BRICK ROADS WILL START

Bond Trustees Expect to Contract the Work

WILL MAKE BEST TERMS

This Innovation in Florida Will Attract Attention of Entire South

Within the next thirty days the brick paving for Sanford district will start and there will be a scene of activity all along the line. All the preliminary work has been finished and it is a certainty now that one of the large brick concerns will take the bonds and the contract for laying the brick and the district will profit by this arrangement. At the meeting of the county commissioners on Tuesday the buyers who represented the larger bond concerns were not disposed to purchase the bonds on account of the five per cent clause as it did not allow them a margin of profit large enough at the selling end and the commissioners with the consent of F. L. Woodruff decided to leave the matter to the bond trustees as the brick manufacturers were disposed to offer better terms at the contract arrangement. At a meeting of the trustees on Wednesday in this city the matter was discussed at every angle and a final settlement will be made today. The work will not be delayed at all by this arrangement as the terms of contract must be advertised for thirty days and at the end of this period the work will start.

Mr. Woodruff and the board of trustees composed of P. M. Elder, M. F. ... are fully alive to the situation and are safeguarding the tax payer's interests at every point and will make the very best terms possible before the final contract is made. These brick roads will be the very last word in road building in this section and will endure for all time to come if properly made and these gentlemen expect to have the very best brick and the very best work obtainable at the very best terms and the smallest per cent of interest. While all of us want the work to proceed at once we recognize the fact that the interest of the people must be protected and road work that will be done here at this time will probably be watched with great interest all over the south. Other sections have discovered that brick is the only material that will endure and the State of Florida especially will be forced to use this material now that the automobile has come to stay and the idea of making country roads of brick is an innovation in this state. Sanford is very much in the public eye at present on account of taking the initiative in the matter of creating a special road district and bonding for brick roads and the capable business men who have this matter in charge are proceeding most carefully and weighing the matter well before disposing of the bonds and making contracts.

It is certain that March first will witness the start of this great work that means so much not only to Sanford and Orange county but to the whole state as well.

Library Notes

It is interesting to know what in the opinion of William Patten, editor, is most excellent in the stories of such favorite authors as John Fox, Jr., Frank Stockton, Octavo Thonet, Robert Grant, Henry James and others—well known.

MERCHANTS WILL ORGANIZE

Business Men's Association for the Betterment of Local Trade

After giving the matter deep study the merchants of this city are planning the formation of an association, having for its object a trade rating by individuals.

W. P. Henry, representing the Merchants' Mercantile Agency of Pittsburg, publishers of the Credit Experience Guide, which agency is organizing business men all over the United States in a similar way, has been here for the past week working up interest in a local organization, and will remain here for some time in the interest of the movement.

By this system all individuals, as well as firms, are put on record showing how many places they deal, what amount of credit they obtain, and how they pay each firm with which they have had credit dealings, accordingly they are rated "prompt pay," "fair pay," "slow pay" and "no pay."

Persons who pay one or two merchants in order to use them as a reference to get credit from others, and then neglect to pay them, form the class that is largely responsible for the losses in the business world, it is said.

The aim of this system is to show such persons in their true light and make it necessary to pay cash, thus reducing the loss in extending credit.

"What the trading public should insist upon," said Mr. Henry, "is that their merchants give them a rating, so that when they ask for credit all that is necessary is to refer to the guide."

"There are many people who are not intentionally slow in paying their accounts, but are neglectful, and when they understand that they must be rated they will endeavor to secure the best rating possible, and will be more prompt, instead of allowing their bills to accumulate. The book is now published in the greater portion of the United States, and renewed every two years. In many states every hamlet in the state is organized under the system.

"People moving from one state or county to another are followed by special agents who give them the rating book or bad risks for credit and for what amounts. This Credit Guide places the honest and prompt persons in a position that every merchant can discriminate between those who pay and those who do not. It is therefore, a benefit alike to both debtor and creditor.

"Supplements to the Credit Experience Guide are issued every sixty days in the form of a secretary's report, keeping the rating book constantly up to date.

"Each subscriber is furnished with letters to send to delinquent debtors that he may have on his books, giving them due notice to adjust their accounts, so no one can complain there was an injustice done that one after the book has been distributed."

So far, thirty-five representative business and professional men have given their indorsement and the agency will continue the work of enlisting the interest and cooperation of the merchants until practically every business and professional man in the city is enrolled. A meeting will soon be called, officers elected and the details of the working out of the plan will be taken up.

REBELS TAKE MEXICO CITY A FEW PERTINENT FACTS

Part of Army Rebels and Turns On Madero

DIAZ RELEASED TAKES CHARGE

Other Short Wires About the World in General and Then Some

The federal army rose in revolt in Mexico City today, took possession of the public buildings, shot down federal adherents in the streets, released General Felix Diaz, leader of the Vera Cruz revolt, from prison, and, falling into line with his banner, practically captured the Mexican capital. Francisco Madero, President of the republic, and members of his cabinet, took refuge in the National capital, where they were besieged but, with some loyal troops, at their backs, succeeded in defending the palace from the assaults of the revolutionists. Madero's family has taken refuge in the Japanese legation and to night the President is making a fight desperate in its efforts, against what happens to be enormous odds for restoration for his power. General Diaz, who is the nephew of the deposed President Porfirio Diaz, is now at the head of the majority of the capital troops, including most of the artillery, and is in possession of the arsenal in the city and powder works nearby. Madero is relying on the loyalty of General Blancoqui, who has been summoned from Tulsa, forty miles distant, but Blancoqui has only a thousand men under his command and the rebels are confident of defeating him should he refuse to join the revolt. The day was marked by four separate engagements, the most sanguinary of which took place in front of the National palace, but the most important was that which terminated in the formal surrender of the troops in the artillery barracks.

Attorney General Wickham

might announce that he had reached an agreement with the representatives of the Union and Southern Pacific railroads by which the dissolution will be carried out. The Union Pacific agrees to sell its 1,266,500 shares to the Southern Pacific stock to its own stockholders. The Southern Pacific will receive the same amount regarding the dissolution. The Union Pacific will receive the stock of the Southern Pacific from the Southern Pacific, giving it an extension from Ogden to the Pacific Coast.

Congress has reached their "squeezing" stage of the session.

Important legislation that has accumulated during the last two years must be considered in the work of the next three weeks, and must find its chance at the hands of the appropriation bills will be considered. Active managers of the 60th House who bear the responsibility of "getting things through" consequently are wearing troubled looks and wondering how much actual business can be transacted in the few remaining working days before March 4.

Some light is beginning to be shed by the brief official dispatches which contain almost all the available news upon the military tactics in the Balkan campaign.

Reports of attempts on the part of the Turks to land troops along the coasts of the Black Sea and the Sea of Marmora, which heretofore were based only from unofficial sources, are now officially admitted and it looks as though Enver Bey's mysterious and desperate move, of which there has been some rumors, was an attempt to effect a landing at Charkeui, about thirty miles to the southeast of Rodosto, with the intention of relieving the pressure of the Bulgarians attack on the Bulaire line.

ABOUT COUNTY DIVISION

STATEMENT

- FOURTH: There are now 566 counties in the United States that have less than 8,500 population. The NEW COUNTY will have 8,500 population.
- FIFTH: The total assessed values of Orange county for 1912 amounted to \$6,948,798. The NEW COUNTY will take \$2,747,815 of this amount leaving to the Old County \$4,200,983. The Old County will have left, more assessed values than are now possessed by THIRTY-FOUR other Florida counties. The NEW COUNTY will have more assessed values than are now possessed by EIGHTEEN other Florida counties.
- SIXTH: The total income for the school fund of Orange County for the fiscal year 1911-1912 amounted to \$87,577.56. There were 1,250 pupils in the county during that term. This would make a per capita charge of \$20.51 per pupil. The NEW COUNTY had 1,745 pupils which cost the county \$29,068.06 or \$16.66 per capita. The area to be comprehended in the NEW COUNTY paid in to the school fund the sum of \$31,700.71. There was returned to us \$29,068.56. We paid \$2,242.18 more than was returned to us. The NEW COUNTY will get all it pays in for school or other purposes.
- SEVENTH: The enemies of county division have circulated the report that the NEW COUNTY when created will be a Wet County and the LIGHT TRAFFIC will flourish in all its rottenness and corruption. In order to get straight on the question we wrote to the Attorney General and herewith print his reply and official opinion on this matter of a WET COUNTY.

State of Florida, Office of the Attorney General, Tallahassee, January 28th, 1913.

Mr. Thomas K. Bates, Secretary County Division Committee, Sanford, Florida.

Dear Sir: Yours of the 27th. has been received and noted. MY OPINION is that if two counties are formed from one county which contains both of these counties WOULD CONTINUE TO BE DRY.

Of course elections could be held in either of them after the change was made and this situation changed.

No fair minded man can question the attitude of the North End of Orange county in the matter of selling liquor and running down and convicting those who attempt to barter in the stuff contrary to our laws.

EIGHTH: The report has been printed and circulated that all the New County would be taxed to pay the \$200,000 road bonds voted by the Sanford Special Road and Bridge District. This is not true. The payment of this \$200,000 will be made by the district as outlined in the call for the election and as voted by a four-fifths majority at that call. There will be 450 square miles of territory in the New County and there is only 76 square miles in the road district. The citizens of the 374 square miles in the NEW COUNTY which is outside of the Special Road District will have the use of these brick roads and will not be taxed one cent to assist in building them. The millage for the payment of these bonds will be assessed against the property in this Special Road and Bridge District ONLY and this Special Road District will have to pay its proper portion of the general road fund in addition to taking care of this \$200,000 bond issue. The funds gathered in this district in the ordinary way do not have to be expended in the district unless the county commissioners should elect to do so. The ordinary funds can be spent in any portion of the county as they are now spent, reports to the contrary notwithstanding. As the Sanford Special Road and Bridge District will construct permanent roads, using BRICK as the material, the cost of up-keep and repairs will be reduced to the minimum, thus allowing the major part of the ordinary road funds paid in by the Sanford section to be used in road construction in other parts of the new county.

NINTH: Orange county for the last three years has contributed sums amounting to Seven Thousand Dollars to the Orange County Fair. Four Thousand Dollars of this money is to be returned to the county if the fair should be discontinued. This money will come from the sale of the fair grounds. The NEW COUNTY will see no portion of this yearly contribution to the Orange County Fair and will not have to pay any part of it. The fair grounds have been \$1,000 per year for the past two years.

TENTH: The Tax Assessor has been allowed to work in the county at \$400 per year. This amount will be paid to the NEW COUNTY because the Assessor will be able to handle the business without help.

ELEVENTH: Orange County now employs a Road Superintendent at a salary of \$125 per month and also employ guards to look after and work the county prisoners. The NEW COUNTY will eliminate the road superintendent and save this amount to the tax payers.

TWELFTH: We will not favor the establishing of a Criminal Court in the NEW COUNTY, thus working a great saving to the tax payers each year.

THIRTEENTH: The NEW COUNTY will favor the building of good roads to all parts of the county.

FOURTEENTH: We will favor the conservative, economical conduct of the NEW COUNTY'S business, eliminating all waste effort, surplus salaries, and useless unexpended of the tax payer's money.

FIFTEENTH: We will not favor an increase in property valuations unless improvements be made upon it sufficient to justify such increase. In case property has been under valued we will favor an equitable valuation.

SIXTEENTH: It is contrary to the laws of the State to issue warrants when there are no funds to pay them. We will not favor the issuing of warrants so as to make warrants below par.

SEVENTEENTH: We are in favor of no bonds being issued outside of the Sanford district unless a majority of the voters outside of the Sanford district should so elect.

EIGHTEENTH: When a man presents himself for office from other than the Sanford district and he is competent and capable we will favor his election.

NINETEENTH: We will favor giving the rural schools of the NEW COUNTY as many months of school as the town districts have.

TWENTIETH: We will not favor the creating of any great bonded indebtedness for the purpose of erecting a Courthouse or Jail but will agree to use our influence so as to conserve the resources and available monies of the NEW COUNTY to the very best advantage.

TWENTY-FIRST: We favor the monthly publication of the transactions of the Board of County Commissioners for the NEW COUNTY, for each month in the year. These statements to show the expenditures itemized and the income specified, and published in such way as to be easy of comprehension.

TWENTY-SECOND: We do not favor increase of taxes for the NEW COUNTY and will do all in our power to reduce the rate of assessment rather than to increase it.

After a meeting of our Executive Committee it was decided that in order to supply the constant and ever increasing demand for information as to the dividing of Orange County and the creation of a NEW COUNTY from its northern portion, that it would best serve all purposes to issue a general statement covering the entire question. We have done our best to make every clause of the statement absolutely correct and in harmony and accordance with the views of our Committee of 150 on County Division and with the idea of justice and right as our guide, we respectfully submit the above statement to the citizens within the area to be comprehended in the NEW COUNTY for their information and consideration.

Supreme Court Declares the Law Constitutional

MAY BE TAKEN TO HIGHER COURT

Other Matters of Interest Taking Place in the Land of Lotus Eaters

The following interesting information is from the Orlando Reporter-Star. A telegram from Tallahassee, received Saturday morning, announced that the Supreme Court of Florida, in a decision handed down Saturday, had upheld the constitutionality of the green fruit act passed by the legislature in 1911. The decision was the outgrowth of the S. J. Sligh case. Mr. Sligh, of this city, having been arrested early in the fall for an alleged violation of the green fruit act. The decision sets at rest a mooted point, which has long been a drawback to the enforcement of the law ever since it was enacted. Carl B. Robinson, attorney for Mr. Sligh, was seen this morning immediately after the telegram announcing the Court's decision was received here and asked whether or not the case would be appealed to the federal courts. Mr. Robinson replied that he would be unable to say what his course would be until he had conferred with his client. Mr. Sligh is in Kissimmee for the day. It is understood that if the case is appealed it will go directly to the Supreme Court of the United States. In case it is not appealed the Sligh case will be appealed here for trial before the criminal court. Such trial was begun here in the fall, but was deferred pending the determination of the constitutionality of the law under which he was being tried.
