County could nix Chuluota site

For a town few outsiders know how to spell, pronunciation or possibly locate, Chuluota has become the talk of two counties, Seminole and Orange.

To be sure, the residents in

or around Chuluota have expressed themselves loud and clear that they don't want their homeland turned into an adult entertainment war zone.

That, not says Seminole County Commission Chairman Randy Morris, who has received more than two thousand faxes and letters of protest over a Chuluota site being identified as a possible location for adult entertainment industry.

Teens hurt, puppy dies in road rage after vehicle catches fire

Five people were injured Thursday and a dog died after the car they were traveling in caught fire during a road rage originating in Sanford and ending near Longwood.

Soap Box Derby racers will be on camera Saturday during a rally race in Sanford. In addition to regular races, Derby Park on Oregon Avenue will be the site of the filming of "Feed Your Mind," a television show broadcast on TBS. The 30-minute episodes are aired at 7 p.m. on Saturdays.

Some fine movies debut

Fairy Tale — A True Story (Three and a half stars) is a strawberry of a film — sweet and tasty. It is sure to please the palates of those film watchers craving — even starving — for family oriented fare. This early fall sleeper is a refreshment for a genre that has been mostly dry.

Two Yorkshirian girls (Florence Hoath and Elizabeth Earl) skip along a picturesque stream trying to find the good fairies that only appear for those who believe. Once found, the girls snap a shot of them, and, before you know it, hordes of people flock to the stream in hopes to either dispel or confirm the claim that fairies do exist. The hubbub has even captured the eye of such early 20th Century dignitaries as Harry Houdini and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle.

The film is based on an actual story with photographs consisting of what look like real fairies. The photographs have even surfaced in today's pop culture from a recent cameo on Fox's *The X-Files*.

The validity of the story and the photos notwithstanding, *Fairy Tale* is a charming film on loss, hope and magic. It is so rare to find a film that maintains the attention of both the parents and the kids. *Fairy Tale* is a special kind of treasure.

There is a murder mystery that is so nonessential at the core of the new film *Gattaca* (Three stars). It almost makes the film as "invalid" as its hero.

Gattaca is a futuristic drama where "invalids" are people made up of the wrong stuff — imperfections that do not allow them to hold a re-

spectable place in the community. It is survival of the fittest where a strand of hair, a smudge of fingerprint or speck of skin can tell your life history and state of health. It's like natural selection: the healthy are rewarded while the weak are shunned.

This view of the future and that it plays on the current fascination and apprehension of genetic science is the most interesting thing about *Gattaca*. Writer-director Andrew Niccol with the help of production designer Jan Roelofs (Orlando) has created a believable, terrifying future world where everything seems to follow a nightmarish uniformity. It seemed like there were no individuals only two specified classes: the "valid" (genetically strong) and the "invalid" (genetically weak).

Ethan Hawke plays an "invalid" who wants to beat the system and follow his dreams. He assumes the identity — actually borrows it — of a "valid" (Jude Law) who has been disabled by a car accident. Hawke befriends a beauty (Uma Thurman) with a heart ailment and his character becomes the main focus of that aforementioned, needless mystery.

The period that Niccol creates and the story of one man's plight to overcome his restrictive existence should



Men and women get different results from painkillers. A University of California/San Diego study found. A synthetic drug related to morphine, a lappapod, worked well for women after dental surgery, but not for men.

The men get better results with similar drugs (like Percodan or Demerol) that have caused troublesome side effects for women.

Watch for 2-Turn, a new fat substitute made from powdered oat flour. It doesn't have the gastrointestinal side effects of Olestra — and may even be good for your gut.

Doctors at the University of Pennsylvania Medical Center have linked overuse of decongestants with stroke. Those at high stroke risk, with high blood pressure or heart disease should avoid them.

New prescription treatment for cold sores — penciclovir or Denavir — seems to speed healing. Ideally, the cream should be applied within an hour of the onset of symptoms.

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Come feel the 4/4 beat of 'Ancient Tribal Rhythms'

Public invited to participate, show to be presented to school children

School children are being offered a unique opportunity to take a look into the world of indigenous cultures at "Ancient Tribal Rhythms" next week.

Chuluota resident Jan Blue is presenting the event to Orange County public and private school children at the University of Central Florida Field House Arena, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 28-30. The program is a condensed version of the festival staged in May of this year at L & L Acres Ranch in Heathrow.

More than 3,000 second through eighth grade students will be attending the three-hour presentation on Tuesday and Thursday. Wednesday has been set aside for private school student and the general public.

"These kids are going to get a look into the lives of different people and gain respect for other cultures," Blue said. Blue is half-Cherokee and half French-German. She spent seven years traveling around the country, with her husband and son, doing seminars and participating in Native American gatherings. She recently settled in Chuluota and started work on establishing an indigenous cultures study center for local children.

Blue volunteers her time at local elementary schools and said she loves working one-on-one with the children. She dresses in her traditional dance regalia and demonstrates some of the dances. She said there is still a lot of misunderstanding about native American culture. "These kids ask me, 'do you live in a teepee?'" She said she answers, "I'm a suburban Indian."

"Ancient Tribal Rhythms" is a combination of several indigenous cultures from around the world. Blue said that the basis of the program is the music and dance, all tied together by the 4/4 drum beat that is used in all cultures.

Phil Miller, from Sydney, Australia, will tell the story of "Blinnee" in voice and with the didgeridoo, an instrument used by the Australian, aborigines.

"Inca Sapi," a troupe of Andean musicians and dancers will also dance and play pan flutes.

Disney Entertainment is providing Aztec entertainers, from Epcot, but they will only be available for Tuesday's show, they will do Aztec and Mayan dances.

There will be a 10-foot teepee set up on the floor of the arena as well as several other cultural displays. Randy Red Hawk will emcee the show and tell "The Legend of the White Buffalo."

Blue is an accomplished tra-

ditional dancer. She and her son, Ryan will dance at "Ancient Tribal Rhythms." There will also be descendants of Quannah Parker performing traditional Western Cherokee dance as well as fancy dance and Jingle dance.

Blue hopes to be able to present this program to Seminole County school children in the near future.

The charge for the public show on Wednesday is \$4. The program begins at 10 a.m. and lasts until 1 p.m. The Field House Arena is located off of Alafaya Trail, the first left past McCullough Road, coming from Oviedo. For more information, call Blue at 977-7584.

Good for Chuluotans! Will Sanfordites join the fight?

Great Americans have never been shy about protesting and standing up for their rights. If something is worth fighting for, real Americans fight. When it came time for arming the Virginia militia at St. John's Church in Richmond, Va., American revolutionary leader Patrick Henry declared, "I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty or give me death."

When it came time for black Americans to be given their rights, Martin Luther King and others bravely risked their lives.

When the folks who live in or near the quiet, peaceful community of Chuluota felt threatened by the invasion of the so-called adult entertainment industry, they united to protest.

As Patrick Henry, Martin Luther King and others succeeded, so will Chuluota. The people are going to be winners. "Site 19" will no longer be identified as a possible area for the relocation of adult entertainment businesses. The Seminole County Board of Commissioners will come to Chuluota's rescue when they meet Tuesday.

There isn't going to be a "war zone"

in Chuluota - and the credit goes to the residents whose protest was swift and powerful.

The citizens of Sanford will do well to observe what has happened by their proud Seminole County neighbors.

A Sanford site remains identified on the adult entertainment list of possibilities - and there may be another as the BCC scrambles to meet the requirements of the courts.

Add to this, the ongoing Sanford Police Department inquiry. Given a chance to voice their opinions at a public work session this past Tuesday, a dozen or so Sanford citizens showed up at City Hall. That many Chuluotans have been faxing complaints to the county each minute of the day.

This is hardly the time for Sanford to sleep.

There will be another public input meeting - at an hour more convenient to its residents to address the SPD issue, and there's some action stirring at City Hall to keep Sanford porn free.

said Bill Simmons, Sanford city manager. "I personally question the need for even identifying this land."

Simmons noted that there is still plenty of undeveloped land in the southern end of the county and in Orange County where the adult businesses currently operate.

Simmons said he did not think it was a good idea to cluster the entertainment industry in an area which has been billed as a future center for business and commerce.

Also, he said the proposed

site has high visibility off the Florida GreeneWay and the new East Lake Mary Boulevard extension.

The purpose of the proposed resolution, which comes only days after residents in Chuluota protested the site chosen in their neighborhood for the same purpose, is "to tell the county that the city objects to this. We're doing the same thing as the folks in Chuluota."

Simmons said all the property at the airport site is contiguous to Sanford city limits under the chain effect.

"If property owners don't want this they can annex into

the city," Simmons said. "Every bit of property there can be annexed."

Simmons said all that is required is for property owners to sign an annexation petition with the city and pay a small fee.

"If people got excited about this, we could have annexation petitions here (city hall) next week."

is often the same as any American history course, Martel said, but from a military point of view.

After regular school hours, drill practice is held from 2:30 to 5 p.m., four days a week. The practices are not required for participation in the ROTC program, but Martel says this is where the fun comes in.

Cadets can learn the intricacies of armed drill carrying 15-pound M-1 rifles from World War II. The rifles are filled with lead, so they can not be fired, but can be handled by a skilled cadet, so as to appear as light as a feather. Martel said her boyfriend can spin his rifle in the air three times and catch it behind his back. The unit's commanding officer can perform the individual drill, with the rifle, blindfolded. Her forte is athletics: sit-ups, push-ups and running. She will not be participating in the competition Saturday because of a knee injury.

Saturday's competition is strictly Navy, but others can

involve all branches of the service. All Seminole County schools have a JROTC program. There is an Air Force program at Seminole and Lake Brantley and an Army program at Lyman and Winter Springs. Lake Mary, Oviedo and Lake Howell are Navy.

The public is invited to come out and see what the NJROTC is all about on Saturday. The competition begins at 8:30 a.m. and continues until all six of the participating schools have competed in eight different categories: Personnel Inspection, Armed Basic Drill, Armed Exhibition Drill, Unarmed Basic Drill, Unarmed Exhibition Drill, Individual Drill, Color Guard and Athletics. All eight of the events, medals and trophies will be awarded to the top three finishers in each event and the best overall between 4 and 5 p.m. The participating schools are Lake Howell, Oviedo, Titusville, Evans and Winter Park. Lake Mary High School is located on Longwood-Lake Mary Road and the event will take place in the stadium.

"Witnesses said there were gestures exchanged," Cox said.

Cox said the incident originated near Seminole Community College at Montgomery Road and that some of the passengers appeared to be students at the adult high school there.

Cox said Gaubin pursued the truck along U.S. highway 17-92 at a high rate of speed, eventually landing in a large ditch after his car slid off the roadway.

Four passengers including

Gaubin climbed out of the car and were later transported to Columbia Medical Center and South Seminole Hospital where they were treated for non-serious injuries, Cox said.

Two of the passengers, Kim Cunningham, 16, and an unidentified male were later found to be runaways. However, no further information is available because when taken to the hospital for observation they both bolted from the hospital facility, Cox said. The other passengers were identified as Mark Hoffman, 17, and Ananda Francisco, 18.

According to Seminole County Animal Control Supervisor Mike Whittmore, what appeared to be a Rottweiler mix puppy died as a result of the car fire.

"The Chuluota site (#19) could be removed as early as Tuesday," Morris said Thursday. "If one of the commissioners makes the motion, I as chairman, will be looking for someone to second it."

Although the Chuluota matter isn't on the agenda for the BCC meeting on Tuesday, it now seems certain that it will be an add-on, and a vote be taken. The commissioners have an agenda review meeting at 9:30 a.m. and their regular meeting at 1:30 p.m.

"Unfortunately, we've stirred a frenzy," Morris said. "And it's time to say the area isn't viable, it just doesn't work. It's totally unacceptable."

This was evident from the protests to Morris and the county commissioners:

"Please don't take away my little piece of heaven," wrote

Liz Christmas from Chuluota. "I made a conscious choice in 1987 to leave the city of Orlando and all that comes along with the big city to find someplace more quiet, rural and community focused."

"I chose Chuluota. Our community, though not rich in wealth, is truly rich in community pride and goodness."

Debbie King, a resident for 27 years, wrote that she loved her home dearly. "I lost my husband in December to a heart attack and the property where I live is all I have to remind me of his hard work and years of sacrifice to pay the mortgage payment and taxes."

"Please reconsider your choice to have Chuluota be home to adult entertainment and other negative influences to our children and community."

Frankie J. Godwin said that

to move such an "industry" into this rural setting is unthinkable. "If it must exist at all, allow it to remain where it has operated for so many years rather than spoil yet another area of Seminole County."

"What could you people be thinking?" asked Cecilia Crescenzo of Oviedo. "What are your reasons for taking such a foolish step? I trust you will consider the lives of people in this area and how they will be affected. Do the right thing and veto this plan."

As Morris and the other commissioners attempt to deal with the Chuluota issue on Tuesday, the fact remains that one area in Sanford remains on the list of potential sites and a second area might be added.

Stay tuned to reactions from those affected in these neighborhoods.

lunta to air their concerns on the possibility of nude dance clubs coming to the area.

In what was supposed to be just a normal meeting of the Southeast Seminole County Voters Association turned out to be a town meeting with troops of angry citizens ready to battle in a "No Porno War Zone."

County Commissioner Grant Maloy was supposed to be the guest speaker at the voters association meeting, and, instead, came fully prepared to discuss the current controversy on adult entertainment within in the county.

The V.F.W. hall normally seats from 90 up to 170 people. However, some were turned back due to the tremendous turnout. "It's overwhelming," said Rev. Barry Wagner of the Trinity Assembly of God in Chuluota. "It was

very positive," said Judy Klobb, part of the Committee Against the War Zone.

Maloy, speaking almost from a doorway separating the inside and outside to accommodate the bulging crowds, addressed the history of the adult entertainment problem to the present date. Maloy has consistently voted to restrict as severely as possible adult entertainment in the county.

He then read off a list of what citizens could do to try and block the building of these establishments in their area.

Then he answered questions from the crowd.

Most of the turnout was clearly confused as how county commissioner would consider a site for an adult entertainment club so close to churches, family housing and a Girl Scout camp. Citizens were also angry that commissioners

did not consider the secondary effects of adult entertainment such as drugs, drunk driving and prostitution.

Site 19, the designation of adult entertainment for Chuluota, is an industrial zoning area that can be used for the purposes of adult entertainment or could be used for plants and factories. If the site is dropped from consideration, Wagner said that his church's committee will then focus on Sites 15 and 16 in Oviedo.

Maloy commended the crowd for its support against the adult establishments and the abolishment of them. "All it takes for horrible things to happen is for good people to do nothing," said a resident whose property faces the site. "We must keep on doing what we are doing now," said Wagner.

Look for changes in milk cartons

Next time you reach for a carton of milk, you may be in for a surprise. Milk labels are getting a facelift of new names, but the same contents and package of nutrients. New FDA regulations have been issued in response to milk industry and consumer group requests to make it easier to identify lowfat and fat free milk. Also, use of the words "fat free, lowfat" and "reduced fat" on milk labels will be consistent with use of these words on other foods, such as crackers and cookies. By January 1998, these new terms will appear on milk labels.

Skim Milk-Fat Free Milk
Skim milk is fat free and that's how it will now be labeled. "Fat free" is a more familiar term and a positive description for this popular variety of milk. Many consumers mistakenly believe, skim milk has been "skimmed" of nutrients. But only the fat has been removed. The words "skim" and "nonfat" may also be used on

milk labels in place of "fat free".

Whether it's labeled fat free, nonfat, or skim milk, it contains 0 grams of fat and 80 calories per cup. Most important, fat free milk offers the same amount of calcium, vitamin D, and other nutrients as whole milk.

A Few More Changes
Other types of milk are also undergoing a name change. Milk previously labeled "2 percent lowfat" will not be labeled "reduced fat"; 1 percent milk will keep its "low-fat" descriptor. Lowfat milk may also be labeled "light", a descriptive term widely used on other

foods that provide at least 50 percent reduction in total fat compared with a full-fat version. The labeling for whole milk (often referred to as vitamin D or homogenized milk) will remain unchanged.

Labeling the percentage of milkfat, as such 1 percent to 2 percent, on milk labels is now optional. But all you need to do is look for the terms "fat free", "lowfat", and "reduced fat" to be sure you're buying the milk you want. The side of the carton with the Nutrition Facts panel will continue to provide the full nutrition information per serving of milk. So it will be easy to make comparisons.

Here's a review of the changes you will see in the dairy cases, along with a comparison of how different types of milk stack up.

Make Milk Part of Healthy Eating Plan

The Good Guide Pyramid recommends 2 to 3 servings of milk, yogurt, or cheese daily for adult growing children and

teens need even more. Help meet your daily need for calcium and other important nutrients by making milk a part of your healthy eating plan. Here are four easy ideas:

- Wake up to a bowl of cereal topped with a cup of fat free lowfat, or reduced fat milk and you're off to a great start. Or mix 8 ounces of milk in a blender with a small frozen banana and a splash of vanilla extract for a quick breakfast on the run.

- When you hit that mid-afternoon lull, have a frothy calcium-boosting coffee latte or cappuccino.

- Quell hunger pangs before dinner with a tall glass of ice-cold milk. Add a spoonful of chocolate syrup to sweeten the treat. Or pop a mug in the microwave for a quick calcium-packed cup of cocoa.


- Try a dash of almond or hazelnut flavoring in a cup of steamed or microwave-heated milk for a nutritious late night treat.

Parents, confront your teens' drug use

In honor of the Red Ribbon Campaign during the month of October, we have been discussing kids and drugs, and how to keep our kids drug free. However, we have to be prepared with our plan of action if or when we discover that, despite our teaching and example, we have a child who has become involved with drugs.

It is our duty as a responsible parent to confront ANY alcohol or other drug use by our children, as long as they are living in our home and under the age of 21. If we fail to confront it, we are enabling the use, you can be certain that both the use and problems that go along with it will continue. There is no such thing as casual alcohol or other drug use among teens; there is only illegal use.

The following guidelines are applicable to both teens and adults when confronting the issues of alcohol or other drug use.

- Don't talk to a person about his or her alcohol or other drug use when they are drunk or high. Confronting a person who is under the influence can have very negative, and sometimes dangerous results. Remember, when you're talking to someone who is under the influence, you're talking to the drug, not the person. Allow enough time for the drug to wear off before talking to the person, but you may need to act immediately.

- If your child comes home obviously under the influence, it is important that you closely monitor him/her until the drug wears off. Be certain that they are sleeping on their stomach

or side, not their back. If they are lying on their back, it is possible that they could drown in their own vomit. If they begin to breathe in any unusual manner, try to wake them up. If you cannot awaken them, call 911 right away.

- If your child is seriously intoxicated, take him or her immediately to a detoxification center or emergency room. If they don't like the smell or looks of a detox center - good, they know what they need to do to be sure they never end up there again. (To find the name and location of a detox center near you, look in the Yellow pages under Detoxification Center or check with your local sheriff's office or police department.)

Finally, remember that you never confront a person while they are under the influence. Take time to plan a calm and rational confrontation when the person has gotten sober again. You will need to plan when and where the confrontation will happen, who will be there, what you will say

and what consequences you will impose. The more calm and organized you are, the better the confrontation will go.

In our final segment of this series, we will discuss some of the consequences of the child's drug/alcohol use a parent can compose.



And telephoning them at home is even further beyond acceptable boundaries. The parents of the offended girls would have been within their rights to order the person not to bother their daughters again.

Since all the parents are standing behind their daughters' choices of attire, this "problem" may resolve itself.

If this parent views the other players' attire as harmful to his or her daughter's morale, the child may ultimately be withdrawn from the team.

Should he report this to store management, or is this the way customers should expect to be treated? DUMBFOUNDED IN FOXBORO, N.C.

DEAR DUMBFOUNDED: My sources inform me that the primary duty of security personnel is to protect and/or recover the

store's assets, not to arrest customers. Because the exposure to liability is so great, the vast majority of department stores have stringent guidelines limiting the manner in which a customer can be detained. Suspicion is never sufficient cause to stop a customer for questioning.

The detainment your husband experienced is called a "bad stop," and it should be reported to the store management.



Serious case requires strong medicine



MEDICINE

PETER GOTT, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Although I have faithfully taken an aspirin a day for years, I had a mini-stroke in June. Fortunately, I was left without a handicap but I was found to have atrial fibrillation. My neurologist prescribed Ticlid, because I am "immune" to aspirin. Is this the right medicine?

DEAR READER: Not in my opinion. People with atrial fibrillation (an uneven heart rate) are at a higher risk for stroke, because tiny little blood clots can form in the cardiac chambers, break off and be carried to the brain.

Ticlid, a prescription drug that is supposed to retard blood clotting, is (in my view) not an effective antidote. A more appropriate choice would be a strong anticoagulant such as Coumadin. I urge you to be examined by a cardiologist, who will — I am sure — confirm my position. You need a more powerful medicine to reduce your risk of a future stroke. I don't believe that Ticlid will do the job.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Four months ago, I developed Bell's palsy, which my doctor treated with steroids. I was told that this would eventually disappear, but it hasn't. What can I do?

DEAR READER: Bell's palsy is partial paralysis of the facial nerves: One or the other side of the face droops. There are many causes for this, ranging from tumors near the facial nerve to Lyme disease. In many cases, however, no cause can be determined.

Although Bell's palsy often disappears with time, many patients aren't so fortunate: The paralysis may persist for several months. It may even be permanent.

Thus, doctors are usually quite aggressive in searching for treatable causes of Bell's palsy, especially if the facial weakness persists. In my opinion, you need a Lyme blood test and a CT or MRI scan — at the very least — to diagnose the reason for your symptoms. Ask your doctor to order these tests or to refer you to a neurologist.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Recently, on a radio station, a doctor recommended citrate of magnesium for leg cramps at night. The dosage was one ounce on an empty stomach in the morning, and for some people, another ounce late in the evening. What's your opinion of this?

DEAR READER: Citrate of magnesium is a laxative, and I'm not aware that the product is useful for leg cramps. It helps reduce your nocturnal leg cramps — a common affliction

of unknown cause — I'd be grateful to hear from you and other readers who have found this cure to be effective.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A recent nutrition book has stated that our digestive systems are not geared to assimilate

a combination of protein and carbohydrate at the same time. The authors recommend we consume only fruit in the morning, only protein at lunch, and only carbohydrates at dinner. What do you think of this theory?

DEAR READER: Sheer claptrap. Diet books are a dime a dozen. Some are valuable resources; the majority are get-rich schemes for their authors. Before taking any nutritional pronouncements as gospel, check out the information with your doctor or, preferably, a certified nutritionist.

Most hospitals have nutritionists on staff, and I've found that these professionals are usually more than willing to answer questions.



A day adrift

Daily bulletins usually supply deals from winners at least one day late. So, it wasn't until bulletin seven that we saw something from Steve Garner and Howard Weinstein, victors in the Life Master Pairs.

First, the bidding. West's double showed three-card heart support. Next, Weinstein made an excellent raise to two spades. Even though he had only two trumps, the ace and king were at least equivalent to three low cards. Now came East's wild-looking leap to four hearts. He wasn't expecting to make the contract. Rather, he hoping to bully his opponents into four spades, which he thought he could beat.

Against four spades doubled, West cashed the heart king and switched to

a low club. (Yes, a trump would be more testing.) East won with the ace, then returned his second club to declarer's king.

Thinking the missing spades couldn't be 2-2 (if they were, he could afford to ruff the club 10 in the dummy), Garner played a trump to dummy, ruffed a heart, returned to dummy with another trump (groan!), and ruffed a third heart. Then he led the diamond queen, giving West Hobson's choice. When he won with the ace (ducking doesn't help), he could either return a diamond to dummy's king (South would discard his club 10) or lead a club from his jack into South's queen-10. Plus 590 was worth 37.5 matchpoints out of 58.

The first part of East's strategy worked fine, when Garner bid four spades. The second part, taking a penalty, didn't pan out. What's that expression about the best-laid plans?
