higher amount of solids price than the fruit was worth.

Neither Hall nor Lowdermilk have appeared for sentencing. Following his guilty plea, Hall has been free until pre-sentence investigation and Lowdermilk pending the outcome of the new trial motion.

Bible Proposal Seen As Threat To Guarantees

WASHINGTON (UPI) — More than 200 constitutional lawyers charged today that proposals to overrule the Supreme Court decisions against Bible-reading and prayers in public schools could set a precedent endangering all the liberties guaranteed in the Constitution.

The lawyers, including deans of 55 law schools, filed a statement with the House Judiciary Committee urging Congress to reject any proposals for a constitutional amendment to reverse the court's rulings.

"A grave responsibility rests upon Congress in taking this first experiment on our liberties," the statement said. "Whatever disagreements some may have with the Bible prayer decisions, we believe strongly that they do not justify this experiment."

The committee has ended public hearings on a variety of proposals to permit prayers in the schools. It has not yet given any indication on when it might take further action on the proposals.

NEW YORK (UPI) — An actor's strike which threatened a prolonged Broadway blackout was tentatively settled today.
