

A big boost for the entire Central Florida area, as well as for Seminole County, came this week with the announcement of Sept. 3 as the groundbreaking date for Girls' Town in North Orlando.

Initial plans call for the design and building of the residence-administration hall with subsequent addition of a dormitory wing and construction of a student center to include an infirmary and supply center. Added later will be an auditorium, cottages for the older girls, elementary and high school, swiming pool and gym, vocational school and crafts, chapel, religious building, staff housing, directors residence and the play area.

The educational program, in addition to state-required academic curriculum, will offer a wide choice of cultural and practical elective courses. Girls will attend public schools in the area until the elementary and high school building is completed.

Exceptionally capable and talented students will receive future aid upon completion of a high school level education. A job placement bureau will help place girls in gainful positions and those having high scholastic aptitude will be granted scholarships to leading colleges and universities.

Long range plans for Girls' Town will include expansion of facilities to give special care for the mentally retarded, brain injured and emotionally disturbed.

Any needy and deserving girl, regardless of race or religion, will be eligible for enrollment at Girls' Town,


