


Altamonte Springs police have arrested two persons in connection with the murder Tuesday, of Steve Schuloff in his apartment at 630 Cranes Way in Altamonte Springs.

Officers were called to the apartment when Schuloff's girlfriend reported she was unable to locate him, and that there was suspicious activities at the apartment when she tried to contact him.

Courtney later arrived at the Altamonte Springs police sta-tion with her mother. She reportedly told officers that on Sunday, Feb. 8, her father had beaten her at her residence. She said she met with Moran at the Altamonte Mall later and told him about the beating. She said



# Invent something

Celebrating the makers of the ferris wheel and the reaper

Hove to read information about inventors. Two of them have birthday anniversaries in the next few days.

On Feb. 14, 1859, George Washington Gale Ferris was born in Galesburg, Ill. As his name implies, he is credited with designing and constructing the first Ferris wheel. He developed it for the World Colombian Exposition in Chicago in



1893. It was 250 feet in diameter, with 36 coaches, each capable of carrying up to 40 people. That's a total of 1,440 people, larger than anything we have at our amusement parks these days. The people stood up in the cars for their circular trip. Needless to say, it was the featured attraction at that fair. Ferris said it was designed as America's answer to the Eiffel Tower built for the Paris International Exposition of 1889. Ferris died in Pittsburgh just three years after his wheel was introduced.

Cyrus H. McCormick was born Feb. 15, 1809 in Rockbridge County, Va. He is credit-

ed with having developed the reaper, said to be second only to the creation of railroads, in the betterment of the farmers of our nation. Actually, he didn't design it. His father had attempted to create a reaper during previous years, but died before it could be fully developed. His son took over the task and introduced his first reaper, with horse-operated power, in July of 1831. It was first demonstrated in a wheattield in Virginia, but McCormick moved to Chicago in 1847 to be closer to the farming center of the nation. Even though there were 20 years of litigation regarding his patent rights, he eventually won, and his business prospered. He died in 1884 and by 1902, his family sold the rights to others who consolidated into what became International Harvester Company. These days, his original reaper has become one of the major pieces of equipment on most grain producing farms. It is now very large, with an enclosed cab for the operator, complete with heat and air conditioning, and often a radio and twoway telephone operation.

Earlier this month, on Feb. 11, we had the birthday anniversiry of Thomas Alva Edison, born in 1847, Talk about patents, he held more than 1,200 of them, including patents for the incandescent lamp, phonograph, electric dynamo, and key parts of such items as the movie camera and telephone transmitter. His once said, "Genius is one percent inspiration, and <sup>09</sup> percent perspiration." He died in Menlo Park, N.J. in 1931.

The purpose here is to call attention to those who may have developed something which would become sellable, but failed to patent their creation. There are many ways these days, including e-mail, which offer to help a person patent something new. The only problem is some of these so-called experts, who might try to take some of the financial gain away from the inventor in the name of being a co-filer. This is dangerous unless you look into the person who says he will get your patent. I had a close friend and relative who worked at the Kennedy Space Center years ago. In his spare time, he was allowed to take home some of the waste fluids from the space program, which he ran through a make-shift still in his shed, and produced some of the strongest glue known at that time. The glue became part of the construction of space related projects. He didn't bother to obtain a patent however. Eventually he turned his process over to the KSC officials he worked for. He suspected that the person who did take over the process obtained the patent and possibly became extremely wealthy. I suspect there are others here in Central Florida who may be in the same situation. Don't let your discovery or invention go to waste. Apply for a patent. You may find someone else has already filed for a patent on what you have created, but one never knows. You may be onto something that could not only be of benefit to future mankind, but be financially good for you as an individual.

## Downtown owner objects to paper's 'untruthful' report




## **Bishop Arthur Lee Smith passes**





SANFORD - When is Arbor Day? A former Sanford city official once told us, "It's any time we want it to be." Such is the case.

The National Arbor Day is supposed to be the last Friday in April (30th). While it is usually declared by **Presidential** Proclamation, it has never been officially verified in Congress. In Florida, Arbor Day is Jan. 19. In the city of Sanford however, this year, it was held on Feb. 9.

Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard, members of the city commission, city officials, members of the Scenic **Improvement Board** (SIB) and special guests, held festivities at Magnolia Square, in the heart of downtown Sanford. The SIB and Lessard planted Live Oak Trees.

Sanford Parks and **Grounds Operations** Manager Marc Hultin delivered the official Arbor Day Message, after which the officials, armed with shovels, dug into the ground for the planting.

Four oaks, valued at about \$1,600 were donated for the ceremony by Chuck Gonyea, district manager of John Deere Landscaping. The trees were actually planted just off Magnolia Avenue between First and Second streets.

Arbor day started on April 10, 1872, in Nebraska, by J. Sterling Morton. About half of the states now observe the event sometime in April, probably due to the beginning of warming across the entire nation when trees can be safely planted.

In his official proclamation of the event, Lessard explained that trees can reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air and produce oxygen, and provide habitat for wildlife.

Sanford has been recognized as a Tree City USA by the National **Arbor Day Foundation** a number of years ago.

## Seminole club to participate in state 4-H championship

High school students from around the state will compete for the state championship of "LifeSmarts .. the Ultimate Consumer Challenge" on Feb. 16, at the Florida State Fair in Tampa.

Seminole County 4-H members are one of the 18 teams which will participate. Last year, the Florida state

winning team was from the Sanford Seminole 4-H club, which went on to win the national championship, outperforming nearly 30 other state winning teams from across the United States, during a three-day event at Disney World.

This year, the national finals will be held April 24 -27 in Chicago.

This is the eighth year for the LifeSmarts in Florida. Preliminary competition for students in grades ninth through 12th was held nationwide using the Internet. The Florida online competition ended Jan. 16, and involved more than 25 coaches and more than 450 students competing to be among Florida's 18 finalists. "High school students spend billions of dollars each year, but studies show that

many lack knowledge about consumer issues," said Florida Agriculture and Consumer Services

Commissioner Charles Bronson. "Through the LifeSmarts program, students learn hot to obtain answers to practical problems, such as buying a car and insurance, or understanding credit card interest rates. These are important skills that will last a lifetime."

The state finals in the LifeSmarts competition will begin at 9 a.m., Monday, Feb. 16, in the Club Pavilion at the Florida State Fair grounds in Tampa.

## ACT Assessment testing date is next month

College-bound school students can take the ACT Assessment test on April 3, the next nationwide test date.

The registration postmark deadline is Feb. 27. Late registration postmark deadline is March 12, but an additional fee is required for late registration.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges and universities in the nation, including all Ivy League schools.

The test fee is \$29 in the state of Florida. Colleges use ACT scores, along with a student's high school GPA, high school courses taken, extracurricular activities and

high other information to help determine admissions and the appropriate course placement for new students.

The ACT Assessment is an achievement test in English, reading, math and science. It measures what students have learned in high school and the skills required for success in college.

It is not an aptitude test. Some students find it more comfortable than an aptitude test because it reflects their high school curriculum. The ACT was administered more than two million times last year.

Students who have already taken the ACT can take it again and try for a

higher score. Juniors can use their scores to examine academic weaknesses, take courses to correct those weaknesses and re-take the exam as seniors. Students who take the exam more than once can report only their highest composite scores to prospective colleges if they choose.

For more information, including registration forms and test locations, contact your high school guidance counselor or register online Web site on ACT's www.act.org. The Web site also has helpful information, sample tests and the opportunity to order test prep materials.

The fight to protect democracy always begins at home and not in some foreign desert 7,000 miles away.

With the pending support

from the highway administration, the design phase of the project is slated to begin in the 2007-2008 fiscal year. Eighty percent of the project will be funded with federal funds, and the county and state will pick up the remainder of the project.

If the project doesn't begin

until 2008 that will be four years the city of Casselberry will have to wait and that's too long, according to several commissioners. It is estimated the project will force 35 businesses to relocate, but more importantly city officials say waiting for construction will cause other development in the area to stagnate. City commissioners are considering asking the county to advance funding for the design phase.


