



A The Way Out

Not all panaceas being advanced for the depression contain the hokus pocus of demestic ellotment plans or the fantastic phantasmagories of technocracy. At a time when most people are vainly seeking some "white rabbit" relief most people are vainly seeking some "white rabbit" relief or hoststrap method of recovery, there still remain a few who continue to think cleanly and sanely in the midst of much confusion and grasping at straws. One of these is Walter Lippmann, once regarded as a Socialist, now certainly a Liberal or Progressive, a supporter of Gov. Roosevelt during the recent campaign, formerly editor of the New York World, foremost Democratic newspaper, and now a free lance columnist writing for a hundred or more independent newspaper.

His plan is comparatively simple and there may be some who will say that there is nothing to it. Yet on second thought there would seem to be considerable depth to his proposals. As fundamental to recovery he insists that the federal budget must be balanced, and balanced so effectively as to preclude any necessity for further borrowing by the government. Some will say that a national government living beyond its means should not necessarily affect the lives of all its people, and yet when we consider dollars have been taken from the normal channels of investment and placed in new government securities, the dangers of the condition become apparent.
