

REPLY IS MADE TO ATTACK ON PENAL SYSTEM

Georgia Governor De- nounces Jersey Ex- ecutive For Not Re- turning Robt. Burns

ATLANTA, Dec. 23. —(AP)—Denouncing charges that Georgia's penal system is barbarous and inhumane, Governor Russell yesterday termed the refusal of Governor Moore of New Jersey to extradite Robert Elliot Burns, chain gang fugitive, a violation of his own state laws and the United States Constitution.

Governor Russell said the New Jersey executive's decision made it easy to understand how "the most horrible crime of modern times, the kidnaping and murder of the Lindbergh baby, which shocked the entire world, could occur and go unpunished in a state where a governor has such ideas of law and the propriety, as manifested by the judgment in this case."

"The governor of New Jersey," Russell said, "is either desirous of basking in the light of some cheap publicity or else is completely taken in by the statements and writings of Burns, who has been proven false and a slanger on the state of Georgia and its institutions."

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PITTS VICTORY OVER IRISH SEEN YEAR'S SURPRISE

Panther Conquest Is Awarded Decision In Sports Writer Poll

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Judging from the response to The Associated Press poll, 1932, was filled with one surprise after another for the nation's sports experts but the biggest shock of all was Pittsburgh's 12-0 upset of Notre Dame, at a time when the Ramblers were being widely hailed as another "wonder team."

The Panther conquest was voted the "surprise of the year" by 43 out of 142 responses to this feature of the second annual poll. Proof that the experts found it difficult all season to "dope" Notre Dame was revealed by the fact 15 other observers named the Ramblers' 21-0 victory over Army as the biggest upset. By the time Notre Dame got around to taking a beating from Southern California, the boys apparently were preserving an open mind on the outcome, for not a single vote was cast to include this result among the year's surprises.

Individually, the outstanding upsets of 1932 were credited to Bill Carr, who caused a series of tremors on the Pacific Coast in the summer by beating the grueling foot-races. The element of surprise, of course, diminished after Carr's first victory of 340 yards in the intercollegiate championships, but the University of Pennsylvania star received 20 votes all together and clinched second place in the balloting.

The New York Yankees, already acclaimed as the year's outstanding team in any sport, sprang the biggest baseball upset by taking four straight from the Chicago Cubs in the World Series. On the basis of the voting, the biggest Olympic surprises were Eddie Tolan's "double" in the sprints and the triumph of the Japanese men's swimming team over the United States. Ellsworth Vines' straight-set conquest of Henri Cochet in the final round of the American tennis championship singles was voted the leading tennis upset.

With the discussions between the two terminated, it became apparent in the capital last night that the problems concerned probably will be handed on to the next administration in much their present form.

Despite Roosevelt's suggestion that the President proceed with an examination of the war debt and related problems, without pledging the next administration to action, Hoover feels that the creation of a commission would be useless unless it could continue active after Mar. 4.

The President-elect declined also to accede to the Chief Executive's hitherto undisclosed suggestion that Owen D. Young, Col. E. M. House or some other prominent Democrat be named to "sit with the principal officers of this administration in endeavor to see what steps can be taken to avoid delays or previous time and inevitable losses that will ensue from such delays."

For me to accept any joint responsibility in the work of exploration," Roosevelt replied, "might well be construed by the debtors of other nations, collectively or individually, as a commitment—moral even though not legal—as to policies and courses of action."

The release of the Hoover-Roosevelt correspondence broke an air of tension at the White House felt there since the dispatch of the first telegram to Albany last Saturday night.

At Albany, too, there was an apparent relaxation. With the first flash of news from the White House, Governor Roosevelt summoned newspapermen to his office.

Wearing before them a batch of papers drawn from his coat pocket, he disclosed the telegrams exchanged between himself and the President, saying with a smile: "I've been keeping these right in my inside pocket. Sit down and I'll read them to you."

At the White House there was little drama in the release of the interchange, although a wild scramble ensued among newspapermen after one of the President's secretaries handed out mimeographed copies. Pinned to them was this statement by the President:

Governor Roosevelt considers that it is undesirable for him to abstain to my suggestions for cooperative action on the foreign problems outlined in my recent message to Congress. I will respect his wishes.

Situations will no doubt develop and will be dealt with by the administration as they arise, but of course no commitments will be made for the next administration.

At Albany, the President-elect confined his remarks to a brisk reading of the messages and the added line: "Well, that's about all. I have no comment to make."

School Teachers Blame Banks For Cuts In Salaries

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Taking the bankers for New York City as special target for their indignation over pay cuts effected by the special session of the legislature last week, public school teachers here are massing behind a demand that the bankers give 5 percent of their incomes to the school relief fund.

A resolution to this effect was adopted by an overwhelming vote at a mass meeting of the city's teaching staff on Saturday. Since October, 1930, the teachers have contributed more than \$3,000,000 to the support of the needy school children of the city and they hold that, since "the pressure of the bankers compelled the reduction of teachers' salaries, making further teacher contributions difficult," the bankers should now assume their share of the special responsibility.

The resolution was sponsored by the Teachers' Union, the Teachers' Welfare League and the Kindergarten-8th Teachers' Association. An amendment calls for a withdrawal of teachers' contributions, which have ranged from 3 to 5 percent of their salaries to provide free lunches, clothing and shoes, and places this responsibility on the city government.

To the legislative committee appointed at the special session to study municipal reorganization here, the teachers reorganized a centralized city government with full responsibility in the mayor, an executive budget, a small legislative council, proportional representation in the financially independent of the bankers.

The teachers' action of the city's civil service came out of the Albany session with their mandatory salary legislation intact under the provision of a separate bill calling for an \$8,000,000 cut in their pay in 1933.

Meanwhile, the Tammany lawmakers from New York City who unsuccessfully sought to attach a moratorium clause to the salary-cut bills are considering retaliatory resolutions against banker domination for introduction in the 1933 Legislature. Chief among these is a proposal for a special investigation of the general question of banking conduct.

Negro, Shot During Attempt To Steal Chickens, Is Dead

The state's case against Eugene Carter, middle-aged Sanford negro field worker, who was shot in the chest by W. B. Querry, aged white farmer, some days ago during an attempted robbery of the Querry chicken house, was concluded shortly after lunch today with the death of the negro at the Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital.

A coroner's jury, viewing the body this afternoon during an inquest, rendered the opinion that the negro's death came as the result of a gunshot wound inflicted by W. B. Querry, while in the defense of his life and property. Mr. Querry was exonerated fully of any blame in connection with the affair.

Carter was shot early Sunday morning, Dec. 11, shortly after he had entered the Querry chicken yard where Mr. Querry, an 82-year old man, had posted himself determined to apprehend the person or persons responsible for the theft of several chickens earlier in the month.

The negro attacked Mr. Querry in the darkness and during the scuffle Mr. Querry fired his shotgun, the lead striking Carter in the chest. The negro ran from the scene and was wounded about 100 yards away early the next morning bleeding that conscious.

PUBLIC SUPPORT IS SOLICITED TO BALANCE BUDGET

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—The Treasury Department delivered its second major appeal in a week for a popular crusade in behalf of a balanced budget, when Arthur A. Ballantine, undersecretary of the treasury, declared that the goal would not be achieved "without wide public support."

Although not mentioning Congress by name, and addressing specifically the convention of the American Mining Congress here, Mr. Ballantine's remarks were obviously in continuation of the sharp lecture Ogden L. Mills, secretary of the treasury, read to the House Ways and Means Committee.

Mr. Ballantine's address again reflected the administration's determination to bring the facts of the financial crisis squarely before the American people. In this drive, treasury officials are proceeding with a recollection of the almost unprecedented outburst from the public which finally forced through the appropriation bills last summer, after seven months' delay, and with the assumption that the situation now shaping in Congress will call for an equally determined stand by the voters.

"It does not seem to be fully realized," Mr. Ballantine said, "that cutting the deficit down to such a figure as \$300,000,000 necessitates the early accomplishment of drastic reduction in federal expenditures, as recommended by the President and by the secretary of treasury. It should be further realized that elimination of the deficit and the resumption of the sound process of reducing the public debt mean the providing of new revenues. These needed steps are not likely to be achieved without widespread support for determined congressional action."

Mr. Ballantine added: "The reduction of expenditures and the broadening of the tax base so vitally needed will not come without wide public support. Such support should be forthcoming, as these measures guaranteeing the financial integrity of the government are indispensable requisites of recovery."

Apart from the speeches of Mr. Mills and Mr. Ballantine, observers point out that at best the latest Hoover-Mills budget rests on a slender margin, which will require full co-operation from the legislature and the public, if income is to balance outgo.

The budget table sits on four legs, which at this distance look about equally unstable. First, is the willingness of Congress to vote new taxes, amounting to almost \$200,000,000. Second, is the willingness of Congress to produce economies, amounting to about the same sum.

The third "leg" is the increased income which it is hoped some of the taxes already voted will yield in the coming business year through a revival of business. And fourth, the balanced budget is implicit on the payment of about \$27,000,000 from foreign debtors between the fiscal period, July 1, 1933, and June 30, 1934.

The latter item has begun to shrink already in view of the French default. The development gives all the more reason, say treasury officials, for congressional co-operation in the other matters; a co-operation which, unfortunately, every observation and intimation of Washington correspondents leads them to feel will not be forthcoming.

(Continued From Page One) of \$2,516,970,427 in net income and 46.44 percent in taxes. Corporations, making returns reported gross income of \$44,512,434,464 as compared with \$79,147,023,818 the previous year and \$129,633,791,720 in 1929.

Net losses reported by corporations totaled \$116,406,978 in 1931, as compared to \$618,216,431 in the preceding year and \$392,177,216 in 1929. Individuals reported gross income of \$16,633,657,713 and took deductions for \$1,043,625,622 for net losses from sale of real estate, stocks, bonds, etc., other than reported for tax credit from sale of assets held for more than two years. They deducted \$129,613,116 for net losses from business and partnerships, took deductions of \$318,885,903 for contributions and \$1,911,163,838 for all other reasons.

The statistics showed that 2,800,197 persons reported income of less than \$5000. Their net totaling \$6,551,000,000 while 143,786 reported income of less than \$6000, for a net income total of \$785,637,363. Persons having net income of \$150,000 to \$200,000 numbered 610 with the total \$103,711,412. Forty-six persons reported net incomes from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000 with a total of \$40,403,831. 39 persons had income of \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000 with total income of \$57,255,156; 13 persons reported income from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000 with a total of \$22,861,543. Twelve taxpayers reported incomes from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000 with a total of \$28,861,543, six reported income up to \$4,000,000, one reported income of more than \$4,000,000 and under \$6,000,000, and four reported incomes of \$5,000,000 or more.

of the punishment of Burns was of little moment, but "the action of the governor of New Jersey in sitting a court and jury and passing sentence not only on a convict, but the sovereign state of Georgia, is far reaching in its consequences."
The Georgia governor said that the effect of the decision not only declares that New Jersey is not bound by the federal constitution but that the governor of that state has the right to decide whether or not the penal system of another state is satisfactory and the laws of another state, which undertake to "protect the lives and property of its citizens," should be enforced.
Russell said no one in Georgia has paid particular attention to Burns' writings with reference to the state's penal system "because we did not think that any

person with reasonable intelligence would give weight and credit to the product of the pen of a confessed highwayman who was attempting to escape paying the penalty for his crime."
"However," he continued, "when these charges, though false, are credited by one who is governor of a state of the union to such an extent that he disregards the constitution of the United States and the statutes of his own state on the false charge that our penal system is barbarous and inhumane, it is time for such charges to be denounced for what they are and I hereby brand them as absolutely false and unfounded."
The Georgia governor said Governor Moore prejudiced the case by stating that Burns' offense of "robbing a citizen of this state as the point of a pistol" was "trivial offense." Russell said Moore "evidently bases this upon the fact that the citizen, who happened to be the victim of the holdup staged by Burns and his gang, did not have a great deal of money and that Burns, therefore, was ill paid for his efforts."

Building Program Of Miami Beach Is Having No Let-Up

MIAMI BEACH—With construction hesitated throughout the country because of troublesome times, the Miami Beach building program continued to advance. During the last fiscal year building permits amounted to \$1,684,088. New homes predominated in this construction program, 61 new residences being erected during the year, topping the previous years program of 51 new homes. It is expected that the majority of these new dwellings will be occupied during the current season.
Warren Wright, Chicago manufacturer, led the home builders with one of the most palatial homes ever to be erected in the American tropics. The actual building permit for the home totaled \$175,000, and it is estimated that the completed home cost \$300,000.
Of particular significance is the fact that the average cost of the new homes was approximately \$15,000 per home. More than \$250,000 was expended for remodeling, six apartment houses were constructed, and an additional cabana club and swimming pool were added to the city facilities.
An unusually bright piece of news is that the municipality of Miami Beach closed its fiscal year with a bank balance of \$400,000. Despite the constant piling of governmental costs, the bonded indebtedness has been reduced \$355,000 in 1 1/2 years, and the city was in the position this year to retire \$20,000 of 1931 maturities.

PARIS, Dec. 23.—Dr. George Harot, eminent French radiologist, died Tuesday night as a result of X-ray burns incurred in a scientific career beginning with treatment of wounded soldiers during the World War. Presumably the fingers of his right hand and then his right arm had been amputated.
