

CWA WORKERS SEEK PLACES FOR MORE MEN

With 625 Persons Put
On Regular Tasks,
Officials Speed To
Find Jobs For All

With 625 white and colored men actually at work this morning on a regular 30-hour work week payroll basis instead of the part-time salaries they have been receiving for weeks, weary local Civil Works Administration workers who have been literally swamped with detail during the past 72 hours this morning began the even more difficult task of assigning the remaining able-bodied unemployed men of this county to work projects that are expected to begin before this week is over.

One of the most hectic weeks known to the local workers was climaxed yesterday when over 500 white and colored men, gathered at the Court House early in the morning, milled about the building until almost all of them had been given a slip of paper which represented their assignment to one of several projects which are under process of completion.

MACARTHUR SEES DANGER IN U. S. ARMY STRENGTH

Annual Report Issued By Chief Of Staff Suggests Remedies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff, yesterday reported the Army's strength "below the danger line."

"I consider it of the most urgent importance in the United States that the condition be rectified without delay," he said.

The chief of staff's warning of America's military standing, which he said was 17th in the world relative strength, was made in his annual report to Secretary of War Dern.

Mac Arthur Is Making Specific Recommendations For Increasing The Army's Efficiency, Spoke Of The "Evil State Of Unrest Now Prevailing Throughout The World."

Mac Arthur is making specific recommendations for increasing the Army's efficiency, spoke of the "evil state of unrest now prevailing throughout the world."

The recommendations include:

- A boost in regular Army strength from 120,000 to 165,000, with immediate execution of the enlisted men from the 16 percent government lay cut.
- An expenditure of nearly \$200,000,000 on a re-armed, mechanization, and a re-armed equipment and general motorization.
- Maintenance of the National Guard at existing strength with 48 drill periods and two weeks active training annually.
- At least 100,000 Reserve Officers with "year" active training for at least 80,000. At present there are 110,000 Reserve officers but only 87,000 are eligible for active duty training.
- Restoration of the 1932 instruction and personnel scale for the R. O. T. C. and C. M. T. C.
- The United States also need a military establishment comparable to the great powers existing in certain of the foreign nations," MacArthur said.

Chilly Winds Fail To Halt Scheduled Jump

Chilly winds failed to halt a scheduled parachute jump which Floyd Sillman, nationally known parachute jumper who resides in this city during the winter, had announced for yesterday.

While about 1500 persons looked on, Sillman climbed into the cockpit of a flashy red airplane owned by Elton Floyd, soared into the sky from the lakefront aviation field, and at a height of about 1500 feet above Lake Monroe, and almost directly north of Municipal Pier, he dived into space.

His parachute opened wide after a short fall and as the wings came out capers in the sky about him, Sillman drifted eastward at a rapid rate to fall into Lake Monroe not far from Grassy Point. Before the parachute had collapsed in the water, he was given a wild ride through the water when the wind caught the parachute and towed him at a rapid rate of speed for over 500 feet. He was brought back to the aviation field in a small motor boat. It was his 23rd jump, and he plans to make another jump next Monday afternoon.

WYNEKOOP IS CLEARED OF DEATH CHARGE

Slain Woman's Mate Now Charged With Being Accessory, Mother As Killer

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Earl Wynkoop was arraigned in felony court today on a charge of accessory before the fact in the slaying of his wife Rheta.

The charge was substituted for the formal murder charge lodged Saturday against the youth whose "confession" that he killed the girl was spurned by police as an effort to save his mother from conviction.

Dr. Alice Wynkoop is held for grand jury action on a murder charge. Young Wynkoop was retained to the custody of police without a trial.

Solution of one of the most puzzling murder cases was announced yesterday by assistant State At- torney Charles S. Dougherty, with the discovery of several blank cartridges for the pistol with which Rheta Wynkoop was shot.

The cartridges were shown the prosecutor by the husband of the slain girl and are believed to explain the finding of three expended shells in the room denoting the fact that only one bullet took effect in Rheta's body.

"It is our theory that Earl and his mother may have planned to kill Rheta for several weeks," Dougherty said. "If this plot was to be carried out, it was necessary to procure such a mystery as has been developed, the firing of blank cartridges in the room would establish this end."

Borah, Supporting Roosevelt Challenges Smith To Offer Better Program Of Recovery

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Senator Borah, Idaho Republican, has jumped into the free-for-all battle over President Roosevelt's monetary program with a direct challenge to critics of the price-raising plan to offer something in its place other than "the policy under which we are at this present disastrous condition."

Borah's challenge was made in a formal statement directed at Alfred E. Smith and others who have recently attacked the President's monetary policies.

It was the high spot of another barrage of comment on the monetary question, in which H. Walton Moore, assistant secretary of state, lined up with the President, Senator Fess (R., Ohio) attacked the program, and Governor Black denied a rift between the Federal Reserve Board and the Treasury.

While the controversy raged, the Administration made no change in the prevailing price of domestic gold of \$35.70 an ounce, though the dollar strengthened abroad and agriculture department statistics showed a rise in the farmers' purchasing power from an index figured 69 in July.

Borah said that the monetary issue was not one of "sound" or "honest" money.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The signs of a reversal in the downward trend of industrial activity which appeared two weeks ago, were evident in even clearer fashion in the business statistics of the past few days.
