## Off-The-Farm Jobs

An interesting sidelight of the so-called "farm problem," which is really a complex of related problems, is the fact that many mer: ara entrine extra money.away from the home place.

This is noteworthy because it eases the pressure on farmers who are caught in a tightening squeeze between lowered income and a steady or rising cost of living. It is also important because of the changes it is bringing in rural ife.

Back in 1947, says the department, farmers earned only 22 per cent of their income away from home. By 1952, off-the-farm income had risen to 26 per cent of the total. Last year it was up to 281/2 per cent, and this year it will be an estimated 32 per cent. The U. S. Census Bureau says that 361/2

per cent of all our farm residents are working at non-farm jobs this year. Five years ago the off-the-farm workers totaled 30.1 percent of farm dwellers, while in 1940 only 31.4 per cent of farm residents worked elsewhere.

The trend is clear. Its import - the nature and extent of its impact on rural America and, for that matter, on our whole economy-is not nearly so clear. But certainly it is a trend for congress to bear in mind when new farm legislation is written.
