LONDON (UPI) - Police early today recaptured a housing project where hundreds of youths wielding knives and hurling gasoline bombs fought an eighthour battle with riot squads. killing one officer in mainland Britain's bloodiest riot in memo-

At least 250 people - mostly police officers - were injured in the fifth riot to hit Britain in a two-month spate of urban violence. The killing was the first police death during a riot since 1980, authorities said.

Police said 163 officers were treated for minor injuries and 69 were treated in hospital with five in serious condition. About 20 civilians also were treated.

"This is not England - this is just madness," said a senior police officer at the height of the violence in Tottenham, a largely black section of north London. "My men are being used as target practice."

U.S. Won't Argue Politics In 'Stacked' World Court

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States is planning to quietly call it quits in the world court in all political cases brought against it, partly out of the belief the court is stacked against it, it was reported today.

President Reagan was scheduled to sign a measure, possibly Sunday or today, withdrawing the United States from world court jurisdiction in cases like Nicaragua's suit stemming from U.S. mining of that nation's harbors. The New York Times reported.

No announcement of Reagan's signing the measure was planned, the Times said, citing administration sources interviewed Sunday but not identified in the story.

The measure's details were quietly drawn up in recent weeks by Secretary of State George Shultz and Attorney General Edwin Meese and their staffs and approved by the National Security Council, the Times reported.

Under the measure the United States would continue dealing with the court on cases involving international legal, commercial or border problems that were "mutually submitted." effectively redefining and curtailing a U.S. role in

The 15-judge court, a U.N. agency officially called the International Court of Justice and sitting at The Hague, is essentially hostile to the United States. U.S. officials maintain according to the

Nicaragua's suit, now before the court. alleges that control and direction of the Nicaraguan Contra rebels trying to topple the Sandinista government comes from the United States and violates

international law. U.S. officials said Nicaragua's suit prompted the administration's withdrawing action, but that the

measure would not substantively affect that suit, stemming from alleged CIA involvement in mining Nicaragua's

After initial U.S. arguments that the court lacked jurisdiction in the affair. Reagan decided in January to quit the case altogether.

The story noted that many member nations, including the Soviet Union and Cuba, have rejected the court's jurisdiction in political matters.

The case marked the first time that the court had been asked to intervene in a current armed conflict.

33-Vehicle Pileup On Freeway Kills 10, Injures 43 In Sacramento

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI) - A huge cloud of smoke from a grass fire blew suddenly over a busy interstate freeway, triggering a five-minute, 33-vehicle chain collision that killed 10 people and injured 43, officials said.

The flery accident at 4 p.m. PDT Sunday closed northbound lanes on Interstate 5 for more than eight hours while workers pried apart and cleared the charred wreckage that littered 50 yards of California's major north-south freeway.

"We kept hearing them hit and hit and hit," said one woman who escaped serious injury. "We thank God we're still alive."

The patrol said it took hours to pull apart the 33 vehicles and uncover the dead. Four people died in two cars flattened between two tractor-trailor rigs, and three burned to death when their cars slammed into the wreckage and caught fire. Three other bodies were discovered hours after

"It looked like a wrecking yard," California Highway patrol spokesman George Olinares said. "It was a literal

NEW YORK (UPI) - Gov. Mario Cuomo condemned the Rev. Louis Farrakhan, scheduled to speak tonight despite protest, as a purveyor of ideas that are "ugly and divisive and wrong and hateful" and urged him to drop anti-Semitic references.

Cuomo, speaking on WNBC-TV's "News Forum," said Sunday that Farrakhan should not be prohibited from speaking, even if what he says may increase the strains of a society already heavily weighted by hatred and

But he warned that New Yorkers should be careful when listening to Farrakhan to weed out the minister's "language of hate."

He called on Farrakhan to modify his speech, removing all anti-Semitic references and instead give a message of

Policeman, Black Baby Hurt In South Africa Violence

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - A policeman and a black baby were slightly injured and five houses were stoned or firebombed in overnight racial violence across South Africa, police said today.

On Sunday, the opposition United Democratic Front accused police of using whips to force children to school and of monitoring classrooms.

Police said there were more than 20 incidents of racial unrest late Sunday and early today. Two black youths were arrested in stoning incidents. A policeman was slightly injured when youths stoned a

police vehicle in Cape Towns Crossroads squatter camp Sunday evening. Officers fired shotguns to disperse the mob, but no injuries were reported.

At Chesterville, near Durban, an unidentified black baby was slightly injured when a mob firebombed a house. No further details were given.

Rioters also damaged or destroyed nine cars, an ambulance, a bus and a police vehicle in attacks near Cape Town, the report said.

Houses were stoned or firebombed by mobs in Soweto, outside Johannesburg, and in black townships near Port Elizabeth and near Durban. A school was extensively damaged in an arson attack at Bridgeton, near the Cape province farming town of Oudtshoorn, police said.

Explosion Kills One, Injures 11

JERUSALEM (UPI) - An explosion ripped through a Jerusalem apartment building today, killing one person and injuring 11 others, authorities said. Police blamed the blast on a gas leak.

Police said the explosion damaged two floors of the building, killing one woman and injuring 11 other persons. two of them seriously.

The explosion police blamed on a gas leak in a poorer section of Jerusalem was the latest incident marring the long holiday weekend of Succoth.

In what is being called "bloody Saturday," seven Israelis were killed in the Sinai Desert by an Egyptian guard who went beserk, and three other Israelis were found slain in the West Bank and Israel in what police called "terrorist slayings."

The explosion today at 7 a.m. destroyed six apartments. Eight families were evacuated.

Bishops Are Committed To Poor

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Roman Catholic he hoped people would recognize the bishops, releasing the second draft of their pastoral statement on the economy Sunday. relterated their strong commitment to the poor but stressed that commitment should not be fulfilled at the expense of the middle

"In the second draft, we do not back away from our strong conviction that more can and must be done to fight poverty and unemployment," said Archbishop Rembert Weakland of Milwaukee in introducing the 40,000-word second draft of the statement.

Weakland, at a news conference, also said there had been neither official nor unofficial reaction from the Reagan administration to either draft of the proposed statement.

Weakland, chairman of the committee drafting the statement, called the current economic situation "a watershed," saying

"special moment to reshape the American economy" toward more justice and democratic participation.

"The economy must be aimed at helping people, all people," Weakland said. "The economy is a human construct constantly altered in the history of our nation so that more and more could participate in it with justice."

"The 'option for the poor' is not an adversarial slogan which pits one group or class against another," said the new text of "Catholic Social Teaching and the U.S. Economy.'

"Rather it states that the deprivation and powerlessness of the poor wounds the whole community." said Weakland, "The extent of their suffering is a measure of how far we are from being a true community of

Weakland said the second draft seeks to "build bridges of responsibility between the poor, the middle and the affluent classes."

"Many working people and middle-class Americans live dangerously close to poyerty," the statement said. "An increasing number of families are compelled to rely on the wages of two or even three members just to get by.

The new draft will be debated by the 300 bishops of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops when they meet in Washington 11-15, be revised again and then voted on in November 1986.

Although the first draft was widely criticized by conservatives, the new draft does not back away from any of the major policy themes of the earlier version.

U.S. To Urge \$50 Billion In Loans

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) -The United States will call for about \$50 billion in new loans to debtor countries over three years as part of its strategy to manage the world debt problem, sources said today.

Treasury Secretary James Baker was to outline the U.S. proposals when he opens the formal session of the International Monetary Fund and World Bank meeting Tuesday.

Highly placed sources said Baker would call for \$25 billion in new lending by the World Bank over the next three years, with the amount to be matched - dollar for dollar - with \$25 billion in new loans from commercial banks.

The \$50 billion will be targeted at eight large debtor countries and about seven other countries with lesser debts, the sources said. The loans would be made on the condition that the recipients respond with economic reforms - probably in the areas of direct foreign investment, government intervention in economies, support for the private sector and foreign trade

Bankers are expected to accept their role in the plan provided Congress supports it and the World Bank agrees to monitor the economic reforms in the debtor countries.

S, as in "Silly." A few well-meaning mothers, supported by a few well-meaning congressional wives, want to issue "ratings" on records, particularly crude rock 'n' roll songs, so that poor parents or children might not purchase inadvertently something demonic, lewd, or erotic. The system presumably would work like the motion picture rating system - giving each record something roughly equivalent to a G, PG, R, or X rating.

Yet even squeaky-clean artists like John Denver object to the measure, pointing out that it amounts to censorship. They're right: Once someone's instituted ratings, eashiers presumably would demand identification. Kids might get false IDs, merchants might break the law, and chances are some artists might feel compelled to throw in an expletive or two to avoid the poisonous "G" rating.

All this is unnecessary. People already have a simple way of reducing record industry obscenity: Don't buy records. Markets respond to all sorts of things, including morals. and the most effective campaign of all is the one that puts foul-mouthed, androgynous screamers out of business. We hold no brief for absurd acts like Twisted Sister or AC/DC. which have made money singing things that no one could legally sing to a stranger over the telephone. But regulations aren't going to silence them. Low sales will.

Besides, in the long run, musicians who get their lyries from rest room walls are not destined to be remembered, by youngsters or anyone else. Parents should give their kids some credit. They may listen to the stuff, but very few youngsters emerge perverse as a result. Only legislators suffer that fate.

Star Wars Fuss

The debate over the Strategic Defense Initiative (also known as Star Wars) is really a debate over the heart and mind of Ronald

Oh, there is much talk about technology and feasibility, about X-ray lasers, particle beams and boost-phase intercepts. But almost everybody agrees that these are proper and necessary subjects for research and that it is too soon to tell whether the research will ever produce any usable weapons.

What really gets the juices flowing is concern over the president's motives. He has never seen a U.S. Soviet treaty that he liked. He has displayed little enthusiasm for arms control. He says he won't use Star Wars as a bargaining chip in negotiations with the

Are these simply the tactics of a tough poker player who knows how to play a blue chip? Does the Reagan administration really intend to reach an agreement, as George Shultz and Robert McFarlane, the president's advisers, say?

Until these political questions can be answered, the technical debate will rage.

Medical Education Loans Being Squandered

WASHINGTON - The Health Education Assistance Loan program is the latest example of a federally guaranteed loan program that promises to "cost nothing," but operates like a ticking budgetary time homb.

The government's "projected financial liability ... under this program is staggering." warns an Inspector General's report

The internal report singles out student overborrowing, ineffective collection efforts and insufficient insurance premiums as dangerous symptoms of deferent program administration. which could soon lead to a tederal bailout of up to \$100 million in defaulted loan claims

The seven-year-old HEAL program insures loans provided by nontederal lenders for graduate students in medicine, dentistry and related medical professions. Borrowers pay insurance premiums into a Student Loan Insurance Fund. but Uncle Sam guarantees that it will make upthe difference if excessive loan defaults exceed the fund balance

Although a recent increase in premiums averted the fund's insolvency, insiders say that further reforms are needed to rem in a runaway loan program tucked by high interest rates, long repayment periods, unchecked demand for new loans and lax standards for need.

HHS auditors link the program's growingdefault rate to the high indebtedness of many HEAL borrowers. Students can get up to \$80,000 (\$20,000 annually over four years) in HEAL loans, in addition to other federal student

Auditors say that the lack of a strict needs test and the loose definitions of student-assistance budgets have allowed borrowers to obtain thousands of dollars in loans for questionable noneducational expenses.

In one case, HEAL loan funds were disbursed for a student "needing" \$1,550 for a round-trip airplane ticket to Europe during the summer The school indicated that the trip was approved for the medical student's "personal develop-

One student was asked to return \$15,000 in HEAL money because the school awarded her a \$21,500 scholarship, but she returned only \$10,000, claiming that she needed the remainder to purchase a car and to use for additional living expenses.

One student's approved budget included \$2.575 for dental work, ear-repair bills of regulations which are slow in coming.

\$1,100, \$3,000 in legal fees for a divorce and \$192 for traffic tickets

Auditors say that another student obtained a total of \$10,000 in funds for support for his ex-wife and two children: \$5,000 to pay psychiatric bills for treatment of his son's behavior problems, and \$4,000 for dining out, rent and payment of his son's tuition at a private school,

The IG has, among other things, recommended charging higher loan insurance premiums and instituting a financial needs test that considers student income and parental support, as well as previous indebtedness, Auditors noted that a married dental student obtained \$20,000 in HEAL loans during the 1982-83 academic year, although she could not qualify for other low-interest loans because her family income was too high - \$65,875.

Pending legislation to reauthorize the HEAL program would double the statutory ceiling on premiums from 2 to 4 percent and would permit more flexible repayment schedules. Sadly, it leaves implementation of most of the IG's recommendations to proposed changes in HEAL

Deficit Caught In A Vacuum

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A recent national poll disclosed that the public gives tederal deficit reduction. higher priority than tax reform.

Imasmuch as a lot of politicians have been saving that for a month or more, the poll results are not exactly shocking news, but the question can be asked in Washington "Is anybody listen-

The president continues to the around the country patching tax reform, the Treasury keeps reporting higher deficit figures and Congress having passed a budget resolution during the summer, appears to be more interested in other issues such astrade legislation.

The budget resolution is a blueprint in which Congress instructed itself to take specific steps to reduce the deticit. There are a lot of people who think Congress will find reasons to get around its own mandate or, if not, that it won't make a significant dent in the deficit

There seem to be a number of reasons for this situation.

First, economic conditions in the country are good enough, or at least not so bad, that the president and Congress don't feel the kind of pressure that makes things happen in Washington

A recession of accelerating unemployment, might focus attention on the deficit but repeated warnings that the rising tide of red ink will surely lead to one or both of the loregoing simply don't excite the capital

In Washington, it usually takes some kind of dramatic reality suchas an oil embargo, a Tet ollensive or a terrorist attack to galvanize the government, although the practitioners of public relations have found ways to create drama as with to months of daily anti-apartheid demonstrations at the South African

A second reason for maction has to do with the mittie of the presidency and the Congress

The White House tends to operate on policy assumptions President Reagan embraced supply sub-erosnomies in 1981 and continues to argue that those policies will take care of the deficit. That means among other things, no new taxes, no matter how big the delagt

Mathias Steps Down

The news that Sen. Charles C. "Mae" Mathias has decided not to seek a fourth term in the U.S. worrisome aspects, since the Senate is closely divided and Mathias, a nominal Republican, was a sure shot for re-election. U.S. Squelched AIDS-Pork Research?

WASHINGTON — Some medical researchers suspect the tederal government is discouraging tests that might identify a deadly swine virus as a cause of AIDS, for fear that such a revelation would wreck the pork industry

U.S. officials have discounted researchers' suggestions of a connection between AIDS and African Swine Fever virus, saving that allthe government's tests have proved negative. In fact, they say, no cases of African Swine Fever have ever been found in U.S. pigs.

But while officials claim the scientists are sounding needless alarms. the researchers charge that their work is being impeded by the Agriculture Department, which controls the material necessary for swine fever tests

The department "is atraid the (pork) industry would fall if African Swine Fever is related to AIDS," Dr. John Beldekas of Boston University told our reporters Corky Johnson and Stewart Harris. It took Beldekas three months to get swine fever material from reluctant department officials to conduct his research. Though his initial tests showed some positive results, he said Agriculture officials criticized his

Beldekas said he had been ordered not to talk to the press for national security reasons, but he charged that Agriculture officials have been leaking word of his research to worried farmers. "I have been indirectly threatened by pig farmers." he said.

At the very least, the new controversy makes clear the frustration that independent scientists feel because of the government's tronclad control of AIDS research.

The theory that African Swine Fever might be a cause of AIDS was first advanced publicly by Dr. Jane Teas in a letter printed in the respected British medical journal: Lancet, in April 1983 Dr. Teas wrote that she had found a parallel between a swine fever outbreak in Haiti and cases of AIDS in humans there. Haitian doctors testing for a correlation in Haiti said they lound no evidence to support this.

Dr. Teas theorizes that a new strain of swine lever was contracted. by Hattans when they are indercooked ment, then spread through sexual contact to visiting Americans. The two diseases have similar symptoms, including teverloss of appetite and swollen lymph glands, she said.

Dr. Teas complains that she was brushed off by Agriculture Department officials and researchers.

Internal memos of the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta indicate that doctors there believe sufficient testing on a possible AIDS-swine fever connection has been done.

"From the outset," states one memo "extensive investigations of specimens from AIDS patients have been undertaken, which would have adentified African Swine Fever Virus should it have been present.

The memos reveal that the tests did show a couple of positive reactions, but Agriculture rescarchers dismissed these results as Talse positives.

Dr. Teas said when British researchers got positive results in preliminary tests, they were discouraged from further experiments by the Agriculture Department. And when Dr. Gus Grossman of St. Vincent's Hospital in New York suggested injecting pigs with the AIDS virus to see if they got sick. the department asked the Atlanta disease center in a memorandum if there was "any way to deal with Dr. Grossman. Grossman said he would have expected "a little more professional attitude,"



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

Mann Announces Candidacy For Governor ... Atop Dark Horse

FORT MYERS (UPI) - Frank Mann, a little-known state scuator running for the Florida Democratic gubernatorial nomination, announced his candidacy from atop a dark

Mann. 44, rode the animal into a crowd of supporters gathered for a rally in fron of his house Saturday

"I know I'm the dark horse candidate, but so were the last three men who became governor of this state." Mann told about 1,000 people clustered around a stage dressed in red flowers and blue ribbons. "The man they only know as that 'feller' from Fort Myers is going to be the next

Mann said he and his wife Mary Lee have cruised around Florida in their "Mann Van" during the last three months measuring support and trying to increase the candidate's name recognition among the electorate.

He has raised about \$160,000 so far, but has refused to accept money from political action committees.

Frey Announces For Governor

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Former Congressman Lou Frey, twice a failure as a statewide candidate, announced today for the 1986 Republican nomination for Florida governor.

Frey. 51, of Winter Park, who lost the 1980 GOP nomination for U.S. senator to Paula Hawkins and the 1978 nomination for governor to drug store executive Jack Eckerd, said this outing he will have the organization and eash he needs to win.

"Before, I tried to run without money. I had the people but not the money." Frey said at a news conference. "I'd been trying to play on a hundred-yard football field that is now 500 yards long.

Now, the 10 year House veteran said, he has raised about \$300,000 of the \$4 million he expects a campaign to cost and has recruited a team of crack handlers, including Richard Wirthlin, President Reagan's pollster, "Maybe this time the odds are with it," he said.

I believe this state is at a crossroads," Frey said. "I want to be governor. I want to lead this state. I want to give back what this state has given my family.

"It's time to put together a group of interested citizens and develop this growth management plan," he said. "We need to take a look at what we want the downtown area of Winter Springs to be."

Trencher said by "controlling growth and limiting development we can maintain resources without hurting what is going on currently."

He said he also believes there is a need for the city to adopt single member districting for election of officials. "The city is divided geographically" between old and new neighborhoods. Since the five seats are now elected at large "we can have three people elected from one neighborhood" which would not be in the best interests of all the

Another concern of his is the possibility of an expressway being located over Lake Jessup or Tuscawilla. Although Trencher is in favor of an expressway he said it should be over the agricultural areas and not near the densely populated areas.

Recreation is also an issue for Winter Springs. Since the completion of the new city hall, the old city hall reverts back to its original use as a recreation center. Trencher said.

"We need to work with the new recreation director to organize recreation for kids as well as seniors," he said. A high population of elderly means the city should provide financial breaks, recreation and services for those people, he said. A city recreational facility will help "keep kids off the street and keep them occupied with challenging things to do."

Each Season Has Own Special Fire Hazards

DEAR READERS: Last year in the United States, 5,240 people died in fires. The total loss in property alone came to \$6.71 billion

This is Fire Prevention Week, and although fires occur throughout the year, each season has its own special fire hazards. Here are some tips for all seasons:

Fall: If you enjoy camping. select a tend make of flameresistant fabric. Pack a reliable flashlight with plenty of extrabatteries to light the inside of your tent — never use matches or candles. When building a campfire, place it sownwind of your tent. And vever try to hasten the burning by using gasoline of other flammable liquid starters.

If you use your fireplace, have your chimney professionally cleaned in the fall to make sure it's in good condition for the coming season.

If you use a portable heater, be sure it is placed away from combustibles - drapertes. furniture, paper, etc. Remember. the surface heat of some portable. heaters may reach 500 degrees. so keep a careful watch on your children and warn them to keep. away from heaters. Hospitals are treating an increasing number of patients with burns resulting from contact with the outside surface of some portable heaters.

For a merry Christmas, choose a Christmas tree that does not have shedding needles, and keepit standing in water while it is in the house. If you choose an artificial tree, choose one that is flame-resistant.

After holiday parties, before retiring, check your ashtrays for smoldering eigraette butts, and carefully examine all upholstered chairs and solas to make sure that no "live" cigarette butts have fallen between the cushions. Remember, most house fires occur between 8 p.m. and 8 a.m., when poeple are sleeping.

Spring: Take spring cleaning seriously - clean out your attic. basement, garage and workshop. Throw out trash, especially combustibles such as rags, newspapers, magazines, boxes and scraps of wood. Never smoke while fueling gaspowered lawn mowers of chain saws. If you must store gasoline, store it in a ventilated area in a can designed especially for that purpose. And store only rags and sealed metal containers.

Summer: When cooking out. never use flammable liquids near live coats. An explosion or tlash fire could result. When you've finished cooking, soak the coals with water and make absolutely sure they're out when you leave. Smoldering coals that appear to be "dead" can reignite. as much as a day later. It you use a propane gas grill, always have the lighted match in post tion before turning on the gas.

Some tips for all seasons: Never smoke in bed.

 Never leave invalids or small. children alone in the house-not even for "a few minutes."

-Never use flammable liquids for dry cleanign indoors.

-Have periodic fire drills in you home to be sure everyone knows what to do in case of fire.

-Keep easy-to-use fire extinguishers in your kitchen, cottage, back bedrooms and on your boat, Invest in smoke detectors, and be sure that they are kept dust-free and in working order.

—The telephone number of your fire department should be taped to every telephone in your house. If it isn't, should a fire find it; get out, and call from a in our county to assist one are out, stay out. No treasure is worth risking your life for.

Hypertension Can Be Managed

has essential hypertension, and put her on Xanax. What is essential hypertension and what can be done for it?

DEAR READER — In medical jargon, the word "essential" means "doctors don't know

what causes it." Most hypertension was once however, experts are gleaning more insights into this disease. which affects about 20 percent of adults in North America. Although hypertension is becoming better understood - and there are known to be many causes - the majority of patients with high blood pressure are still known as essential hypertensives. The good news: Treatment is uniformly effective and there are many therapeutic drugs available.

Xanax is a tranquilizer, one of a class of medicines that are not recommended for high blood pressure. If your mother's pressure decreases on Xanax, she doesn't need the drug. Weightloss and behavioral relaxation techniques probably would be just as beneficial, with none of the side effects of a tranquilizer. On the other hand, if she does have hypertension, there are other, more sultable treatments. Ask her doctor why he chose not to treat her blood pressure. preferring instead to reduce her anxiety.

DEAR DR. GOTT - How can I get rid of light, downy facial hair that has developed on my cheeks, chin and upper-lip area? I have read about the use of hot wax, but I don't want to do anything that would make the problem worse. Would electrolysts work? Would estrogens help? l am 50 years old and had my last menstrual period about a vear ago.

DEAR READER - An increase in facial hair is common in women as they age. Estrogen would help, but may be associated with unwanted side effects and risks. Ask a cosmetologist in your community if wax or electrolysis would be beneficial in your case. In my experience, these methods are reliable and do not ordinarily

DEAR DR. GOTT - My worsen the problem. I think you mother's doctor said that she might also check with your gynecologist to see if he or she would recommend the judicious use of estrogen cream.

DEAR DR. GOTT - My skin is sensitive and my clothes cause pain when they rub against it, from the center of my back down to the left side of my stomach. I had kidney surgery about 10 judged to be "essential." Today, years ago. Does this pain indicate something serious?


