

Hyacinths Could Help Pollution Control Fight

Herald Staff Writer

Seminole County pollution control officials are excited over a biochemist's report that says the common water hyacinth can suck pollutants from a city's drinking water and provide fuel to

Once thought to be only a clogger of waterways and one of the south's most beautiful nuisances'

"We can cycle our own wastes with water hyacinths," William Wolverton of the National Space Technology Laboratory said.

He began looking into ways to use the hyacinth's useful properties about the same time most states searched for ways to kill the vegetation, which spreads like wildfire, clogging waterways and irritating fishermen.

Law enforcement agencies over Seminole County today were searching for three men who robbed a Casselberry store Tuesday night and persons who took items valued at more than \$5,700 in Tuesday burglaries and thefts.

Casselberry police said three stocking-masked men, one brandishing a sawed-off shotgun, robbed the TG&Y store in Casselberry Square about 7 p.m. and escaped with an undetermined amount of cash. Manager Don Boylan told investigators the black males

entered the store and one pulled the shotgun from his boot and ordered Boylan to hand over cash, checks and contents of the store's safe in a rear office. The other suspects herded employes and customers together

and forced them to lay on the floor while a cash register was Police said a small red sports car was reported seen leaving the scene at a high rate of speed following the robbery.

Sanford police said today that business machines valued at \$1,850 were taken by burglars who forced open a sliding glass door at the lakefront civic center offices of the city recreation department, Sanford Avenue and Seminole Boulevard. Department head Jim Jernigan said two electric typewriters and a calculator were taken from the offices.

Sheriff's deputies said items valued at \$1,509 were reported taken in a burglary at a vacant house at Route 2, Box 523B, Maitland. Robert Nason told investigators a citizens band radio, pecket calculator, two cameras, a lady's watch, two rings and \$325 in checks were missing.



Marijuana Trial Continues.

Florida Man Convicted

COLUMBIA, S. C. (AP) - Prosecution testimony was expected to end today in the trial of nine men charged with a massive marijuana smuggling operation. Cross-examined Tuesday during his second day on the stand was Bernado Escobedo of Colombia, South America. He admitted piloting a four-engine plane which

was seized by waiting federal agents when it landed last June 23 at the Chester County Airport. The nine are charged with attempting to smuggle almost 15,000 pounds of marijuana into the United

Escobedo, an unindicted conspirator in the alleged smuggling conspiracy, said his decision to take part in the

operation has been "a blot on my soul." Clemency Program Failing?

LOS ANGELES (AP) - President Ford's clemency program for Vietnam-era draft resisters and deserters has attracted few participants because it offers few benefits to offset its abuses, several civil rights lawyers say. The American Civil Liberties Union, which favors unconditional amnesty, said it plans to file suit in U.S. District Court in Washington on Thursday to have the military section of the program declared unconstitutional. "We don't feel that the amnesty program offers anything that wasn't previously available, and in many cases it offers less," Scott J. Tepper, a volunteer ACLU attorney and military law specialist, said Tuesday. More than 100,000 men are eligible for the amnesty program but only about 5 per cent have applied to take advantage of it with the eligibility period more than half

Judge Wants Answer Today

BOSTON (AP) - The Boston School Committee must answer before a federal judge today why it defied his orders to approve a plan furthering desegregation of the city's public schools. The five committee members have been ordered to appear "in person" before U.S. District Court Judge W. Arthur Garrity Jr., who ordered the original busing plan which has produced so much racial turmeil in Boston. It would be the first official appearance of the committee before the judge, who had ruled that the board discriminated against black children and instituted a desegregation plan calling for the busing of 18,000 of the city's 87,000 public school pupils.

nation's largest steel producer justify an 8 per cent price increase that shows signs of spreading through the industry and may ripple across other segments of the nation's troubled economy. Under the President's order, the Council on Wage and Price Stability demanded an immediate explanation Tuesday of the price increase being put into effect today by the United States Steel Co. Within 24 hours of the industry leader's priceboosting announcement, CF&I Steel Corp., the nation's 13th largest

producer, said it also was hiking prices up to 8 per cent. As Ford set the price battle in motion, Treasury Secretary William E. Simon upped the administration's estimate for unemployment next year and warned that the recession will deepen into the spring of next year.

Simon told the Senate Budget Committee that unemployment, now 6.5 per cent, will rise to about 7.5 per cent next year before it turns around. Previously he said it would reach 7 per cent, but indicated then he wouldn't be surprised if it went higher.

He also cautioned against massive government spending to ease recessionary pressures. Simon said a government spending spree merely would touchoff more inflation, which he said is the prime cause of recession.

Ford's criticism of U.S. Steel's price increases recalled President John F. Kennedy's battle with the industry in 1962. Kennedy publicly denounced U.S. Steel and seven other companies for increases and they subsequently withdrew them.

U.S. Steel said Monday it was increasing prices an average of & per cent on two-thirds of its products. The increases primarily will affect the construction, rail and oil industries.

A company spokesman argued the increases were necessary because profits were held down by price controls in recent years. U.S. Steel's profits of \$463.4 million in the first nine months of 1974 were higher than in any 12-month period in the company's

WASHINGTON (AP) - In the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, where race and sex discrimination is a daily concern, some staffers spied "sexploitation" when two of Santa's helpers showed up this year strolling the corridors in scanty costumes. A meeting was called to hear out the offended staffers Tuesday and Santa himself was put on trial, as one participant put it. The verdict after a tumultuous hour-long

session was not guilty. The Santa was Russell M. Roberts HEW's freedom of information officer, who for the last seven years has donated his time to direct the charitable HEW Christmas

Shaking his money can in the department's corridors, he helps collect some \$1,800 a year and mounds of toys, clothing and canned food for needy families in Washington's slums.

This season two attractive young HEW employes, Julie Frasner and Linda Hudock, volunteered to help. Roberts shelled \$56.30 out of his own pocket for the costumes they selected: miniskirt-length red suits with white trim and red leotards to match.

HEW has a large contingent of hard-core femininsts and the wrath of liberated womanhood soon descended on Roberts. There were at least 15 complaints from the department's 130,000 employes. "They felt I was using scantily clad women to entice

The department's Federal Women's Program demanded that the girls cover up, because miniskirt suits degraded all female workers and reduced their status to the level of "chicks."

SALT Accord Worth The Risk

President Ford at his recent news conference stood firmly by his conviction that the Vladivostok summit has produced a major breakthrough toward ending the arms race between the United States of America and the Soviet Union. He makes a compelling case that it has, but it is also apparent that the agreement to place a numerical ceiling on the number of missiles and bombers in our respective nuclear arsenals does not mean an end to competition in weapons technology.

The breakthrough is that Mr. Ford and Soviet Leader Leonid Brezhnev have found a way perhaps the only way - to forestall an open-ended arms race which would see both of the superpowers investing more and more in the deployment of an unlimited number of nuclear missiles. If the principles laid down at Vladivostok can be incorporated into an arms limitation treaty, neither side would look beyond a force of 2,400 strategic vehicles - missiles or bombers - and would outfit no more than 1,320 missiles with multiple

The limitations of such an agreement are History never repeats itself obvious, and Mr. Ford concedes the possibility that the United States would have to develop a family of larger missiles at some point in the future to offset the great "throw-weight" of large missiles now in the Soviet arsenal. However, he is convinced that the Soviet Union is committed to the principle that both sides would seek only to achieve and maintain "equality" in the total strength that their array of nuclear delivery systems would represent.

Mr. Ford was not questioned by newsmen on the matter of how one side would verify that the other was abiding by the terms of the proposed SALT II agreement. However, he expressed his doubt of charges that the Russians have violated the SALT I agreements, and appears hopeful that the issue of verification can be ironed out satisfactorily at the SALT II negotiations resuming next month in Geneva.

The President clearly was impressed by Mr. Brezhnev's statement at Vladivostok that the two leaders have an obligation to bring the nuclear arms race under control. History teaches us to be wary of personal assurances of any kind by Soviet leaders. However, as far as obligations are concerned, if there is any sign of willingness by the Russians to negotiate seriously and fairly on the issue of arms control, any American president is obliged to test that willingness. Mr. Ford is doing so as other U.S. presidents have in the past.

A ceiling on numbers of missiles and strategic combers will not end our worries about nuclear deterrence. It will leave us in a "race" involving weapons research and development within the limitations of that ceiling. It will entail some gambling on Soviet sincerity. However, considering the alternative of an unlimited arms race, SALT II could become the significant "breakthrough" that Mr. Ford sees.

The surplus pills have disappeared into the distribution system and have wound up in the black market. Yet the pharmaceutical houses, for the sake of the almighty dollar, have gone ahead producing more narcotic pills than could possibly be used for legitimate medical

Now these firms claim there is a shortage of medical opium. They say India, which supplies legal opium gum, has had a bad crop year. More is urgently needed, according to the industry, to produce pain-killing morphine and codeine.

The White House crowd, always quick to hear the anguished cries of corporate behemoths, has responded by cutting loose 60 per cent of the opium in the nation's strategic stockpile.

WASHINGTON - (NEA) - White House aides are misleading President Ford and all of us by not making clear that any realistic solutions to our energy problems will end up costing taxpayers between \$100 billion and \$200 billion over the next decade. The money will be spent on direct subsidies, tax favors, research and development, demonstration projects, government-approved price increases and special privileges as payoffs for special risks. These costs will be open, direct and out of the







Recapture Small Airport

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) - South Vietnamese forces recaptured a small airstrip 60 miles north of Saigon today less than 24 hours after it was lost but gave up two other positions in Phuoc Long province, the Saigon military command announced. The command said its forces drove North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops off the airstrip just outside Don Luan, a district town. The Communists hit the town with 50 mortar shells, but there were no casualties, the command said. Meanwhile, heavy fire forced about 70 government militia troops to retreat mc. Greported. The government also reported South Vietnamese losses in the 13-day-old Communist offensive had risen to 4,970 men, including 877 killed, 3,360 wounded and

Raiders Enter Lebanon

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Israeli and Arab raiders crisscrossed the Lebanese border early today. The Israeli command said its troops blew up six houses used by Arab terrorists in a village in southern Lebanon and captured two villagers suspected of collaborating with terrorists. The Lebanese government said a child was critically injured in the attack, and four villagers were kidnaped. The Israeli command said less than three hours later a band of Arabs slipped past guards at the Hanita kibbutz threw half a dozen grenades at a house and escaped back into Lebanon. No casualties were reported.

One problem, however, is that some builders just can't let go of

their creation. Some are slow to relinquish control, others retain common facilities and lease them to the association, more tie up the association in long-term contracts. While the institute, formed with the aid of builders, lenders and owners, hasn't yet adopted a position on when the turnover of control should be completed, James Dowden, its executive vice

president, believes it soon might. In the simplest situations, he believes builders "should be turning over control when their project is 50 per cent sold, and be out by 75-80 per cent." The institute, he said, might consider adopting such a policy.

Dowden, 31, hopes to develop the Washington-based institute swiftly as "an independent, nonprofit, research and educational organization." The need, he believes, is great and growing.

In 1962, he notes, there were about-545 community associations. Now, he estimates, there are "something in excess of 20,000." At least five million homeowners and eight million to 10 million people are involved, along with property valued at \$2 billion. And Dowden refers to a government estimate that 50 per cent of Americans will live in condominiums by 1980.



BEEF BIRYANI

(This classic and popular dish - essentially a casserole of rice ombined with meat, chicken. fish or vegetables — has many variations. This version is put together in layers consisting of white rice, braised beef, saffron rice, nuts and raisins, and opped with yogurt.)

2 tablespoons salad oil 112 pounds stewing beef, cut large onion, chopped teaspoon cumin seed

1/2 teaspoon gartic powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1-16 teaspoon cayenne
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
5 cardamon pods, crushed
2 tablespoons chopped fresh

cup raisins 1 cup plain yegurt Heat oil in large skillet. Add beef and onion, brown lightly, turning often. Over low heat, stir in cumin, garlic, salt, cayenne, ginger, cardamon and mint. (Add a tablespoon of water if juices do not drain rom meat.) Cover tightly and simmer until tender, about 1 nour. Meanwhile, cook rice in lightly salted boilong water for 15 minutes. Drain. Divide rice in half adding saffron dissolved in I tablespoon hot water to one sart. Set aside. 


