'Cautious Optimism' Expected Nixon Sums Up War Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon, responding to what associates say is a public demand for a summation of the Vietnam situation, goes before the nation tonight to give what is expected to be a cautiously optimistic assessment of peace prospects.

White House press secretary Fred L. Ziegler said the speech, to be broadcast live at 10 p.m. EDT on national television and radio, will contain some new material, but cautioned against expecting an announcement of a peace breakthrough.

Nixon associates also said the President's speech will outline how matters now stand in light of the Viet Cong's 10-point peace proposal rather than announcing the breaking of new ground.

A high government official said Nixon will stress mutual withdrawal of troops and reduction of the fighting as moves the United States believes must have priority in the Paris peace talks.

This official said there would be no pledge for unilateral U.S. troop reductions.

The President's speech is expected to reflect the administration's feeling that the Hanoi-backed Viet Cong proposals, while generally unacceptable, offer some negotiable points.

One of these contains the "final" public admission by Hanoi that it has troops in the South.

No associate expects the President to announce acceptance of the proposal.

Cabinet Opens Attack On Reorganization

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Cabinet supporters in the House, overwhelmed Tuesday by a coalition which put central management services under the governor, made another attack today on the "strong government" reorganization plan.

The pro-Cabinet forces, beaten earlier in an attempt to put budgeting, purchasing, personnel, airplanes and other vehicles under the Cabinet, tried again to get Cabinet control just in the budgeting process.

The proposal was defeated 76-42 Tuesday as most Republicans teamed up with a minority of the Democrats to support members called an "unholy alliance."

Representative general agreed that the vote to determine whether the governor or Cabinet should control the state purse strings and other important functions was the most important of the 1969 session.

The Senate, meanwhile, was promised copies of the revised appropriation bill this afternoon and was told that the Senate's version of the 1969-70 budget will be up for debate Thursday.

After a four-hour hearing, the Senate Ways and Means Committee Tuesday night approved a committee spending bill totaling \$1,096,614,284, and will submit it to the Senate today.

Great White Way To Start In 60 Days

Construction should begin in the next 60 days on the "White Way" project of providing street lighting on Hwy. 17-0C around the lakefront from the Sanford city limits to I-4, officials told The Herald today.

One of the four hurdles in the project was overcome yesterday when the Board of County Commissioners gave unanimous consent and authorization to Commission Chairman John Alexander to execute contracts to permit expenditure of secondary road funds for materials for the lights.

Total cost to the county for the materials is estimated at \$17,400 with city of Sanford to pick up labor, installation and maintenance expenses. Current cost figure is some \$5,500 less than estimated six months ago.

Final procedures to be accomplished before construction begins is formal approval by the State Road Board, letting of the project for bid and contract award. It is expected it will take a minimum of 60 days for these procedures to be completed.

Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and the City Commission have worked together on the effort for the past two years.

The county governing body, when the project was given its approval nearly one year ago, agreed to cooperate with any of the other county municipalities in lighting major access highways, including SR 28 from Oviedo to the county line, SR 436 from I-4 to Altamonte Springs, SR 4 from I-4 to Longwood.

However, none of the other cities have indicated desire to participate on like projects.

President's Draft Plan Favored

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate has responded favorably to President Nixon's lottery-based draft reform plan, but the two top Democratic leaders are split on the issue.

Majority Leader Mike Mansfield says the Nixon plan is "a step in a direction that will satisfy some members," but he will vote against it because it doesn't cure enough inequities in the draft.

Democratic Whip Edward M. Kennedy, however, praised the President's proposals, saying they "embody the reforms we most urgently need."

And a Republican critic of the Vietnam War, Sen. Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon, saw the Nixon message, issued Tuesday, as a sign the GOP administration is not nearing a solution to the war.

"It discourages me about what we can expect from their war policy," Hatfield said in an interview, but he acknowledged he would probably find few allies in opposing the Nixon draft program.

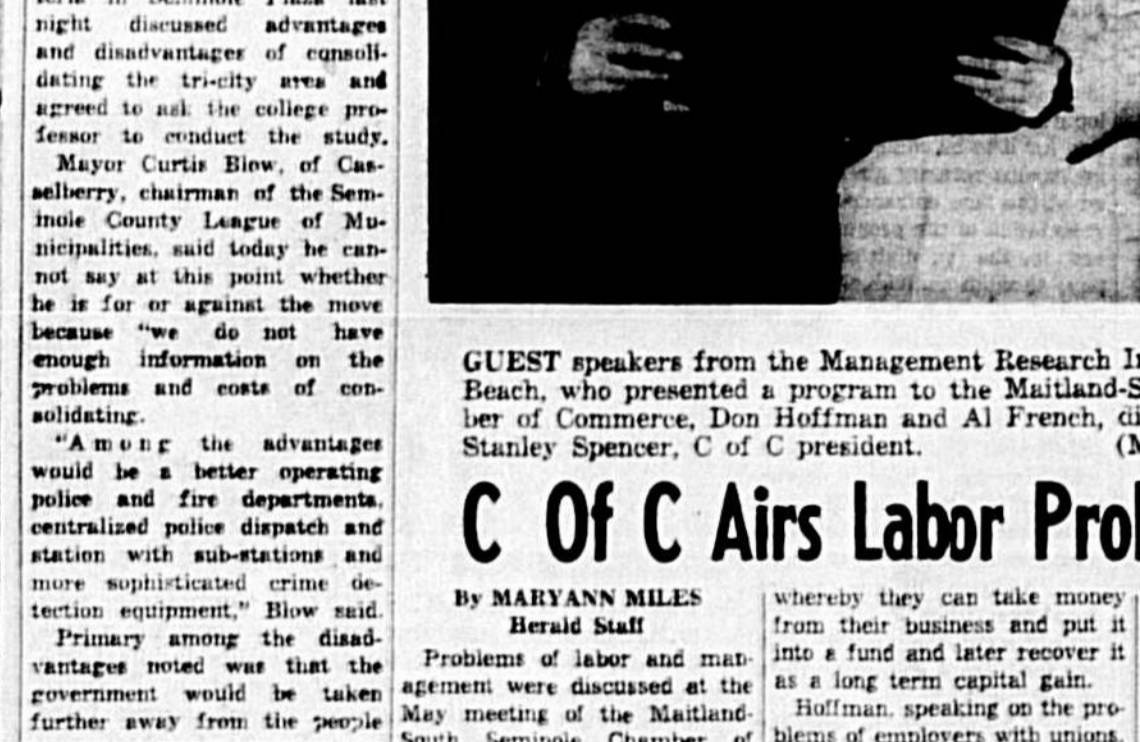

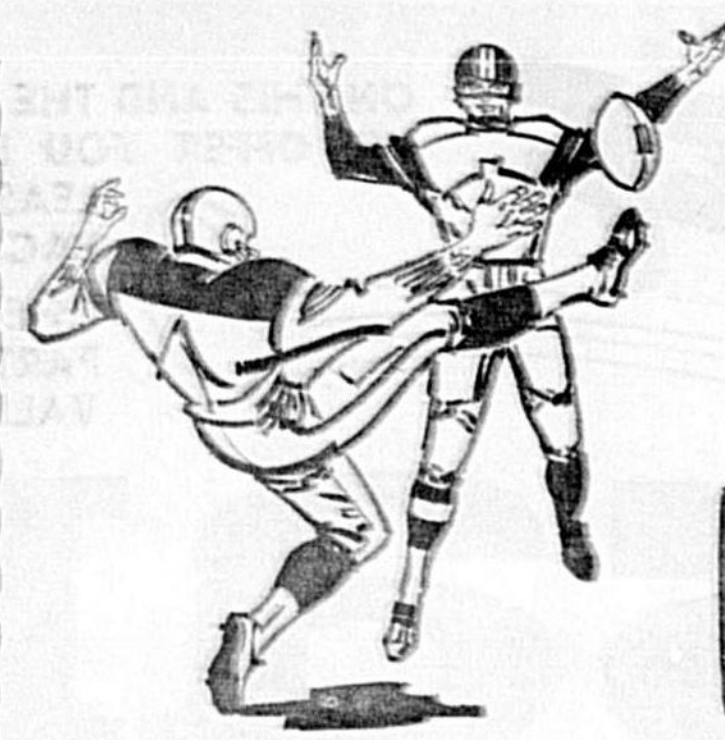

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Scientists Air ABM For Solons

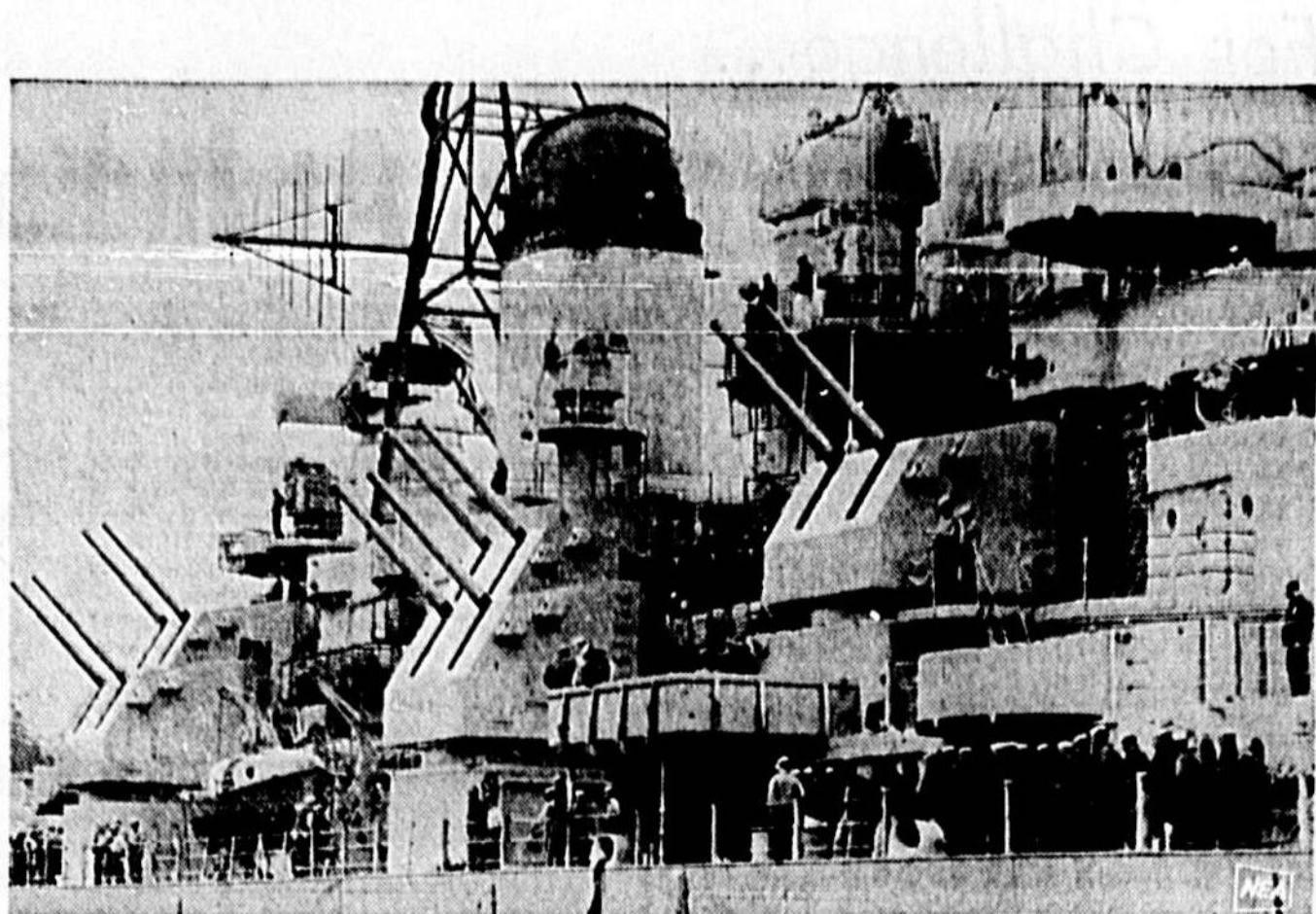

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two eminent scientists with similar information but different conclusions on President Nixon's Safeguard missile defense system had the chance today to wage their battle in the same forum.

Dr. Edward Teller, nuclear physicist who led development of the hydrogen bomb over stiff opposition, and Dr. Jerome Weisner, co-director of a voluminous study attacking the Safeguard ABM system, were scheduled to appear before the Senate disarmament subcommittee.

ABM supporters looked to Teller to bolster Nixon's call for limited deployment of the anti-missile system.

While Weisner and other opponents in the scientific community argue the system won't work, ABM supporters delight in recalling that they overcame similar opposition when he was pressing for development of the H-bomb.

Weisner, provost of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a former presidential science adviser, helped edit the 344-page study commissioned by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., challenging the Safeguard system.

Casualties Mount In Vietnam

Heavy Fighting Continues

SAIGON (AP) — Casualties mounted today as heavy fighting continued across South Vietnam for the third day. All military sources claimed more than 1,800 North Viet names and Viet Cong killed, many of them by American bombers and artillery.

Military sources estimated more than 100 U.S. troops had been killed and several hundred wounded since the sudden upsurge in enemy attacks Sunday night.

South Vietnamese losses were put at 273 troops killed, 748 wounded and 22 missing. The biggest fight of the last 24 hours raged 30 miles northwest of Saigon as American infantrymen from the 25th Division and U.S. bombers and artillery battered North Vietnamese troops entrenched in fortified positions.

After four hours, the North Vietnamese force retreated, leaving 50 of their dead on the battlefield. Three Americans were reported killed.

The area northwest of Saigon and the rugged foothills south of Da Nang, South Vietnam's second largest city, have seen the stiffest fighting during the past three days.

In a two-day fight six miles southwest of Da Nang, 81 enemy soldiers were reported killed by U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese militiamen. Eleven U.S. bombers and artillery blasted the enemy's positions.

Military analysts consider the steps in enemy attacks part of the effort to force a coalition government on South Vietnam and to increase demands in the United States for a withdrawal of American troops by inflicting higher U.S. casualties.

Astronauts Face Jinx

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Astronauts Tom Stafford and Gene Cernan hope to break a jinx and blast off for the moon right on schedule Sunday.

On previous flights, both have had problems getting off the launch pad, especially Stafford. On both the Gemini 6 and 9 flights, Stafford had to make the trip to the pad three times before his rocket finally was launched. Cernan was his copilot on Gemini 9 and experienced the same double delay.

The shots were scrubbed for a variety of reasons, ranging from technical to the explosion of rockets boosting rendezvous targets.

Young, veteran of the Gemini 3 and 10 missions, has never had a launch postponement, and his fellow spacemen hope some of his luck will rub off on them.

"When I flew with Wally Schirra on my first flight," Stafford recalled, "I was sure it was Wally who was the jinx who caused the delays. And then when we started getting the postponements on Gemini 9 I thought I was the guy with the cloud hanging over him."

"Then I finally realized that maybe I was the guy with the cloud hanging over him."

"We have a whole lunar operation keyed to that liftoff time," he said. "Any delay would upset our timetable and take us over different areas of the moon than planned."

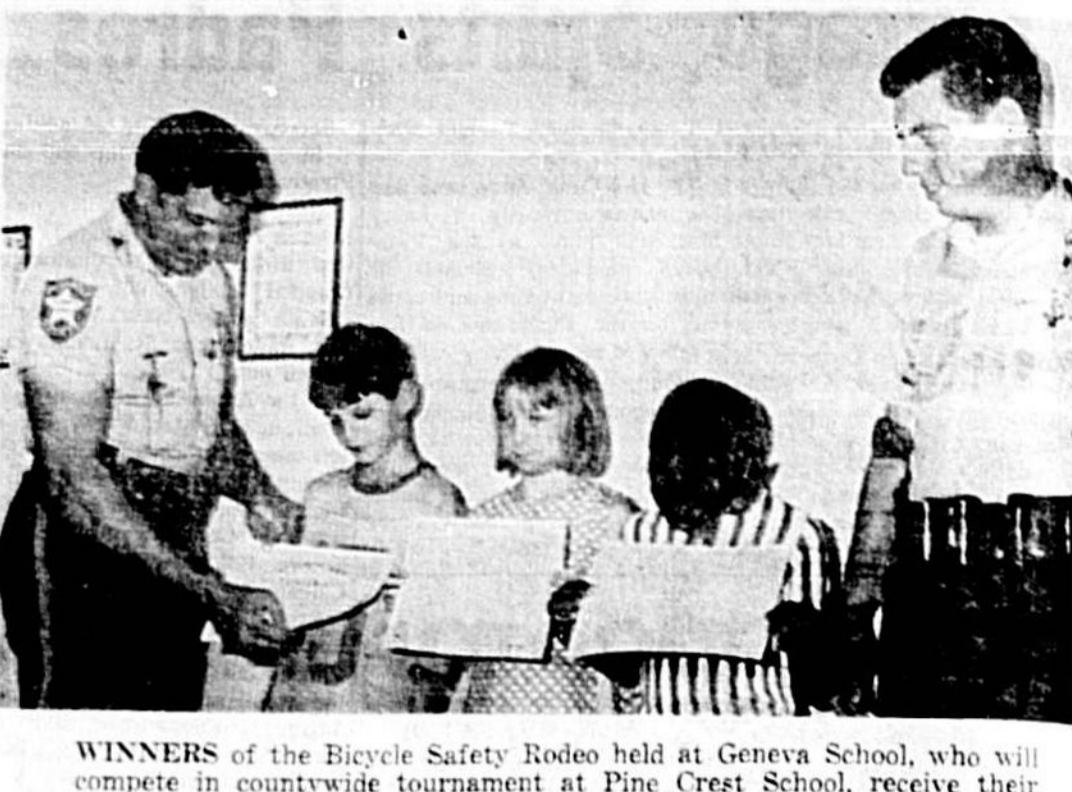

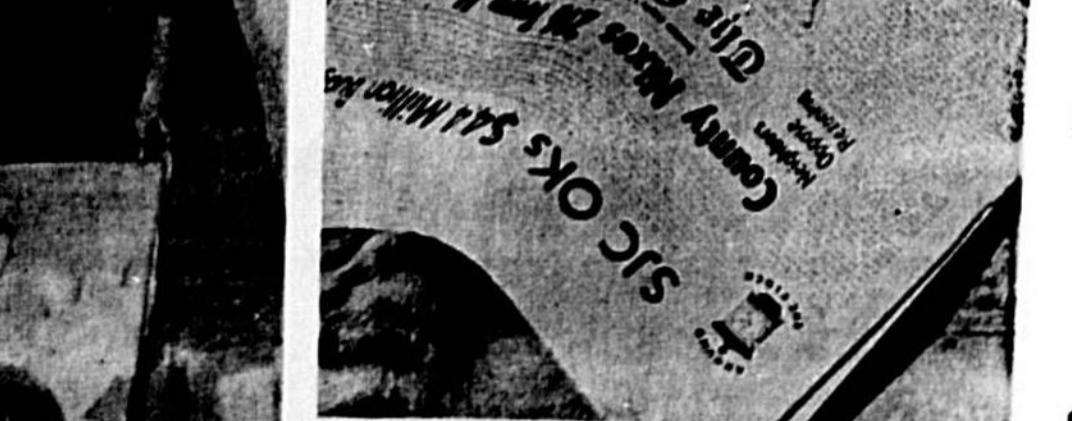

German Pancakes Go, Go, Go

Recipes come and go, but one for German Pancakes goes on and on.

One of the best places to eat this specialty is at Pandi's in Whitefish Bay, Milwaukee's oldest restaurant. Milwaukee residents told us that long ago, but we just caught up with Pandi's recipe in a delightful regional cookbook, "Be Wisconsin's Guest." This collection contains recipes from almost 50 Wisconsin restaurants as well as many contributed by members of the Junior League of Milwaukee who publish and distribute the cookbook.

What else is special about "Be Wisconsin's Guest"? A good number of recipes that are just a little different. Among them, baked breaded chicken wings and baked shrimp stuffed with crabmeat in the appetizer section; several unusual vegetable casseroles to serve as meat or fish accompaniments; a simple-to-make but interesting Sunday breakfast rusk of Scandinavian origin; super-seasoning for roast beef; Hungarian beef goulash with an especially delicious gravy; economic soufflé made with egg whites; and elegant torte.

Here, then, is the German Pancake recipe. Tried in our kitchen, it worked perfectly.

FAMOUS GERMAN PANCAKE

1/2 cup all purpose flour
1/2 cup milk
Pinch of salt
4 large eggs
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon shortening

Mix flour, milk and salt together until smooth. Crack in eggs and mix until smooth. Melt butter and shortening in a large frying pan (one with sloping sides is best) and pour in batter. Fry until golden brown. Turn with spatula. Make four criss-cross cuts (two each way) with spatula. Bake at 425 degrees for about 12 minutes (pancake will not begin to rise until about seven-eight minutes). Makes one large pancake. Serve immediately with maple syrup, powdered sugar, jelly, bacon or any other accompaniment you prefer.

This recipe comes from the cookbook, "Be Wisconsin's Guest," published by the Junior League of Milwaukee, and was contributed by Pandi's Whitefish Bay restaurant.

NEWBURG BISQUE

1 can (16 ounces) frozen corn
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) chicken
cheese soup
Milk
Finely grated cheddar cheese
Paprika

Into a medium saucepan turn the soup. Fill the lobster bisque can with water and add. Fill the cheese soup can with milk and add. Heat gently, stirring often, until bisque thickens, bring to a boil. Sprinkle each serving with cheese and paprika. Makes six servings.

American Cooks Use Burgundy

Each country has its favorite version of stew, but in recent years the French way of cooking beef in Burgundy wine has won its way into the hearts of American cooks.

No wonder! The dish, although it calls for a goodly number of ingredients is not difficult to put together. It's not lavishly expensive. And its flavor is so good it makes an excellent offering for company.

The latest American adaptation of Burgundy Beef tried in our kitchen makes life easier than usual for the cook. That's because frozen small whole onions are used. No peeling! Frozen mushrooms that come in a convenient package also do in as well as a little chopped parsley from the freezer.

Here's the recipe. But a couple of changes may be made if you like. Before you brown the onions, you can sprinkle them with a teaspoon of sugar and although this isn't traditional, you can add a quarter cup of dry sherry when you pour in the Burgundy.

What to serve with Burgundy Beef? Lots of crusty bread—French or sourdough. And a big salad of tossed greens. Dessert can be a simple fruit combination or something luxuriously sweet.

BURGUNDY BEEF

4 tablespoons butter
3 pounds boneless beef rump cut in 1 1/2 inch cubes
1/2 cup brandy
2 beef bouillon cubes dissolved in 1 cup boiling water
1 1/2 cups red Burgundy wine
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 bay leaf
1/4 teaspoon dry crushed thyme
2 tablespoons frozen chopped parsley
2 strips bacon, diced
1 bag (1 pound, 4 ounces) frozen small whole onions
1 package (4 ounces) frozen whole mushrooms

In a large skillet in the hot butter brown beef well on all sides.

In a small saucepan heat brandy until warm. With a match, light the brandy and pour flaming over beef. Shake skillet until flame dies.

Transfer beef and pan juices to a casserole that has a tight fitting lid. Add bouillon, wine, salt, pepper, bay leaf, thyme and parsley. Cover tightly with foil to collect droplets of steam, then cover with lid and cook in a preheated 350-degree oven until beef is tender—about two hours.

About 15 minutes before beef is done, cook bacon in skillet. Add onions and mushrooms (not defrosted). Cover and cook over medium heat, stirring several times, until vegetables are thawed and tender—about five minutes. Uncover and continue cooking until liquid has evaporated and vegetables are lightly browned. Add to beef mixture. If you like you may sprinkle the beef dish with additional chopped parsley.

Makes six healthy servings.

Food Combo Payoff

The best home cooks we have discovered lately hail from Italy. It's a delicious combination of rice, spinach, cheese and eggs that's baked in a fatty shallow pan. Cut in small pieces. It's great to offer with late-afternoon or before-dinner drinks.

This tortia comes from Piacenza, a town in Northern Italy where rice is a staple, and sauces are likely to be made with butter, eggs and cream. In Italy the rice tortia goes to the table at the end of the meal along with fruit and cheese. It's so highly regarded that it is usually served on holidays or other festive occasions.

The recipe was contributed by a friend who borrowed it from her Italian-born mother. Our friend says: "I've made a departure from the Italian service of tortia because I use it as an hors d'oeuvre nearly every time I entertain a dozen or more friends. It's a perfect do-ahead dish and inexpensive. Recently I served my tortia to my mother who pronounced it just right. Although she seems any approach that isn't fresh, she didn't even guess that I had used the frozen kind!"

JENNIE'S RICE TORTIA
1/2 cup water
1 package (16 ounces) frozen leaf spinach
2 cups cooked rice
1/2 pound ricotta cheese
1 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
4 large eggs
Olive oil
Fine dry bread crumbs

In a saucepan bring the water to a boil. Add spinach. Break up with a fork to thaw and bring to a boil; boil about one minute. Drain thoroughly; chop fine; squeeze out any excess water. In a medium mixing bowl stir together the spinach, rice, ricotta, Parmesan, salt and pepper. In a small mixing bowl beat together three of the eggs until yolk and whites are combined; fold into rice mixture. With olive oil, grease the bottom and sides of a square cake pan (9 by 9 by 2 inches). Sprinkle bottom and sides with enough bread crumbs to coat. Turn rice mixture into pan. Heat remaining eggs until yolk and whites are combined. With a pastry brush, brush over rice mixture. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until firm—about 30 minutes.

Note: If any of the tortia is leftover, cut it into large sections. With a wide spatula, loosen carefully and remove; wrap in foil and refrigerate. To reheat, bring to room temperature and then reheat in the foil in a 350-degree oven just until warm—5 or ten minutes. Recipe may be easily doubled and baked in a 13-by-9-by-2-inch pan at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

HAM AND CHEESE PINWHEELS
1 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/4 cups enriched white or yellow cornmeal
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup cold water
Ham Filling—see recipe below
2 slices American cheese

Into medium mixing bowl sift together flour, baking powder, salt and cornmeal. Cut in shortening until particles are fine. Add water; stir until well blended and mixture leaves sides of bowl.

On a prepared pastry cloth, knead gently 10 times. With stretched-covered rolling pin, roll out to form a 15-by-15-inch rectangle. Spread Ham Filling over dough.

Starting with 15-inch side, roll up. Cut in half-inch slices. Place on greased cookie sheets. Bake in preheated 400-degree oven 12 to 15 minutes. Cut each cheese slice in 15 pieces; top each pinwheel with a cheese piece. Return to oven until cheese melts—two to three minutes. Serve hot. Make about two and a half dozen.

Florida Women Get Vote

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A resolution which would make Florida the last state to ratify the 49-year-old constitutional amendment giving women the right to vote was approved by the Florida Senate Tuesday 42-0.

The resolution went immediately to the House, where passage would formally record Florida's approval of the 19th Amendment.

The amendment giving women the right to vote became effective in 1920. Enough states had ratified it.

The Senate approved another resolution paying tribute to the 50th anniversary of the League of Women Voters of the United States and 50th anniversary of the Florida League.

Sen. Verle Pope, D-St. Augustine, speaking on behalf of both resolutions, said "I know of no organization in the United States that has set about their job in a more intelligent manner to see that citizens are properly informed."

He said ratification of the 19th Amendment comes as a tribute to the league.

"Florida is the last state in the union to formally ratify this amendment. It is a step that should have been taken many, many years ago," Pope said.
