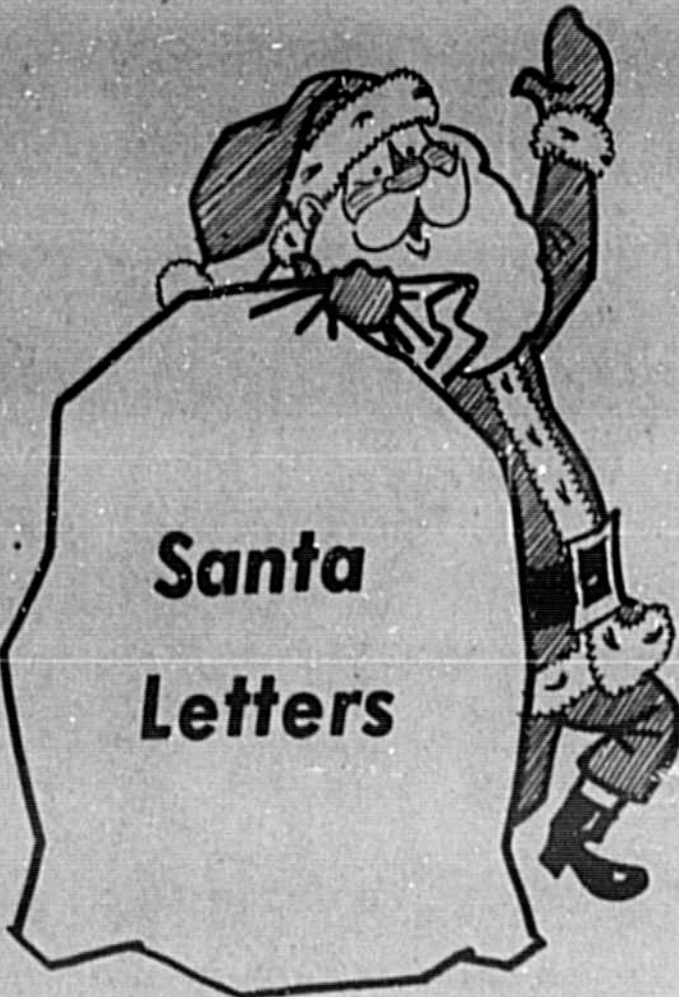

Condo Associations Get Help

NEW YORK (AP)—As a consequence of the condominium concept, in which a resident owns his particular unit and shares in common areas, a form of government called the community association is developing rapidly.

It really isn't new. In 1811, residents of New York formed an association in Gramercy Park. But its growth in the past decade exceeds that of the previous century.

An association sets regulations, standards, fees — call them taxes — just as any other local government. It decides on improvements and architectural changes. It attempts to resolve disputes, as other governments do.

And, like other developing concepts it is often entangled in confusion, uncertainty and even scandal. Its officers and directors, being amateurs, sometimes don't know what they're doing. Insurers and accountants and lawyers sometimes don't know how to serve.

In more than one instance the directors decided to close the swimming pool during evenings in order to save electricity, and were sued by members who claimed they were deprived of rights they had paid for.

When a thief hacks away your door, who is responsible for replacing it? Your insurer might agree he is responsible for the inside of the door but insist the condo's insurer of common properties must pay for the outside.

Where does your property, and therefore your responsibility, end? At the rear of the paint? Or does it extend midway into the concrete or plaster? How should the accountants handle depreciation?

Newly formed by builders, lenders and associations, the Community Associations Institute, hopes to come up with some answers. Its goal is to keep managements informed and educated about planning, maintenance and management.

Quite often, the first problem encountered by the community association concerns the transfer of ownership.

It comes about this way:

An automatic community association is created by a real estate developer of a condo, planned unit development or similar venture. The bylaws are essentially part of the developer's sales package.

As homes in the venture are sold, however, the developer's interest in the automatic community association diminishes and participation by the individual unit owners increases.

Governing power for the community thus is transferred from the developer to the home owners. The time span for this transfer of power is governed by the original community association's bylaws.

One problem, however, is that some builders just can't let go of their creation. Some are slow to relinquish control, others retain common facilities and lease them to the association, more tie up the association in long-term contracts.

While the institute, formed with the aid of builders, lenders and owners, hasn't yet adopted a position on when the turnover of control should be completed, James Dowden, its executive vice president, believes it soon might.

In the simplest situations, he believes builders "should be turning over control when their project is 50 per cent sold, and be out by 75-80 per cent." The institute, he said, might consider adopting such a policy.

Dowden, 31, hopes to develop the Washington-based institute swiftly as "an independent, nonprofit, research and educational organization." The need, he believes, is great and growing.

In 1963, he notes, there were about 445 community associations. Now, he estimates, there are "something in excess of 20,000." At least five million homeowners and eight million to 10 million people are involved, along with property valued at \$2 billion.

And Dowden refers to a government estimate that 50 per cent of Americans will live in condominiums by 1980.

ORLANDO — Since he began his professional boxing career in July of 1970, when he was stopped in three rounds, Sanford's Perez has spent the past four and one-half years searching for success. Tuesday night at the Orlando Sports Stadium his search ended when Perez proved he can defeat "the good ones." For at 1:57 of the eighth round Referee David Hanlon stepped between the "Sanford Slugger" and his highly touted opponent, Sam "Candy" Barr, and declared Perez the winner of one of the most brutal fights ever held in Orlando.

The Candymen continued his sharp shooting in the second as he peppered Perez with thudding left jabs and kept stepping into the local's looping punches with short shots to the face and body.

The third through the seventh had the crowd on its feet as both men were hurt time and again. Barr used his height advantage to good use as he threw a chopping right hand that caught Perez coming in. Perez, though staggered and hurt, would wade right in with smashing rights and lefts as the tide of battle kept shifting with almost every punch.

For Watkins it was only the second time anyone had forced him to go the full distance in eight pro outings. And the first time he had ever been cut in a fight.

The laceration occurred in the fifth round when Sears, who did most of his leading with his head, butted "The Termites" over the left eye splitting it. 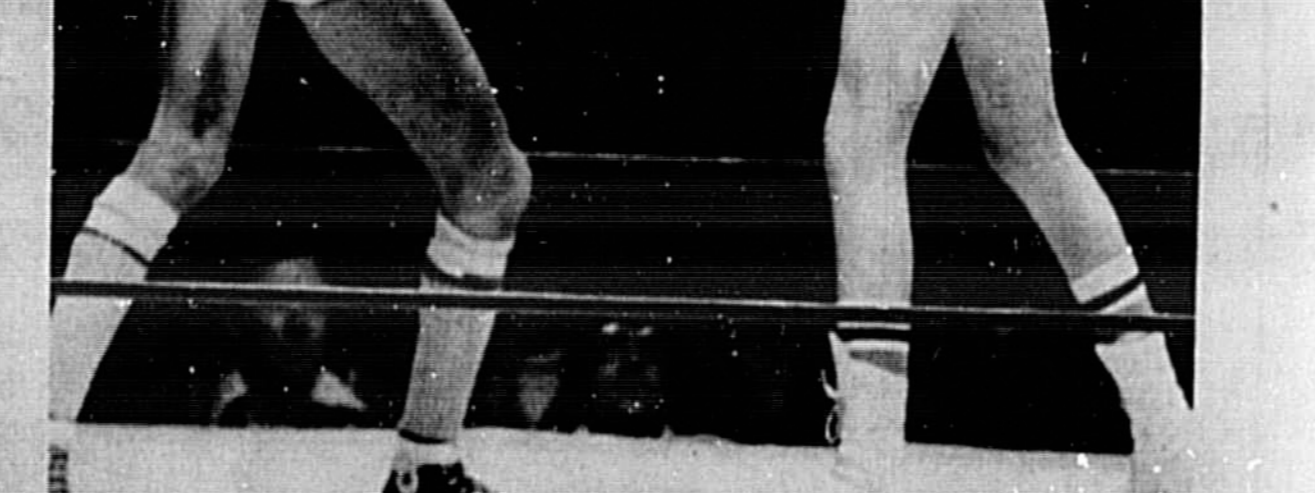
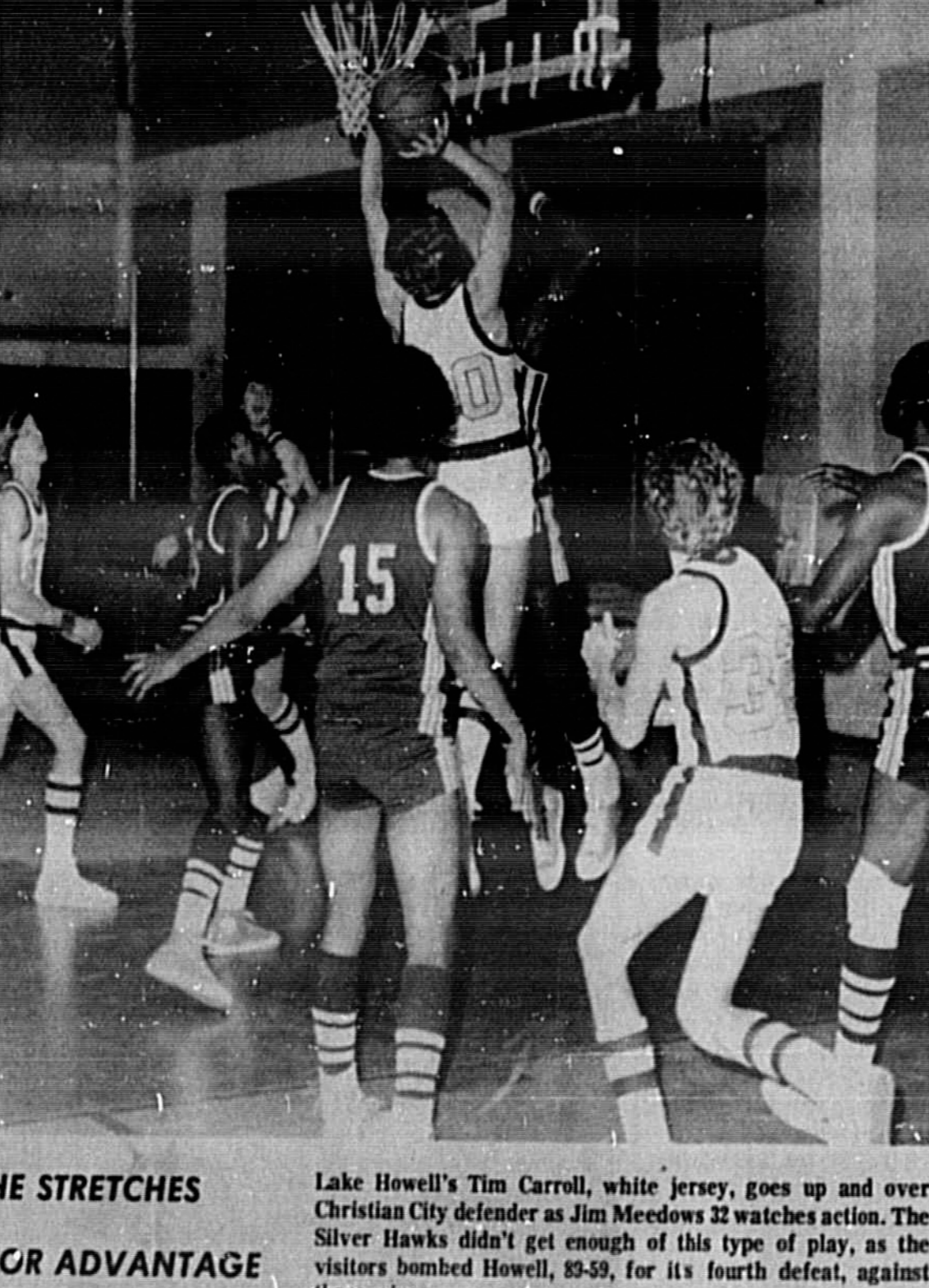

 One story he didn't tell is too good. It might make his next book, Sammy was in London, at while it is delightful and witty and charming and readable and

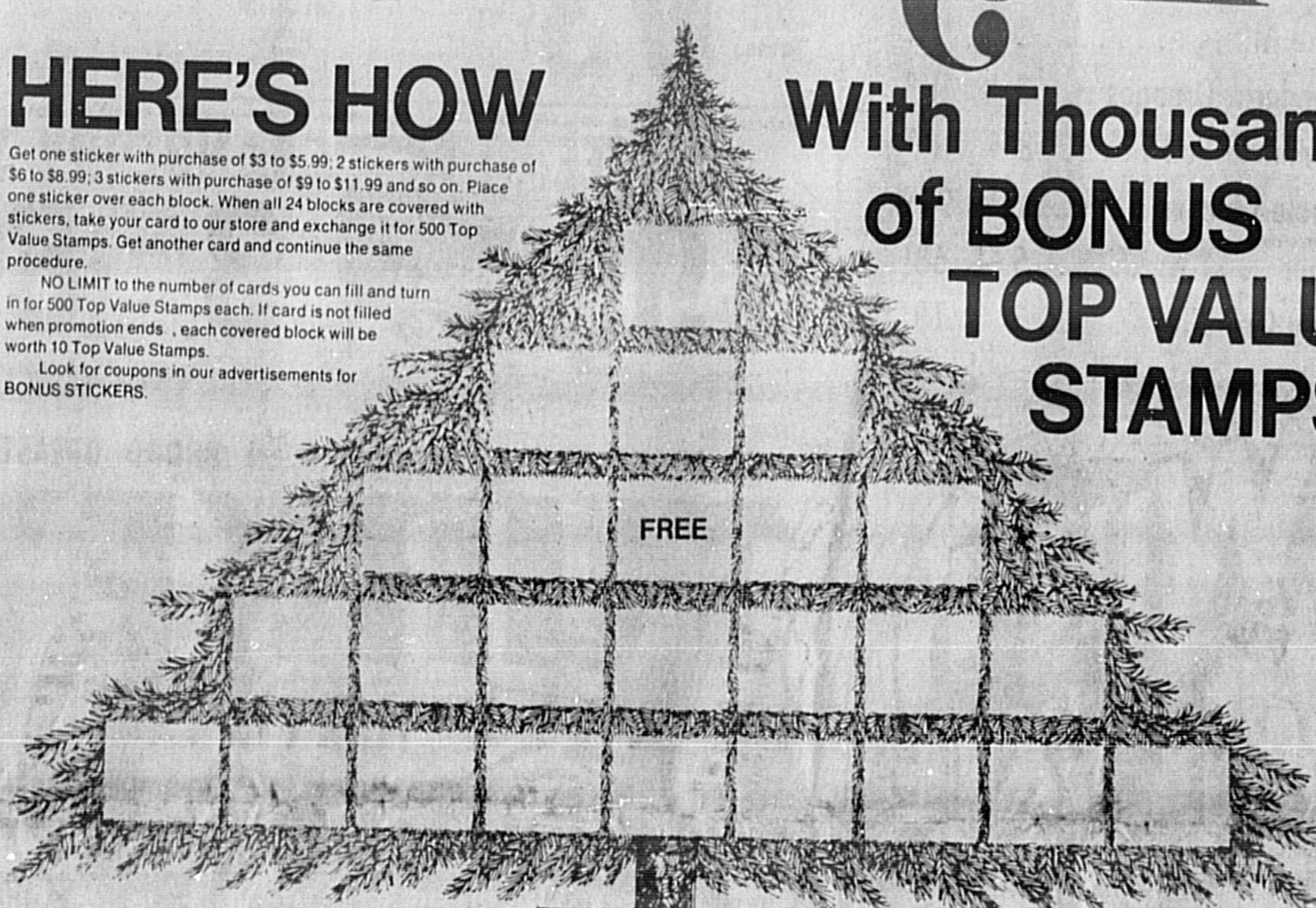

DR. L. E. LAMB
 Question Vitamins Role In Pregnancy

DEAR DR. LAMB — I have read your column on Adelle Davis and know your basic attitude toward her nutritional viewpoint. However, I would like to ask you about one of her specific points. She has claimed that large doses of both vitamin E and folic acid can prevent miscarriages in a woman who is deficient in either of these vitamins. Since I have had two miscarriages (as well as two normal deliveries), I would like to know: 1) Is there any medical evidence to support her point? 2) Could taking large doses of these vitamins do any harm to the fetus?
 DEAR READER — There is no medical evidence whatsoever that increased amounts of vitamin E improve human reproduction, that specifically prevents miscarriages. It is true that will prevent this problem in rats and some animals with different metabolic systems than man. There are NO CASES on record of miscarriages in women caused by vitamin E deficiency.
 Folic acid deficiencies might cause problems in development since it is essential to cell division and growth. The requirements are slightly increased during pregnancy. Large doses of vitamin E are not likely to cause any harm to the fetus. It is unlikely that large excess amounts will even be absorbed from the digestive tract. While vitamin E deficiency is rare, except in premature infants, there is no evidence of vitamin E toxicity either.
 Folic acid is another matter. Because of the complexities of anemia that can develop during pregnancy, I would not advise taking large doses of folic acid without your doctor's approval. This could mask more important changes that he would need to know about to give you proper treatment.
 DEAR DR. LAMB — I am a woman of 55 and my problem is my eyes. The eyelid is drooping over my eye. It now covers the eyelash, and I am afraid soon it will cover my vision. What causes it to do that and can you tell me what I can do about it?
 DEAR READER — It depends a lot on what you mean. The upper eyelid is held up by some tiny muscles attached to the lid under the skin. When they are weak the lid falls. This is usually a sign of medical problem and would require careful tests to determine the real problem.
 An eyelid can swell from the accumulation of fluid. This can be on one side as an allergic reaction or involve both eyes, as in swelling with kidney disease.
 I suspect what you mean is that the skin above the eyelid has increased in amount so that you have an excessively large bag hanging down over the upper lid. This is common in varying degrees as you get older. It is related to overstretched elastic fibers. A plastic surgeon who specializes in cosmetic surgery can simply cut away the excess skin and the tiny scar line rests behind the groove above the eye and is unnoticeable. It is a simple procedure for the upper eyelid.

Cooking, Imbibing Books Popular This Year

If there's a bill or check under the Christmas tree for you, you may be spending it on new books on cooking and/or imbibing. Which ones will please you? Here are a dozen of this year's offerings for your consideration. It's appropriate these days that the list should start with a book devoted to the wild-plant provider of America's indigenous inhabitants.

"American Indian Food and Lore" by Carolyn Niehammer (Collier Books, \$4.95). The author is a Southwestern journalist who has done thorough research in field and kitchen on about 50 wild plants — from cactus to parula — used by Indian tribes in Arizona and New Mexico; many of the plants grow in other parts of the country. Along with botanical material and lore there are recipes from Indian women who hark back to traditional In-

dian ways, old and new, of using the plants for food but for the most part bolster them with ingredients from supermarket shelves.

ANECDOTAL "Beard on Food" by James Beard (Knopf, \$10). A generous assembly of the newspaper columns that the author says "best reflect my beliefs, my pleasures, my memories and occasionally my prejudices." Entertaining, informative and interlarded with recipes, the

collection demonstrates why Jim Beard has had such a benevolent influence on our food scene. *Save! Fore! Bravo!* Beard!

AUTOBIOGRAPHICAL "I Cook As I Please" by Nika Hazeltin (Grosset & Dunlap, \$10). Honest and witty, this book entertains and, each chapter includes recipes. Whether the author is writing about cooking for two or a number of guests, providing amusement for a party, cooking

in kitchens near or far or using recipes to cope with moods and dilemmas, she is both down-to-earth and imaginative — and fun.

CHINESE "Chinese Cooking for Beginners" by Alice Schryver (Dodd Mead, \$4.95). An introduction to the food that Americans enjoy so much. The author, tutored by Chinese friends, has outlined the basic ingredients and techniques of Chinese cooking and her tested recipes are practical

and delicious.

FINNISH "Natural Cooking the Finnish Way" by Ulla Kakonen (Quadrangle, \$8.95). Because there are few English-language books entirely devoted to the food of Finland this one is appealing. By a young Finnish journalist living in New York, it gives recipes for the usual categories of dishes. Gluten flour, raw sugar and sea salt are used in some of them, but it's not necessary to go to "natural food

stores" for the chief ingredients called for.

FRENCH "Simple French Food" by Richard Olney (Atheneum, \$10). Richard Olney's concern with truly good food and his advocacy of it as one of life's great pleasures, his profound knowledge of his subject and his distinguished style of writing — a fascinating combination of elegance and informality — make the publication of this, his second book.

Easy to assemble and the main preparation may be done ahead.

1 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 cup orange juice
1 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine
18-ounce can vacuum-packed sweet potatoes (whole and pieces)
3 bananas

In a 1-quart saucepan stir together the sugar, cornstarch, salt and cinnamon; gradually stir in orange juice, keeping smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened and boiling. Off heat, stir in butter. Lift potatoes from can and arrange in a single layer over bottom of a shallow 1 1/2-quart baking dish, cutting large pieces in half if necessary. Pour sauce over potatoes. (If prepared ahead, cover with foil and set aside.)

Grandmother's Breadmaking Tips

Our grandmothers grew and dried hops and mixed them with cornmeal and flour to make yeast. The mixture formed into soap-size bars and dried slowly in a warm oven. On the eve of baking day, they made boiled potatoes for dinner. They saved the potato water to mix with the dried yeast bar, added a little flour and put this mixture called a sponge in a warm place for the night.

In the morning, they separated the mixture. Some dough was used for dinner rolls and bread. Others were used to make various sweet bread recipes. Young bakers have modern gricers at walking distance and prepackaged yeast and flour at their fingertips.

Unlike so many of our grandmothers, they are willing to share with others the simple precautions they have found which will insure the quality of their efforts.

1. Four large eggs constitute a full cup. Four medium eggs constitute three-fourths cup. If a recipe calls for eggs but does not specify their size, use large eggs. The extra yolk adds to the pretty golden color so much desired in quality baking.

2. Buy only the best ingredients. If a recipe calls for butter, use butter. Do not substitute.

3. Avoid metal utensils. Wooden spoons and wooden bowls (if you're lucky enough to have these treasured items) make the difference between a good batter and a superb one.

4. Use a glass measuring cup for liquids and a dry measure (one which you can level) for dry ingredients.

Modern bread bakers claim that a key kitchen with low ceilings, few doorways and no drafts or children breasting their way through further their chances to produce a bread equal to their grandmothers'. And even though they use modern methods, they have not forgotten the authentic specialties of their grand-

Plum Pudding—A Longstanding Christmas Tradition

One Thanksgiving was over, and not until then, it was time to start thinking about Christmas. And one of the first things to consider was the plum pudding. You don't buy them in tins all ready to be opened and warmed up 60 years ago. You made your own and you made it the latter part of November so it would have about a month to ripen and acquire that delicious flavor. Plum pudding originated in England and was first called plum porridge. This was that famous dish which the Man in the Moon went to the south and burnt his mouth on after tumbling down from the sky on his way to Norwich. The porridge was cold at the time of that particular episode, and the world is full of people who keep right on burning their mouths on a little cold plum porridge, but actually it was usually served hot for Christmas dinner and was made by boiling mutton or beef in broth thickened with brown bread and seasoned with spices, raisins and currants. Later on it was made of flour and suet, with eggs, spices, raisins, currants and candied orange peel added, and the whole boiled in a cloth and served in a dish with blazing brandy. This had progressed far enough so that 60 years ago the pudding was usually steamed, but first it had to be put together and this was no small matter. Earlier in the fall Mamma had made candied orange peel, lemon peel and citron and stored it away in glass jars to be ready for the holiday season. But before it could be used it had to be cut up into tiny pieces, for citron was usually just cut in half for preserving and the
