## CWA WORKERS SEEK PLACES FOR MORE MEN

With 625 Persons Put  
On Regular Tasks,  
Officials Speed To  
Find Jobs For All

With 625 white and colored men actually at work this morning on a regular 30-hour work week payroll basis instead of the part-time salaries they have been receiving for weeks, weary local Civil Works Administration workers who have been literally swamped with detail during the past 72 hours this morning began the even more difficult task of assigning the remaining able-bodied unemployed men of this county to work projects that are expected to begin before this week is over.

One of the most hectic weeks known to the local workers was climaxed yesterday when over 500 white and colored men, gathering at the Court House early in the morning milled about the building until almost all of them had been given a pin of paper which represented their assignment to one of several projects which are under process of completion.

Employers of white or colored labor in this county, whether it be one person or 100 persons, are appealed to by Mrs. Helen T. Morse, county welfare director today, for aid in assisting the local Civil Works Administration in placing those persons actually out of work on Federal payrolls as quickly as possible.

These employers are requested to "see" the Civil Works Administration office in the Court House, immediately, the names of any employees that have quit jobs, or are contemplating quitting their jobs, so that they might register for work under the CWA.

Mrs. Morse is stated that this information is needed at once. To facilitate the handling of such information Mrs. Morse has named R. A. Cameron, CWA office worker, in charge of gathering this data. Mr. Cameron can be reached by telephone at 282-37 and it is suggested that all employers call him as quickly as possible in the event that the or more employees has quit a job.

The order to place approximately 600 persons on regular jobs starting today came through as a definite fact late Friday. Immediately upon receipt of the information, a corps of stenographers and contact men went into action, checking and re-checking a mountainous mass of data which had been gathered as representing the recent doing of every man and woman on the relief rolls.

This work continued until early Sunday morning, and after a brief rest, the entire personnel (Continued On Page Three)

## WYNEKOOP IS CLEARED OF DEATH CHARGE

Slain Woman's Mate  
Now Charged With  
Being Accessory,  
Mother As Killer

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Earl Wynekoop was arraigned in felony court today on a charge of necessity before the fact in the slaying of his wife Rheta.

The charge was substituted for the formal murder charge lodged Saturday against the youth whose "confession" that he killed the girl was spurned by police as an effort to save his mother from conviction.

Dr. Alice Wynekoop is held for grand jury action on a murder charge. Young Wynekoop was returned to the custody of police without a trial.

Selection of one of the most puzzling angles of the Wynekoop murder case was announced yesterday by assistant United States Attorney Charles S. Douglass, with the discovery of seventeen blank cartridges in the pistol with which Rheta Wynekoop was shot.

The cartridges were shown the prosecutor by the husband of the slain girl, and are believed to explain the finding of three exploded shells in the gun despite the fact that only one bullet took effect in Rheta's body.

"It is our theory that Earl and his mother may have planned to kill Rheta for several weeks," thoughtfully said, "If this plan was to confuse the issue and to create just such a mystery as has been developed, the firing of blank cartridges in the gun would accomplish this end."

The youthful husband pleaded guilty and admitted he had made cartridges and given them to his father, a local leader, and had also explained to his stepmother that he had made the cartridges.

Dr. Wynekoop, who is charged with the crime, had agreed to appear before the grand jury called by a Justice of the Peace before the trial date of October 1st, and had been given an anesthetic injection prior to his appearance.

Chilly Winds Fail To  
Halt Scheduled Jump

Chilly winds failed to halt a scheduled parachute jump which Floyd Stinson, nationally known parachute jumper who resides in the city during the winter, had announced for yesterday.

While about 1500 persons looked on, Stinson climbed into the cockpit of a flashy red airplane owned by Elton Floyd, soared into the sky from the lakefront aviation field, and at a height of about 1500 feet above Lake Monroe and almost directly north of Municipal Pier, he dived into

the water. His parachute opened wide after a short fall and as the plane set apart in the sky about him Stinson drifted eastward at a rapid rate to fall into Lake Monroe not far from Grassy Point. Before the parachute had descended to the water, he was given a wild ride through the water when the wind caught the parachute and towed him at a rapid rate of speed for over 500 feet. He was brought back to the aviation field in a small motor boat. It was his 23rd jump, and he plans to make another jump next Sunday afternoon.

## UPWARD TREND IN INDUSTRY SEEN CLEARLY

Christmas Volume For  
Nation Is At Highest  
Level For 3 Seasons;  
Car Loadings Better

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—

The signs of a reversal in the downward trend of industrial activity which appeared two weeks ago were visible in even stronger statistics of the last five days.

Now analysts began to point off some of the automobile assembly lines—steel production quickened slightly, contrary to the usual seasonal trend at this time, and the weekly statistics for the movement of revenue freight showed a marked expansion, although the figures normally down at this season.

## GATOR VICTORY OVER AUBURN IS WEEK'S SURPRISE

Experts Marvel Over Florida's Recovery After Three Losses

ATLANTA, Nov. 27.—(AP)—A football victory, which was one of the most surprising victories of the year Saturday to defeat Auburn, the club that went to an upset triumph over Georgia Tech in the first half of Florida's win, 14 to 7, was the only astonishing result of a day that saw Louisiana continue its slide with a 21 to 6 decision over Mississippi State, Tulane win its last game, and Georgia Tech, after a tie at a point, 7 to 6, defeat Georgia Tech.

The Gators, recognized as a fine defensive outfit, whose potentially dangerous attack had failed to make much impression in their first two games, annihilated the Bulldogs in the second and third period. A fumble in the fourth period gave Auburn opportunity to score on a short pass, but it was held off by a 20-yard run, and Louisiana, which had been beaten more than 60 yards, brought Louisiana's victory over an unexpectedly strong Mississippi State with Carl Bikes, the Mississippi coach, unable to find his team's way out.

a 7-6 win for Georgia over its ancient state rival before a crowd of 35,000.

The game was the game, but Georgia Tech, employed the Bulldogs all the way and only the break—Gat—had gone against the Engineers—kept Tech from winning.
