Carter, Reagan Bury Opponents

CHICAGO (UPI) — Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan easily added Illinois to their string of primary victories along with bags full of new delegates in their quickening march toward the presidential nominations.

Illinois voters put Carter one-third of the way to the Democratic nomination Tuesday, and pushed Reagan to the 20 percent mark for the GOP nomination he just missed four years ago.

And the largest primary to date left it clearly up to the falling challengers — Edward Kennedy on the Democratic side and George Bush and John Anderson in the Republican race — to produce something sensational to stop Carter and Reagan.

Carter drubbed Kennedy almost 2 to 1 in Illinois "beauty contest" and did almost as well in the separate voting for the state's 179 national convention delegates. It was the seventh time in eight primaries he has beaten the Massachusetts senator.

Reagan defeated Rep. John Anderson in the battle of Illinois, doing even better in the tabulation for the GOP's 92 district delegates than he did in the popular vote. Bush, last month's "stop Reagan" champion, was barely able to keep the percentage of his third-place finish in double numbers.

The primaries move next to New York and Connecticut, where the faltering challengers are said to have some prospects. But Carter and Reagan are cushioned against setbacks; Kennedy, Anderson and Bush are sitting on bedrock.

Kennedy and Anderson both vowed to continue in the race; Bush had nothing to say on election night, but declared in advance he would persist.

Daley Conquers Father's Group

CHICAGO (UPI) — Richard M. Daley conquered the Chicago Democratic machine his father built by winning the Democratic nomination for state's attorney of Cook County.

He did it with a landslide Tuesday over Alderman Edward M. Burke — the hand-picked choice of Mayor Jane M. Byrne and the candidate of the party organization she heads.

While an estimated 500 persons stomped and cheered in a hotel ballroom, one man yelled, "You're the next mayor!" Daley stopped in the middle of his acceptance speech and laughed.

Daley, who ran as an independent against the organization, has denied he wants the mantle of a father who ruled Chicago for 20 years. Mrs. Byrne has denied she tried to block him because of his supposed ambition.

Reagan was ahead for 42 delegates for an indicated total of 209 toward the 998 needed for nomination. Anderson was ahead for 26 delegates for an indicated total of 39. Bush was ahead for 1 delegate for an indicated total of 46. Rep. Philip Crane led for 2 delegates. There were a projected 21 uncommitted delegates for an indicated total of 38.

Going into Illinois, Carter led Kennedy in the delegate race 376.5 to 163.5, with 1,666 needed for the nomination. On the GOP side Reagan had 167, Bush 45, Anderson 13 and Crane none, with 998 needed to win.

Carter now has won the primaries in Illinois, Puerto Rico, Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Vermont and New Hampshire. Kennedy won Massachusetts. The third major Democratic candidate, California Gov. Edmund G. Brown, Jr., did not campaign in Illinois and collected 4 percent of the vote.

Reagan won the same primaries as Carter except Puerto Rico, which, with Massachusetts, went to Bush. Anderson has second-place finishes in Vermont, Massachusetts and Illinois.

Trials And Errors

Casual Thief Must Serve Life

ANGLETON, Texas (UPI) — Bill Hummel, casual thief, habitual criminal under Texas law and state prison "lifer," gazed through the black mesh wire cage separating him from a reporter.

For four hours Tuesday, he had mullied the Supreme Court's 5-4 vote upholding his life sentence for three thefts totaling \$229.11.

There are, it became clear, degrees of freedom.

Hummel, his thinning blond hair neatly combed, a cigarette in his hand, ached not just to leave prison, but simply to talk to his visitors in the more dignified surroundings on the other side of the black mesh.

His lawyer, Scott Atlas, 30, an antitrust specialist with the nation's largest law firm — John Connally's Houston law firm — sensed his client's distress and called the warden of the Retrieve Unit of the Texas Department of Corrections. The warden agreed Hummel could leave the cage.

With a guard standing nearby, Hummel, 36, pinched the cigarette and thought about the question.

"If you had it all to do over again —"

"I would have fixed the man's air conditioner," he interrupted.

If Bill Hummel had repaired an air conditioner in a San Antonio, Texas, tavern in 1973, he might not be serving a life term today. But he didn't repair it, even though he cashed the tavern owner's \$120.35 check.

Nine years earlier, he had used someone else's credit card — on a dare his lawyer said — to buy four tires worth \$80 at a service station. He was 20 and pleaded guilty to credit card abuse.

Five years later, he wrote a \$28.36 check to pay for a rented hotel room. The check was not on his account. Again he pleaded guilty.

When the San Antonio jury convicted him of theft by false pretenses in the air conditioner case, the state classified Hummel as an habitual offender and gave him the mandatory punishment specified in an 1856 law.

Alleged Rapist Gets New Trial

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — The Alabama Court of Criminal Appeals has overturned the rape conviction of Tommy Lee Hines, a retarded black man whose case triggered months of racial turmoil in north Alabama, with a stern warning that "this court will not tolerate anything less" than a fair trial.

The court held Tuesday in a unanimous decision that Hines, who was convicted of the February 1978 rape of a white Decatur woman and sentenced to 30 years in prison, was denied a fair trial. A new trial was ordered.

"Regardless of his race or the crime with which he is charged," the court said, "the accused must receive a fair trial. This court will not tolerate anything less."

Attorneys for Hines have argued his client had the mental capacity of a 6-year-old and was wrongly prosecuted.

Judge William Bowen said in the opinion that Hines did not have the mental ability to waive his constitutional right to remain silent during questioning and have a lawyer present during the interrogation.

"We have diligently searched and have been unable to find any case involving mental retardation and the voluntariness of a confession wherein the degree of mental retardation was as extreme as that presented here," Bowen wrote.

The case sparked a series of demonstrations and clashes between blacks and the Ku Klux Klan when the trial was moved from Decatur to Cullman.

It was one of the most volatile racial cases in north Alabama since the Scottboro Boys rape trials in the 1930s. In that case, nine black boys were convicted of raping two white girls in a freight car passing through Alabama.

Attorney May Use 'Astrologic'

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (UPI) — The position of the stars doesn't excuse crime, a judge has told an attorney who wants to plead his client innocent by reason of astrology.

"I don't think we can excuse people from the results of what we would otherwise call criminal activities just because the stars were in the wrong place," Broward Circuit Judge Joseph Price told veteran Miami Beach defense attorney Jack Nageley at a pre-trial hearing this week.

But Price refused to grant a prosecution motion to reject Nageley's planned defense that Mark Quinn, 23, is innocent of rape and robbery charges because he is insane by reason of astrological influence.

Rejecting the defense before the trial started would be premature, Price said, though he added that "the rules of criminal procedure do not make provision for that defense."

Nageley contends that the fate of Denton, an

ex-convict, was written in the stars when he was born. The lawyer said he has a Hong Kong astrologer preparing Denton's sun chart and will call astrologers from New York, Arizona and Virginia to testify.

Denton and others like him are "forced by planetary obedience" to lead violent and troubled lives," Nageley said at the hearing Monday.

"I want the verdict to prove that an individual has no control over his behavior," he said.

Nageley said he also plans to introduce comic books into evidence at the trial but declined to disclose the purpose.

"People think I've gone around the bend," Nageley said.

Denton is charged along with Thomas A. Sheridan with breaking into the town house owned by a Plantation, Fla., couple last Sept. 22. They robbed the couple, slashed the man's wrist with a knife and raped the woman.

NEW YORK (NEA) — Every time Stephen Schutz turns around there's a letter from his wife, Susan Polis Schütz.

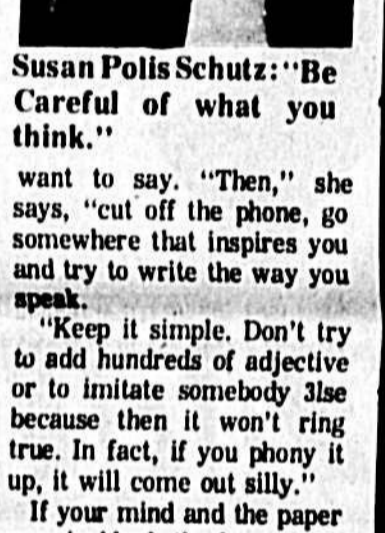
That's only noteworthy because they live and work together in a mountain house in Vail, Colo.

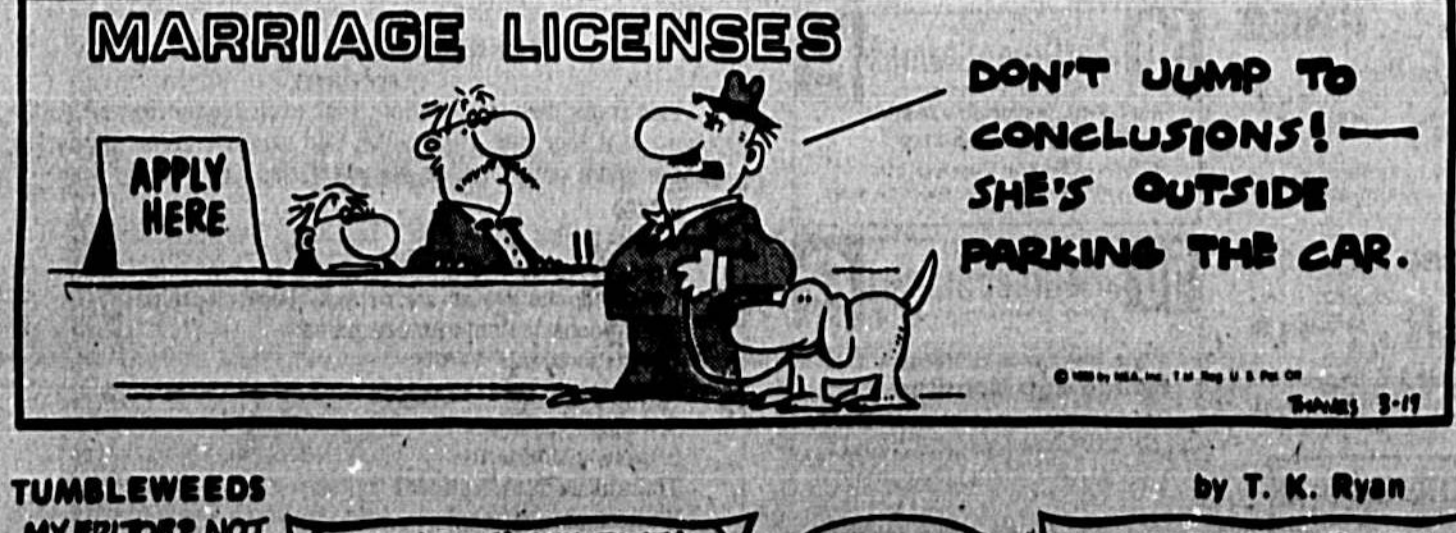
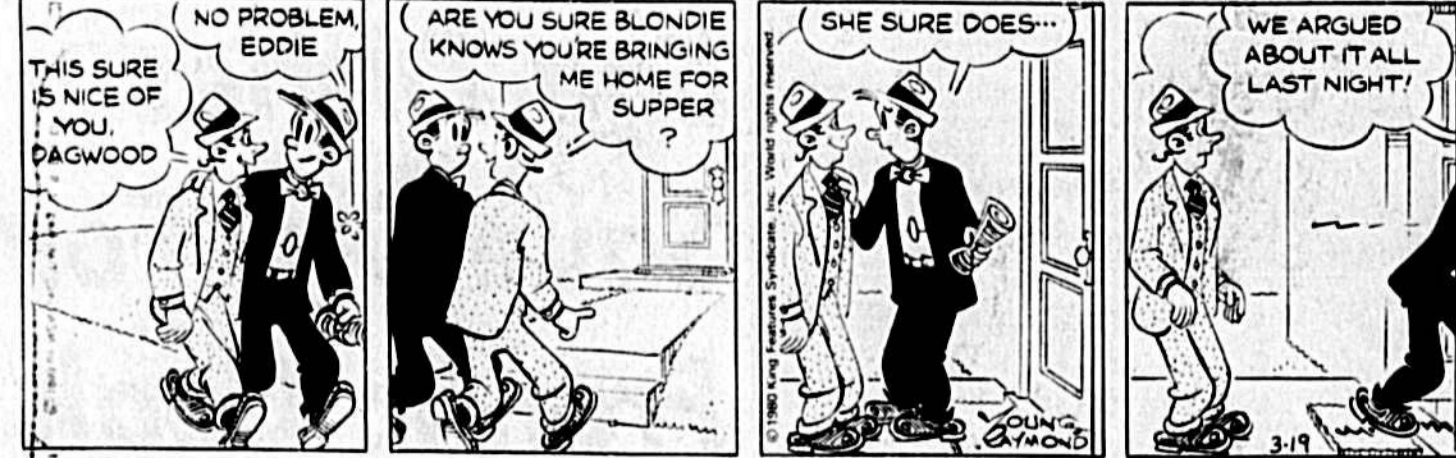

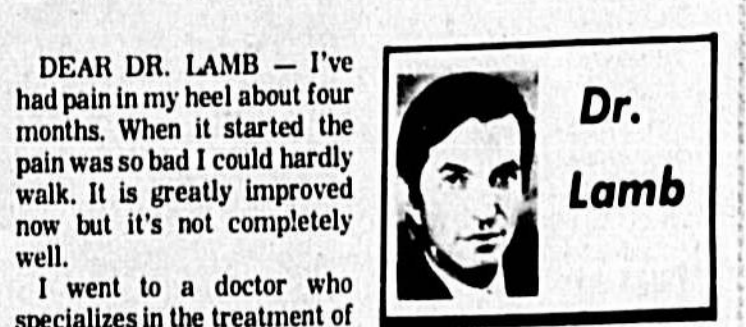

Bony Heel Spurs Under Your Pain?



DEAR DR. LAMB - I've had pain in my heel about four months. When it started the pain was so bad I could hardly walk. It is greatly improved now but it's not completely well. I went to a doctor who specializes in the treatment of bone disorders. He looked at my heel and said it was an inflammation of the tendon that stretches from the toe to the heel. He gave me a shot of cortisone in the heel and told me to return in two weeks if it was not well. If anything, it was worse, so he gave me another shot and again told me to come back in two weeks. It didn't improve any. I cancelled the third visit after hearing it was not good. A good foot doctor will sometimes strap the heel to rotate the foot a little and cause you to walk on the outside of the arch. By walking on the outside of the arch, you don't pull all the strain across the center arch of the foot and you decrease the pulling effect. A similar approach is to get a little pad underneath the inside of the foot to change the weight bearing effect on the foot itself.
