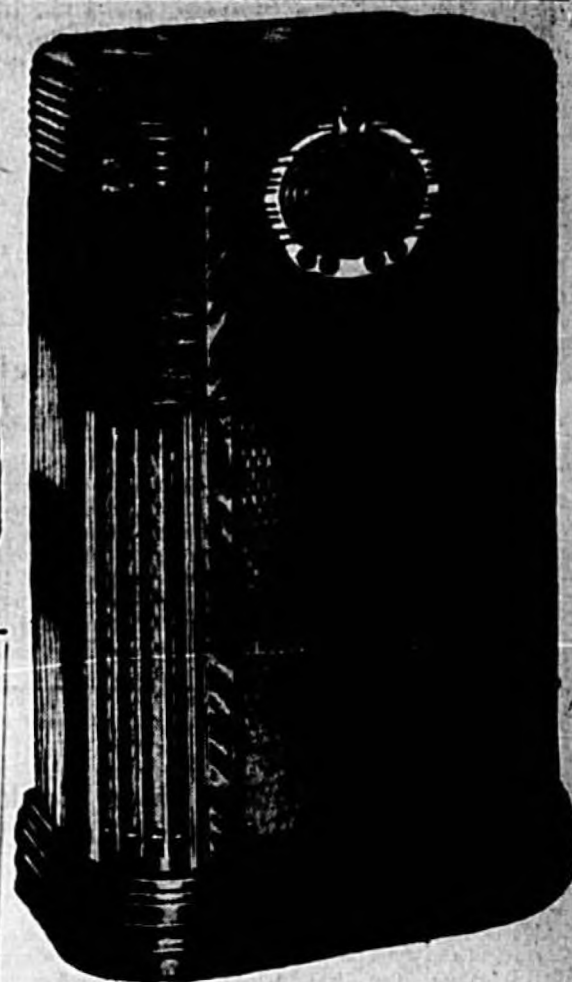

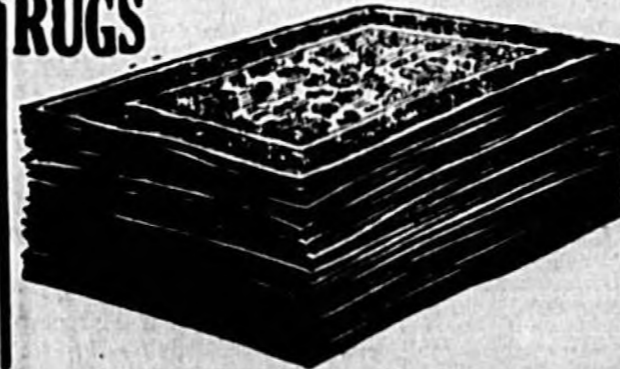

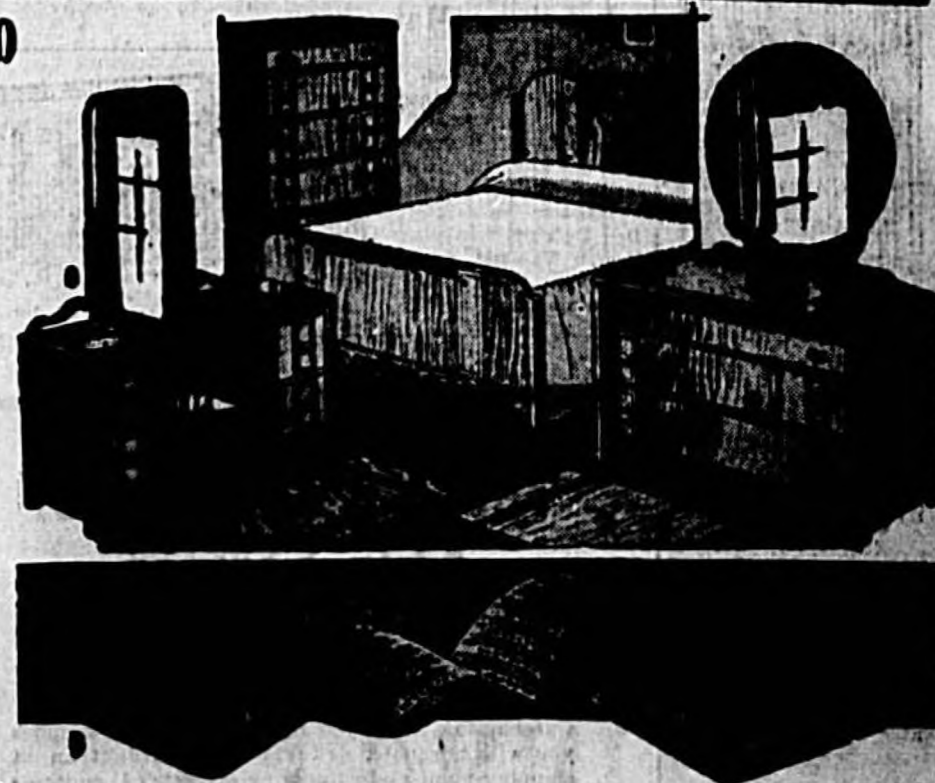

Activities Begun Outlining Plans For Founders Day

The daily Seminoles Chapter of the American Revolution began today to draft a program for the celebration of the city's 100th anniversary. It is known as "Founders Day."

Mr. Patterson, chairman of the Founders Day committee, and Mrs. S. Paleton, secretary, are leading the effort to make the event successful one. Mrs. Lehman and Mrs. Paleton have made a plan for the co-operation of every individual in the city with the group of organizations, including the Seminoles Chapter and Governmental units.

A definite program is yet to be worked out, although when completed there is the possibility that it may include the dedication of a small tract of land near the bridge, later to be known as "Founders Park."

The city committee has been working on the plan for some time and has given instructions to each member of the committee.

The exhibit will be a display of the city's history and will include actual exhibits which had a part to play in the building of the city.

Activities of the section's plan are expected to furnish considerable interest.

Seasonal Crops In
County Aid Labor,

Nazis Issue Ultimatum To Loyal Spain

Give Government 8
Days To Return
Cargo Of Vessel
Captured By Navy

Madrid, Spain, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Germany today gave Spain eight days to return to the Spanish Government the cargo of a German freighter recently captured by the navy.

Germany said they would give the two Spanish ships to Spanish insurgents unless the Socialist Government returned the cargo it took from a German freighter recently.

British warships were a pledge of respect from both sides of the Spanish civil war for British shipping. The British reports of 16,000 new Italian volunteers in the Spanish war complicated the matter of controlling the "little world war."

On the actual battlefield around Madrid the Rebels won an important victory, driving Government defenders back from the front line.

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New Congress Starts Grind In Washington

Neutrality Legislation
One Of Chief
Problems To Be
Solved By Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The 75th Congress opened today amid the quickening tempo of national prosperity to face a batch of problems embracing labor strife at home and war rumbles abroad.

Sharp gavel taps by Vice-President Garner in the Senate and Chief South Trimble in the House officially began as noon the organization chores of the third Congress of President Roosevelt's administration.

Preliminaries over today, Congress will hear the President's message tomorrow. Problems to be faced include measures to guarantee America's neutrality, the future of federal relief expenditure, and possibilities of a constitutional amendment covering labor wages and working hours.

Representative Sam Rayburn, Texas, Democrat, was the post-party floor leader in the House where he will work with Democratic Speaker William Bankhead.

Sanford will have a new mayor tomorrow.

One new City Commissioner and four men who have previously served on the municipal governing board will assemble at 7:30 o'clock tonight in City Hall to choose the head of City government.

Retiring from the chair is Mayor S. O. Shindler who declined to run for re-election in the November primaries because of the press of private business too great to allow adequate time for the proper management of City affairs.

The new Sanford mayor will be selected from the following group: W. A. Lefler, Perry Whitehurst, M. J. Lodge, W. R. Dupree and Ed Higgins.

Commissioner Higgins is the only member, having succeeded Mayor Shindler in Group No. 2, while Commissioner Lodge is assuming a seat for the second term as successor to himself.

Tonight's meeting is expected to develop hardly more than routine affairs since it is the organization session—however, the board will have a free hand to take any action, within its jurisdiction, that it so desires.

Possible changes in City personnel have not been publicly discussed by any of the Commissioners, giving rise to an indication that no drastic shakeup of employees is forecast.

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Governor Fred P. Cone today entered upon a four-year term with sharp criticism for the Road Department spending on the State highway patrol and aviation division without direct authority from the Legislature.

"All these so-called boards and commissions that have been created have increased their expenses until it's a disgrace to the State of Florida," he said in his inaugural address.

He declared the money "wasted by the State Road Department would have taken care of nearly all expenses we had, and the Railroad Commission has wasted enough money to give every county \$2,000 or \$3,000 more dollars for schools. I want to correct that." (Continued on Page Three)

Youth Will Rise
Against Politics,
Asserts Forecast

Modern youth will rise against party politics in 1937, according to a prediction of the Rostertorian Order, AMORC, represented in Sanford by L. A. Renaud.

The prophecy asserts that "youth has become aware of the tyrannical methods frequently employed by party leaders to gain their ends without consideration of consequences which may involve the next generation in wars, economic strife and social upheaval."

Mr. Renaud said the AMORC prediction forecasts the formation throughout the world of progressive young men and women "whose duty it will be to analyze every bill presented to their respective governments which may place a lien upon their future personal freedom or jeopardize their opportunities by excessive taxation."

Mr. Renaud said the prophecy is based on a study of the cycles of human tendencies and trends and are not founded on any method of fantastic prognostication.

City Places Signs
At Dangerous Turn
Near Sanford Pier

City workmen under Street Superintendent James Moughon today were painting warning signs at three locations on the highway near Municipal Pier and the sharp right angle turn which all through traffic must negotiate at the Boulevard and Park Avenue.

Florida's New Governor

Biggest news event in Florida today is the inauguration of a new governor. On this day Governor-elect Fred Cone of Lake City becomes Governor Cone of Tallahassee, or rather, of all Florida. His predecessor, Dave Sholtz, steps down and out, to move to Jacksonville where he will practice law, and base his travels as Grand Exalted Ruler of the Elks.

Pledged to economy, Governor Cone enters the executive mansion at a time when state operating costs are at a peak of all time. Spending some \$43,000,000 during 1936, state officials have seen expenses rise some eight million dollars a year in the past two years. Pledged also to old age pensions, Governor Cone expresses the belief that they will impose an additional charge on the taxpayers of some six million dollars.

He promises to maintain a balanced budget, to provide old age pensions, to support adequately the schools, and to give the over-burdened motorist a five dollar auto tax. He is unalterably opposed to a sales tax, and believes that many existing taxes ought to be reduced. He insists that conditions found in many state departments are thoroughly "rotten", and that no less than nine million dollars can be saved simply by more efficient and economical management.

It is a big order; but one for which Governor Cone should have the whole-hearted support of the taxpayers and the great mass of the citizens who are not looking for special favors. Of course there will be thousands of job hunters who will view these plans for economy with cries of alarm and who will immediately start a backfire of acrimony in the hope of changing the course, but if Governor Cone sticks to his guns and saves the State the nine million dollars now being wasted, he will have the support of the people.

It is easy to see that if Governor Cone proves less of a Gibraltar than his friends think he is, and opens the gates to the hordes now clamoring for jobs, provides six million dollars for old age pensions, gives the schools what they are justly entitled to, all thought of tax reduction and five dollar tags must go out of the window. Instead of saving he'll have nine million dollars now being wasted, we will find state expenses being increased still further, and taxes piled higher and higher on the already broken backs of the taxpayers.

So there is every reason in the world to hope that Fred Cone will make the best governor Florida ever had.

Flagler's St. Augustine

It was exactly fifty years ago that the development of Florida as a State of tourist resorts began. Now the greatest mecca for tourists in the world, then only Henry M. Flagler realized its possibilities and in 1887 began the construction of the beautiful Ponce de Leon hotel. So, as the New York Herald Tribune puts it, "St. Augustine is celebrating not the fiftieth anniversary of its founding—that took place more than three hundred and seventy years ago—but the renewed youth that Henry Flagler brought it a half century ago."

"Among all these 'first' achievements," continues the Herald Tribune, "the first perhaps remains the best, the most enduring and endearing—charming, decorous, self-contained little St. Augustine, with charm and dignity enhanced by Flagler's lavish expenditures. Miami has become a great city. Palm Beach has world fame as a fashionable winter playground, is virtually supreme in the smart winter world that only the Riviera could please years ago. Ormond remains quiet and aloof and select—like St. Augustine in these qualities—but without other background than its perfect golf course and the Florida coast and lagoon landscape, which has been judiciously left in something very like its original state, a rare thing on the Florida east coast.

"But St. Augustine is the whole of Florida from its aboriginal myth and the disputed landfall of Ponce de Leon in 1513 to the founding of the first city there in 1565 and through many years of devoted missionary effort, war, butchery, sack and pillage to those late Victorian days when an upstate boy from Canandaigua who had made a huge fortune in the Western Reserve discovered a strenuous leisure and Florida at the same time and began to lavish himself and his money on the east coast. And of all the magnificent gifts that Flagler showered upon Florida none remains more enduring and sumptuous and choice than his Ponce de Leon Hotel, at St. Augustine—solid as a monolith with its coquina and tile and proudly memorializing not only its great patron and his architects, but Florida's rich and deep background from the days of Spanish Renaissance grandees to the days fifty years ago when an American grandee turned from grandly acquiring wealth to grandly spending it."

The Legislature has assured me of its co-operation."

Cone succeeded Dave Sholtz during the traditional ceremonies at noon. Sholtz made a report on his administration, calling it "four years of great progress."

Chief Justice J. B. Whitfield of the Supreme Court administered the oath of office to Cone.

The new Governor made an extemporaneous address, pledging himself to "a plain, sensible, business administration" of economy, opposition to new taxes, adequate school financing and social security.

Cone said he would not have many jobs to pass out as he is going to eliminate many of the present positions. He said the trouble with Government is that every time a new revenue begins to come in, new and greater expenses are incurred.

"If we follow economy, we will have all the money we need for any purpose whatsoever."

The new Governor said five or six million dollars a year will be needed to finance old age pensions. He said that it is worrying him more than anything else but he believed if the Legislature will follow his program, old age pensions can be financed without any new taxes.

Cone said he is not going to cut salaries but will follow a policy of not paying 10 or 15 on the payroll when we need 100.

He endorsed salary increases for State cabinet officers who now receive \$5,000 a year. The Governor gets \$7,500 a year.

Differences over spending, monetary and other policies temporarily were forgotten in a general desire to spread the ban after the State Department reluctantly issued two permits to export more than \$7,000,000 worth of munitions and airplanes to Spain.

The Senate and House met jointly at 1 o'clock this afternoon to count the electoral vote in last November's general election in which Roosevelt and Garner won 363 electoral votes to eight for Landon and Knox.

President Roosevelt delivered his opening message to Congress at 2 o'clock this afternoon, reviewing the past year and looking ahead to the next. He left details of a legislative program for special messages. He will transmit to Congress from time to time.

Celery Activity Becomes Lively After Jan. 15th

Scott Sees Better Local Conditions Prevailing In '37

Only a few scattering cars of celery have been shipped to date from Sanford, but right after Jan. 15 the celery season is expected to open up in a lively fashion. W. M. Scott, vegetable chief for American Fruit Growers, said here today in announcing that "the celery crop in the Sanford district is in better condition than usual for this time of year."

The weather for the most part during the fall and winter has been favorable for celery growth. Mr. Scott declared, and the oldest blocks of celery have been prepared for bleaching. During the cool period of the winter from two to three weeks are required to properly bleach celery; consequently the celery which was prepared late in December or early in January will be ready for shipment from Jan. 15 to 25, Mr. Scott said.

The first car of celery of the season, grown by John Bell and marketed by American Fruit Growers at Cleveland, was shipped late in December, but first carloads were scarce and in big demand. Quality of first celery was excellent and promises to remain that way.

"Usually the heavy shipping period for Sanford celery is the month of March, but this season on account of early setting and good growing conditions, a heavy period, or peak movement, is expected to be from Feb. 15 to Mar. 15," Mr. Scott added.

Setting of young plants in the field at Sanford will wind up about Jan. 15. Ovidio, however, is just getting well started in setting the late "mucklands" crop (Ovidio sometimes ships celery in to June).

Celery has been growing uniformly and at a good rate of late, according to Mr. Scott, who thinks that Florida will be shipping some of the finest celery in years during the coming season.

New telephone books for Sanford subscribers are being printed today in Atlanta and should be ready for distribution within a few days, E. V. Turner, Southern Bell manager here, announced today.

Books will be distributed to patrons immediately after their arrival here, the manager said. Mr. Turner said the local telephone company is looking toward a bright year in 1937, pointing out that a steady gain has been evidenced in subscribers during the past few months.
