

# Fifteen Docketed For Trial

Fifteen defendants are docketed for trial the week of July 17 before Circuit Judge Tom Waddell Jr. The cases run the gamut from first degree murder and manslaughter to rape, attempted rape, lewd and lascivious assault and incest. Albert Evans faces first degree murder charges in the April 15 death of Damon Jones, who was shot in the chest twice with slugs from a 22 caliber pistol. The affray allegedly took place as a result of an altercation between the two men over a woman.

James Drake, 27-year-old Casselberry resident, is charged with attempted rape and assault with intent to commit rape upon a 24-year-old Orlando woman in May.

The woman reported to sheriff's deputies she was assaulted at the county dumping station on SR 419. Drake was charged with assaulting the woman in a car.

Roosevelt Barkley is charged with manslaughter in the Oct. 31, 1971 death of Charles Lambert, when he is alleged to have operated his car in a culpable and negligent manner effecting the death of Lambert. The incident took place on SR 526, Oviedo.

Carl Courtney is charged with attempted rape and assault with intent to commit rape in an April 1 incident.

Roger Maxwell is charged with lewd and lascivious assault upon a female child. (The Herald omits the name of the defendant in the incest case to avoid embarrassment to his family.)

Other defendants docketed for trial and their charges include: Steve McCummins, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony and grand larceny; Carl Courtney, aggravated assault; Lexie Martin, grand larceny; Webster Ott, possession of a barbiturate; Michael Oviatt, possession of a barbiturate; Elwood Lester, buying, receiving, concealing stolen property; Albert King, breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony and grand larceny and Jack Yandic, breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony and grand larceny.

The state has dropped charges of breaking and entering with intent to commit a misdemeanor against James Hedwin.

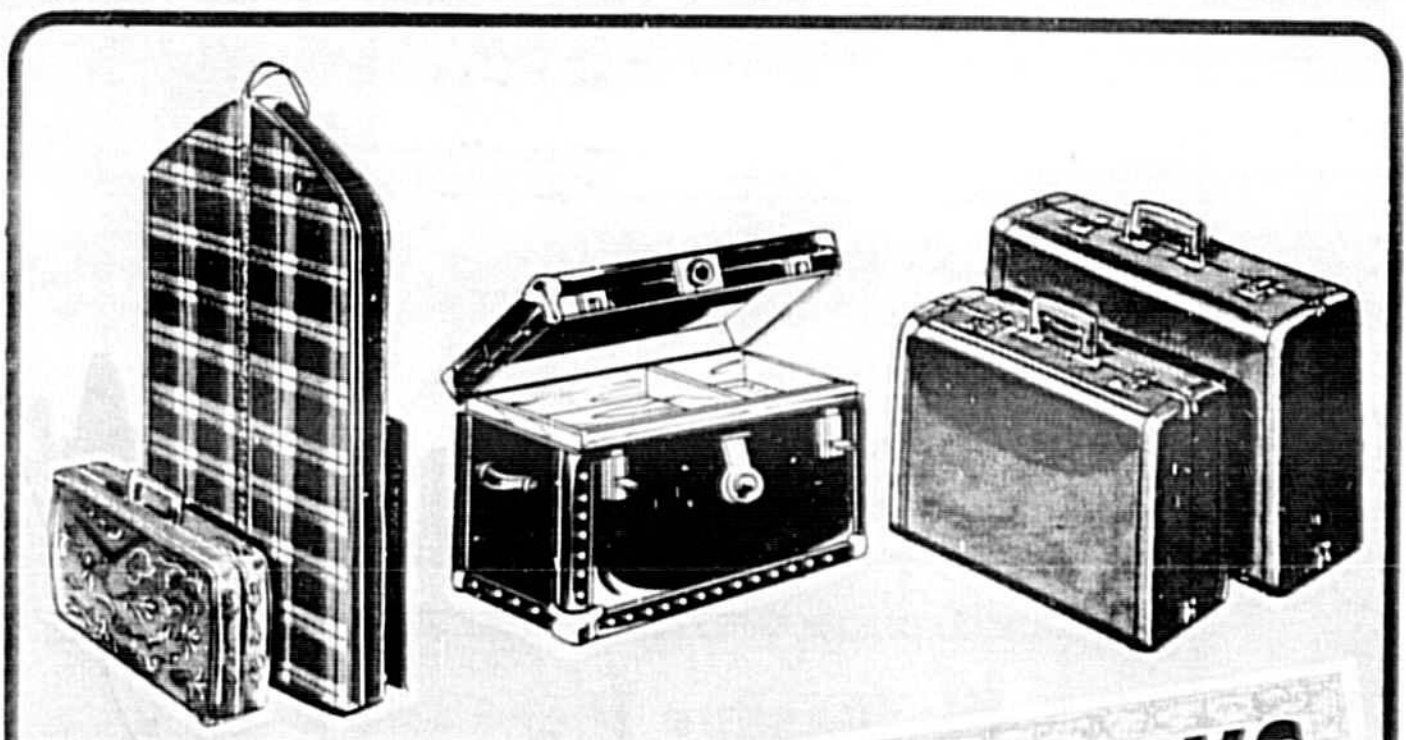

# England Fights Proposed Hike

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Reubin Askew's consumer adviser, Arthur England, said today he will petition the Public Service Commission (PSC) to suspend its June 30 approval of the rate hike while the corporate tax issue is being decided.

He said the move would be a follow up to Askew's request Monday that the PSC reconsider its decision to allow utilities to use the tax as justification for a rate hike.

The sponsor of the 5 per cent corporate tax that took effect last Jan. 1, Askew told the PSC that letting utilities pass the tax on to consumers put the tax burden back on those the tax legislation had sought to help.

The Gulf Power increase, which formally goes into effect today, was the first rate hike granted by the PSC in which the state corporate taxes were taken as a cost of doing business in the rate-making formula. "I don't know exactly how we will get the Public Service Commission to suspend the Gulf Power increase," said England, "but I have all day to figure out a way."

In putting England on the case, Askew is making his first major use of the consumer adviser's post created by the 1971 Legislature and taking effect July 1.

England conceded that it would be unusual for the PSC to hold up a rate hike it had already awarded, but said the regulatory body was "wrong in allowing Gulf Power to consider a profits tax in the same way it considers sales taxes or other taxes associated with doing business."

Meanwhile, state Sen. Gerald Lewis, D-Miami, today filed qualification papers with the secretary of state's office, taking on Public Service Commission Chairman Jess Varbrugh for the Democratic nomination.

**Request For Building Causes Confusion**

CASSELBERRY — A hearing before the city's Board of Adjustment seems to be the only way to solve the problems and confusion which have arisen from a request to build a Masonic Temple — courthouse annex on Lake Triplet Drive.

The question came up last week when a contingent of members from the South Seminole Masonic Lodge No. 364 came before the city council to feel out the city's position on the proposed court house annex being located in the Masonic Temple. The council at that time asked for more information on the proposed building, especially in the area of parking, Francis P. Odlo, Worshipful Master for the Lodge, presented this information to the council last night.

The proposed building, according to Odlo, will provide 87 parking spaces. This is above the requirements of Casselberry ordinances, which call for 54 spaces. The proposed two level building, estimated at costing \$120,000, will be used for Lodge meetings (lower level) and it had been hoped that the Board of County Commissioners would rent the upper level for use as a court house annex. After last night's discussion, this may not be possible.

The problems arose in the matter following a report by City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh, who revealed that the biggest problem is with zoning. The property was zoned in April, 1970 from RMA to C-1, but minutes of a council meeting at which this was determined if any commitments were made in this respect by the petitioners for rezoning (Masons) at that time. McIntosh also reported that the question must be taken before the city Board of Adjustment, regardless of whether the property is used for a Masonic Temple or professional offices, because neither is allowed under C-1 zoning anyway.

Former councilman Louis Kirby and Richard Wirtz were present at last night's meeting, and both disputed the idea that it had been the council's intention to limit the usage of this property. The minutes of the meeting in 1970 show that Wirtz made the original motion to rezone this "for a Masonic Lodge."

This cannot be definitely proven, however, since a Clark County Commission meeting cannot be found. City Clerk Mary Hawthorne is attempting to find the tape in order to prove without a doubt what the intentions were at that time.

Councilmen Edith Dwyer and Thomas Dwyer, who were also sitting on the council in 1970, both expressed their feelings that the council had intended to restrict usage of this property. Mayor Curtis Bellow also expressed this feeling. Bellow said that photographs of the proposed building were shown to the council at that time, and these photos did not indicate a two level, part commercial building.

Council voted to refer the matter to the Board of Adjustment for a hearing. The property owners must obtain a conditional use variance before they can build either a Masonic Temple or office space for a court house annex. The delay created by the hearing may rule out a commitment from the County Commission, since they are expected to make a final decision on this matter in the near future.

**Jury Deliberates Murder Trial**

Jury deliberations on the guilt or innocence of Albert Evans, 35-year-old Sanford man, charged with second degree murder in the shooting death of Damon Jones, also of Sanford, started just before noon today as closing arguments for the state and defense ended at 11:30 a.m.

Evans is being tried in the April 15 death of Jones, in an incident of passion that resulted when both men vied for the affections of Deshae Mae Jones, no relation to the deceased, but according to testimony Monday elicited in the trial of Evans, a "friend" of both sisters.

With assistance state attorney William Bill Eaton, handling the prosecution for the state and attorney Hulan Ray, defendant's attorney, the following information poured forth before Circuit Court Judge Tom Waddell Jr.

Mrs. Jones, widow, said she and Evans were sitting on the front porch of her 13th Street home on the evening of April 15, when Damon Jones came by in his truck and asked her to come into the house to talk with her about the presence of Evans.

After a conversation between Jones and herself, Mrs. Jones Park Avenue apartment rented to Eddie E. Selway and Loraine Michelle Selway, both 18 years of age.

Husband and wife were charged with possession of narcotic paraphernalia and jailed in lieu of \$5,000 total bonds each.

Also arrested in the same foray on the apartment were Jose Raul Marti, 19, of Orlando, charged with possession of less than five grams of marijuana and possession of alcoholic beverages. Agents reported Marti had a match box filled with marijuana. His bond was set at total \$502.

Earl Faircloth, 17, of 1405 South Locust Avenue, Sanford, was booked in lieu of \$500 bond on a possession of marijuana charge of less than five grams.

Douglas Maddux, 18, also of Sanford, was charged with possession of more than five grams of marijuana and possession of narcotic paraphernalia after a wooden smoking pipe and two bags of "grass" were taken from the youth, an agent said. His bond was placed at \$1,500.

# \$3 Billion Price Tag For Russian Oil Deal

LONDON (AP) — The Occidental Petroleum Co. announced today that it has signed an agreement with the Soviet government to supply the Russians a wide range of scientific and technical services. Informants in London estimated the value of the contract as high as \$3 billion and said it was the biggest ever signed by a U.S. corporation with the Soviets.

Dr. Armand Hammer, the 72-year-old chairman of Occidental, told a news conference the agreement was signed in Moscow on July 14. He said it covers a five-year period and is renewable by mutual consent.

Hammer, who first did business with the Soviets shortly after the Bolshevik Revolution, said the contract covers five areas:

1. The exploration, production and usage of oil and natural gas in the Soviet Union.
2. Production of agricultural fertilizers and chemicals.
3. Metal treatment and metal plating.
4. The design and building of hotels in the Soviet Union.
5. The use of solid waste materials.

"The agreement is not restricted to the five areas mentioned," Hammer said. "It permits development in other areas at any time by mutual agreement."

The agreement also provides for compensations for the transfer of scientific and technological know-how, the sale of patents and the sale of licenses, Hammer continued.

## In Evans Case Murder Trial Goes To Jury

State Witness L. Edward Hayden said he was the first officer to arrive on the death scene and ordered Patrolman John Moore, second officer to arrive, to remove Evans from the scene after he heard Evans say something.

Patrolman Moore said he heard Evans say, "I shot him." Upon further testimony, Sgt. Gary Swain advised he had found the death weapon, a knife, in a room on the second floor of the house under a mattress.

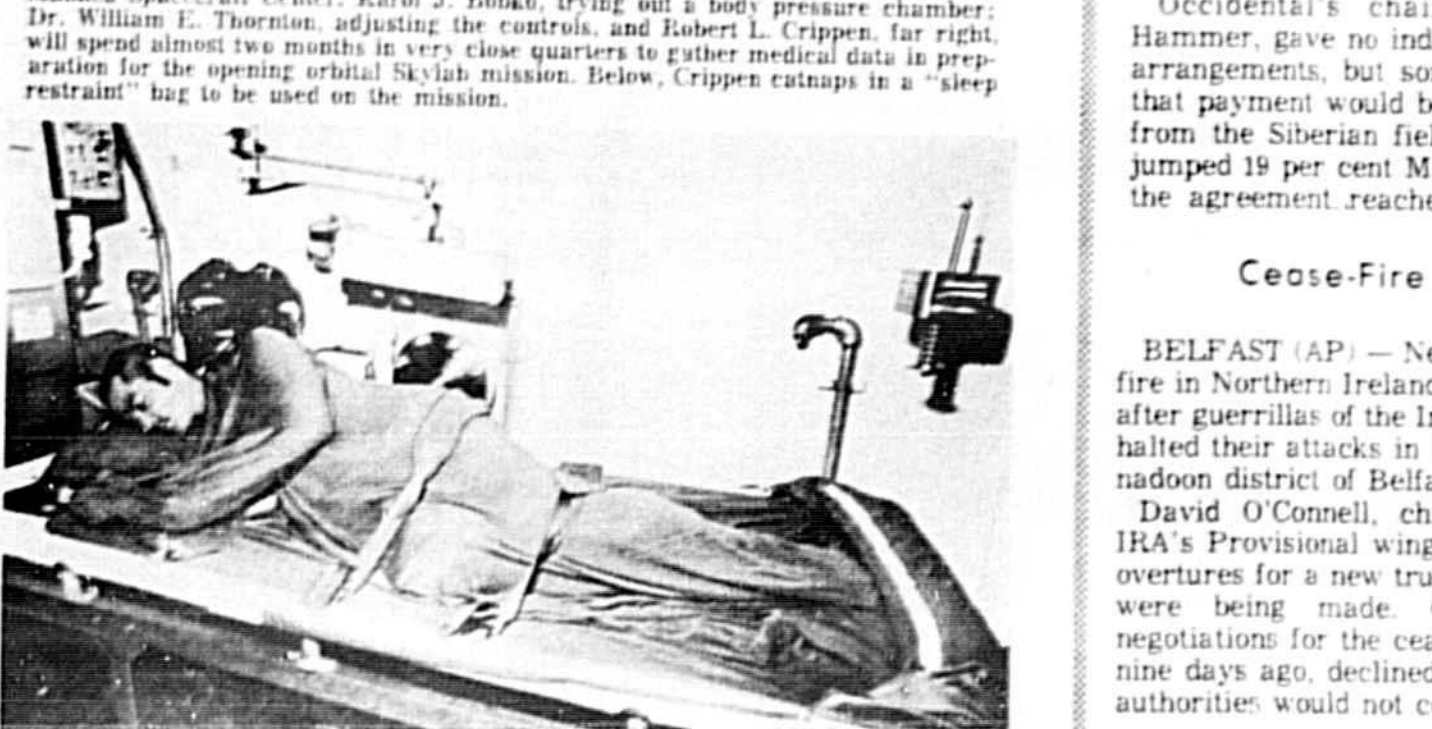
This morning the defendant took the stand and said he saw Jones reach his hand in his pocket as if to get a knife, but under cross examination, Evans admitted he never saw Jones produce a pocket knife.

In a previous first degree trial in June, the Evans case resulted in a stalemate when the jury could not reach a verdict.

Conviction on second degree murder could bring a prison sentence of up to 30 years, depending on Judge Waddell. Evans admitted on the stand he served time in prison when sentenced in 1966 to a five-year term upon conviction of forgery.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional auditors say costs of 77 major weapons systems have now overrun by \$2.7 billion and say much of that "is directly attributable to unrealistic early cost estimates."

The General Accounting Office, an arm of Congress, said in a report today that it analyzed 78 major weapons but did not include one—the proposed ultrasonic Trident long range missile-firing submarine—because it has not been given a final go-ahead.

## Anti-War Ex-Servicemen Seek Political Support

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Vietnam Veterans Against the War, reeling under federal charges that six of their leaders planned shootings and bombings in Miami Beach, have changed their protest strategy.

Instead of staging massive street demonstrations, the anti-war ex-servicemen are launching a deliberate drive to elect political and financial support for their cause.

Gov. Reubin Askew reportedly was scheduled to meet with VVAW members today, and offices of two South Florida congressmen were visited Monday by representatives of the veterans' organization, Askew and Reps. Claude Pepper and Dante Fascell, both Democrats in the U.S. House.

He said Askew would be asked to help narrow federal officials to reduce the bond for VVAW coordinators Scott Camill of Gainesville, John W. Kniffin of Austin, Tex. and Peter P. Mahoney of New Orleans.

## Health Fund Bills, Due House Action

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress is moving to intensify attacks on America's chief killer and communicable diseases despite Nixon administration opposition to key parts of the billion-dollar battle bills.

Two comprehensive health-fund authorization bills, similar to measures which the Senate passed without dissent, were due for House action today.

One would provide a three-year, \$1.25 billion program aimed at curbing heart, blood vessel, lung and blood diseases—America's leading killers. The other would extend the communicable disease control program for three years under a \$276 million plan to combat venereal diseases, German measles and tuberculosis.

The heart bill is envisioned as a companion to the recently enacted \$1.6 billion anti-cancer law. The Senate's version of the heart legislation authorizes \$1.47 billion over three years, about double the present rate of spending. The Senate-passed bill on communicable diseases contains a five-year authorization of \$759 million.

The House Commerce Committee approved a more conservative funding level in both bills but retained several organizational features such as grants to states and local communities in the communicable disease control bill, and the handling of research and treatment programs through federal facilities in the fight against heart and lung diseases.

## Entire Zoo Is Stolen

NEW YORK (AP) — The tortoise, the motive and the watchdog were the last remaining questions today in the great Coney Island zoo robbery.

An anonymous tip Monday led police to a battered Brooklyn stable seven miles from the Astroland amusement park where the entire children's zoo was stolen early Sunday.

Detectives found six Shetland ponies, 11 sheep, 11 goats, a llama, a miniature white bull and a coop of chickens suffering from heat prostration. But only a South American tortoise was missing.

Police arrested Toby Esposito, 39, on charges of possession of stolen property and cruelty to animals. But they said the motive for the robbery remained unclear.

Meanwhile back at the zoo, the operator was wondering what her trained guard dog was doing while the thieves smashed several padlocks, tore down a fence and loaded the merchandise on a trailer for the getaway.

"The dog wasn't harmed at all, just left there," said a puzzled Elizabeth Hammond. "It's very strange."



# 2 Underwater Blasts Damage Destroyer

SAIGON (AP) — Two underwater explosions heavily damaged the U.S. destroyer Warrington on Monday in the Tonkin Gulf where it was trying to intercept cargo from three Chinese freighters. U.S. military sources reported today.

The Navy said the cause of the explosions was not known. Spokesmen declined to speculate whether the destruction might have been hit by U.S. mines that had broken loose from the fields U.S. Navy planes planted around North Vietnamese harbors.

No enemy fire was reported at the time of the explosions, spokesman said.

One sailor among the destroyer's 270 crewmen suffered minor injuries, was treated on board and returned to duty, the Navy said.

The 3,400-ton Warrington sustained heavy shock damage and

there was flooding in its engineering spaces, which was quickly brought under control, a spokesman said.

The Warrington left the Tonkin Gulf on her own power for the U.S. naval base at Subic Bay in the Philippines but later was taken under tow by the salvage ship Reclaimer because full extent of the damage was not known, spokesman said.

Sources said the Warrington was part of a 7th Fleet task force posted off Honai Island about 85 miles north of the demilitarized zone to fire on barges and craft attempting to ferry war materials ashore to North Vietnam from three Chinese Communist freighters.

The sources said the two Chinese freighters had ever been attacked.

The U.S. Command reported that American fighter-bombers flew more than 316 strikes against highways, bridges, supply barges, fuel depots and

warehouses inside North Vietnam on Monday.

## Record Subsidy Billion Dollar Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — A sweetened billion-dollar farm subsidy plan by the Nixon administration is expected to bring into huge surplus stockpiles next year as the Soviet Union decides not to buy any U.S.

bread grain.

The plan, announced Monday by the Agriculture Department, could pay farmers about \$1.1 billion for trimming wheat acreage next year, a record high subsidy for the crop and about \$100 million more than payments for 1972.

It is basically the same as for this year, but it includes additional incentives to encourage more acres from wheat production. The basic government price support loan will remain unchanged at \$1.25 per bushel.

A department spokesman, noting the build up of wheat surpluses to the highest level in nearly a decade, told reporters the 1973 acreage "set-aside" program benefits could run \$100 million more than the billion spent on payments this year.

"It was drawn up without taking into consideration the possibility of the Soviet sale," Glenn A. West, deputy administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said.

Weir referred to a recently announced \$750 million sale of U.S. grain to the Soviets over the next three years.

"But if exports, and sales to the Soviet Union materialize, then farmers stand to gain and cost to the government will be lower," he said.

The program is keyed partly to farmers get higher prices for cash sales they will rely less on government payments.

The program is aimed at taking production next year, compared with about 20 million idled this harvest.

A major change for 1973 is in an "optional" provision intended to entice farmers to remove 10 million acres from wheat production in addition to their basic idled acres.

For that, the government plans to pay farmers an average of \$20 per acre or more to reduce acres for harvest next year.

The reason is apparent. On July 1 the wheat "carryover" or surplus was more than 900 million bushels, the most since 1963-64.

Much of the current surplus is the result of a record harvest of 1.6 billion bushels last year.

## McGovern's Campaign Detailed

CUSTER, S.D. (AP) — Democratic presidential nominee George McGovern, in the Black Hills of South Dakota for two weeks of rest and strategy sessions, has before him three alternative schedules and a detailed proposal for media spending in the fall campaign against President Nixon.

The outlines, far more detailed than anything the Democrats had four years ago even after the campaign was launched, were among the materials McGovern brought with him when he flew here Monday.

After an enthusiastic greeting from several hundred supporters in Rapid City, he drove south 37 miles to the Sylvan Lake resort area near here.

Aides said McGovern's scheduling office has prepared an outline for consideration on the large industrial states, a second for a campaign aimed at all 50 states, and a third for an attempt to combine the two approaches.

In addition, the aides said, a detailed plan covering media expenditures, both allocating amounts per area and specifying type of advertisements to be used, has been prepared for McGovern by Charles Guggenheimer, the senator's radio-television ad manager.

In 1968, Democratic presidential nominee Hubert H. Humphrey arrived at his Waverly, Minn., home after the party's late August convention to find that no planning had been done for the general election campaign.

Even while resting, McGovern had his eye out for strengthening the party unity behind his candidacy.

Within five minutes of his arrival at Cabin No. 22 at Sylvan Lake, the candidate was on the phone to Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley to thank him for Monday's endorsement of the entire Democratic ticket.

Press secretary Richard Dougherty said Daley, ousted from last week's Democratic National Convention in a drive led by McGovern backers, told the senator he and Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton of Missouri are "a fine ticket" and he planned to "do what he can to help him get elected."

BALTIMORE (AP) — After settling two prison uprisings and touching off a brief guard rebellion with his on-the-scene negotiating, Gov. Marvin Mandel says he's through playing mediator.

"This is the last time I'm not going back," Mandel said as he left the Maryland Penitentiary after negotiating the freedom of three hostages seized during a six-hour inmate rebellion Monday.

"I'm not going to be on 'will call' for the prisoners," added the governor, whose meeting with an inmate delegation Sunday ended a 12-hour siege at the Maryland House of Corrections in Jessup.

## Customer Privacy Questioned

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A panel of three federal judges has taken under submission the first court challenge of the Bank Secrecy Act of 1970. It requires banks to microfilm all checks for government inspection.

"There simply is no right of privacy for bank customers," declared John J. McCarthy, an attorney in the California Department of Justice who argued the government's case Monday.

The act will require banks to become government spies on their customers, said attorney Neil Horton of the American Civil Liberties Union. The ACLU has joined the California Bankers' Association representing the state's 158 banks, in challenging the act's constitutionality.

CBA attorney John Anderson argued that in California all compliance with the requirement to photograph the front and back of each check would involve 250 million checks a month at a cost to the banks of \$50,000.

He said this would be like requiring the telephone company to monitor and record all telephone conversations in order to detect criminal ideas.

The act, which was to have gone into effect July 1, was challenged in the CBA-ACLU suit on June 22.

On June 30, U.S. District Court Judge William T. Sweetser issued a temporary restraining order nationwide against banks having to turn the microfilm records over to the government pending outcome of the suit. However, he ordered them to make the records in the meantime.

In accepting the case Monday, the U.S. District Court panel extended Sweetser's temporary order.

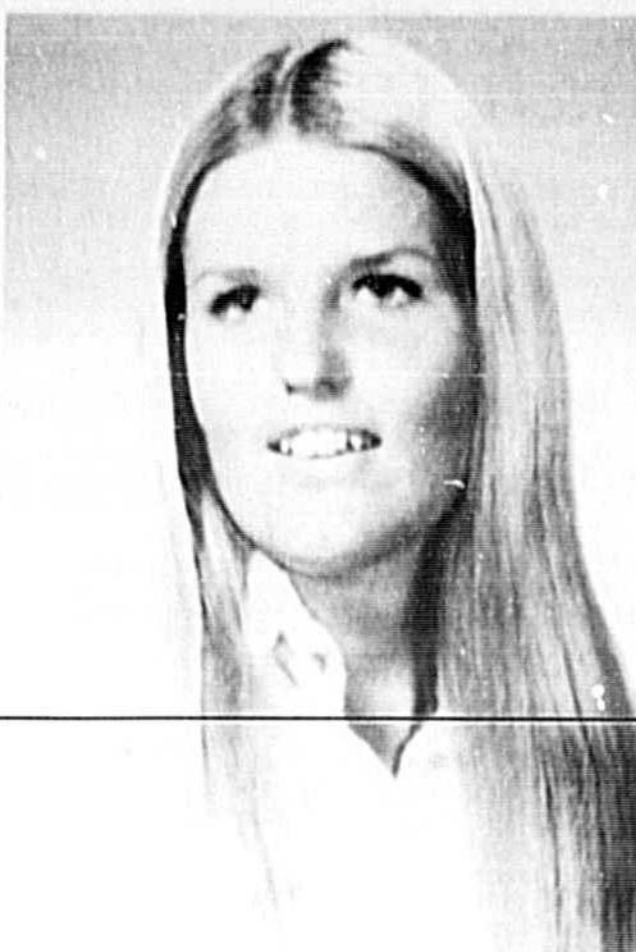

## Sand Aids In Flower Drying

If you've read the many articles on drying flowers and become discouraged by their lengthy lists of expensive ingredients, try using ordinary fine sand.

You can make lovely arrangements by using one or two dried garden flowers, weeds, broken branches, or drift wood. I use all of them to make lasting arrangements. I place them on cut and stained boards or potter's bowls; even plates will do.

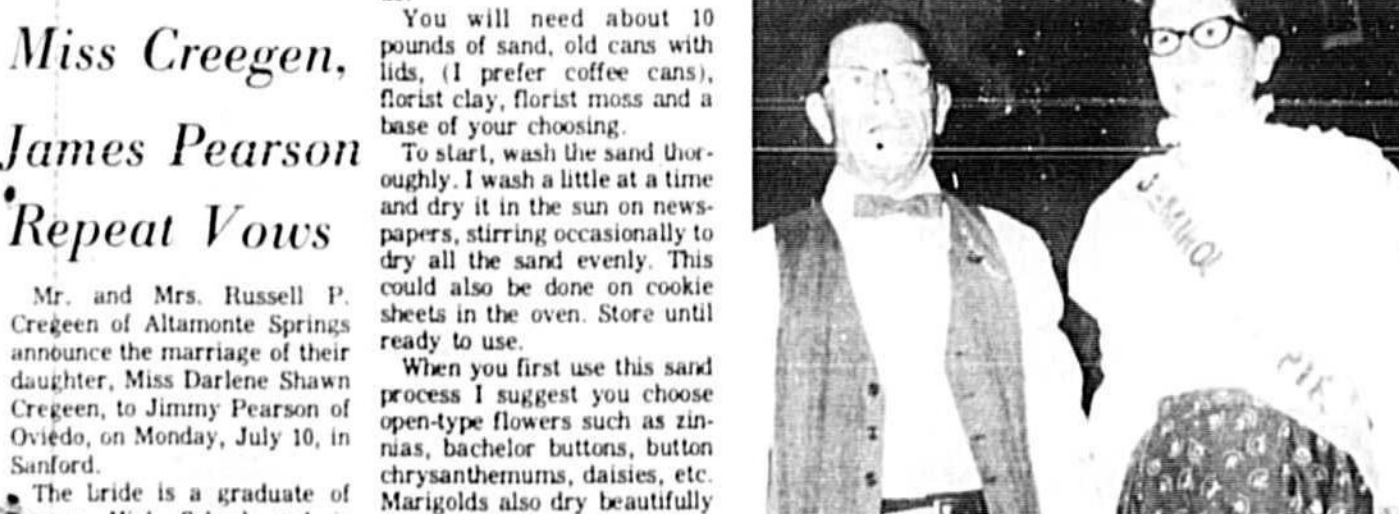
You will need about 10 pounds of sand, old cans with lids, (I prefer coffee cans), florist clay, florist moss and a base of your choosing.

To start, wash the sand thoroughly. I wash a little at a time and dry it in the sun on newspapers, stirring occasionally to dry all the sand evenly. This could also be done on cookie sheets in the oven. Store until ready to use.

When you first use this sand process I suggest you choose open-type flowers such as zinnias, bachelor buttons, button chrysanthemums, daisies, etc. Marigolds also dry beautifully and even sweet alyssum can be used. For roses, however, I suggest another method which I will cover in the future.

Cut the flower heads leaving a one-inch stem. Pour two inches of sand in a coffee can, and place the fresh flower stem in the sand in the center of the can and with your hand gently pour the fine dry sand all around the edges of the flower, so that the sand builds up and slides down around the petals.

It is important to let the sand slide between the petals in



order to keep the shape of the flower and also to dry the petals evenly. When the flower is covered, fill the can level with the top and tape the lid so that no air can get in the can. Now comes the hard part. Store the can for at least 10 days to two weeks. Since storage of a large number of cans can become a problem these

small arrangements with only a few flowers are the answer. Don't peek and don't hurry the process.

When the time is up to open the can be ever so careful to slowly pour the sand out. Lift the dried flower out and shake off. There will remain some grains and I remove these with an artist's paint brush.

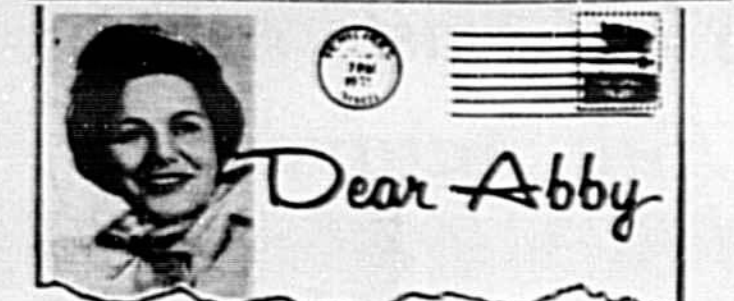

DEAR POLLY—Mrs. G. S. who wants to clean her silk lampshade at home did not realize washing instructions but I cannot resist passing on a method that really works. Be sure the shade fabric is colorfast. Remove any trim before washing. Sometimes these trim are attached with a fabric glue and can be easily pulled loose. If stitched, cut the threads and when trim is returned it brushing with a soft brush, such as an old toothbrush.

Wash in warm mild suds that are deep enough to cover the entire shade. Brush out, inside and out, with a soft lampshade brush and work quickly with up-and-down motion. Swish shade in circular pattern to distribute suds. Thorough rinsing is most important to prevent streaking and for this use a sink spray gun or hand squeeze around top and bottom with a heavy bath towel.

Remove excess moisture. Hang shade by a string to dry so it hangs free and dries evenly. From time to time dry the drying process go over frames with a lower—MRS. H. H.

**DEAR GILL—**This is tricky business but works on most silk shades. If the fabric looks stretched and soggy during the process, do not worry as it will tighten when dry. If outdoor drying is impossible an electric fan may be used to speed things up. Work fast—POLLY.

DEAR POLLY—I let our dark blue car out in the sun after I washed it with the result that there are water spots all over the paint job. Does anyone know how to remove these unsightly spots? I tried wax and a rubbing compound but it removes the paint. Please someone help me as I am really in hot water with my husband—BONNIE.

**DEAR POLLY—**I am a compulsive knitter and one thing that always annoyed me was picking out the yarn for my projects. I finally came up with an idea that I hope you will find helpful. I save all coragse pins with those lovely large heads and use them when I knit. I knit a knitted garment. The big heads never get lost in the wool. As a result, I found a pin is never lost—MARGARET.

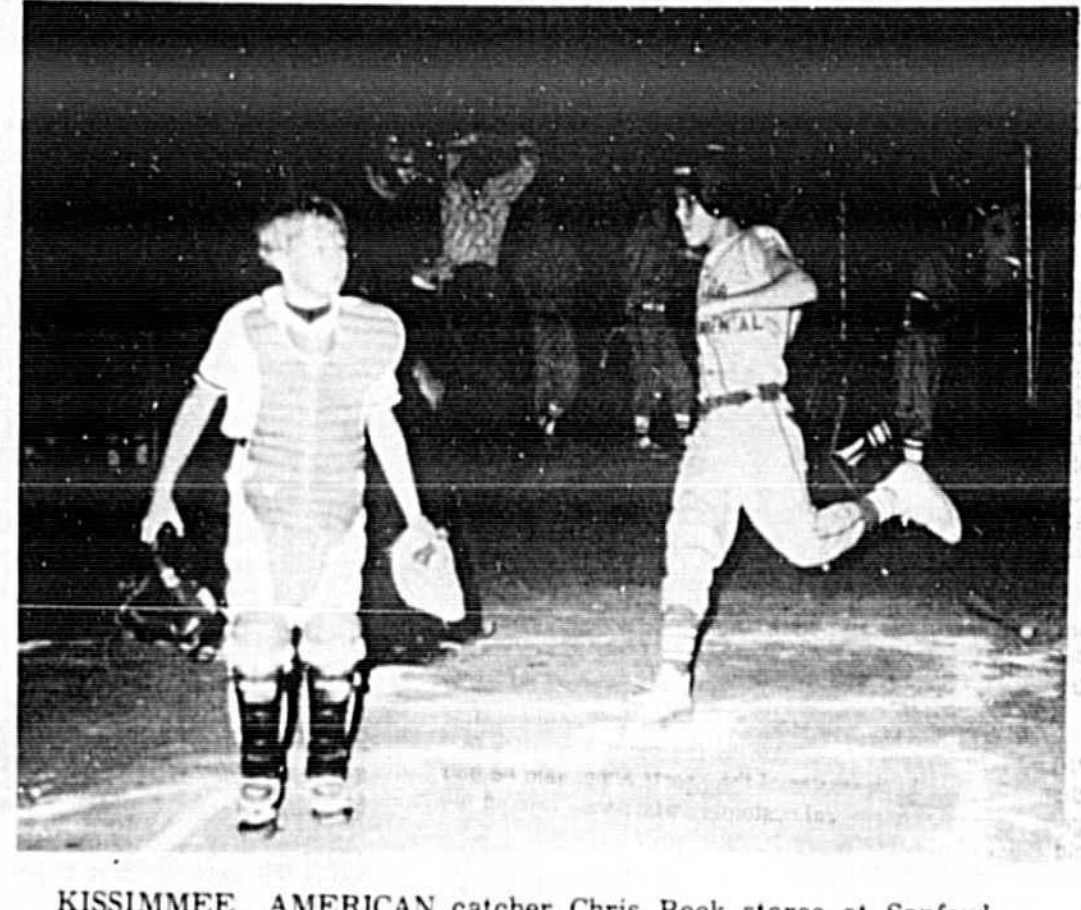
