TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 27.—(INS)—A boost for Governor Martin's campaign for the United States Senate was seen today in the decision of the State Supreme Court which late yesterday upheld the Governor's program to finance the Everglades drainage to completion.

The court unanimously reversed the decision of the Florida Circuit Court at the same time dissolving the injunction against the commissioners of the Everglades Drainage District in executing 1927 acts providing for a \$20,000,000 bond issue to finance the drainage to completion.

LONDON, Mar. 24.—(INS)—With the arrival in London of definite news that three American cars will be built to wrest the world's motor-car speed record from Great Britain next year, the blood of British sportsmen is stirred to a slightly higher pitch than is usual and they are saying that they will be maste. of the land, sea and air in 1929.

To show that this is no mere idle boast, a group of financiers-sportsmen have already met and decided to bank a fund of \$100,000 to retain the record. This move to maintain British international prestige, coupled with the plans of American sporting enthusiasts, promise to develop the most intensive Anglo-American speed war ever seen. Exclusive of the Government air service expenditure, it is believed that approximately \$1,250,000 will be spent by British and American sportsmen and firms to retain, or capture, the speed record; the British international motor-boat speed record and the Schneider Cup trophies.

Plans for the "all-British" car have already begun. This car is to be specially built from the design of the finest high-speed motor-car engineers of British birth. BLESSING OF NETS REVIVED

After a lapse of a century, "blessing the nets," an ancient custom, was revived at the opening of the present salmon fishing season on the River Lee, Ireland. The ceremony was held at Blackrock, where many of the fisherfolk reside. A fleet of 34 boats, each manned with a crew of four, assembled at the pierhead, where a crowd had gathered. The service included a reading from the Gospel of St. John, which tells of the blessing of the nets in the Sea of Galilee. Priests, preceded by cross-bearers and acolytes, intoned the blessing, while the fishermen with bared heads stood in their boats.

Precious Stones Pave Roads

What is declared to be the most costly blunder in the world has been revealed in the Russian town of Swerdlowsk. Nearly \$2,500,000 worth of precious stones have been used in road making there. The lot was bought for an equivalent of \$80. Huge blocks of Jasper were buried in the ground, while beautiful green malachite, topaz and even jade were crushed to use in the paving. The mistake is said to be similar to that at Kimberley, South Africa, when the streets of the city were paved. The blue clay used there contained diamonds, and when the mistake was discovered it was carefully scraped up and washed. More than \$5,000,000 worth of gems, some as big as hazel nuts, were recovered. The timely discovery made this blunder less costly than that in Russia.

Renewal Of Bitter Gang Warfare Is Predicted By Heads Of Chicago Crime

CHICAGO, Mar. 24.—(INS)—Renewal of the bitter gang war feud which has cost the lives of hundreds of men, the bombing of hundreds of dwellings and continued reign of gunfire is predicted by one of the higher-ups in gangland here for control of the \$75,000,000 annual vice, liquor and gambling commission now controlled by the famous leader "Scarface" Al Capone.

One of "Scarface's" chief lieutenants, Jack Mc Guinn, "nuts in man" and professional "tough guy" tell under a withering cross-examination as he sat in a telephone booth.

This, according to information received confidentially by International News Service, was the outburst of a new war—a war to the finish.

Recently, combined efforts of politicians and gangsters, and to be "about" with the City Hall rules, have attempted to oust Capone from the Chicago racket. Capone, after a lengthy, wandering about country, returned to Chicago and went into conference with his chief vice and gambling man, Joe Casack, alias, Gusel.

Gusel, Casack reported the "war" was dead; it was heard of "Scarface" under expert advice broadcast the information he was "out of the racket" and literally a fugitive from the Chicago police.

This is untrue. Capone today is in control of all vice, liquor and gambling in Chicago.

But other interests are now threatening the gang chief. It is a lieutenant, who learned the rudiments of gang lore from "Scarface" and his underworld boss, has now raised a band of young men, now called "the boys," to get men on the racket for the big money.

It is well known what a party is being held in the home of the lieutenant, who is presiding at the banding outbreak, the idea of an organized house, and the current young of "taking a name for a job."

The Skeptics Have It

Some people are so glibly they believe everything they hear; others are so distrustful that they don't believe anything. Of the two one is about as bad as the other. Our idea of the ideal end to be attained is the happy faculty of recognizing the truth from fiction no matter how subtly the latter may be disguised.

Robert L. Ripley has observed the human characteristic of disbelieving and for years has been making a very good living by playing up to it. He draws for the New York Evening Post a cartoon which he calls "Believe It or Not" and nine times out of ten very few believe it, although it is always the absolute truth. The skeptics are fooled.

The other day readers of the Post were stunned when Ripley solemnly announced that Lindbergh was the sixty-seventh man to make a non-stop flight across the Atlantic Ocean. Time says that three thousand indignant letter-writers demanded an immediate apology in behalf of the hero of the air.

But Mr. Ripley explained his statement very easily and clearly. He simply stated that Alcock and Brown, as everyone knows, made a non-stop flight between Newfoundland and Ireland in 1919, that thirty-one men were aboard the English dirigible B34 on its trans-Atlantic flight in 1919, and that thirty-three men were aboard the German Z43 (Los Angeles) on its trip from Germany to Lakewood, N. J. in 1922.

Ripley was right. Lindbergh was the sixty-seventh man to fly across the Atlantic. But Mr. Ripley is always saying something like that. He has been called the "greatest liar in America," and yet he is always telling the truth. Working For Success

Someone has said "They also serve who only stand and wait, but we doubt very seriously if the poet meant that any considerable degree of success would ever come to those who just stand around and wait for it. Most people, who attain success, battle their way to the top of the ladder by tremendous effort.

A few find the going comparatively easy, going steadily upward with seldom any hitch or setback in their progress. They arrive at the top early in life. Others take longer, sometimes have to begin all over again at the bottom. They do not "arrive" until middle life or old age. Others never succeed at all.

The Forum Magazine tells an interesting story of how success came to a man who did not stand and wait, but who met failure after failure, and took the hard knocks of life, always coming back for more. He was Ramsey Ben, who had spent a lifetime in newspaper work and magazine writing, and had failed in ever doing anything which would have been a mark of success in his profession.

For five years he sent a contribution each week to the magazine Life, only to have them all turned down. There of the stout heartedness in that man who working on one story or poem all the time, finished fifty-two every year, and never had a one of them accepted. In two years three of the work he had done which had brought him nothing.

Then one day he "landed." Life accepted one of his stories, and he quickly became a constant contributor not only to Life but also to Puck. That gave him additional courage and he set to work on a novel, much of which was based on his own life. The novel attained an immediate success and won for its author a \$7,500 prize offered by a famous monthly magazine.

But what is of more importance to Ramsey Ben than the money he received is the knowledge that he has attained. He knows now that all those years of tedious effort when he was writing stories and getting nothing for it were not wasted but were merely the foundation for his greater work later on. Success was hard for him, but it was worth working for.

REDUCING TAXES IN PITTSBURGH

How the City and County of Pittsburgh took the bold step of reducing taxes to a vacant lot in Pittsburgh.

The plan was to build a building in Pittsburgh that the Chamber of Commerce calls "the most remarkable in the city's history." In 1925 construction of new buildings broke all records. Building passed involving the expenditure of a million dollars at home are so much more numerous than in any previous period that it is probably safe to say that last year the total cost of new buildings in the million dollar class was greater than the total cost of all such building erected in Pittsburgh in the previous fifteen years. Start building on your lot, however, and down come the taxes. Evidently the citizens were inclined to favor creative industry and to frown upon speculation. Why not push them further and make speculation in land a bit more costly to its promoters? 

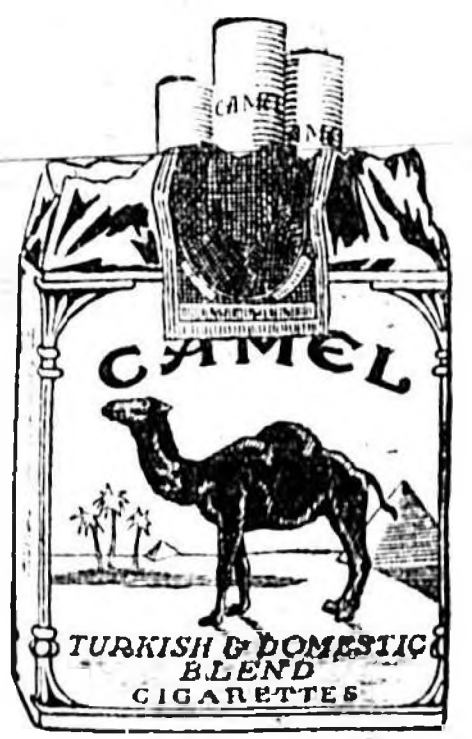

2nd Flood Menaces Stricken Areas Of California District

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 27.—(INS)—While North Sacramento, flood-stricken suburb of California's capital city, ministered to 100 homeless families, counted its tremendous property losses and searched a swollen expanse of water for bodies of those believed missing, a new flood peak, mounting as it neared the "bottle-neck," rushed down the Sacramento River today toward this city.

In North Sacramento, dawn found hundreds of refugees lined up for breakfast in emergency quarters established by relief agencies, while two squads of national guardsmen patrolled the district to prevent looting of flooded homes.

ped off on their ill-fated flight.
No storms of any great intensity were reported but low temperatures and overhanging clouds would be encountered almost over the entire route, weather experts predicted.
Captain Koehl attempted to conquer the Atlantic in a forward flight last year but was forced to give up the attempt because of terrific head-winds. He is rated as a cool, capable flier and has been planning the present attempt since his failure last year.
The Bremen is a sister ship of the Europa which also made an unsuccessful flight attempt last year. The Europa was wrecked in a forced landing after going only a short distance. Koehl's plane has a fuel capacity which is said to be sufficient to keep it aloft from 25 to 40 hours. It is powered with a

motor of the same type as that which now holds the world's record for endurance flying.
BERLIN, Mar. 27.—(INS)—The German Lufthansa today definitely disclaimed all responsibility for the projected trans-Atlantic flight of Captain Koehl in his plane, the Bremen, by announcing that he had automatically "fired" himself from the company's employ when he hopped off from Berlin to Baldonnel. "Koehl broke his contract and thereby dissociated himself from us," company officials stated. Meanwhile high army aviation officials and the German press continued extremely skeptical of the practicability of the flight at this time. Several papers editorially warned the flier and his companions that they were embarking on a "foolhardy" enterprise.
"Children will be children. We can only hope that if they play with fire they won't get burned," was the laconic comment of Director Merkel of the Lufthansa. Only a few papers comment favorably upon the project of Capt. Koehl and

Declaring his opposition to the nomination of Al Smith as the Democratic standard bearer, Gilchrist Stockton, prominent Jacksonville attorney, today announced his candidacy for delegate to the Houston convention from the fourth congressional district.
If elected, Mr. Stockton promised to fight the nomination of the New York governor to the limit. He proposes to urge the adoption of a plank in the party platform pledging the Democrats to a reapportionment of seats in the house of representatives immediately following the 1930 census. Of the 25 mills assessed for taxes this year, approximately 11.6 mills will be used to pay interest and retire bonds.

The City's bond debt must be paid. If you fail to pay your taxes the City will be forced to borrow money to pay for these bonds.

Borrowing money to pay taxes means selling bonds. Selling bonds to pay for bonds means more interest with the principal still unpaid.

More interest and unpaid principal can mean but one thing.... your taxes will be higher next year.
