

Closing of Dump Could Be Costly For Sanford

 The closing of the state Department of Environmental Regulation of a privately owned dump in Orange City would result in a total cost to the city of several years for the use of the sanitary landfill in Volusia County to dispose of the garbage and transfer it up from Sanford to Ocala and homes.

Sanford officials said the price for the use of the sanitary landfill is \$1.00 per ton.

New city staff members are trying to find a new dumping ground, with the use of Seminole County landfills as a last resort.

Assistant City Manager Steve Harriet estimates it will cost the city about \$101,600 a year to use county landfills versus the \$38,160 the city has been paying in fees in the private landfill owners — a difference of \$63,222 annually.

The Lake Marie landfill in Orange City is slated to be closed May 20, so there isn't much time for the city to find another solution.

A spokesman for the Lake Marie landfill said today the owners have given up trying to comply with DER regulations that seem to change from day to day. The spokesman, who asked not to be named, said that even though the landfill was trying to comply with the DER order, the state agency notified that the state permit necessary for operation would be denied anyway.

City Manager W. E. "Pete" Knowles, in a memo to the City Commission Monday night, said several alternatives are being examined.

He mentioned:

- A long term contract with the county with possibly lower rates.
- A city-owned transfer station and equipment so haul to the county landfill in Ocala.

—An air-curtain incineration unit for partial reduction of quantities.

—A full incineration operation by the city, possibly with energy capture.

—Franchising to a private system for collection and disposal.

Harriet reported to the commission that he and other staff members met with Ken Hooper, state manager of the county's environmental services department on Sunday's need for a disposal site.

Harriet said that Sanford collects 40 to 50 tons of garbage per day, running five residential and one commercial route with a total customer count of 8,000. He said the group discussed the city's need to use the Upstate Road transfer station.

Harriet said, however, while Hooper thought using the transfer station is a possibility, the county would be looking for a long term contract from three to five years

from the city. Hooper's reasoning on the long term contract is that the county would have to make capital investments in treating the trash to accommodate the increased land generated by the city of Sanford.

Harriet said Hooper said that the county would still use the added transport equipment could be purchased. Sanford might have to transport the garbage directly to the Ocala landfill.

"This is a 24 mile round trip for our trucks, over twice as long as the 12 mile round trip we are making to Orange City," Harriet said, adding that Hooper said the current rates charged at the transfer station is \$9.75 per ton and the rate is set per ton — \$7.75 — at the Ocala landfill if delivered by city trucks.

Hooper indicated the rates are negotiable if the city enters into a contract with the county.

Mayor Lee P. Moore urged his fellow city commissioners to study Harriet's and Knowles' reports.

Sanford Still Not Restricting Video Fun

There will be no move by the city of Sanford to regulate video games, since the state has already done so.

City Attorney Bill Colbert told the City Commission Monday night that the state's new Florida ban on rule law to regulate video games if it becomes law.

But, Colbert added, that if police officers are correcting reported problems with public gaming and interfering at a convenience store at 12th Street and Park Avenue, perhaps city regulations on video games isn't necessary.

The city received numerous complaints from property owners since the department in February. Mayor Lee P. Moore two weeks ago requested the police department run a "back and forth" patrol in the area where complaints come in about the police stopping and starting in the early morning and late evening hours at the spot creating a general public nuisance.

Assistant Police Chief Herb Shea said since the department has been patrolling the 12th Street and Park Avenue area on a regular basis, like there is no issue with video games and no complaints have been received.

Shea said the patrol at the one spot is time consuming, predicting that when it is stopped the problem will return.

"Our officers go to the area of the lot," he said, adding that patrolling is the real problem rather than the games.

Commissioner Eddie Keith said the situation has improved. He said Commissioner Ned Yancey asked advised if the problem stops up again. "If you have the problem, advise us so we can adopt an ordinance regulating the games," Yancey said.

Commissioner David Parr also asked Shea about whether there is a problem in Sanford Plaza where a game room is located. Shea responded that the police haven't received complaints about the game room.

Blacks Organize Save Schools Effort Today

 Black community leaders have laid the groundwork for a mass rally to support efforts to save schools in primary high schools in the wake of a School Board decision to move Crooms High School students into Seminole County's new schools. Robert Hughes' recommendation to move Goldoborn Elementary to Crooms. The fate of Goldoborn will be discussed at a meeting of the Board of Education at 7:30 p.m. Monday. Crooms are in primarily black neighborhoods.

Local NAACP Chapter President Willie King said today the city would serve to inform the community as well as demonstrate the numbers of people determined to support the Chapter's efforts to save the schools.

It would also help contain an effort to raise funds to address the issues in court, if necessary, he said.

Monday night's meeting was attended by about 25 people. King said, including executive officers of the county NAACP, parents and teachers from Goldoborn Elementary, members of the "Concerned Citizens of Seminole County" and other interested residents. Reports, however, were not permitted to attend.

Hughes said the recommendation involving Goldoborn was based on an effort to consolidate five elementary schools in the north end of the county into three in the best interests of the children.

King said one concern is that Crooms was not built to serve young children.

Hughes, however, said Crooms, in becoming Crooms Elementary, would be brought up to state standards for an elementary school.

King said black leaders have contacted an attorney in Orlando concerning legal action to block moves to close black schools.

Police said Palazzo would not talk about the shooting.

An autopsy is scheduled for today at the Florida Regional hospital in Sanford.

Further details were not available at press time.

DEAR ARBY: Your item about the matted shoes brought back a flood of memories. Our daughter had polio at age 2. Irg braces for five years and then a series of operations. Today, at age 35, she is a successful homemaker and has a career as well. She walks normally unless in a hurry. We too have spent a fortune for shoes!

Ten years ago she was hurrying across the bank lobby and was greeted by a new girl who was about her age. The girl asked, "Did you have polio?" When our daughter said yes, she broke into a smile and said, "What a mess of shoes do you wear?"
