U.S. consular agent released

MEXICO CITY - A lone gunman, demanding Justice from Mexican authorities he accused of helping swindle his mother, held the U.S. consular agent in Veracruz hostage for about 15 hours before releasing him unharmed early

U.S. Embassy spokesman Robert Hugins said in Mexico City that consular agent Edwin Culp was released unburt after the gunmen took Culp and his secretary hostage Thursday afternoon in Verseruz, 195 miles east of the Mexican capital.

The gunman, identified as Francisco Delfin Perez, told United Press International by phone that he took Culp and secretary Teresa Oorts hostage because he admired the consular agent and thought holding him hostage would attract attention to his case.

Congress saves AIDS bill

WASHINGTON - A major AIDS research. prevention and education measure believed dead for the year was saved by Congress - but only after Sen. Jesse Helms, R.N.C., exacted his

The legislation breezed through the Senate and House by voice vote Thursday once supporters acquiesced to Helms' demand that the bill include no federal guarantee for positive

AIDS blood tests remaining confidential.
"It worked out just fine," Helms remarked, But Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., chairman of the Labor and Human Resources Committee. said he shared the disappointment of Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., head of a health subcommittee, that lawmakers "were unable to secure a federal confidentiality law this year.

Shroud of Turin claims refuted

TURIN, Italy, - Carbon-14 tests prove the abroud of Turin, venerated for centuries as Christ's burtal sheet, was woven only in the Middle Ages, church officials said today.

Laboratories in the United States. Switzerland and England placed the date of the linen shroud between 1260 and 1390, Cardinal Anastasio Ballestrero told a news conference. The laboratory tests thus refuted claims it was Christ's burtal sheet.

The cardinal's scientific adviser on the relic, physicist Luigi Gonella, indicated earlier that the announcement would confirm reports the shroud was of Medieval manufacture.



Graham was beaten and stabbed to death during a robbery at her house at 188 Stephens St. The attackers set her house on fire to try to cover up the crime, police said. Peterson said money was stolen from the house, but police said they don't know what else may have

Robinson was arrested at Mitchell Hammock, Oviedo, Police said she is a transfent. Peterson said the suspects knew Graham, who was a widow and a long-time resident of Oviedo who lived alone

Caretakers: Cemetery in trouble

LAKE MARY - The caretakers of Lake Mary Cemetery said yesterday that the century old historic landmark on Greenleaf Drive, is in

The Lake Mary Cemetery Association, a nonprofit civic group that sells plots and maintains the city's oldest private cemetery, has not recovered from the theft four years ago of \$22,000 from its treasury, according association of He tala.

Some of them were in Seminole County Circuit Court yesterday for the probation violation hearing of Colin Keogh, 32, a former Lake Mary city commissioner who was convicted in 1986 of grand theft in the disappearance of the money. However, the hearing was postponed to give Keogh more time to make restitution, including by taking a second mortgage on his home. He has been ordered to pay up to \$21,407.77, according to court officials.

In a telephone interview today, Keogh said he felt remorse for what he had done. At the time, he said, he wanted to invest the cemetery funds in land and buildings but lost

"Basically, I made an investment and lost it. It was stupid on my part. I spent a year in fall for it. It turned my life around. I lived on the edge. I lost ten times more of my own money than I lost of the cemetery's," Reogh said.

Although Keogh said he is not making enough at his \$700-per month job to pay back everything within the five-year term of his probation, he said, "I owe the people. Eventually, I will pay everybody off."

So far. Keugh has made three payments totaling \$305, according to the Florida Department of Correction. Probation and Parole in Alta-

His wife remains hospitalized today in satisfactory condition with a broken leg and a concussion. according to a hospital spokesman. Her husband was treated for multiple bruises and released at about 6:30 a.m., the spokesman said.

At about 10:30 p.m. Thursday, Brown said, he was awakened by a prowler outside his house, Brown fired two shots from a handgun out a southwest window and called Sanford police,

according to police. Police found no sign of the prowler and no indication that Brown wounded the person with this shot, Harriett said.

Maloracticu insuror increases incomo

TALLAHASSEE - A doctors' malpractice insurance company that promised to cut premiums by 12 percent if a \$100,000 cap was placed on non-economic damage awards in civil suits increased its investment income \$24 million last year, records show.

Jerry Vogel, an actuary with the state insurance Com-mission's ratings department, said Thursday a financial statement filed by Florida Physicans Insurance Co. showed the company increased its investment holdings from \$62 million in 1986 to \$86 million in 1987.

Backers of Amendment 10, a proposal on the November ballot that would limit non-economic damage awards in all civil cases, say the cap is needed because malpractice premiums are driving doctors and hospitals a at of business.

The proponents say the premiums are being probed up by huge malpractice awards in civil suits.

Vogel said the statement showed FPLC collected \$40.633,282 in premiums in 1987 and paid out \$29,754.311 in claims and other expenses, including attorneys fees.

Habitual DUI offender gets 33 years

FORT LAUDERDALE - A Broward County Circuit judge sentenced David Jay Parrish of Fort Lauderdale to 33 years in prison Wednesday for an alcohol-related automobile accident that left a Massachusetts man on invalid.

"You have virtually no regard for life," Judge Patti Englander Henning to Parrish during his sentencing hearing. "You're not satisfied with ruining your own life. You insist on ruining the lives of everyone you come in contact with."

A Broward jury found Parrish, 30, guilty last month of drunken driving, leaving the scene of an accident, driving without a license and possession of cocaine and marijuana in the March 1 accident that severely injured Kevin Simmons. It was Parrish's third drunken driving conviction in six years.

The judge declared Parrish an habitual offender and sentenced him to three consecutive 10-year terms in state prison and three consecutive 1-year terms in the Broward County Jail.

Extent of burial fraud unknown

JACKSONVILLE - Authorities may never know how many bodies were buried more than one to a casket by Morning Glory Chapel, Duval County Medical Examiner Peter Lipkovic said

Morning Glory Chapel was ordered closed after the Department of Professional Regulation found 41 rotting corpses there in June. On Tuesday, authorities exhumed four caskets buried by Morning Glory and found eight corpses inside.

Lipkovic said authorities believe they have closed the case on Morning Glory, but said there is no way of knowing how many bodies Morning Glory owner Lewis Howell buried two or more to a casket cemetery before DPR began its investigation.

"He was conducting his business over a period of 10 years. with many hundreds of bodies buried." Lipkovic said. "Many of those were buried at private cemeteries with no markers. What could we do, buildoze the whole cemetery?"

Most of Morning Glory's business was burying indigents for Duval County. Those indigents were frequently buried with no identifying headstone, and Morning Glory's records have proven inadequate for identification purposes, officials said.

State exems insurors payment practices in

TALLAHASSEE - The Department of Insurance said Thursday it warned an illinois insurance company and two affiliates to pay claims as promised and not to mislead Florida policy holders.

Gerald Wester, deputy insurance commissioner, wrote a letter prohibiting Modern Pioneers' Life Insurance Co., Patriot Life Insurance Co. of Illinois and Patriot Health Services from paying claims because they are under investigation. The companies, which operate out of Tampa, are owned by Patriot Health Companies Inc. of lilinois, which provides mostly health insurance for 657 groups in Florida.

The state's order came after insurance examiners found \$1.8 million in unpaid settlement checks, mostly to Florida policyholders, in Patriot Health's Tampa office. The discovery came during a routine investigation in September, said department spokeswoman Kathleen Snoeblen.

State officials have received about 200 consumer complaints concerning the companies' failure to pay timely and lawful claims, said Michael Bannister, the deputy in charge of the insurance department's Tampa service office.

Martinez plan would release Andrews

TALLAHASSEE - Abortion rights proponents believe election year politics are behind Gov. Bob Martinez's new plan to release Joan Andrews, the so-called patron saint of the anti-abortion movement who is

Martinez had the approval of two Cabinet members Thursday and needed the agreement of one more to release Andrews from the Broward Correctional Institution. where she is serving a five-year sentence for illegally entering a Pensacola abortion clinic 13 1986.

Andrews would have to travel to Pennsylvanta to face sentencing on similar charges to qualify for release in Florida.

'It can't be much more pleasant for Miss Andrews to be in prison in Pennsylvania than in Florida," said Janis Compton-Carr. executive director of the Florida Abortion Rights Acton League, who opposes the

"But it's got to be more pleasant for Gov Martinez not to have the anti-abortion people nipping at his heels."

Although Martinez, an opponent of abortion is not running for re-election this year. the issue has been raised in the presidential campaign. Martinez is rational campaign co-chairman for Vice President George

In August, more than 300 anti-abortion activists marched on the Capitol bearing fetuses encased in plastic to pressure

Martinez to free Andrews. They called her a "saint" and compared her to Joan of Arc.

Brian Ballard, an aide to the governor, said the demonstrations played no part in Martinez' decision to press for her conditional clemency.

If you want to be a confrientious objector, that's your right, but it's the state's obligation to put you in jail," Ballard

Kenneth Connor of Florida Right to Life welcomed the development

"Joan Andrews was really sentenced for future acts," he said. "Everyone talked about her tack of repentance and tack of contrition. The real issue was, did Joan Andrews pay with her sentence for the offense.

The plan assumes Andrews would serve time for two misdemeanors and a felony stemming from a 1985 demonstration at a Pittsburgh abortion clinic, Ballard said

She faces sentencing in Pittsburgh on Tuesday

"She would still be incarcerated there and

not be a threat to society, but her Florida time would be up," said Ballard.

Andrews has 25 months remaining on her sentence for entering The Ladies Center in Pensacola, where two clinic workers were injured when they struggled with Andrews as she tried to unplug a suction machine. which was damaged in the melee.

She drew the unusually long sentence after she refused to promise to stay away from the clinic. She already had been arrested more than 150 times for similar offenses in various states.

While serving her time she has battled with authorities, at times refusing food. bedding and clothing and refusing to perform prison chores that would have helped her earn one oil her sentence.

Amendment does not limit highway bonds

TALLAHASSEE - A proposed constitutional amendment allowing motor fuel taxes to be used to finance highway bonds puts no limit on bond sales and provides an avenue for a tax increase to pay for the bonds, United Press International has learned.

"We have been led to believe it (the bonds) would be paid off with existing revenues." Don Crane, campaign chairman for backers of Amendment 4, said Thursday when told by UPI of the language in the amendment that does not appear on the sample general election ballot. "I suspect that's an opportuni-

ty to do so." Crane said of a possible fuel tax increse when informed of a clause in the amendment that mays motor fuel or "special fuel taxes" shall be used to pay off the bonds. Crane also said he was not

aware the measure, placed on

the ballot by the Legislature

allow lawmakers to dedicate virtually all state motor fuel revenues to pay for bonds.

The Legislature said the most the (Department of Transportation) could use out of its revenue. is \$50 million annually," Crane

But Bill Ham, an attorney with the House Transportation Committee, said the language in the amendment allows lawmakers to dedicate for future bond payments any amount up to 90 percent of available motor fuel revenues.

Joan slides near Barbados, pushes toward Caribbean

MIAMI - Tropical storm Joan slid south of Barbados where little damage was expected today and swept on toward the Windward Islands with top sustained winds of 50 mph.

Although winds near the center of the storm were measured at 50 mph, forecaster Jim Gross of the National Hurricane Center said those reaching Barbados were only 28 mph with some stronger gusts.

"I don't think there would be significant damage even if they were get 50 mph winds." he said. "It would be mainly confined to vegetation. I think."

Forecasters issued a tropical storm warning for the islands of St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Grenada and the Grenadines. A tropical storm watch, which advises residents to prepare for the possibility of being hit by the storm, also was issued for Dominica and Martinique.

Hair growth drug backed by ad push

NEW YU'K - 1 Join Co. says it plans to promote Rogaine, its new \$600 a year prescription hair growth medication, with a television advertising campaign backed by a budget that could reach \$20. million.

The company, which said Thursday it has shipped the drug to pharmacies nationwide, also said it filed federal lawsuits against two Nevada pharmaceutical firms, alleging those companies' products do not stimulate hair growth or arrest hair loss as stated in their advertisements.

The Kalamazoo, Mich., company held a Manhattan news conference to announce that minoxidil-based Rogaine Topical Solution, approved in August by the Food and Drug Administration, now is available to balding men nationwide.

Daily topical application of dilute minoxidil - initially studied as a hypertension drug has been shown to cause significant hair growth on the heads of 39 percent of the balding men who participated in Upjohn studies. There was no effect on about 15 percent of study participants and the remainder showed marginal results. The FDA approval extends

testing minoxidil's effects on

a television commercial that mentions Upjohn but not the product's name.

"The ad says. There is a hair-growth product. It works. please see your doctor." Hoff said:

Upjohn may spend as much as \$20 million to broadcast the commercial, he said.

Upjohn is charging pharmacists \$42.50 for a 60milliliter bottle of Rogaine, a one-month's supply, and the drug is being premoted by national chains at prices ranging from \$43 to \$50 a bottle - about \$600 a year, Hoff said.

Tests show Rogaine is more effective in younger men than older men and its twice-daily use must be continued indefinitely, with the effects beginning to show between the fourth and eighth month of treatment.

WASHINGTON - Attorney General Richard Thornburgh denies any special political timing or ethnic targeting in mass arrests of so-called Jamaican drug posses across the country.

Let me put it this way: The problem is that you have some have gained a foothold in drug trafficking and illegal firearms trafficking that has brought a state of siege to some of our inner city communities, Thornburgh said Thursday in announcing a major crackdown against the groups accused of hundreds of narcotics related killings.

Scoreboard on the candidates

The second, and last, debate between the two presidential candidates last night produced two winners and one loser.

Vice President Bush clearly exceeded all expectations. He appeared relaxed, confident and enunciated his positions concisely. He avoided the accordary issues and charges against his opponent used previously and seemed to concentrate on the elements of his political philosophy. His army of advisors expressed hope before the debate that he would avoid a gaffe. Not only did Mr. Bush avoid making any mistakes, he forced several by his opponent. Score the vice president a winner.

Unlike his performance during the first debate, Gov. Dukakia appeared uncertain at times last night. His petulence with the panelists by interrupting questions on three occasions, and avoiding questions in other instances, may be an indication of impatience, at best, or cumnuflaging his true positions at worst.

The first question, preceded by an overly dramatic hypothetical situation about crimes against the governor's wife, dealt with the death penalty. The governor said there was no circumstance in which he would lavor capital punishment. He then quickly segued into anti-drug rhetoric. Mr. Dukukis appeared obscused with avoiding the label "liberal" and became a mag regarding any indication that such an identification may be appropriate. Score the governor a loser.

The second winner is the 100 million-plus estimated viewers who at last could see both candidates more sharply defined.

Both supported increased emphasis on the development of nuclear power for both energy and defense purposes. But their positions on abortion, defense, penalties for crime, and social programs differ greatly. That was clear during last night's debate.

Mr. Bush accused the news media of shunning information regarding both candidate's positions on issues and concentrating on polls and quirks in the campaign. Voters need solid information during the next 27 days to aid in making an informed decision. Estimates by both campaign camps indicate that nearly 25 percent of the electorate has yet to decide how to vote.

The balance of the campaign has thus become a triune endeavor with responsibilities resting on the candidates to express their positions, the news media to disseminate the information, and most importantly, the voters to study the issues and the candidates in order to arrive at an intelligent decision.

The Iranians are involved because they hope to once again pull the strings on an American presidential election. They appurently prefer the idea of George Bush being elected president.



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Teenager had identical AIDS virus in 1968

CHICAGO - Doctors hope to study an AlDS-like virus that infected a teenage boy in 1968 to see if it can give them clues on how the virus became the fastspreading killer it is today.

An article published Thursday in the Journal of the American Medical Association said that tests on tissue samples taken from a 15-year old St. Louis boy. who died in 1969 had confirmed suspicions that he was one of the first concricans infected by a virus virtually identical to the AIDS virus.

The scientists, led by researchers from the Tulane Untversity School of Medicine, are now trying to isolate viable virus particles from the frozen tissue. hoping to culture it and compare molecular details of its genes to the genetic material of the human immunodeficiency virus. or HIV, the AIDS virus now thought to infect about 1.5 million Americans

The researchers said their



ANCHORAGE. Alaska - Three endangered California gray whales are trapped by the same heavy ice that has wreaked havoc with ships plying the arctic waters north of Alaska, and officials say their breathing hole is shrinking.

"It doesn't look good for them." North Slope Borough whale biologist Geoff Carroll said Thursday by telephone from Barrow, the northernmost point in the United States. "They apparently stayed over too long in the Beaufort Sea before beginning their long migration south and got stuck.

The big whales spend their summers in northern waters around Alaska and go south to Mexico for winter, and are trapped offshore from Barrow by the same arctic ice that has trapped or blocked several ships, including icebreakers, in the last six weeks.

Welfare reform emphasizes states

One parent in two-parent families must be employed

WASHINGTON - The most extensive overhaul in 50 years of the nation's major benefit program for the poor soon will require more aggressive efforts by the states to move Americans from welfare rolls to employ-

President Rengan, who has ratled against federal welfare programs throughout his political career, saw the goal of reform become a reality Thursday by signing into law major changes in Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

Over the next few years, the "Family Support Act of 1988" for the first time will require at least one parent in two parent welfare families to work, assisted by expanded training, education and job search programs.

At a Rose Garden ceremony,

Reagan asserted that the welfare system for too long "has reinforced dependency and separated welfare recipients from the mainstream of American soci-

In an election year that has seen candidates of various political stripes offer ample talk of compassion, Reagan shared credit for the welfare reform act with Democrats as well as Republicans.

Indeed, he even included Senate Finance Committee Chairman Lloyd Bentsen, the Democratic vice presidential nominee, among the members of Congress he lauded for "key roles in forging the consensus for this landmark legislation

They and the members of this administration who worked so diligently on this bill will be remembered for accomplishing what many have attempted, but

decades. A meaningful redirection of our weltare system," he said.

At the outset of his administration. Reagan set as a tenet of his domestic policy a goal of directing welfare benefits only to the "truly needy" and putting able-bodied recipients to work

Senators struggle with drug bill

WASHINGTON - Senators trying to "drive a stake in the heart of the drug industry' eastly put a "get-tough" provision in their election-year anti-drug bill that would hit casual narcotics users with fines as high as \$10,000.

But lawrankers who think stakes must be raised for both casual and hard-core users faced a bigger challenge today persuading the Senate to adopt a measure that would end all federal benefits to drug felons.

Another proposal, also expected for debate today, would toughen the bill by authorizing random drug tests of those applying for driver's licenses.

Embracing the first of those three "user accountability" amendments to the popular underlying bill, the Senate voted 88-0 Thursday to let the attorney general slap civil penalties on users caught with small amounts of drugs.

Earlier in the day, senators defeated an effort to replace a required death penalty with idatory life imprisonment for those convicted of drug-related murders and rejected two other bids to limit the use of capital

While the full chamber wrestled with a handful of controversial measures. Senate Democratic leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia worked with other top colleagues toward a final agreement for tackling more than four dozen less contested amendments in a single vote, possibly later today.

Under the "user accountabilicivil guideline approved Thursday, a citizen caught with illegal drugs could be prosecuted criminally or hit with a steep fine that could be appealed. The civil penalty could be levied only on those without a felony conviction and any record of the fine, which could be as high as \$10,000, would be erased in three years if no other violations

This amendment is going to do more to drive a stake in the heart of the drug industry than the death penalty and all the money we spend on enforcement, predicted ben Phil Gramm, R Texas, one of the provision's sponsors.

"It strikes at the real drug kingpin." he said. "the real drug kingpin who is the user.

Overall, the Senate bill would shift emphasis from the supply

to the demand side of the illegal marcotics problem, but it also would carry a big stick - the death penalty for drug ringlead ers who kill.

"Why is it that the Senate's resolve to light drug abuse and drug related crimes hangs on whether we would flip the switch on the electric chair?" asked Sen. Mark Hattleld, R-Ore., who opposed capital punishment by sponsoring the defeated life imprisonment amendment.

Sen. Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., the leading supporter of the death penalty provision, responded by insisting that the threat of capital punishment would be a "long overdue" weapon in the war on drugs.

President Reagan repeatedly has pressed the Senate to approve an anti-drug bill similar to a House passed version that contains a number of get tough provisions, including the death penalty.

The fate of the overall Senate bill, however, hinged on Hyrd's ability to get colleagues to agree unanimously to take a single vote on 51 non-controversial amendments after separate votes on the contentious

13 wounded in Korean attack an U.S. facility

SEOUL. South Korea - Up to 100 radical studen's hurling firebombs attacked a U.S. Information Service compound in the southwestern provincial center of Kwangju today, wounding 13 policemen, smashing windows and scorching two vehicles, a U.S. Embassy spokesman said.

The spokesman said about 50 to 100 students attacked the USIS facility in Kwangju, 170 miles south of Scoul, shortly after 2 p.m.

About 30 of the ansatlants hurled Molotov cocktails at a police bus and then at the USIS compound, he said

"There were no injuries to personnel inside the compound but we were told 13 people, believed to he policemen, were injured, two of them seriously," said the spokesman for the U.S. Embassy in Seoul.

They destroyed the police bus. A car inside the compound was also destroyed by Molotov cocktails, and another car was slightly damaged. About 10 windows of the USIS were also damaged." The spokesman said about two dozen students

climbed to the top of a small hotel adjoining the USIS compound and seven of them jumped to the mof of a building inside the U.S. compound. "They tore up some tiles, they wielded from

pipes there and threw Molotov cocktails," the spokesman said. "They fled when police came close to them. Their action lasted 10 to 15 minutes.

The domestic Yonnap News Agency said the incident began when about 100 youths from

Choniam University gathered in downtown Kwangju for a demonstration and then marched to the USIS facility.

There were 32 policemen on guard near the USIS compound. When the attack took place, only nine officers were standing guard while the others were resting in the bus. Yonhap said.

Firebombs thrown by the students into the bus set the vehicle ablaze, injuring more than 10 policemen. Yonhap said.

It said the students stood atop the USIS building shouting. "U.S. imperialists go home." "Discard Korean armistice and conclude peace treaty (with North Korea)," and "Arrest (former President) Chun Doo Hwan and (his wife) Lee Soon-ja."

Police arrested one of the students who demonstrated on the rooftop, according to

Earlier, the students distributed leaflets identifying themselves as members of a "death squad of patriotic youths and students for the arrest and execution of Chun and Lee," Yonhap said...

Submto also blasted Western market analysts for their "strange" criticism of oil's current low price - for which they clamored when prices skyrocketed during the oil shortage of the 1970s.

Officials said U.S. Energy Secretary John S. Herrington was expected to respond to Subroto's remarks today in a speech outlining U.S. oil policy.

Subroto's address opened the conference, seen as a preview to an Oct. 20 meeting in Madrid. Spain, where the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries will discuss pricing and longterm strategy.

With the spot value of OPEC's reference price below its target level of \$18 per barrel, Subroto said prices would continue to slide unless OPEC and non-OPEC producers engaged in a broader dialogue to arrive at a price for oil that is "fair to both producers and consumers."

"The prospects of instituting enduring stability in the oil market will remain somewhat bleak as long as the attitudes of some of the major oil producers and the major oil consuming industrial countries continue to be characterized by indifference and antipathy toward OPEC." he

In the first week of October, the price of oil fell to \$10.64 per barrel from \$16.34 in April.



Plant strawberries now for Christmas

tion of the word makes one's mouth water. In addition to their taste appeal and attractive appearance, strawberries are well suited to Florida conditions and are relatively easy to grow. And now we are rapidly approaching the proper time to plant strawberries in our area.

The strawberry plant is perennial by nature, but is grown as an annual in Florida. The plant goes through a cycle of vegetative growth. flower formation, fruit production, tilenrunner development. For those of you familiar with growing strawberries in the north, it is important to note that our production season is totally re-

Strawberry plants should be set our during October and no later than mid November. The cool nights and short days of winter stimulate the plant to produce flowers that develop into trutts ready for harvest inabout a month. Plants set out in intd October should produce ripe. fruit by Christmas Berry production and harvesting continue throughout the rest of the winter and through spring

As the weather gets warmer



and the days grow longer, the plants will stop producing ber ries and form run ris. These runners will take root and become new plants. However, for most home gardeners, it is more practical to destroy the plants at the end of the season and purchase new plants in the

Although strawberries can be grown in almost any type of Florida soil, they prefer a welldrained type that can be kept moist but not wet. A sandy soil. with considerable organic matter. is the best. Some form of irrigation is needed because strawberries have a shallow root avatem.

Strawberries are sensitive to climatic conditions such as day length and temperature, and it is





WAKE FOREST, N.C. - Evangelist Billy Graham said battling Southern Baptists need to quit fighting and get down to the

"I don't get into Southern Baptist problems," he said. "I'm not getting into all the fighting. We can agree on one thing - and that is love.

Graham spoke at the inauguration of his longtime friend Lewis Drummond, 61, as president of Southeastern. Drummond was previously a scholar at the Billy Graham Center at Southern Baptist Seminary in Louisville, Ky

Drummond, a fundamentalist, was named to the job after its former president, the Rev. Randall Lolly, resigned in a dispute with the school's fundamentalist trustees. Lolley is a

About 50 students and faculty members. wearing black garments and yellow ribbons. protested Graham's appearance, accusing him of siding with fundamentalists.

Graham steered clear of choosing sides, saying the Southern Baptist Convention could resolve its differences with "prayer and love and faithfulness to the truth.

"The primary thing for us as a church is evangelism." said Graham. "You have a

man (Drummond) who knows how to teach it and set an example as president. He has a tremendous vision to train teachers. pastors, missionaries. Southeastern could become a beacon of light not only to the Southern Baptist Convention, but to all the world."

Seminary trustee voted Monday to accept outside help in reng the conflict some say threatens the hool's accreditation Over the past year - rollment has dropped about 20 percent, fi n 1.046 to 837.


Despite assurances from Drummond that the school will not lose accreditation, the trustees voted to accept mediation from the Association of Theological Schools, which in August called Southeastern "a very troubled divided institution ... that has suffered the loss of a sense of mutuality and trust among several constituencies that make up the seminary.

Last year, the Southern Baptist Convention decided Lolley's policies were too liberal and it stacked the Southeastern board of trustees with fundamentalists.

The new board declared in the future it would hire only professors who believe in a literal interpretation of Scriptures. That brought about the resignation of Lolley and four other seminary administrators.

Lolley did not attend Tuesday's ceremony. He said in a telephone call from First Baptist Church in Raleigh, where he became pastor July 1, that he left the school because he could not find a common ground with the new fundamentalist trustees.

"The bottom line was the trustees had a vision for the seminary contrary to my own vision for it." he said. "Their vision was one

of authoritarianism.

"But my love and concern for the people over there don't terminate on any given day. I have a different task and a different sense of duty and a different future now."

Burial shroud made 1200 years after Crucifixion

TURIN, Italy, - Carbon 14 tests prove the shroud of Turin, venerated for centuries as Christ's burial sheet, was woven only in the Middle Ages, church officials said today.

Laboratories in the United States. Switzerland and England placed the date of the linen shroud between 1260 and 1390. Cardinal Anastasio Ballestrero told a news conference. The laboratory tests thus refuted claims it was Christ's burial

The cardinal's scientific adviser on the relic, physicist Luigi Gonella, indicated earlier that the announcement would confirm reports the shroud was of Medieval manufacture.

'There will be no surprises," Gonella said.

Church officials have never committed themselves on the authenticity of the shroud. As inthe case of other relics, it has been considered a symbol of

Laboratories at Tucson, Ariz., Zurich, Switzerland, and Oxford. England, conducted carbon-14 dating tests on fragments of the shroud to determine the age of the yellowing linen that bears the shadowy image of a Christlike figure.

The results were supposed to be kept secret until announced by Ballestrero, the custodian of the shroud, but unofficial reports said the tests placed the origins of the shroud in the 14th

The first reports of the shroud date to 1350, when it was in possession of the French knight Geoffrey de Charny.

In the 15th century, it became the property of the House of Savoy, which brought it to Turin in 1578. On his death in 1983, Umberto II, the last king of Italy, left it to Pope John Paul II.

According to tradition, the cioth measuring 14 feet 3 inches by 3 feet 7 inches was used to wrap the body of Jesus Christ after his crucifixion.

The first photograph of the shroud, taken in 1898, disclosed that the shadowy septa image on the cloth was the negative likeness of a bearded man. Studies first by pathologists

and more recently by computer scientists determined the image was anatomically correct. Bloodstains indicated the man wrapped in the shroud had been flogged, stabbed with a lance and crucifled wearing a crown of thorns.

In order to date the material.

the pope permitted fragments the size of postage stamps to be cut from the shroud on April 21 for the tests at the University of Arizona, Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich and Oxford University.

The British Museum, which coordinated the tests, supplied three "control samples" dating to the 1st and 11th centuries after Christ's death and to about the year 1300.

Gonella, professor of instrumental physics at the Turin Institute of Technology, said no matter what the findings of the carbon dating, a battery of physical, chemical and optical tests still are needed to explain how the mysterious life-size image came to be imprinted on

Many of the artifacts placed within the coffins have, however, been preserved. Some are now on display at an exhibit called "The Funerary Arts of Ancient Egypt" at Boston's Museum of Fine Arts.

'Palm reading' takes discriminating eye

hundreds of times daily, these words are spoken in one form or another: "Oh. look at the paim tree!"

Having been both tourist and new resident. I know this to be true. As a tourist, palms were among my "frondest" memories.

But finding anyone who possessed answers to inquiries about palm specifies was difficult to say the least. One phrase kept cropping up throughout my search: "That... Oh, it's just a palm tree."

As most new residents "tile Into the warm tropics of Florida, they become desenstired until Floride ? adl monplace and evoke only apathy.

Tropical bushes, flowers. flowering trees, bananas, papayas, and avocados all well enhance the state's landscape. But a stretch of sod striving to be purely Floridian would seem incompless without at least palm and even nicer with

more. Having moved into my very first brand-new home three years (go. I set about landscaping it with the tropical plants I'd collected over six years. When I had gone as far as I could with the materials on hand. I set about searching for more. I filled the yard, but a piece was missing from the overall picture-a

Depleted funds forced me to use creative measures to obtain a palm. After some long, hard thought, I struck upon the idea of humbly begging one from a local farmer.

I found a ranch on State Road 415, south of Osteen. that was blessed with a number of palms along its road frontage. The owner of the property was astounded at my request, but, after teiling me I was crazy, granted me permission to dig one, an 8-footer with a base bigger than my arms would reach around.

The first obstacle I encountered wasn't just annoying, it was deadly. As I cleared the weeds from the tree's base, I



came face to face with a diamondback rattlesnake. After near panie-I'd never

... I a personal encounter aiua venomous snake-1 made quick work of the fellow and proceeded.

The roo ball necessary to keep a paim alive after transplanting may not be as large as other kinds of trees. but the blood, sweat and tears required to unearth it are a considerably more in proportion. After I had spent eight hours digging. I knew why the rancher had laughed and pegged me a lunatie. It took another two hours to get it out of the ground. Only with the help of two recruits and the rancher was the palm finally in my track, headed for a new

All palms are not the same! For you who wish to make intelligent choices or distinctions between palm varieties, I have compiled the following data with the help of Chuck Hubbach, palm expert at Fairchild Gardens in Coral Gables, and Michael J. Martin with the Seminole Office of the Division of Forestry

The obvious place to start is with the state tree the cabbage palm. Native to Florida, it is seen growing wild and in planned landscapes. It was a source of food for another Florida native, the Seminole Indian However, the tree will die when its edible part-the growing tip-is harvested for consumption. Cabbage palms are very cold tolerant and relatively quick-growing

Washington palms are among the tallest palms in the area. Although not indigenous-they immigrated from Mexico and Baja Californiathey'll grow in a variety of Florida soils. They are coldtolerant and reach heights of approximately 80 feet, despite being slow growers. Look along the lakefront of Lake Monroe for samples.

Rindo palms were introduced from Brazil but are very much at home here. Also cold-tolerant, they grow only to 20 feet. The feather-leaf fronds of Rindo palms are similar to those of the cabbage palm, but appear blueishgreen instead.

Canaly Island date palms thick trunked palms with an enormous spray of fronds and deadly thorns. They are seen mostly in commercial plantings because of the price and the fact that they are susceptible to cold dam-

For home landscapes, the Senegal date palm deserves the highest recommendation. As elegant as the Canary Island variety, it can take the cold and is less expensive. It also sports a multi-stem arrangement that lends itself to visual interest.

Finally, two venerable varieties of palm-like plants were companions to the dinosaurs, Both, are cycads, the oldest living plant species surviving on planet Earth. Even their appearances seem prehistoric. Being cold-hardy. they are well-suited for any region in the state.

The Sago palm is the most popular of the two, with a regal collar of dark green, stiff-leaved fronds surrounding the trunk and growth-bud. Like a palm, it also blooms. but then divides into several branches.

Coontie is a Florida native and is the only eyead native to North America, It was another source of food for the Seminoles. After repeatedly pounding and rinsing the pith to remove all the poisons, a starch meal was derived and baked into bread.

So, if you now find yourself in the planting frame of mind, consider adding one of the palms above to your garden. While these earn the highest marks by Hubbach and Martin, they are not the only choices you have. Other


