## Sanford Beauty Plans Near OK

Plans to beautify some of the areas leading into Sanford were approved for the landscape architect's final rendering this morning. The scenic improvement board reviewed final plans to guide Tom Wallis, of Wallis-Stressau and Associates, a Winter Park landscape architecture firm, in his final drawings for the city-appointed board.

The five projects now included in the scenic improvement plans are: Memorial Park (the landscaped area on Lake Monroe), the senior citizens park bordered by Park and Oak Avenues and Fourth and Fifth Streets, the Crooms High School grounds, islands along Highway 17-92 and the intersection medians on the south end of 17-92 where Park Drive and 17-92 (French Avenue) meet.

Wallis expressed concern over an earlier decision by the board to omit game areas from the final plans of the senior citizens park. He pointed out that it would be worthwhile to include the areas in the final plans so if at some later date they were desired they could be easily added. A light ground cover or grass covering the area where the shuffleboard courts would later be placed, for instance, would be aesthetically pleasing until the game areas are built.

The board members voted to recommend to the city council the final plan with the thought that the courts could be added early at a later date if they are deemed necessary.

It is his plan to use azaleas and day lilies in profusion and colored sidewalks to liven up the park areas.

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# HEW Lops Money For Migrants School Funds Cut \$82,820

School Supt. John Angel revealed today that the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) had deferred \$82,820 in federal funds for the county's migrant program. Angel, at his news conference today, said HEW attorney Alice Helms yesterday told Walter Teague, school finance officer, that this county will lose the money since the program was filed after July 1, 1969, and is being considered as part of a new program.

County was notified in August that because of the freedom of choice school plan submitted by the School Board for 1969-70 term, which was turned down by HEW, all federal funds for new school programs would be deferred.

Miss Helms, speaking by phone from Washington, further advised that other funds counted on by the school's "wait" this year might be deferred.

Loss of the money means that six teacher aides employed in the migrant program at six county schools will be given two-week dismissal notices as the program is being discontinued.

## Vehicle Bids Asked By County

Authorization to advertise for bids for a number of vehicles was granted by J. C. Lavender, county road superintendent, by the County Commission Tuesday. Lavender will ask for bids for:

- Four dump trucks, a flat truck, two pick-up trucks and a low-boy for his department;
- a motor grader and a car for the county engineering department;
- a pickup truck for the county agriculture agent;
- a car for the county home economics agent; and
- a car for the county zoning department.

Commissioners also received a report from its insurance advisory committee that comprehensive liability insurance coverage will cost \$12,000 in premiums.

Commissioner Greg Drummond recommended the county approve a \$1 million "umbrella" coverage program but the Commission took the matter under advisement.

It also took under advisement — "for consideration early in the budget year," the "City Water Rates" discussion taking the right path in a healthy democracy . . . by being active and vocal.

And he's trying to console those whose water rates have gone up a couple of dollars.

Mr. Bassett made reference to the City of Sanford's sewage treatment plant; that they weren't going to go up to Tallahassee . . . but found out what it was all about in regards to following rules and regulations.

That's true . . . or rather, partly true.

The illustrious legislator neglected to mention that the City has three years to comply or else forfeit the proportionate State and Federal funds available for correcting the existing problems.

But then he should have also mentioned that in the event the city does NOT comply, the federal government will step in . . . essentially do the work . . . and the city will have to pay the bill period.

And don't try to hide behind a referendum, either . . . cause it has to be done, whether we vote for or against it! (And there we're talking about a piddling million-plus dollars.)

## Taxpayers Set Fight On Utility Rate Hike

Support of legislation regulating municipally owned utilities was urged by Rep. E. Pope Bassett, Republican member of the Seminole-Orange legislative delegation, before the Seminole County Taxpayers Association last night in the group's effort to defeat an increase in water and sewer rates. The meeting was held at Moose Lodge and was attended by 120 persons.

Bassett spoke to a disgruntled group of Sunland Estates residents attending the session to hear the politician's views on ways to stop the 200 per cent utility increase to out-of-city limit users of water and sewer facilities provided by Sanford.

Bassett advised there was more than one way to "skin a cat," referring to possible methods to prevent utility increases.

"We kept the city from annexing areas without residents of the affected areas voting on the idea," he commented. "Another way the legislative delegation 'skinned a cat' was to provide for the election of a mayor by the people of Sanford," he continued.

The representative advised the Sunland Estates residents to continue with their suit to enjoin the city from increasing the rates and revealed his support for a local bill at next legislative session to regulate all city-owned utilities in the county.

DeWitt Hunter, temporary taxpayers president, later said that the association would introduce a bill to regulate municipal utilities. Bassett said he had left four bills for the group to pick one as a model for the local act.

Bassett told the group that the Legislature is helping keep taxes down by voting to impose the 10-mill limit on city-county school tax levy.

Harry Skop and Gordon Meyer, two candidates for a city commission seat, were at the meeting and spoke in defense of the city's rate increases. Bassett said increase resulted from increased cost and a deficit in the utility department.

Bassett said he did not know why the increase but had heard somewhere that Sanford Airport utility costs were to blame for the increase. A Sunland Estates woman corrected Bassett that increased employee salaries were the cause. Another Sunland woman reported a city official told her that three out of every four water meters at Sunland Estates were broken and customers were billed on an average rate.

The meeting lasted two hours and included an appearance by Rep. Cecil Bothwell, who came to plug his views on several items, including money for roads and unicameral legislation, both of which he opposed.

Sherriff John E. Polk preceded Bassett and spoke on the need for mental health and juvenile detention facilities in the county.

## Injunction Suit Vowed

An injunction to stop the City of Sanford from increasing water and sewer rates is expected to be filed soon by Fred Leone, Sanford attorney, at the request of a number of Sunland Estates residents.

Leone said he probably would file a temporary injunction to stop the price hike, which was implemented by the Sanford Commission to become effective today.

A group of Sunland Estates residents are opposed to the doubling of the water rates and have hired Leone to stop the water and sewer increases until the case can be brought in court contesting the city's action which occurred without any official notice being given those customers living outside the city limits.

Argument expected to be used in the court fight involve customer rate increases amount to taxation without representation and condemnation without notification.

Meanwhile, another utility company is being sought by the affected residents to replace city utilities if and when the city decides to cut off the area for refusing to pay the increased fee.

A number of private wells are reported to have been dug and others are in the offing as the residential area grids to fight city hall over a report that Sanford City Manager W. E. Knowles has threatened to stop sewer service to those citizens who want to stop using city water.

## City Hall New But Left Bare

It may take a "sit-in" before the new Castellberry City Hall complex has any furniture. The new facility probably will be completed around the first of November but, according to a city official, furniture for the complex has not been ordered.

With the usual three-month delivery time set for the furniture, this would mean it probably would be near the first of January before furnishings would arrive.

This and other problems connected with the new facility have prompted the City Council to ask for a meeting with the building's architect Eoghan Kelley at their next workshop session planned for Monday.

The city also is having maintenance problems with city equipment. Mayor Curtis Blow has requested that the city hire a full-time mechanic to keep the equipment in condition.

Mayor Blow pointed out that a series of breakdowns to city equipment have occurred, and stated that he believes it would be more economical for the city to hire a mechanic. True issue probably will be submitted for approval at the council's next official meeting on Oct. 15.

Another question posed to the city body was the paving of Sunset Drive. The city, through its attorney Kenneth McIninch, has been seeking right-of-way grants from various property owners.

The council has requested that the owners give the city the proper right-of-way grants and then also assist in the cost of paving the street.

## Zoo Site Discussed

Mayor Lee P. Moore, at this morning's meeting of the Sanford zoo relocation committee, advised the City Commission should take over responsibility of picking a site for relocating the zoo.

Moore, who also serves as zoo committee chairman, said if the public decides at Dec. 3 city elections to turn down the cost of relocating the zoo, the matter is resolved.

Moore, with Harlan Hanson, tri-county planner and John Alexander, County Commission chairman, met with the zoo committee and city commissioners Earl Higginbotham, A. L. Wilson and J. H. Cropps to hear Hanson explain plans for the Lake Monroe Park, expected to be established by the county along the lakefront.

S. Korea In Surging Boom

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Cubans Growing In Miami

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The Cuban refugee welfare program at Miami is on the increase again and will get additional office space starting in November.

The Florida Division of Family Services administers the program although it is 100 per cent federally financed. On Monday the state agency approved a new five-year lease on five floors of a building at 127 North-west 2nd St. in Miami and an addition to be built.

The number of Cuban refugees at Miami is steadily increasing as two flights a day continue to arrive. In the past year, 18,000 Cuban families received \$12.4 million in welfare aid. Administration cost an additional \$1.8 million.




# World Record Too Small To Keep

### Elimination of Sex Education Sought

## Orange Schools Facing Law Suits

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—Invasion of the home and emotional damage to children will be the basis of law suits demanding the elimination of sex education in Orange County schools, an opponent of the program said Tuesday.  
"We haven't fully discussed this yet, but I am sure that sex education in the public schools constitutes an invasion of the privacy of the family," said William Spicer, president of the Citizens for Moral Education. "We can also show that emotional harm has been done to some children who are exposed to this," he said.  
A sex education program planned for the second half of this school year was approved Monday at an emotion-charged 13-hour county school board meeting at which 90 people testified.  
The course will be based on a pilot program used in some schools last year. Most opponents said they objected to materials used in the pilot program. Spicer said resource materials for kindergarten pupils showed animals copulating and that older pupils were shown drawings of nude men and women preparing for sexual intercourse.  
The Rev. Robert Ware, pastor of the Tabernacle Baptist Church, also said he believed the primary responsibility for sex education belongs in the home and criticized the pilot program "because it makes no reference to moral teachings. It is taught without God," Ware said parents opposed to the program might withdraw their children from the schools. "This kind of material is just too much of a shock for young children, and many psychiatrists have said it would be damaging," he said.

## Jax Celebrates Birthday

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Consolidated Jacksonville celebrated the start of its second year as the nation's biggest inland with prayers, parties and fireworks today.  
"The major hurdles are over," said Mayor Hans Zanier. "The right to operate a unified city-county government was upheld by the courts and attacks on Zanier and other leaders of the consolidated city were repuffed in the fight for life during the first year."  
"Now," said Zanier, "we can pause to evaluate the performance of the government heads and individuals and step back to size up the internal activities of the government itself."  
"For the average citizen, it's very difficult to perceive the entire picture of what we have accomplished," the mayor said. "The changes are extremely complicated and confusing. People react angrily to the 16 percent utility tax and forget to be thankful for the reduction in the electricity rate."  
"I think there's a lot to be proud of," he said. "That's because he wouldn't have made \$12,000 a year in his life if he had remained in business in Gainesville."  
During the Board of Education meeting, Kirk accused Turlington of doing nothing while state and local officials were in his home town to discuss mental problems.  
"While we were having discussions in Gainesville on how city, county and state could get along better together, he was on the street corner picking his teeth," Kirk said.  
Before the meeting started Kirk asked if any new services were presented and, assured some were, said sarcastically: "I don't see how we can function without Mr. Turlington here. I don't know how one can think he can represent 167 in the legislature."  
Kirk then issued a press release attacking Turlington's performance as House Appropriations Committee chairman.  
"It is ironic to me that Mr. Turlington should chide the Cabinet for 'overspending,'" he said. "It is ironic because it was Mr. Turlington, as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, who appropriated \$8.4 million more that projected revenue. I think he was speaking, as usual, with a forked tongue and, as usual, he was standing on shaky ground."



### Classic 'Baked' Alaska

A brownie Alaska is an up-date version of the classic "Baked Alaska" dessert created in 1867 by a New York restaurateur to honor the U.S. purchase of the Alaskan Territory.

**BROWNIE BASE:**  
 1/2 cup butter or margarine  
 1/2 cup firmly-packed brown sugar  
 2 eggs  
 1/2 cup (2 sq.) unsweetened chocolate, melted  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 cup all-purpose flour  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 cup quick or old-fashioned oats, uncooked  
 1/2 cup chopped nut meats

**Meringue:**  
 4 egg whites  
 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 2 1/2 pints cherry-vanilla ice cream (brick-style)

For brownie base, heat oven to 325 degrees. Beat butter until creamy. Gradually add sugar, beating until fluffy. Add eggs, beat until light and fluffy. Blend in chocolate and vanilla. Sift together flour and salt, add to chocolate mixture, blending thoroughly. Stir in oats and nut meats. Spread evenly in well-greased 8-inch square baking pan. Bake in preheated 325-degree oven about 35 minutes. Cool.

For meringue, beat egg whites until foamy. Add cream of tartar; beat until soft peaks form. Gradually add sugar, beating until stiff and glossy. Increase oven temperature to 450 degrees. Cut a 3-inch strip from brownie base. Place brownie base on a 12-inch strip of brown paper. Place bricks of ice cream on brownie base. (The brownie base must be slightly larger than the ice cream.)

Spread meringue over ice cream and base, sealing well. Bake in preheated 450-degree oven about 8 minutes or until meringue is lightly browned. Serve at once with chocolate sauce.

Sprinkle brownie strip with confectioners' sugar and cut into six bars. Serve later as brownies.

### School Fondue Snacks

Treat the youngsters to a different school time in a c.h. One that takes little effort combines toasted sandwiches and soup.

Let's call it a Fondue Sandwich. Combine one can each of Condensed Cheddar cheese and tomato soups with water, a little mustard and heat. Meanwhile, make toasted sandwiches and cut them into dip-sized rectangular strips.

Each child gets his own bowl of thick soup in which to dunk his sandwich. Vary your soup combinations and also the sandwich fillings for serving after a game, movie or an evening of bowling.

1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed Cheddar cheese soup  
 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed tomato soup  
 1 cup water  
 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard  
 Sliced cooked ham  
 Sliced cooked chicken or turkey

36 slices toast, buttered  
 Blend soups, water and mustard. Heat, stir now and then. Meanwhile arrange ham and chicken on 8 slices toast. Cover. Cut each sandwich into 2 triangles. Pour soup into bowls. Dunk sandwiches bite by bite into hot soup. Provide spoon for eating remaining soup. Makes 8 servings.

### What's In Hotdogs, Burgers??

Hamburgers and frankfurters — what is in them? Not exactly "meat and snails and puppy dog's tails," but often a lot of stuff that does not belong there, according to Commissioner Ross Meyerston Grant of New York City's Department of Consumer Affairs.

"A hamburger should consist of beef, all beef and nothing but beef. That's the law in New York City. But far too often we have found that the meat in hamburgers is padded with cereals, soy and starch flour and chemical additives. In such cases the public is being cheated," she says.

Appointed by Mayor John V. Lindsay in October, 1968, to her watchdog job, Mrs. Grant has been hot-footing it through various markets and eating spots in behalf of the consumer.

"Our basic purpose is to see that the public gets a fair shake, that they get what they are paying for, nothing less, that they are free from economic manipulation and deception," she explains.

For example, 46 inspectors visited 42 eating places recently. In 154 of them they found hamburgers they believed were not all beef. The specimens were analyzed in laboratories and found to be extended with soybeans, other vegetable flours and additives.

"Nevertheless, the public, many of them youngsters, paid for genuine hamburgers, meaning, according to law, nothing but beef," she states.

The guilty establishments are liable to a civil penalty of up to \$100 per violation, or a criminal penalty up to \$200 or 90 days in jail for each violation.

New York-born, a Hunter College graduate with credit for advanced work at Columbia, mother of a 21-year-old daughter and wife, Ross Meyerston Grant has long been prominent on television and in public and charitable affairs.

"I've always regarded myself as a total and dedicated New Yorker. Now, as commissioner, I hope to prove that claim. Locating and exposing those guilty of adulteration of food is one of my main objectives," she states.

Exposure of so-called "veal chops" is one of her efforts.

"Many are actually veal patties, not chops. The eye of the 'chop' is made of minced veal and additives, packed closely, but sold as the more expensive veal chop to the public."

Frankfurters are one of the most eaten items today and one of the most controversial.

"We in New York think they should be all meat, either beef or pork, with only 25 per cent fat and 10 per cent water. But many manufacturers show a lack of restraint and an absence of standards. Between 1967 and 1967, for example, the protein content has decreased 40 per cent. During this same period, the fat content has risen to 80 per cent, in other words, although the shape remains the same, the nutritional content in many cases has gone down considerably.

"The decrease in protein content while the price goes up is a deception. The rise in fat content, with increase in cholesterol, is also a health threat," says a Commissioner Grant.
