SOME CHURCHES HAVE BEEN SOUND ASLEEP FOR YEARS; therefore let us not sleep as do others.—1 Thess. 5:6

Only 30 persons lost their lives in farm accidents in Florida last year as compared with 22 the year before. But in addition to those who were killed, there were 2000 injuries resulting from falls, farm machinery, burns, ladders, electricity, tools and various sharp instruments.

A young man driving on Seminole Boulevard was sideswiped by another automobile which fails to stop though he loses his arm. One would think Seminole Boulevard is wide enough for two cars to pass, but such is the magnitude of visual deception that one often thinks he is on the side of the road when in reality he is in the middle.

J. A. Murray writes in the Tampa Tribune that a political free-for-all may be in the offing when the Legislature meets in April. Some of the issues which may see the Governor tangling with political opponents in the House and Senate are new taxes, new State Constitution, white Democratic primary, water conservation, revenue demands of cities and counties, state building program, schools, colleges, hospitals, prisons, cows and chickens, not to mention the State Comptroller's office.

Taking the optimistic view of it, the Florida Supreme Court has ruled, "Some day it will be as rude and ill bred to act the road hog or transgress road manners as it is to eat peas with a knife or lap soup from a spoon." The Supreme Court has spoken and the Supreme Court is the law of the land. But it is funny how some people wouldn't think of eating peas with their knife or lap soup from a spoon, but let them get behind a steering wheel and they instantly display all the manners and mores of the most primitive savage.

England, which has a socialist government, is facing as difficult a problem in solving management labor problems, as the more conservative American government. Millions of Londoners are finding it next to impossible to get anything to eat since truck drivers went out on strike and refused to move groceries. A general strike is threatened which would paralyze the economic life of the whole nation. The answer to such problems is not socialism, communism or fascism, but in the development of a high degree of intelligence and character, coupled with mutual respect and toleration, among all the people.

A prominent Democrat in the House of Representatives demands a congressional investigation to determine the cause of airplane accidents and the "excusable killing of the American people" in them. If such an investigation is made, Congress may discover to its shocked surprise that strikes, slowdowns, absenteeism, and other forms of labor strife have kept airlines from obtaining new equipment and essential repair parts which must first be provided before airplane transportation can be made safe. The best thing congress can do to prevent further loss of life is to get people to go back to work, encourage production.

Remember a few months ago when you couldn't find a pound of butter to save your life and the so-called "liberal" politicians, as well as the CIO and other communist agitators were telling you that if they took the price ceilings off, the butter which you couldn't get anywhere would cost you \$1.50 a pound. Well, they took the price ceilings off in spite of all the people in this country who think they would like to live in Russia but don't dare go there, and the butter came back. Not at \$1.50, not at \$1.00, but at \$1.00 for a while. Now it is down to 75 cents and will settle lower, while dairy interests are about to start an investigation to see if they can find someone to blame it on.

Cities Better Managed

Are our cities better or worse governed than 40 years ago? Luther Gulick, president of the Institute of Public Administration, answered this question at the recent 50th anniversary of the National Municipal League. He cites many gains, but much still remains to be done. One definite gain is that there is far less direct thievery from the public treasury. Better accounting systems are partly responsible. There is less political murder and other forms of violence, and less vote fraud. Corruption in connection with the sale of franchises has been reduced, and the patronage deals are less raw. The fundamental cause of these is the wiser and less partisan attitude of the average city voter.

On the other side are the consequences of a far more complicated scheme of government. Administration needs many more technical experts, and thus runs the risk of becoming bureaucratic. With government operations on a far larger scale there is more chance for rife off and special privilege. A new area for graft is opened by the vast increase of new regulations, many of which call for lawyers to represent the citizen. Finally city boundaries have not changed with the changes of population. Too many cities contain the slums, while the better citizens have moved out to the suburbs.

Still, 40 years ago few would have anticipated the improvements that have come about in city government.

Public Celebrates

It is always interesting to get the viewpoint of public men known, or assumed, to be nonpartisan in politics. When they are truly so, they occupy a position which might be called a sort of political priesthood, from the very fact of their aloofness and disinterestedness. They naturally value their position accordingly.

It is hardly necessary, however, for a statesman or soldier to show irritation, as some have been known to do, because newspaper reporters persist in asking them about public aspirations. Such a suggestion itself is an honor which most men would covet, and any man distinguished in public life has to recognize the facts of the situation.

Newspaper men do not seek and perhaps annoy public men because they want to, but because the very distinction of such notable citizens sets them apart from others in a sort of "noblesse oblige" position that is obligatory on both sides.

The reporter and photographer may seem a sort of nuisance, but they are the necessary means by which man looks and sounds like. They are part of the democratic citizen learns, through his paper, what the public cratic process.

Over 40,000 Workers On Strike In London

LONDON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The ranks of London strikers were swelled today to more than 40,000. The latest recruits to the work stoppage are 2,000 Thames River barge men and thousands of dock workers. The workers are quitting their posts in protest against the use of troops to replace striking truck drivers for the delivery of food.

P-50s IN PACIFIC

TOKYO, Jan. 15 (AP)—Far East Air Force headquarters announced today that four P-50 jet planes made a flight from the Philippines to Okinawa. The four planes made the flight of about 700 miles in one hour and forty minutes, averaging about 430 miles an hour. It was the first long distance Pacific flight by jet planes.

All flowers except roses, she said, should be cut in the cool of the day. Fillers in corsages such as baby's breath are not in the best artistic taste. Flowers should be immersed immediately in water after cutting, she said.

At the conclusion of her informal lecture, she told how much she had enjoyed her stay in Sanford and thanked members of the Garden Club for their splendid cooperation. She cautioned her audience to put the things they had learned to practice and said that she would always have a soft spot in her heart for Sanford.

Mrs. A. W. Epps, president of the Garden Club, thanked Mrs. Ochiltree for her instructional lectures and expressed her appreciation to members and guests for their good attendance. Her aim, she said, was to improve the Garden Center and was sure that in the next year much improvement would be seen.

She also spoke on the dress of the Korean people and showed the audience the various clothes which the Korean women wore.

Miss Miller returned to this country in 1940 after spending 20 years serving as a missionary in Korea and is a native of North Georgia and was a friend of Mrs. C. A. Adams, Mrs. H. M. Goodwin and Mrs. A. K. Rosetter.
