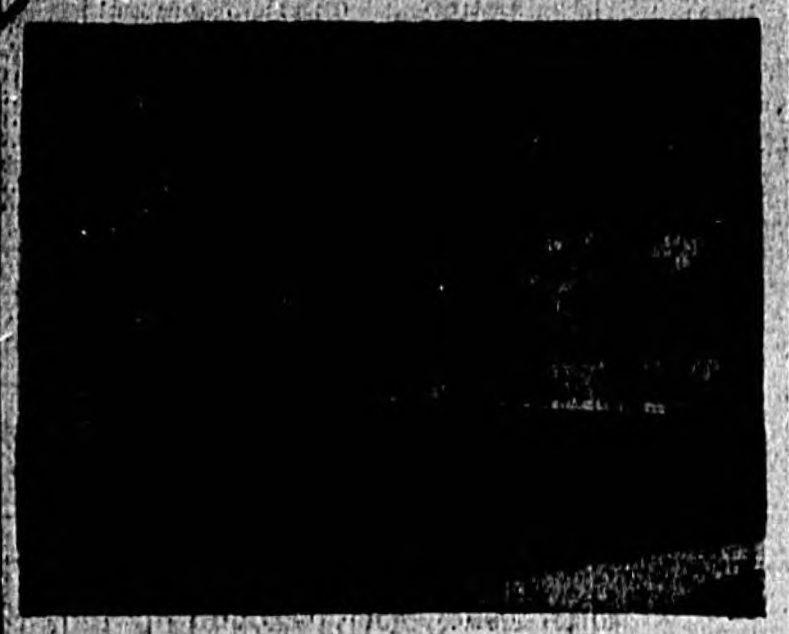

Gore Sees Snarls Over Hi-Way Money

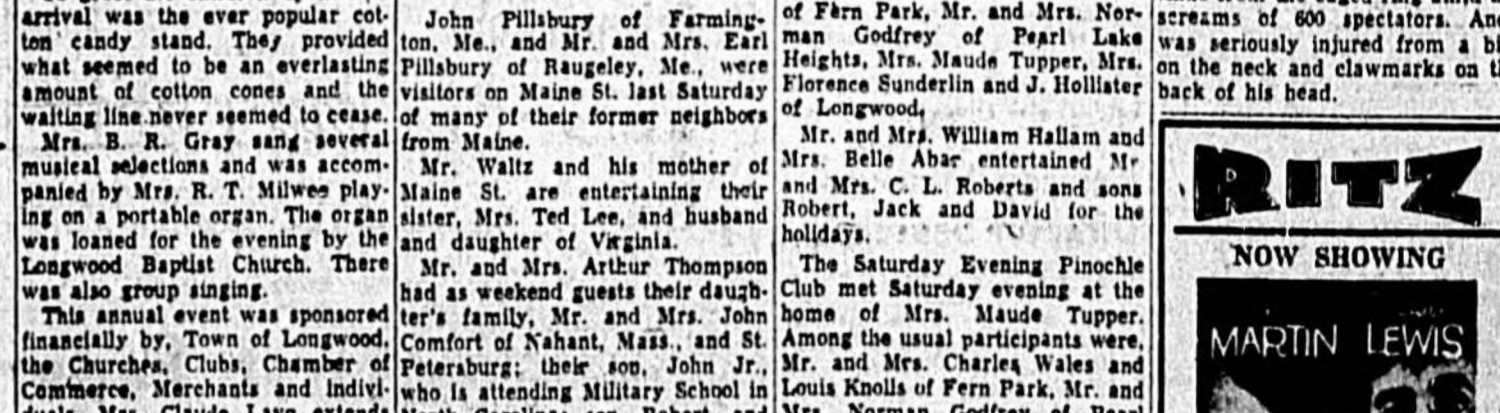
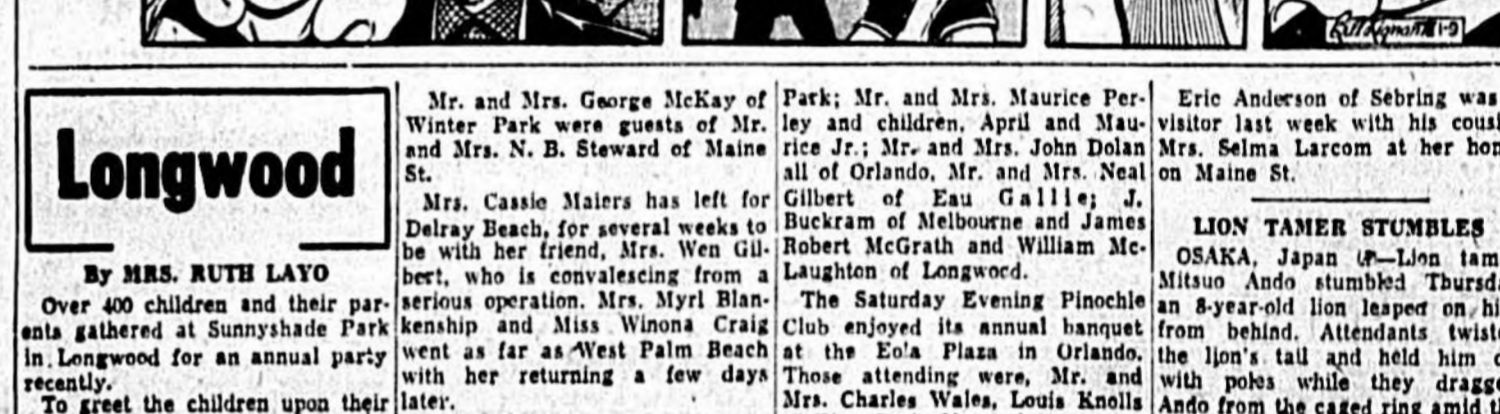
WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.) said Wednesday the 1933 Congress may get snarled up in a dispute over how a big chunk of new highway construction money should be distributed among the states.

However, he said a difference of opinion on how to allocate funds for the interstate system creates added hazards for the legislation.

The interstate system, a 40,000-mile network of key roads, would get the bulk of the new funds under all the major highway aid plans pending in Congress.

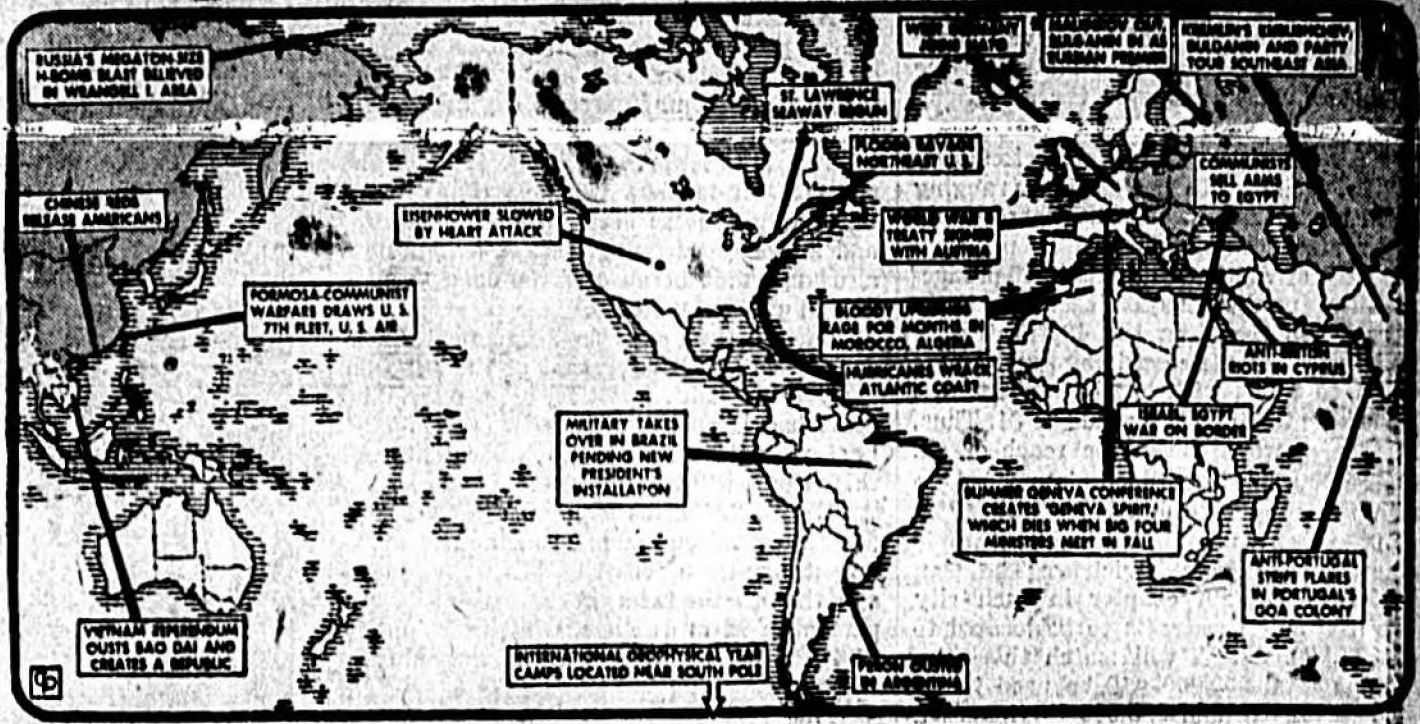

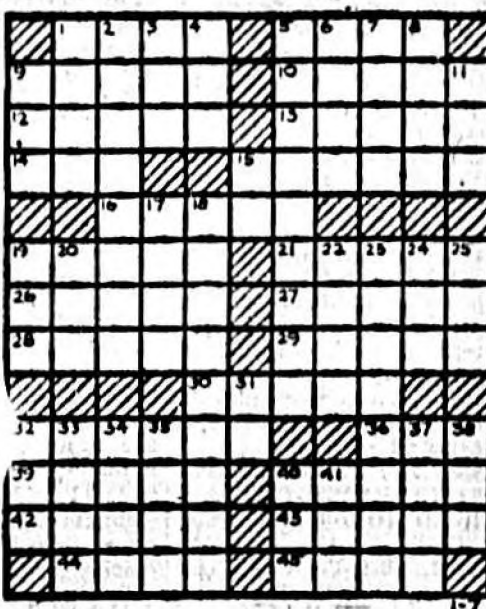

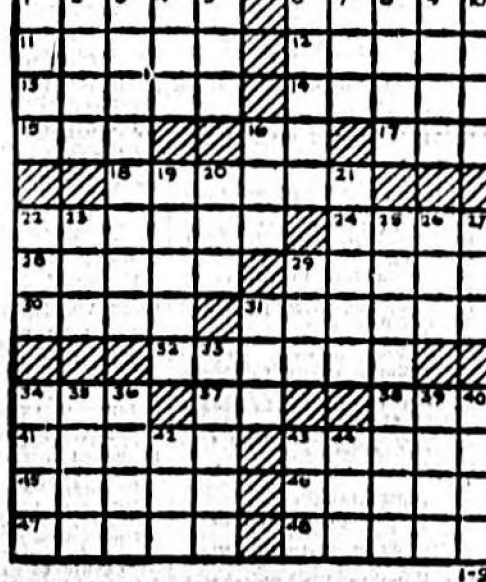

Three Teenage Boys Arrested in Deland

DELAND, Fla. — Three teenage boys were arrested Tuesday for the recent dynamiting of a vacant farmhouse, the ticket office at municipal stadium and a railroad trestle. Eugene Petrone, investigator for the state attorney's office, said Ken D. Burgess, 18, of DeLand, Richard I. Brackett, 19, of DeLand Springs, and a 16-year-old are charged with malicious use of dynamite. Damage from the blast was small, Petrone said, but a 10-ft-ick charge placed under the trestle cracked a beam. The trestle is on the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad five miles southwest of DeLand. Petrone said two of the boys admitted stealing the dynamite from a ranch storehouse near DeLand Springs. A preliminary hearing will be held Jan. 10 before county judge Thomas N. Tappy.

MIAMI (AP) — Key West City officials were told by Circuit Court here Tuesday to show cause why they have refused to seat Charles Parra as city commissioner on the basis of election returns Nov. 15. Parra's suit for declaratory decree, outlined to Circuit Judge Marshall Wiseheart, seeks to force the canvassing board and clerk Victor Lowe to certify his election. The city now has 10 days in which to answer Parra's action and to show that all of the absentee ballots cast in the general municipal election were irregular and invalid as the canvassers held earlier. In his suit, Parra contends he was elected over Jack C. Delaney, former Key West commissioner, by a vote of 2,432 to 2,331, including his 198 absentee ballots to Delaney's 40. Newman Offers Report Business Ended In Record Time

The Board of Sanford City Commissioners last night completed the business before them in record time.

All items taken from the agenda and from the floor, as well as those presented by the commissioners were taken care of and discussed in less than 45 minutes.

Dave Newman, Field Representative of the engineering firm and Robert M. Angus, Associate of Jacksonville, reported to the commission that a five-day test on the filling of the Mellonville Ave. Water Tank was begun Monday morning. A similar test, but of a three-day period, was made by the City recently.

A request by the Salvation Army to waive the license fee for a "thrift store" proposed for a Sanford Ave. location was denied by the commission. Commissioners David Gatchel said, "We would be setting a precedent for the individual commissioners to pay the license fee." He said, "We would encourage the wrath of other second hand dealers and I move that the request be denied." The motion was carried by the Board of Commissioners.

A discussion of a water rate adjustment for Hunter Ice and Fuel brought out explanations that a new meter was installed at the location to replace one that was damaged. However, the Board of Commissioners, in reviewing a 30-month tabulation of the company's water bill, Commissioner Earl Higgins proposed that the water bill like that of the Board of Commissioners, be held in abeyance until the owner of the firm to appear before the commission and show reason why changes should be made.

City Clerk W. N. Sayer told the Board of Commissioners that attorneys representing the city in appeals have said that action would be taken in the more than 25 charges that have been appealed to higher courts.

City Manager Warren E.
