

Elrod Urges GOP Club To Get Early Start

 Rep. Bob Elrod of Orange County was guest speaker Tuesday night at this month's meeting of the Seminole County Young Republican Club held at the Howell Park Civic Center.

Elrod, who is in the advertising business in Orlando and is past chairman of the Orange County Republican Executive Committee, was elected to the Legislature in the special election held last March.

He told the group that the future belongs to those who prepare for it and urged them to start planning now for the 1964 elections.

He stated that Democratic politics in the state have been on an "every man for himself" basis and said that though the Republicans are building a stronger organization in the state, GOP candidates for the most part still have to depend largely on their own resources, along with individual and club contributions, to finance their campaigns.

In an analysis of Republican victories in Florida, he pointed out that the five counties emerging as Republican strongholds also have had the highest rate of population increase. Only three

of the 18 elected Republicans are native Floridians, most being newcomers to the area as well as to politics.

Elrod advised the club, in preparing for next year's elections, to look for candidates who would not only win but also could do an outstanding job; to run candidates in races where the opposition is weakest; to avoid primaries in order to save best efforts for the election; to get out and sell the candidate, door to door, and to get those on the committee's voter list to the polls.

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The Federation meeting also was attended by D. E. "Bozz" Lukens, national chairman of the Young Republican Clubs, as well as many other party dignitaries.

 The purchase of property measuring 108 feet by 400 feet on Oxford St. at Lake Wildmere in Longwood was announced today by the First Baptist Church of Longwood.

'Mom' Brings Scouts Back Home

(Editor's Note: Although our Casselberry Scouts returned late Sunday afternoon from their camping trip in the Smokies, we still have to bring them home in print via our reporter and their camp "Mom", Mrs. Jane Casselberry.)

After enjoying several days of beautiful weather at our Deep Creek camp, the rains came and with them the mud.

In spite of a few wet sleeping bags the boys were undaunted and enjoyed the challenge of putting up a shelter from a sheet of plastic (20 x 30') with poles and rope.

In this drizzle we visited Cherokee Wonderland, sort of a poor man's Disneyland. There is a gondola lift up the mountain side, a "western" town complete with gun fights, train and stage coach rides. The driver of our stage was a Cherokee Indian and it made me wonder if he would be "for us or agin' us" in the event of a showdown.

On Sunday morning three of the Scouts attended Catholic Mass in Bryson City and the rest of the group attended worship at the Methodist Church.

We packed up Monday morning and headed for Asheville where the group separated temporarily with the Casselberry family going to Blowing Rock for an overnight visit with Leonard's mother, Mrs. Mel Casselberry, and the bus going to the Daniel Boone Council Scout Reservation south of Canton, N. C.

The campers slept in Adirondack Shelters in this remote area and enjoyed a swim in the waters of Lake Allen. When we rejoined the group we found the young naturalists had been busy catching snakes and the inevitable salamanders (this time some orange ones with black polka dots).

There was quite a bit of excitement when Danny Dempsey, who was sleeping in an upper bunk woke up to find he had been joined by a large king snake who had escaped from captivity. On orders from the Scoutmaster the boys reluctantly released the rest of the snakes before boarding the bus Wednesday morning for Chattanooga.

Another passenger was added to the roster when we picked up Steve Kish, a member of the troop who has been spending the summer in North Carolina with his grandmother near Bryson City. Steve has hiked over most of the mountains in the Smokies and on the Blue Ridge Parkway as well as working at "Midget City," a tourist attraction which his family moved from Fern Park to Franklin, N. C.

Harrisburg Bay State Park on Chickamauga Lake was headquarters for Troop 311 which we were sightseeing in Chattanooga. The area was the scene of some of the bloodiest fighting during the Civil War. On Thursday morning the group went up on Lookout Mountain where the "battle above the clouds" took place, riding up on the world's steepest incline Railway.

The view from Point Lookout, a National Military Park, overlooks the city and the part of the Tennessee River known as Moccasin Bend. The park ranger pointed out spots of historic interest and the 20 miles of hiking trails winding around the side of the mountain.

Chattanooga is "cousin country" for Billy and Danny Dempsey and 12 cousins visited our camp that night as well as their grandmother, Mrs. Rita Dempsey Bryant, who had been following their adventures in The Herald to which she is a subscriber.

Mrs. Bryant and several other relatives brought with them a dinner that was one of the high points of the trip for all 31 campers in honor of Danny's Aug. 17 birthday. The tables were laden with fried chicken, potato salad, corn on the cob and cake and other goodies.

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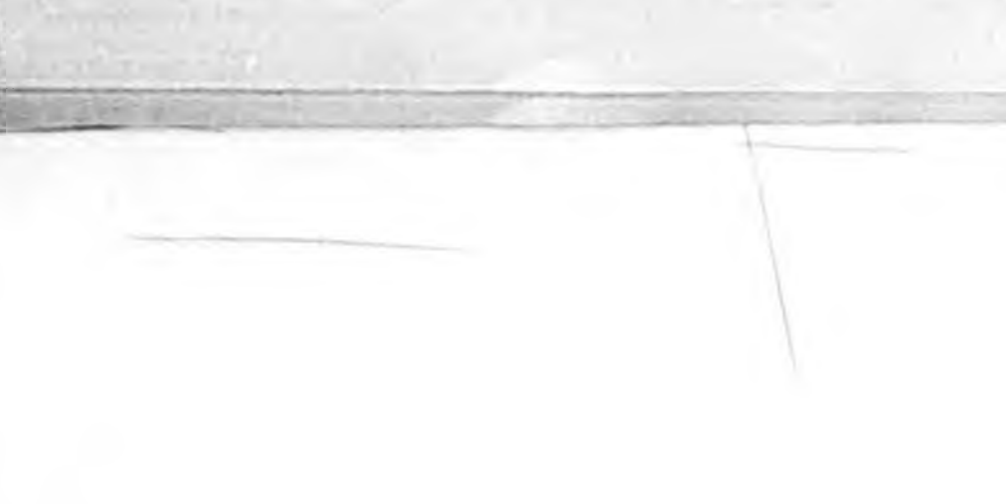

Why Afraid?

Perhaps we all would agree that there is more fear in our lives than is healthy. The thing that we do agree on is how to get rid of it. If we have too much acid, cholesterol, nicotine, or alcohol in our systems we can at least find formulas that will work in eradicating it if we put them into effect, but this is not true with the fear that haunts us. It is very easy for some people to say that we should cast fear aside and be concerned with other things, but fear is one whose work causes him to see the fear-filled eyes so often and the mental, spiritual, moral, and physical paralysis that follows, he knows that it is not so simple as turning his head. I have tried to make a list of the things that people fear and find that it is so long that this column could not accommodate it but there are a few basic fears which continue to plague us time and time again that I will mention. One of them that seems to be so dominate concerns physical health. People are afraid of cancer, heart disease, and a multitude of other things that afflict the body. Many people are afraid concerning their material possessions which can be very real when we know the extent we depend on a complex and complicated economic machine for even our daily living. We fear what we do not understand and how they will change and how they will change us. There is fear that we know that more and more hospital beds are being filled with people who are mentally ill. Are our fears really caused by the complexity of our modern world or are they caused by the lack of having the armor to take care of threats that have been with us always even if in different forms? As we read history we find that there was always much to fear. Americans remember the pioneers who pushed westward with their families and possessions knowing that others had experienced hardships and even death which might be their lot also, but we do not read of the fears that could have been theirs. When future readers compare the pages of history of our day and that of earlier days will they find recorded a difference in attitude as related to fear? We need to realize again that we are not able to face life courageously in any century or under any circumstances without the recognition of God in our lives and in the life of our world. Our world was facing a dark time indeed in 1939. Many of us can remember the somber headlines as Hitler marched across much of the free world of that day. We did not know what to expect from day to day and for those who lived in lands across the sea by the thousands of miles of water, King George VI gave one of his most memorable addresses in his Christmas broadcast in that year. Part of it was a quotation from Louise Haskins which said, "I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: 'Give me a light, that I may tread safely into the unknown!' And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way.'"

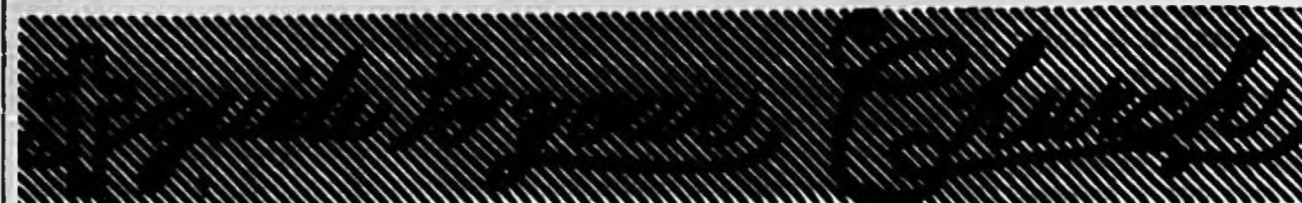

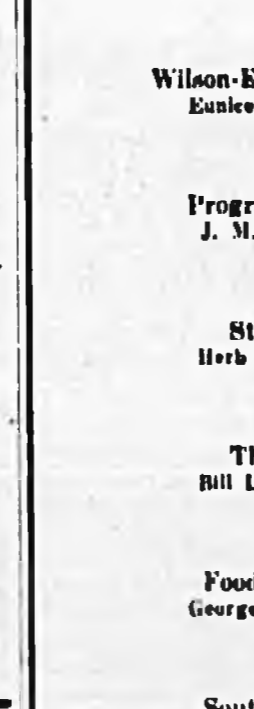

Road Board Pact With U. S. To Speed Up Funds

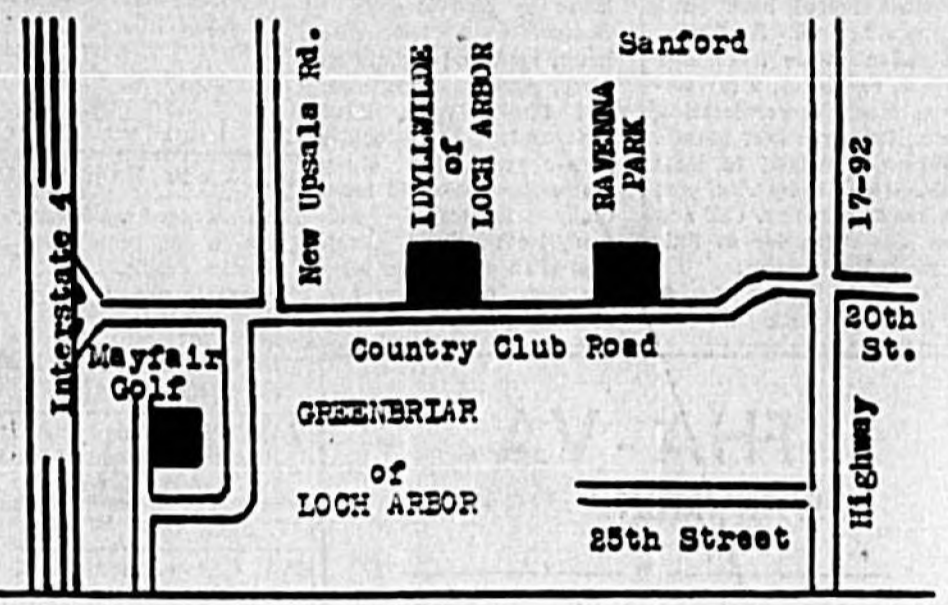
TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The Road Board set in motion today an agreement with the U. S. Bureau of Roads that will enable the state to get its money on federal-state projects up to a year faster than before.
Comptroller Richard Judy said approval of the program would result in an immediate payment of about \$15 million in back payments.
In the past, the federal government has audited each payment made by the state on highway projects before its portion of the costs was sent to the state. For instance, expenditures by the state for rights-of-way were checked closely by federal auditors before payment was made.
The result was a delay of from six months to one year in receipts of the federal government's portion of project costs.
By making certain changes in the internal auditing and financial set-up of the big highway department, the agency will now be able to bill the federal bureau monthly for payments without the necessity for lengthy audits.
Effective date of the plan was set for Sept. 1, and Judy said Florida will be the first state in the nation to operate under the new program.

3 Convicts Get Additional Time

MIAMI (UPI) - Three convicts were sentenced to additional time Wednesday for conspiracy in the 424,000 burglary of an armored car service vault in Tampa Dec. 27, 1960.
Federal Judge Bryan Simpson sentenced Joseph G. San Fratello, 46, to an additional 10 years, and Joseph Lino Alvarez, 36, and Hubert Vernon Hardin, 45, were each given an additional five years—but the sentences will run concurrently with the terms Hardin and Alvarez are already serving.
