



Our records show that our white schools have increased on an average of fifty pupils per year for the past ten years.

The total enrollment last year was as follows: Boys, 371; girls, 393, totel, 764. Of this number 105 vere in the high school department. The enrollment for the present session will doubtless exceed that of any previous year. The enrollment charge. to date is as follows: High school department, 417; primary school department, 182; total, 711. We have, however, at the end of two weeks twenty-five more pupils enrolled than we had at the end of the first month last year.

The principal of the colored school The principal of the colored schools, J. N. Crooms, reports an enrollment of 450 pupils.

All the grades are well filled. The chasses in plane geometry, tenth grade algebra and ninth grade English and geography of the high school department are larger than desir able for the best work. The capacity of the class rooms is overtaxed in some cases. We look forward to the erection of the new primary school building, as the congestion in

the upper grades will be relieved by its use

It is gratifying to note the interest which is being shown by the pypils in their work in the beginning of the session. We note with especial pride the improvement in the marching of the grammar school pupils. The piano which was recently installed in that building is proving a great inspiration in keeping step and order.
