





# No Suspects As Motel Robberies Continue

An exterminator working in a room at the Holiday Inn, State Road 46, west of Sanford, told Seminole County sheriff's deputies he was robbed at gunpoint at about 7 p.m. Friday. A second man at the nearby Day's Inn also reported that at about the same time an attempt was made to rob him.

In the first case, Gerald A. McBride, 25, of Goldenrod, an employee of Getz Exterminators, reported the bandit who robbed him of about \$25 entered the open room where he was working and threatened him with a small revolver. The bandit tied McBride with his belt and towels before he fled with the cash.

In the attempted robbery, Felix P. Hernandez, 34, of Hialeah, told deputies he was buying a soft drink from a machine when a gunman armed with a small automatic pistol approached and said, "Get your Pepsi, then come with me."

Hernandez ran and told deputies he heard the bandit pull the trigger of the weapon, but it didn't fire.

He said he had seen the gunman a few minutes before the incident in a small, bright orange, American car, a sheriff's report said.

Within the past couple of months several guests at motels in the area of Interstate 4 in

Seminole County have been robbed by gunmen under similar circumstances.

An 18-year-old Longwood woman has been charged with grand theft after allegedly stealing \$125 from a billfold at a home at 1846 Longwood Lake Mary Road, Longwood, at about 11 a.m. Wednesday.

## Former Sarasota Mayor Indicted On Thirteen Counts Of Bribery

SARASOTA (UPI) — Former Mayor Ronald W. Norman was free on \$13,000 bond Friday, on 13 counts including bribery and racketeering.

Norman, 47, was named in a 22-count indictment returned by the Sarasota County grand jury Thursday. He was booked into county jail and immediately posted bond of \$1,000 on each count.

Norman was booked on charges of bribery, unlawful compensation for official behavior, unlawful compensation for official behavior to influence another public official, racketeering and conspiracy to engage in racketeering.

Dennis Trubey, case agent for the Florida Department of Law Enforcement said the indictment named other individuals and firms but those names will not be released until the suspects are arrested.

He said some are from out of state and investigators are trying

to locate the affected corporate officers.

The charges against Norman involve the alleged receipt of money from companies doing business with the city.

In a news release Thursday, the FDLE said Norman and the others were accused of engaging in a "pattern of racketeering activity involving officials of the Sarasota city government and persons and/or their firms doing business with or within the city of Sarasota from a period beginning about 1979 and continuing through 1983-84."

Doyle Jourdan, supervisor of the FDLE's Sarasota office stressed that other city officials mentioned in the news release may have been involved unknowingly.

The charges against Norman are first-degree and third-degree felonies, and if convicted, he could receive up to 30 years in prison and be fined \$10,000.



## 'Send Help' Banner Offered

This motorist aid banner designed to allow stranded drivers to signal for help while remaining in their locked vehicle is being offered by a non profit, California woman's safety organization. The plastic banner, designed to fold and store in the glove box when not in use, police say, might deter attackers who prey on stranded victims, while bringing help to the scene. Sanford Police Chief Steve Harriett called the banner a good idea if used in legitimate emergencies. He hasn't seen it used, but said, police would respond if notified that such a banner was being displayed. They're available for 33 plus 50 cents postage from Car Safety Signs, P.O. 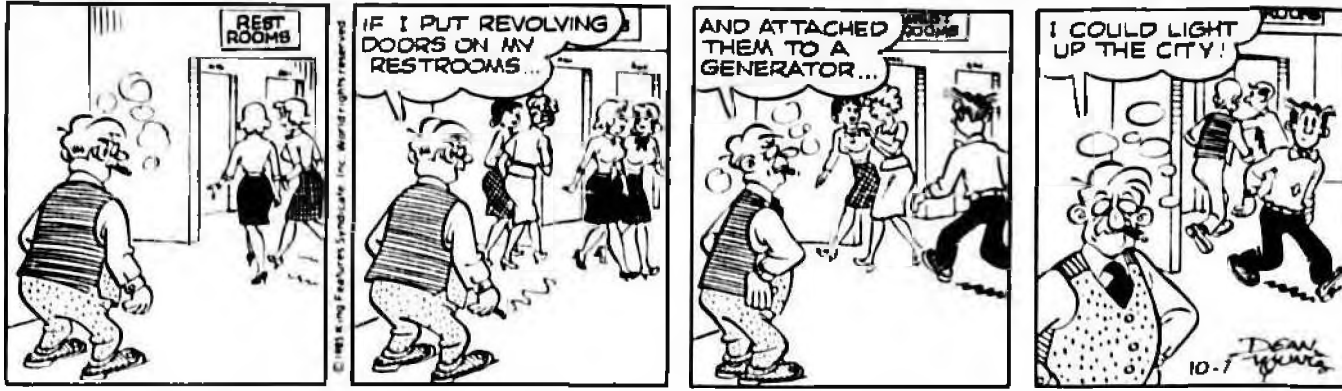

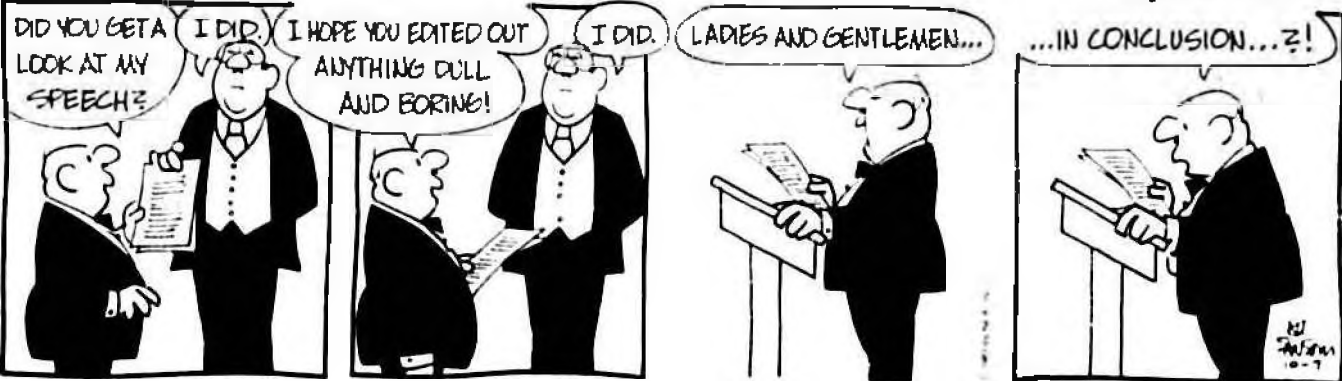

# Hypertension Can Be Managed



DEAR DR. GOTT — My mother's doctor said that she has essential hypertension, and put her on Xanax. What is essential hypertension and what can be done for it?

DEAR READER — In medical jargon, the word "essential" means "doctors don't know what causes it."

Most hypertension was once judged to be "essential." Today, however, experts are gaining more insights into this disease, which affects about 20 percent of adults in North America. Although hypertension is becoming better understood — and there are known to be many causes — the majority of patients with high blood pressure are still known as essential hypertensives. The good news: Treatment is uniformly effective and there are many therapeutic drugs available.

Xanax is a tranquilizer, one of a class of medicines that are not recommended for high blood pressure. If your mother's pressure decreases on Xanax, she doesn't need the drug. Weight loss and behavioral relaxation techniques probably would be just as beneficial, with none of the side effects of a tranquilizer. On the other hand, if she does have hypertension, there are other, more suitable treatments. Ask her doctor why he chose not to treat her blood pressure, preferring instead to reduce her anxiety.

DEAR DR. GOTT — How can I get rid of light, downy facial hair that has developed on my cheeks, chin and upper-lip area? I have read about the use of hot wax, but I don't want to do anything that would make the problem worse. Would electrolysis work? Would estrogens help? I am 50 years old and had my last menstrual period about a year ago.

DEAR READER — An increase in facial hair is common in women as they age. Estrogen would help, but may be associated with unwanted side effects and risks. Ask a cosmetologist in your community if wax or electrolysis would be beneficial in your case. In my experience, these methods are reliable and do not ordinarily

worsen the problem. I think you might also check with your gynecologist to see if he or she would recommend the judicious use of estrogen cream.

DEAR DR. GOTT — My skin is sensitive and my clothes cause pain when they rub against it, from the center of my back down to the left side of my stomach. I had kidney surgery about 10 years ago. Does this pain indicate something serious?

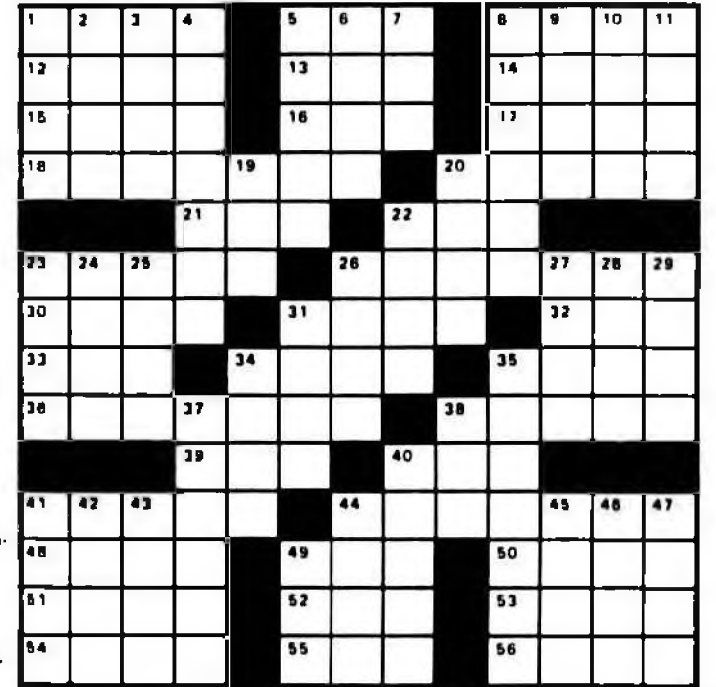
