## Closed To Housing; Juvenile Charged Academy Damaged By Fire

The Sanford Naval Academy (SNA) senior school was ordered closed to boarding students today after fire badly damaged the third floor of the building and one student was injured last night.

Deputy State Fire Marshal Ernest B. Wright and Sanford Police Detective Walter Jones announced a 17-year-old juvenile had been arrested at 4:30 a.m. today and charged with arson in the fire.

The youth's arrest ended an intensive probe that began shortly after the fire was brought under control.

Sanford Fire Chief George Harriett said he was notifying Naval Academy officials that his department would not allow housing of summer school students at the First Street facility until "the building meets state fire codes."

The action came 12 hours after a fire broke out in three third floor rooms, causing extensive smoke and water damage to the building.

The students were transported to the naval academy's Junior School at Celery and Mallonville Avenues to be housed overnight. Classes resumed today at the main building, according to Academy Administrator Jesse Harry.

Wright and Jones did not indicate the reason, if any the suspect in the case may have given for setting the blaze. A six-gallon gasoline can was found by investigators on the third floor of the naval academy a short time after the fire was brought under control.

Chief Harriett said he had decided to direct Harry to close the structure to boarding students until the facility can be repaired and brought up to state fire codes.

"I don't know about the use of the building for classes," Harriett said. "Those are daytime activities and the building is open. But there will be no further staying overnight after this."

## Twin Countdowns Tick Toward Apollo-Soyuz Liftoffs

CAPE CANAVERAL (AP) — Astronauts, cosmonauts, spaceships and rockets are ready for the joint U.S.-Soviet space mission that gets underway Tuesday, ending the space race that began 18 years ago with the launching of Sputnik.

Cosmonauts Leonov and Kubasov will take off from Cape Canaveral 7 1/2 hours later at 3:30 p.m. to begin a celestial cruise that will end with the two ships joined together 140 miles above West Germany at 12:15 p.m. Thursday.

Three hours later, a tunnel connecting the

The Soyuz, guided by cosmonauts Alexei A. Leonov and Valeri N. Kubasov, will blast off at 8:20 a.m. EDT from the Baikonur Cosmodrome on the edge of a central Russian desert 1,400 miles southeast of Moscow.

Apollo astronauts Thomas P. Stafford, Vance D. Brand and Donald K. Slayton will take off from Cape Canaveral 7 1/2 hours later at 3:30 p.m. to begin a celestial cruise that will end with the two ships joined together 140 miles above West Germany at 12:15 p.m. Thursday.

Three hours later, a tunnel connecting the

vehicles will open, and American commander Stafford and Soviet commander Leonov will shake hands.

It will be an emotionally charged moment, not only because of its symbolism but because the two men — both veterans of space — have become such close friends during two years of training for this mission. Both believe that moments like this, high in space, can speed detente between Soviets and Americans on earth.

The two commanders spoke by long distance telephone Sunday.

Stafford said Leonov and Kubasov told him "that everything was real fine at the Soviet cosmodrome" and he told the cosmonauts that things were good at the Cape, except for "sweating out" the weather.

Meteorologists say the afternoon thunderstorms that have swept the Cape daily are a matter for concern, but "the amount of thunderstorm activity is expected to decrease by Tuesday."

Chester M. Lee, NASA's program director, held a 2 1/2-hour readiness review Sunday and reported: "We are satisfied we are ready to carry out our part of the Apollo-Soyuz Test Project mission."

From Baikonur the report was the same: "All activities are being carried out according to the time line of the pre-launch flight plan."

President Ford, Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin, other diplomats and James Fletcher, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, plan to watch televised coverage of the launch, which will be broadcast from the Cape Canaveral to the Apollo launch.

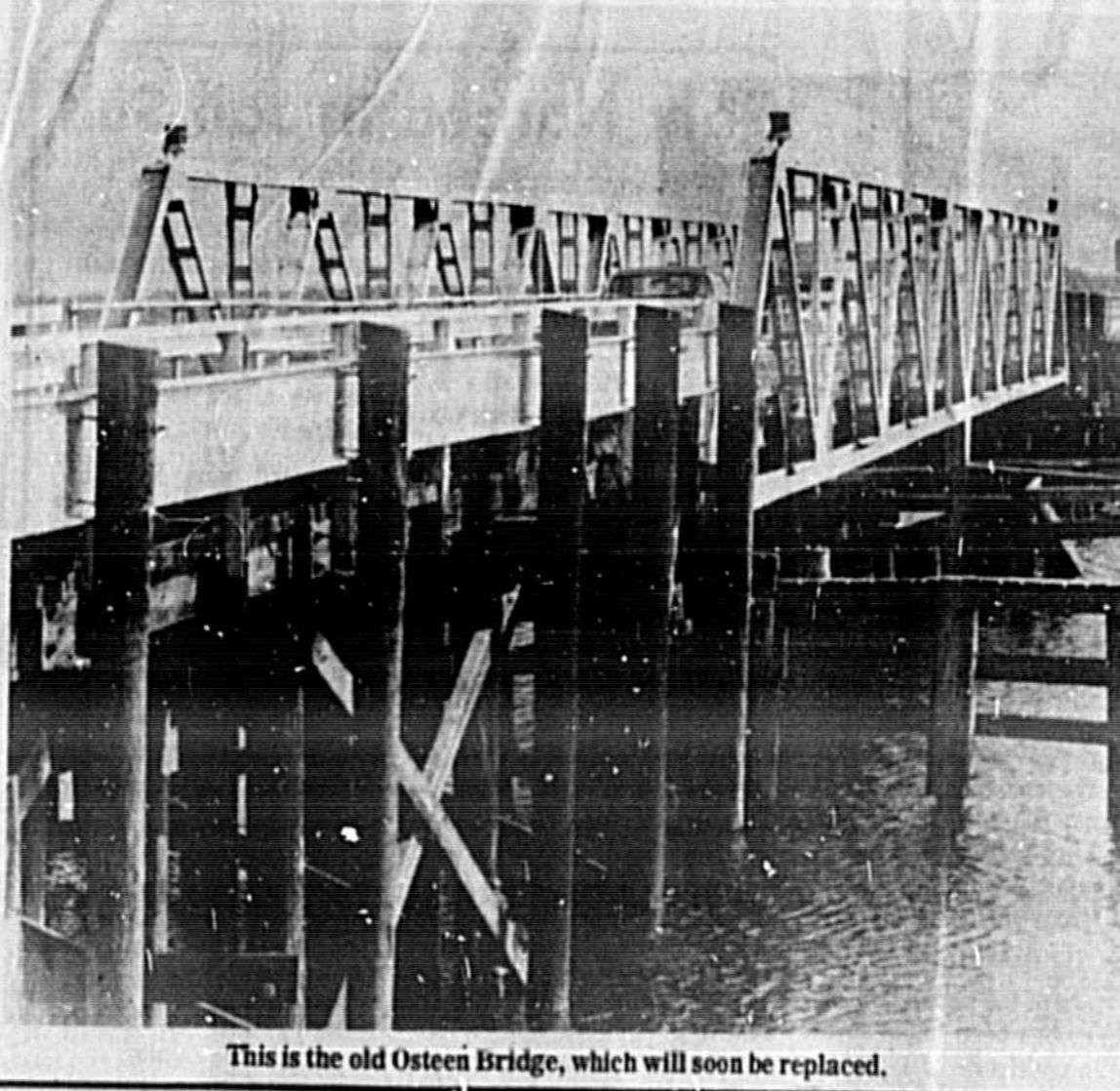
## Knowles Report On Demolitions To Be Studied

The Sanford City Commission will be asked tonight to decide if buildings in the 300 block of South Sanford Avenue will be demolished as part of the city's condemnation program.

The Commission will hear a report from City Manager Warren "Pat" Knowles on the property listed as 301 to 311 Sanford Avenue and owned by Joe Moas.

At the Commission's final meeting in May, Knowles was asked to determine if Moas had been properly notified of public hearings on condemnations of the property and that his time to repair the buildings had expired.

Cost of the demolition would be \$7,000, Knowles indicated. According to city records, three registered lenders giving notice of public hearings, certification of condemnation and time

## Work Is Under Way On Osteen Bridge

Contractors today began replacing the rickety Osteen Bridge with a wider, two-lane concrete structure which will cost in the neighborhood of \$3 million.

Jim Davis, contract coordinator for Hoadley, Duval-Wright of Jacksonville, said his firm has 400 working days in which to span the St. Johns River with the 2,428 foot bridge.

Davis said Millard Murray, a superintendent, today began moving in a drag line — which Davis says is "breaking ground" on the long-awaited project.

The state Department of Transportation (DOT) issued the work order on July 2 for the replacement of the bridge.

Five persons lost their lives in the depths of the St. Johns last October after a truck rammed into a slower moving van on the narrow, wooden bridge.

It was that accident which attracted attention to the antiquated structure. And in February state officials came up with a \$3 million appropriation to replace the bridge.

Davis said the bridge will be constructed of concrete with concrete handrails. He said it will be 24-feet wide, with two lanes.

"Barring any unusual construction problems, we'll be finished within the time limit set by the contract," he added.

Officials of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce lauded the DOT's announcement that they worked more than 18 years to get the Osteen bridge replaced with a structure that meets today's building standards.

Spurred on by the tragic accident last fall, local officials redoubled their efforts to get funds. Then in February, DOT announced the state would allocate the necessary money.

Rescue crews worked three hours to raise the van and free the bodies. Police said six children luckily managed to escape death in the accident.

## Envelope Stuffer Causes Delay Property Tax Value Notices Mailed

Notices were sent today by Seminole County Property Appraiser Terry Goebel, informing the county's 68,000 to 70,000 property owners that their property values have been increased for real estate tax purposes.

The notices were to have been mailed last Friday, but an envelope stuffering machine in Goebel's courthouse office broke down, causing a delay.

The overall tax value of Seminole County lands and buildings rose from \$738 million in the 1974 tax year to \$1.5 billion for the 1975 year.

There may be sprinkling of appraisal reductions, Bill Suber of Goebel's office said, but they will be few.

In a random sampling of homes and commercial enterprises in the county, The Herald today found home values increasing by as little as 15.5 per cent in the Geneva area to as much as 47.5 per cent in Casselberry.

Commercial enterprises, however increased in the sampling from a 140 per cent for the Zayre Shopping Center in Sanford to 1,238.5 per cent for the Interstate Mall in Altamonte Springs. Both facilities were only partially completed for the 1974 tax rolls.

The Altamonte Mall's tax assessment rose from \$3,702,700, much of it vacant land, on the 1974 tax rolls to \$20,558,980 for the 1975 roll. The latest appraisal still does not include the entire developed tract, which had further construction this year.

The Interstate Mall buildings themselves were not included in

the 1974 tax roll when that development was appraised at \$442,570. The 1975 appraisal is \$5,923,100 up 1,238.3 per cent. This mail sold last week for \$7 million.

Zayre Shopping Center, with only the Zayre's Store itself and land, on the 1974 roll was appraised at that time at \$691,460. The new appraisal is \$1,281,000, up 140 per cent.

The random sampling of homes around the county showed: Sanford, Loch Arbor area \$32,710 in 1974, compared to \$41,590 in 1975, an increase of \$8,880 or 27 per cent; Longwood, Longdale area, \$9,390 to \$12,750, an increase of \$3,360, up 35.8 per cent; Altamonte Springs area from \$30,540 to \$40,370, an increase of \$9,830, up 32 per cent; Sanlando Springs \$54,170 to \$53,670, up \$500 or 0.9 per cent; Lake Mary \$18,720 to \$26,270, an increase of \$7,550 or 40 per cent; Oviedo \$22,360 to \$27,850, up \$5,490 or 24.5 per cent; Geneva \$21,020 to \$24,290, up \$3,270 or 15.5 per cent; Casselberry \$27,820 to \$41,030, up \$13,210 or 47.5 per cent; Longwood Devotshire area \$12,140 to \$41,680, up \$29,540 or 29.7 per cent.

Goebel and Suber noted today, in accordance with law, the property appraisers' office can appraise property at full value with improvements only after the appraisal is substantially im-

proved; that is after final inspection permits have been issued. They said the power companies will not connect electricity to a building or dwelling until final certificates are issued.

Because of this law, an owner of property can have a partially free ride on real estate taxes for as much as two years and longer in some cases.

If a house or building is completed in its construction phase after the first of January, only the land is placed on the tax roll for that particular year and the improvements placed on the tax rolls the next year.

As an example, property improved after Jan. 1, 1975 will not be picked up on the tax roll until Jan. 1, 1976 and the tax bill for improvements will not be payable until between November, 1976 and April, 1977. Only the land will be taxed.

Suber said the monitoring committee of the Seminole County League of Civic Associations has reviewed the tax roll and is satisfied with the completed document.

Included with the notices of appraisal increases in today's mail are insertions giving all information on how persons may appeal the assessments and another informing how the tax adjustment board will operate this year.

Goebel's office, later this week, will be sending to the municipalities their total property assessment rolls, along with Goebel's certified millage figures.

Under the law, the cities may levy no more taxes than the certified amount or must hold public hearings. In all cases, Goebel will be recommending to the cities and the county that property taxes be reduced by at least half.
