BERLIN, Mar. 2.—(AP)—Germany will fight until Britain and France recognize the "German Monroe Doctrine for central Europe," and restore war-lost colonies—this was described by Hermann Goering, German minister of aviation, in a 45-minute broadcast to the German people.

Germany's price peace, according to this version of the declaration, includes a permanent political domination of Bohemia, Slovakia, Poland and Hungary.

Celery Program Is Studied By Official Of AAA

Manchester Says Extension Of Plan Is Ultimate Goal

A. W. Manchester of Washington, director of the Northeastern Division of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, was a visitor in Sanford yesterday studying the experimental AAA celery program which has been in effect in the celery producing sections of Florida for the past two years.

The AAA is continually looking forward to doing a "better job for the nation's farmers," Mr. Manchester said, pointing out that the celery program, which provided payments for compliance with farm quotas set by local committees, is merely an experimental beginning in the efforts of the AAA to enlarge and extend the farm program in an effort to stabilize agriculture.

The celery program is an approach to the solution of the over-production problem from an entirely different angle, Mr. Manchester said, pointing out that the AAA is interested in the outcome of the experiment from which it is hoped a program can be developed which will stabilize the celery market.

Conservatives Plan To Extend Registration In Present Session

Labor Legislation Will Bear Brunt Of Attack Soon

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—(AP)—A coalition of conservative House Democrats and Republicans last night prepared to ambush Administration plans for a short, hasty session of Congress intended to safeguard vital New Deal laws and drastic revision.

The Smith committee last night passed a formal statement saying it was seeking unanimous agreement on the proposed amendments and that the group's deliberations have been entirely harmonious.

The decision, agreement or disagreement has been reached as to any amendment, the statement said.

Members of Cox's group also indicated that they would force the Biden amendments to the wage-hour law, vigorously opposed by the Administration, to a vote in the house before adjournment.

Supervisor Urges Registration In Precincts Monday

Three Weeks Remain For Candidates To Qualify, Clerk Says

Monday is the last day for registering in the county precincts, W. J. Thippen, supervisor of registration, said today, urging all those who are otherwise qualified to vote in the coming primary elections to register on this day.

On Monday night the registration books will be brought from the precincts to the supervisor's office in the Brumley-Puleston Building where they will remain open until Apr. 20 but the registrar pointed out that it will be much more convenient for those eligible to vote and who have not previously registered to sign the registration books while they are in the voting precincts.

There is a large number of persons in the county who are eligible to vote who have not registered, the registrar pointed out, adding, however, that in some precincts there had been many new names added to the register.

Plans for increased organization activity were directed principally at textile and chemical workers, stenographers, bookkeepers, hotel and restaurant employees, retail clerks, insurance salesmen and general service workers.

Long Move To Call Special Session Fails

BATON ROUGE, Mar. 2.—(AP)—Governor Earl Long's second effort to convene a special session of his hitherto obedient legislature failed when the legislators, in open revolt against the repudiated state machine, failed to report a quorum in the Senate.

Only 13 of 29 senators were present at roll call nearly an hour after the body had been called to meet.

AFL Holds Meet Preparatory To Membership Drive

ATLANTA, Mar. 2.—(AP)—An unprecedented show of American labor strength in the form of an AFL membership drive for 7000 new members in the textile, maritime, lumber, retail trade and other industries, was announced today by William Green, president of the AFL.

The conference, larger than any AFL radio network tonight held before, was called to:

1. Institute a united organizing drive in the south.

2. Coordinate legislative activities for the enactment of the bill for the promotion of union-management cooperation in southern industry.

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Belgian Officials Take Serious View Of Incident, Confer With German Envoy

Number Of Belgian Killed Is Unknown

German Boats Are Halted In Attempt To Break Blockade

BRUSSELS, Mar. 2.—(AP)—German bombers shot down a Belgian pursuit plane in a fight over Belgium while Finland strove desperately to hold off the Russians, Nazi planes raided British shipping, and the British navy reported new success.

Belgian officials viewed the warplane fight, and of its kind since the war, in a serious light.

The British freighter *Scotsport*, which last night flashed an alarm saying she was being attacked by a submarine near Cape Rico, was sighted by United States Navy planes this morning apparently unharmed.

Lamb Among Wolves

Our roving ambassador, President Roosevelt's "dove of peace," Sumner Welles, is having an interesting night-riding trip of European capitals, a sort of a farewell pre-destruction tour as it were, even if he does not succeed in the accomplishment of his original mission, whatever it was. We doubt if Mr. Welles really expected that anything would come of his trip, other than some publicity and a chance for European dictators to let off steam, but it is probably just as well for this country to have made the gesture.

Nobody knows exactly what Mr. Welles said to Premier Mussolini or what Il Duce said to Mr. Welles, but a "source close to high Fascist circles" is reported to have revealed that the discussions were conducted in a cordial atmosphere and that Italy is interested in the part that the United States will play in the reconstruction of post-war Europe. It seems also likely that Mussolini paid his respects to the British Empire and its "strangle hold" on the economy of the world, mentioned "Djibouti, Tunis, and Suez," and expressed his sympathy for the economic privations of the Germans.

It is not clear yet just what Mr. Welles and Mr. Hitler said to each other but early reports indicate that Mr. Welles got in so much as a "Good morning," he was doing pretty well. Mr. Hitler seems to have done most of the talking and made it pretty plain that the only peace offer he will consider is complete and abject surrender. Germany is determined upon the utter annihilation of the British Empire, not to mention the destruction of France, and nothing short of that will satisfy the Nazis who are still smarting under the sting of their temporary setback twenty years ago and are anxiously awaiting their revenge.

Mr. Welles has not talked to Mr. Daladier or Mr. Chamberlain yet, but the leaders of France and England have not waited for his arrival to make known what their answers will be. Not only are they unwilling to make peace on the German terms, that is, the dismemberment of their empires, they are not even willing to make peace without the restoration of free and independent nations of Poles and Czechs, and the overthrow of the Nazi regime with the substitution thereof of some government not based on the rule of force. There seems to be little in the way of a compromise in the war aims of the conflicting powers.

Under the circumstances we suppose Mr. Welles will be lucky if he gets out of Europe before the whole thing blows up in his face. As a matter of fact there has been considerable intensification of warfare, on land, on the sea, and in the air, since the first day of his arrival in Europe. It seems that both sides are determined upon a course of action which will leave no doubt in Mr. Welles' mind or any one else's as to the belligerency of Europe's intentions. Increased aerial activity and war on the high seas seems almost to have been arranged especially for his entertainment.

Or it may be that Spring is in the air. With the first thaw of the winter's snow, and the first appearance of bright green leaves on the trees, one can expect almost anything to happen. At least it is sure that a British fleet has not been concentrated off the Arctic, Norwegian coast for nothing, nor have several hundred thousand British and French troops been concentrated in the Near East just to make a pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

Typical Accident Victim
 Did you know there were 12,470 pedestrians killed by automobiles last year? Did you know that in addition to these 12,470 persons who were seriously injured, 1,000,000 were injured in some way? Did you know that a man crossing a street is 10 times as likely to be killed by a car as a car driver? Did you know that over 20 percent of the deaths while crossing streets between intersections? Did you know that over 12 percent were killed while walking on rural highways and country lanes? And that 9 percent were killed while crossing crossings against the red light signals?

You would think that a person who would get killed under such circumstances would be either defective as to sight or hearing, somewhat crippled, or otherwise physically incapable of rendering a quick getaway from an approaching automobile. However since this is not the case, it would be interesting to see just what the typical accident victim last year really was:

1. He was over 40 years of age—by no means decrepit; nevertheless his eyesight and hearing had passed their peak efficiency and he was less alert and agile than he had been only a few years ago.
2. He had the usual worries that go with the adult life of the family bread-winner; he was frequently preoccupied and occasionally downright absent-minded.
3. He probably had had a couple of drinks.
4. He had never learned to drive a car, and his walking habits had been formed when automobiles were both fewer and slower than they are now.
5. He was wearing dark clothing, and while the headlights of the oncoming car seemed blinding to him, his outline was scarcely discernible to the driver against the dark background of the pavement.
6. It was between 6:00 and 7:00 o'clock on a late Autumn evening, and he was struck just as he stepped out from between two parked cars preparatory to crossing between intersections on an unlighted street in a fairly large city.

Sumner Welles Is Having Some Quiet Talks In Europe

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—(AP)—A candid study of the testimony before the House Committee investigating the National Labor Relations Board indicates that the cause of trouble is no greater in the board itself than in the fact that stubborn leaders of two rival labor organizations won't make peace.

Many of the amendments to the act suggest that the board should be given authority to solve problems which probably would otherwise be referred to the National Labor Relations Board.

There is a complaint from employers that they must simply suffer losses while rival unions strike and picket each other in disputes over who is to be the bargaining representative. That has prompted certain of the amendments designed to give the employer the right to appeal directly to the board.

Dispute Over Craft Unions
 The principal charge that the A. F. L. makes against the board is that the board has handled too many cases in a way that benefited the C. I. O. President William Green of the A. F. L. outlined four objectives to be sought by amendments, at least three of which were proposed by the majority of the two great labor organizations to reach an understanding without the board.

Green insisted that craft unions should be permitted to bargain independently of other workers if they are "Right or wrong, the board has ruled frequently that skilled craftsmen and unskilled workers alike should be required to bargain together. Because without the craftsmen the unskilled are in weaker positions."

Green didn't hide his reasons. Skilled craftsmen who bargain independently get more than when they are lumped in with the unskilled brackets, and the A. F. L. pushes organization by crafts.

Because of the board's disposition in this regard, Green asked that the whole board be removed and a new one substituted whose policy would be let craftsmen bargain when they choose.

As a sample of what was happening to the crafts, Green said that all 800 members of the outside Pacific Coast had been directed to bargain as one group under Harry Bridges' C. I. O. union.

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Kermitt Roosevelt Enlists To Fight Against Russians

LONDON, Mar. 2.—(AP)—Kermitt Roosevelt, son of a crusading father, yesterday threw in his lot with Finland's weary armies as commander of an international brigade. Only the king's signature on an order releasing him from his father's commission in Britain's Middlesex regiment remains before he formally accepts his new command.

Looking like anything but a harlot of fortune, the paunchy, heavy-jowled member of the President's Theodore Roosevelt family marched solemnly from the swank Ritz hotel to the war office to receive his commission. Although failure of the king to sign the release left his mouth open, Roosevelt did not mind when reporters and photographers saw him sign for new buttons for the British army uniform which he will wear in Finland.

These included a whopping thirty dollars' standing for international brigades which are to go on his tank collar. Volunteer wages filed that the buttons upside down stood for "non intervention."

London newspapers, decorously jejune at the spectacle of an American commanding an expedition sent to Britain's aid, splashed front pages with his picture.

At the United States embassy it was said Roosevelt still has an American passport and American citizenship, and that he was admitted to the British army without securing admission to King George, which would have been his wish.

There is ample evidence here that the international brigades will make a difference with 1,500 men and a quarter of those are well equipped to have left here.

At present headquarters could not say how long Roosevelt would stay in Finland.

Cold Storage Lockers Being Used On Farms

ST. PAUL, Mar. 2.—(AP)—Rural cold-storage locker plants are bringing about the most significant change in the American farmer's processing and storing of meats since colonial times, University of Minnesota agricultural economists report.

The first detailed study of these plants has shown that in the last five years thousands of farmers have abandoned time-honored practices of handling meats, says Dr. A. A. Dorell, university economist. In many cases, the study shows, even slaughterhouses have been moved from the farm. The survey covers Minnesota alone. Dr. Dorell says, but is indicative of the trend in most other states.

The idea has mushroomed in Minnesota from five plants with fewer than 1,000 lockers in 1933 to more than 300 plants with 60,000 lockers now. Other states show about the same ratio of increase, says Dorell.

On a basis of five persons to each family served by lockers, some 300,000 persons in Minnesota are directly affected by the new trend, with perhaps more than 5,000,000 affected throughout the nation.

The survey showed beef and pork formed 95 percent of the meat handled in the lockers, and chickens (meat) about equal quantities of cash.

Lockers are rented on an annual basis. Meat is available at any time of day the patron wants to get it.

The storage locker's most important advantage over the butcher, as disclosed in a one-on-one interview with more than 2,000 patrons, was the availability of

There were rumblings in British circles in connection with the German bombing attack on the British liner *Donau* in the English Channel. Of 801 persons aboard, the ship was damaged and 100 persons injured. The *Donau* was the only British liner to be hit by a German plane.
