Harvard Astronomer Says Life Exists Elsewhere In Universe

NEW YORK — Is there life like ours on other planets? For ages men have wondered. Now from astronomers comes the answer. "Yes, probably," they are not alone in the universe, says Dr. Harlow Shapley of Harvard University.

Next, assume that only one of every thousand of all these families of planets has one planet with the right conditions to support life. That means not being too close or too far from its sun, having the right kind of orbit and rotation, and of course an atmosphere.

So now you're assuming only one in every billion stars could have the kind of planet to support life.

Then suppose that life actually develops to high forms on only one in every thousand of these.

That's saying there could be life like ours of pretty high forms, or even higher forms, for only one of every one thousand billion stars in the universe.

Well, there are still enough stars, there would be 100 million of the suitable planets, Dr. Shapley estimates.

Our sun and earth are part of a huge family or galaxy of stars, the Milky Way, estimated to contain 100 billion stars. There are billions of other "milky way" galaxies, each with billions of stars.

The implications are that "the life phenomenon is widespread and of some significance," Dr. Shapley has written. And, he adds, there's no reason to assume that man in the animals or birds on earth "are the only life forms that can be produced."

He says that some day perhaps we will visit other planets in our own solar system to see if there is life on Mars, or elsewhere.

But to learn whether other stars have planets like ours, or planets with life on them, is quite another thing.

Even the stars which are nearest to us are so distant that it takes years for their light to reach us. Yet light travels 186,000 miles a second, in a year it light can travel about six thousand billion miles.

The very nearest star to us is 43 light years away. That's a

long round trip even if space rockets could travel at the speed of light.

Present techniques in astronomy can't answer whether nearby stars have planets of about the earth size. The stars are too bright, and any small pull by planets on their motions is difficult to measure. But evidence has been found for a huge planet circling around a star named 61 Cygni, which is about 11 light years away.

The speculations are called to mind by Dr. Shapley's latest description to the National Academy of Sciences of the galaxy which is nearest to our own Milky Way.

This is the large Magellanic cloud, visible only from our Southern Hemisphere, and the small Magellanic cloud are about 170 thousand light years away from us.

Many galaxies are spherical, or spiral shaped, or have star arms like pinwheels. The large Magellanic cloud, though, has an irregular shape.

From various studies, Dr. Shapley now thinks the large Magellanic cloud is a very young or embryonic galaxy. In time, he says, these irregular galaxies tend to become spiral shaped, then spherical.

Our own Milky Way has spiral arms, and seems to be a middle-aged galaxy. The large Magellanic cloud is perhaps only a few million years old as a galaxy.

The age of our universe, by the way, now is estimated at about five billion years.

The large Magellanic cloud has one big claim for fame and attention—it possesses the brightest star known to man in the universe, Dr. Shapley says. The star is S Doradus. It is one million times brighter than our sun.

And S Doradus is apparently only about one million years old—about the same length of time that man has lived on earth, the astronomer adds.

Is there some planet, at a respectable distance from S Doradus, which is straggling with life, on which life like ours will develop? We can only wonder.

No charges have as yet been pressed against his 13-year-old companion, who, Sheriff J. L. Hobby said, made a complete confession and directed the sheriff to where some stolen articles were hidden in woods near Lake Mary.

Sheriff Hobby said Greenleaf has denied the charge that he went to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Melville Monday night, after helping them unload their car, and participated in the removal of a 200-pound safe, a watch, assorted jewelry, a portable typewriter and various articles of clothing.

The Melville had advised from the North to their Lake Mary home Monday, and hired Greenleaf and another youth to help unload their car. Constable J. Q. "Slim" Galloway said the second youth is not apparently involved in the theft at the present time.

Prosecution Hacks Away At 2 Episodes In Physician's Tale

CLEVELAND, Nov. 23.—The prosecution punched today at two episodes in Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard's account of the night his wife was murdered. It got witnesses to say his house was ablaze with light and the lake outside was rough.

A Sheppard neighbor, Mrs. Jay L. Bender, testified she saw lights upstairs and down at 2 1/2 a.m. on the murder morning. Sheppard has said he chased his wife's killer through a darkened house.

John Tront, a dark, burly custodian, said he had to rush fishing in Lake Erie near Sheppard's home that morning because the water was "bad" and lashing almost the entire beach. The state claims Sheppard's account of a struggle with Marilyn Sheppard's killer at the edge of the water is phony because it says he would have been drowned after being knocked out.

Crime Reconstructed

According to Galloway's reconstruction of the crime, Greenleaf and his juvenile accomplice went to the Melville home after the couple had come to Sanford to spend the night, forced an entry and took the missing articles.

Sheriff Hobby said that when Chief Deputy Sheriff O. L. Owens and Galloway arrested Greenleaf yesterday afternoon, they discovered a sledge hammer and a screw driver believed to be the tools used to enter the home and later break open the safe in Greenleaf's car.

The safe, a heavy metal one, was discovered by a hunter in a field yesterday. It had been battered open by heavy blows and the locking mechanism had been pounded out.

Sheriff Hobby said all stolen goods except some jewelry, watches and a suit of clothes have been recovered.

Ex-Minister Given Term Of 14 Years For Assaulting Girl

ANDERSON, S. C., Nov. 23.—John Shoon, 44-year-old former minister of Pickens county, was sentenced today to 14 years in prison here yesterday for assaulting a 13-year-old Negro girl.

Charles G. Duncan, judge, sentenced Shoon after he had pleaded guilty to the charge of assaulting the girl. Shoon was arrested last week after a woman told police she had been assaulted by a man who looked like Shoon.

An excellent demonstration on the forestry phase of conservation was presented by the Florida Forestry Service. 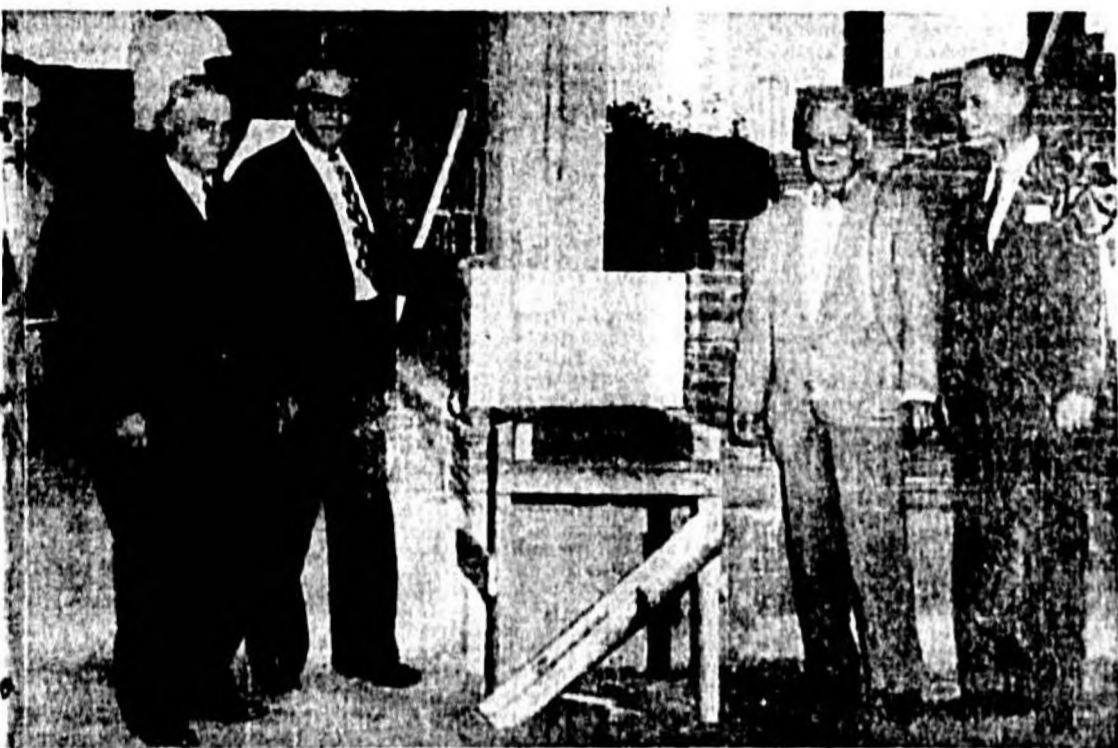

Local Edicts On Mixing Suggested

Suggestion Made On School Issue By Atty. General

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The Justice Department says the controversial task of sending white and Negro children to the same public schools should be carried out in accordance with federal court direction, not by a general Supreme Court order.

Att. Gen. Brownell proposed this to the Supreme Court yesterday. And in so doing, he seemed in agreement with President Truman's view and with the parties actively involved in the historic case on public school segregation.
