## Missing Girl Found Safe In Dade City

Sanford Police Chief Ben Butler disclosed this morning that a missing Sanford girl had been located by Pasco County authorities at Dade City.

Butler said he had received a call from Pasco authorities informing him that a girl answering the description of 15-year-old Gloria June Berwiechin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Berwiechin, 211 Summerlin Avenue, was apprehended this morning by Pasco authorities after she had been observed for several days in the county courthouse near the office of the Pasco County Judge.

According to a woman dispatcher in the Pasco sheriff's office, it has been determined that the girl is the Berwiechin girl, missing since Labor Day.

Photographs of the girl have been circulated throughout the state by missing persons officials and Sheriff John E. Polk a week ago requested help from The Sanford Herald by publishing the girl's photograph.

A \$50 reward was offered at the time by the girl's father for information leading to whereabouts of his daughter.

Polk said that any information given to his office would remain secret and the informer, if any, would have his identity kept secret.

According to Pasco informants, the girl first gave a "fake" address, but changed it after being offered a ride by authorities to her home.

Butler said he and a city detective would leave Sanford immediately for Dade City to return the girl to her parents.

## Conflict Issue Is Aired

A confrontation between two candidates for Mayor of Sanford took place at the conclusion of last night's meeting of the city commission.

After receiving no information concerning the property, Skop turned to go and inform the commission he had obtained questions he would ask later regarding a reported conflict of interest.

Mayor Moore interrupted his former and asked him to return to the rostrum and discuss the matter of city bank deposits.

Moore informed Skop that city is now doing business with the Sanford Atlantic and Florida State Bank and a \$50,000 loan was negotiated with the Sanford Atlantic Bank, but because of the low 4.5 per cent interest, the Florida State Bank had agreed to handle a third of the loan.

## Child Is Taken

Two sisters have been jailed by Seminole County authorities on breaking and entering and assault and battery charges after they reportedly forced open a door to the home of another sister and assaulted her inside her Lake Mary home.

Ellaabeth Ann Sinclair, 28, and Leta Mae McGinnis, 17, both of Landover, Md. were arrested last night by William Chandler, county deputy, after Mrs. Fay Thompson, 289 Seminoles Boulevard, Lake Mary, took warrants charging her two sisters who arrived in Sanford earlier in the day from Maryland.

President Nixon, after saying again he will not allow Wednesday's blooming moratorium movement to influence his policy, has announced he will speak to the nation early next month on the course of the war.

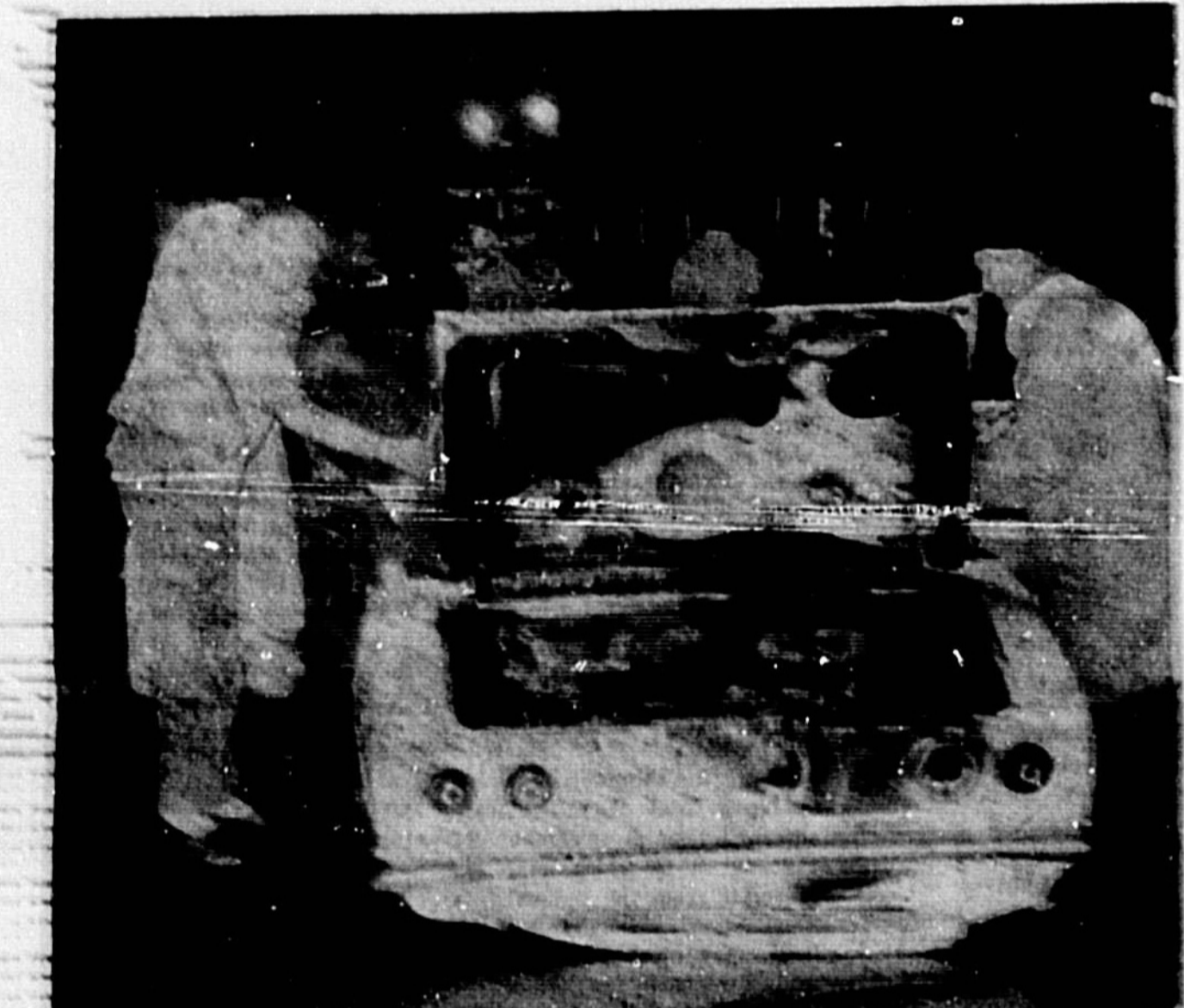

# Sunshine Law Runs Into Clouds Temporarily

If Florida's "Sunshine Law" gets clouded by such deplorable and unhappy events as the affair in DeLand where a needed and inevitable decision on the enforcement of the law was thwarted, be not dismayed!

Such clouds will be dissipated. The innate soundness of the law, upheld by the Florida Supreme Court as recent as last July, which demands open meetings by public bodies engaged in public business will assert itself.

It was the event has escaped notice, we would point to the news reports which came out of DeLand on Tuesday telling of indictments handed down by a Volusia County Grand Jury charging some DeLand city officials with violation of the Sunshine Law.

### Read And Regret

From our Mail-We-Wish-We-Hadn't-Read Department:

Congressional Quarterly reports that the cost of keeping Capitol Hill in operation continues to rise — to an estimated \$361.6 million this year. Some of the cost items are relatively familiar: 42,000 daily copies of the Congressional Record, 200 million pieces of free congressional mail each year, and the like. Others, however, are less well known:

Barber shops are maintained by both the House and the Senate. Barbers are paid a salary, and their space and equipment provided. Representatives get haircuts at no charge; House members have to pay 75 cents. (Surely the Civil Rights Act says something about that.)

Both houses maintain gymnasiums and swimming pools for their members, along with steam baths, exercise equipment, heat lamps and handball courts. Senators may choose one of two swimming pools, depending on their preference of water temperature.

Congress also maintains studios for recording television messages to constituents. The studios are completely staffed and lately have begun the process color film.

Both houses provide office space and equipment at income tax time for Internal Revenue Service personnel who come to assist both the legislators and their employees in the preparation of federal returns.

It should be reported that there have been some expense cuts as well. Last year Congress closed down the ice house under the front steps of the Capitol. Now ice-making machines have been installed at a saving of \$6,000 a year.

Congress also cut the number of free wall calendars it passes out from 90,000 to 45,000. Silver lining, and all that — Charlotte (N.C.) News.

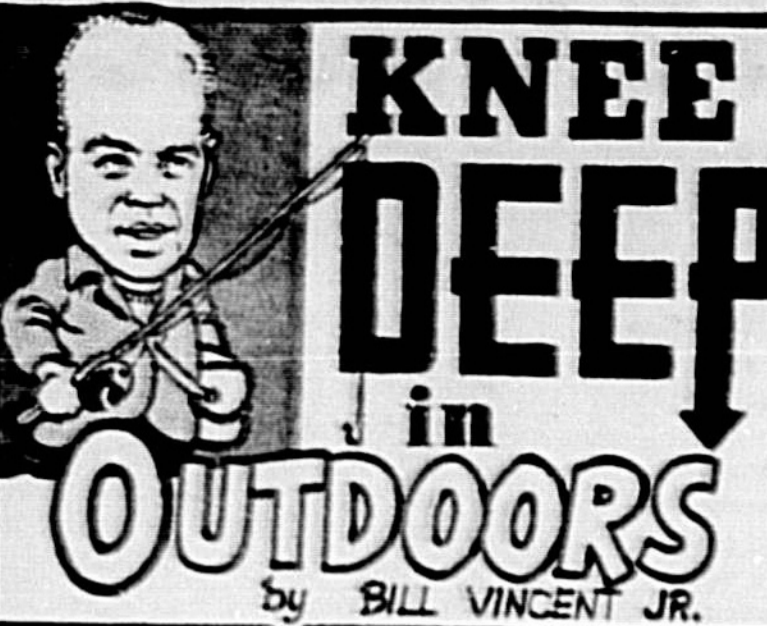

"They tell me they can't single out any guys and they don't think the average fans throughout the country can — so they've been buying groups of Mets because what they really want to say is that they've got the Amazing Mets."

Scott, who has handled Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris, Sandy Kousser, Frank Robinson, Carl Yastrzemski after his biggest seasons, estimates that the Mets could, as a group, make as much as \$250,000 if they go on to beat the Baltimore Orioles.

"Among those Orioles as the teams took the field for the 3 p.m. EDT start of the game which was being telecast nationally by NBC was Frank Robinson — who has become somewhat of a focal point for what seems to be developing into an intense rivalry."

Limping as he worked out Monday on a sore left leg bruised severely when he slammed a foul on the foot during batting practice Sunday, Robinson's physical condition remained somewhat of a question as the third game began.

Robinson did not collect a hit in seven at-bats during the first two games and also failed to make a hit with New York fans by demoralizing the attitude of the players on the Met bench during the weekend split in which the Orioles won the opener 4-1 and the Mets the second game 2-0.

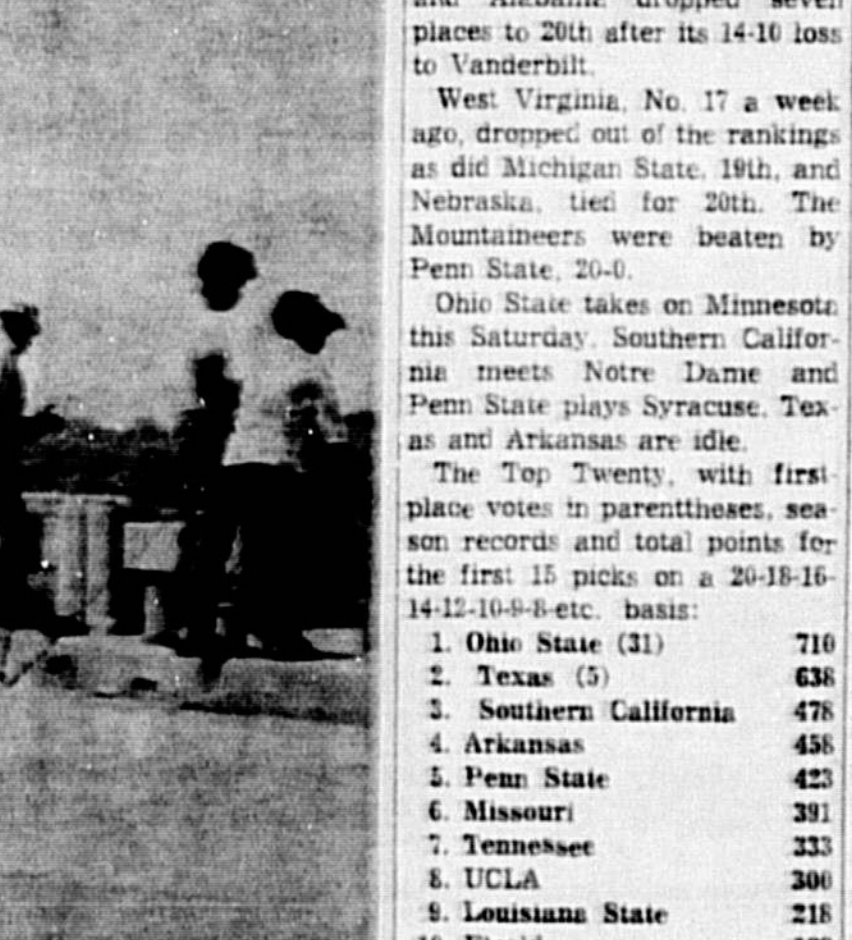
