ing 1,300,000 state AFL members that the amendment "originated with a group of western employers who want state unemployment agencies to deny benefits" to all unemployed members of any union on strike.

Under minimum federal standards, he said, the states could not withhold payments to such jobless workers because to do so would be forcing workers "to take struck work." But the Knowland Amendment would deprive the Secretary of Labor of requiring states to conform to the standards, Tobin said.

Tobin said that unification of the CIO and the AFL "now seems close to consummation," and added that such a merger "has long been one of my fondest hopes." "Never in the past," he said, "have the two great wings of labor seemed so close together, never has our labor movement seemed so near to broadening its political activity and other forms of cooperation into organic single-

Korean Communists Renew Pressure On American Lines; Drive To Within Forty Miles Of U.S. Base At Pusan

President Sees World Peace As Endangered; Agrees To Controls

Truman Calls For \$4 Billion More For Re-Arming Of West European Nations

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1—(AP)—President Truman told Congress today that world peace has been endangered by the Korean crisis and asked it to vote quickly \$4,000,000,000 of new money to arm anti-Communist allies.

Speed in getting production of military equipment under way is imperative, the President said in a letter to House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) formally asking for the money.

Mr. Truman added:

"It is now clear that the free nations must accelerate the efforts they are making to strengthen their common security.

"They now have no alternative but to increase rapidly their preparedness to defend the principles of international law and justice for which the United Nations stands. This course provides the best hope of deterring future calculated outbreaks against the peace of the world."

Malik Presides At First August Council Meeting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1—(AP)—President Truman today presided at the first meeting of the National Security Council, which is to advise the President on all matters relating to the national defense.

Malik reached the U. N. building at 1:59 P. M. (EST) and the Council session began 13 minutes later. His ruling on China came quickly, and the council planned to meet again in two weeks.

Power To Control Wages, Prices And To Ration Goods Raises No Objection

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1—(AP)—President Truman today said he has no objection to enactment of stand-by powers to control wages and prices, and to ration consumer goods.

Mr. Truman set out his position in a letter to Senator Maybank (D-S.C.), chairman of the Senate Banking Committee. That group is now working on controls legislation.

The President's nod of consent made it virtually certain that Congress would put in his hands the power to clamp on wage-price rationing whenever he feels they are needed.

Missouri Voters Pick Senatorial Candidates Today

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 1—(AP)—Missouri voters picked U. S. senatorial nominees today in a primary election called by Governor Warren.

The two principal candidates for the Democratic senatorial nomination are Emerly W. Allison, a veterinarian, and James H. Hennings, Jr., a former congressman.

Allison had the support of Mr. Truman. The President would like to see him win the Senate seat now held by Republican Forrest C. Donnell.

Conviction Of 11 Commies Upheld By Appellate Court

NEW YORK, Aug. 1—(AP)—The U.S. Court of Appeals unanimously affirmed today the conviction of 11 Communist leaders on charges of conspiring to overthrow the government by force and violence.

The main opinion of 69 pages was written by Chief Judge Learned Hand with Justice Thomas W. Swan concurring. A separate concurring opinion of seven pages was written by Judge H. H. Cummings.

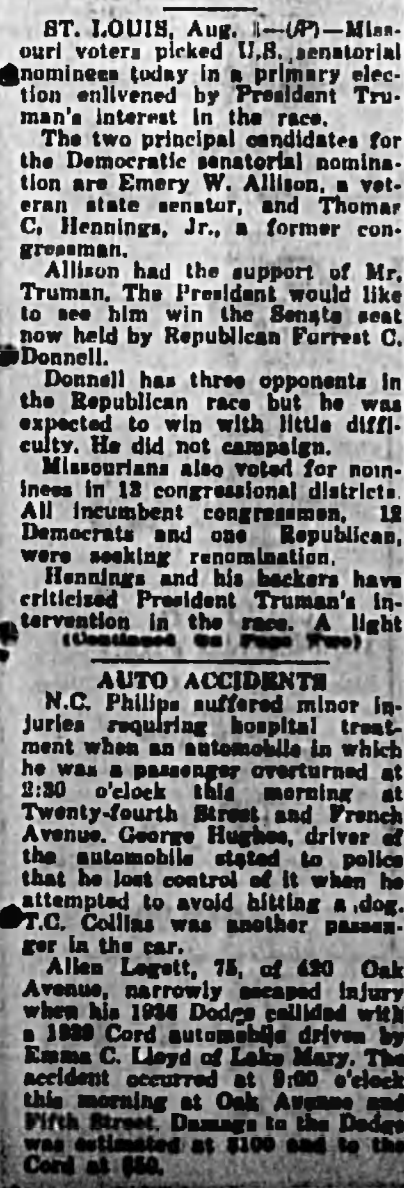
Business Demands High Taxes And Austerity To Pay For War

They wrote the doughboy off after the First World War and said tanks—better tanks—but it isn't lack of tanks that has chiefly hampered the Americans and South Koreans.

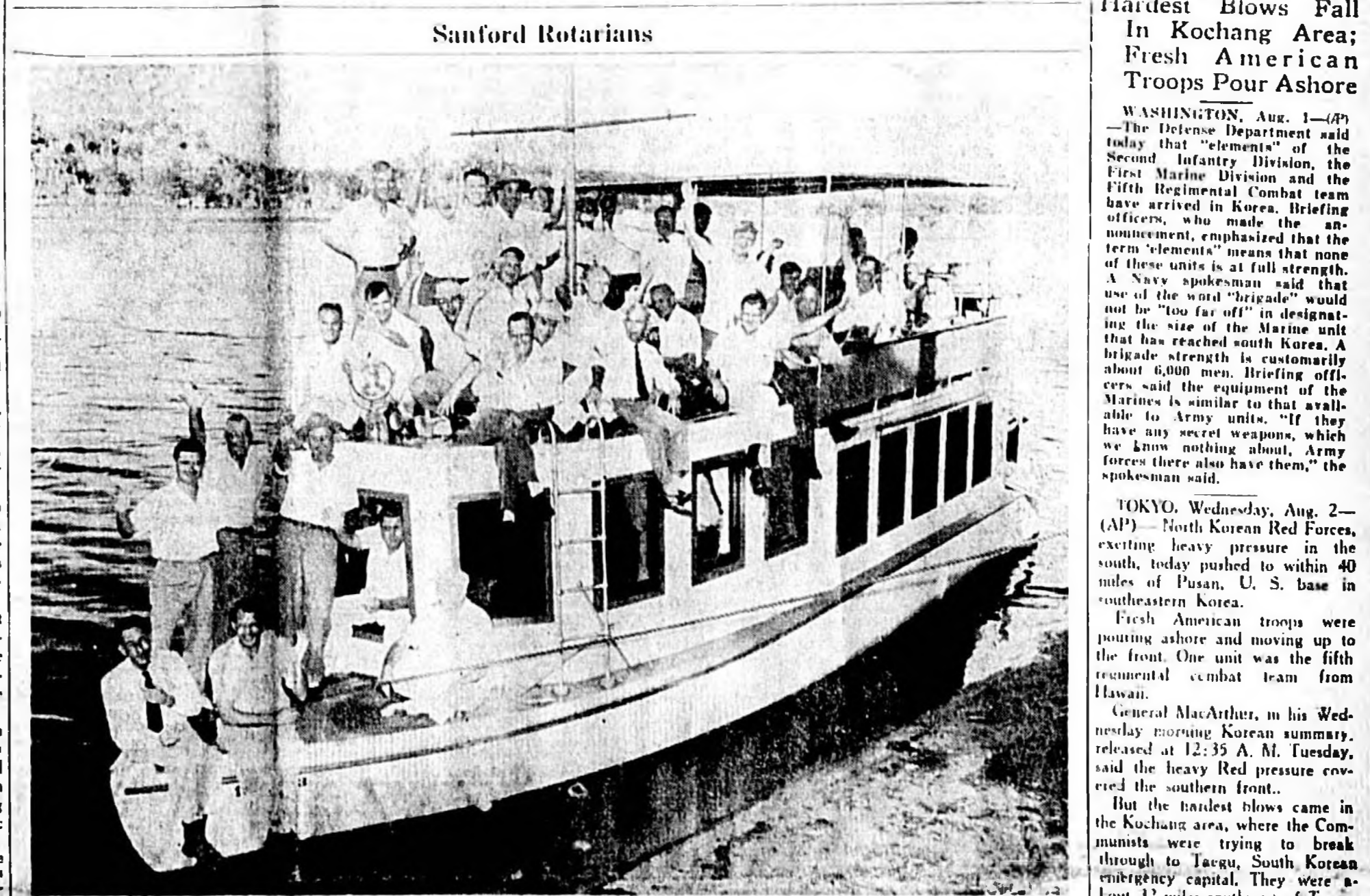
City Commission Meeting Postponed

Hardest Blows Fall In Kochang Area; Fresh American Troops Pour Ashore

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1—(AP)—The Defense Department said today that "elements" of the Second Infantry Division, the Fifth Marine Division and the Fifth Regimental Combat team have arrived in Korea. Briefing officers, who made the announcement, emphasized that the term "elements" means that none of these units is at full strength.

TOKYO, Wednesday, Aug. 2—(AP)—North Korean Red Forces, exerting heavy pressure in the south, today pushed to within 40 miles of Pusan, U. S. base in southeastern Korea.

Fresh American troops were pouring ashore and moving up to the front. One unit was the fifth regimental combat team from Hawaii.

General MacArthur, in his Wednesday morning Korean summary, released at 12:35 A. M. Tuesday, said the heavy Red pressure covered the southern front.

But the heaviest blows came in the Kochang area, where the Communists were trying to break through to Taegu, South Korean emergency capital. They were about 32 miles southwest of Taegu.

The MacArthur summary issued a few hours after the United Nations commander returned from Formosa to Tokyo, said UN troops were attacking the Reds around Yondok on the east coast. U. S. pilots reported the Communists in positions 1,500 yards north of the wrecked city.

"It is possible that friendly forces have again forced entry into that port city," MacArthur's summary said.

The MacArthur release described the front as running roughly from one mile south of Yondok to 10 miles southwest of Sangju, one mile southeast of Kwangju, seven miles northeast of Kijochu, four miles southeast of Chingju.

The summary spoke of eight UN troops withdrawn but said they were not forced and were made to prepared positions.

Chiang said a foundation also had been laid for Chinese-American military cooperation.

"Our struggle against Communist aggression will certainly result in final victory," Chiang declared.

MacArthur flew back to Tokyo yesterday after talks with Generalissimo.

MacArthur turned down Chiang's renewed offer of 33,000 Nationalist troops to fight alongside United Nations forces in Korea.

"Such action at this time might seriously jeopardize the defense," he said.

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 1—(AP)—The Florida Supreme Court today refused to order the admission of five Negroes to the University of Florida.

The court in a unanimous opinion said it would not order admission until it was proved "to the satisfaction of this court" that the Board of Control has not furnished Negroes opportunities for desired courses "substantially equal" to those offered all other students of any race supported by state funds.

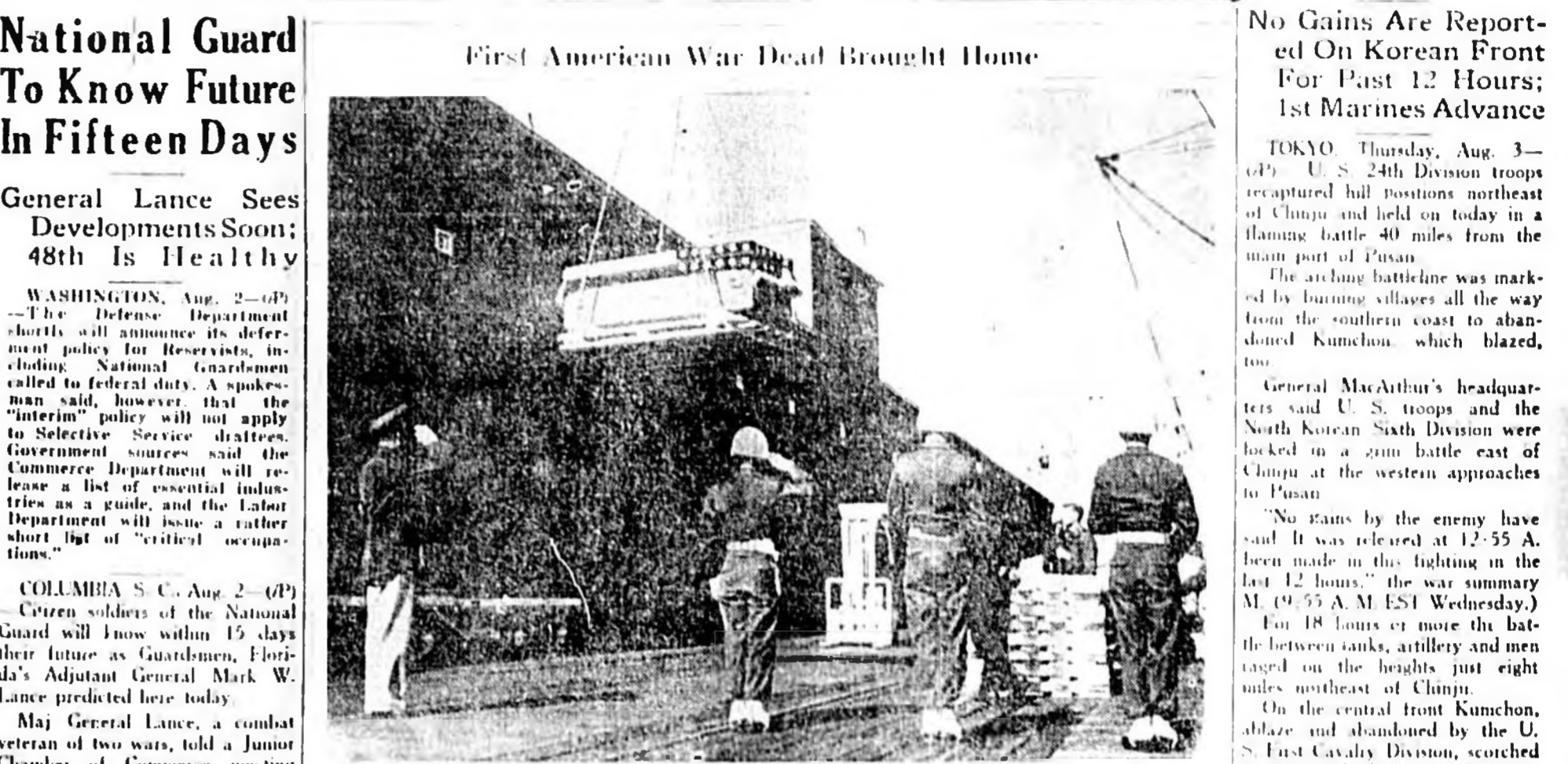
