Heartfelt acknowledgment of the public support given "brave and dedicated men" of the 31st Tactical Fighter Wing was given by Capt. Richard E. Fowler Jr., wing commander, at a widely representative luncheon in his and Mrs. Fowler's honor in the Civic Center yesterday. The commander is

to hand over command to Capt. George W. Blumstein on Friday before leaving for his post as commander of the amphibious command ship USS Elrod, home ported in San Diego, California. Government, civic club, chamber of commerce members listened intently as Capt. Fowler responded to several gifts

and a joint resolution recognizing his major contributions to the city and Seminole County. He referred to the nature of the wing's assignment as not to be told in detail. "But," said Capt. Fowler, "it is important, successful and costly. The brave and dedicated men of the squadrons face great demands, but face them without com-

plaint. I think you (Sanford) have sensed this and shown them an awareness of the public understanding of what they are doing. The wing has been in continuous combat operations in Vietnam. And the captain addressed his concluding remarks to the fine home base support given in Sanford: "You have

created an atmosphere of true homes, a place to return from deployments and a good place to leave their loved ones. This has been a great factor in their success and is appreciated by them and me." Captain and Mrs. Fowler have their own Sanford home. "We have bought a nest and feathered it and, in the words of another military man — 'We shall return.'"

Capt. Herbert N. Houk, base commander, also paid tribute to the wing's accomplishments and noted the fine cooperation which exists between the squadrons and the force on the base which makes their missions possible of fulfillment. Capt. Kimmons, who has already had a tour of duty in Sanford during which he, too,

made solid relationships with the well-filled center that they were "glad to be back. Sanford is our adopted home." He also referred to the community support which has played a real role in the success of the squadrons — "It was not chance that made Capt. Fowler's success possible, but the work of Capt. Fowler and Mrs. Fowler and the community."

U. S. May Use Civilians For Viet Nonfighting Jobs

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara is thinking of substituting civilians for U.S. soldiers in some nonfighting tasks in Vietnam. McNamara indicated this might be one way of holding down on further additions to U.S. forces there, and of reducing a top-heavy ratio of support troops to combat men.

At a White House news conference Wednesday, the Pentagon chief linked a discussion of possible additional U.S. reinforcements with a new assertion that "we must use more effectively the personnel that are presently there."

McNamara said foreign nationals might be hired for such things as military construction, mail delivery, medical services, and other noncombat duties. He said that about 183,000 of the 531,000 American military men in Vietnam were in the Army, with 347,000 in the Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps. He said that only 10 percent of the 183,000 were in combat units.

Rights Resistance Growing

BOSTON (AP) — The first Negro popularly elected to the U.S. Senate says this summer's racial violence is causing what appears to be a "punitive reaction" to the civil rights movement.

"Today," said Sen. Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass., "alarmed by riots and cries of black power which have often meant violence, the mood of the nation is resistant to progress in civil rights."

Brooke received the Spingarn Medal for outstanding achievement by a Negro Tuesday night from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People during the organization's 50th annual convention.

"I see this reaction reflected in the Congress of the United States," Brooke said. "The only so-called civil rights legislation which has made serious progress in Congress this year is a bill to make promoting a riot a federal crime."

"A congressman's willingness to face his responsibility to all of the American people is inhibited when he finds the majority of his constituents frightened and angered by riots or the threat of violence in his community," he said.

"Riots and violence are the normal enemies, not the servants, of the civil rights movement," Brooke warned, however, that "if Congress, out of fear or anger, continues to choose the path of 'inaction' and violence in the United States will not only continue, it will recur with ever increasing intensity."

Researchers Look To Future

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Sky-scrapers five times as high as the Empire State Building, suspended bridges twice as long as today's longest, and today's largest, drastic new steps for aircraft.

These are the visualizations of researchers who for two years have been taking a close look at the way man-made fibers may be joined together to produce materials stronger and lighter than any natural material, including aluminum.

Groundwork research in the field of composite materials is being done by scientists from Washington University and the Monsanto Co. in St. Louis.

The close look is made possible by a new electron scanning microscope able to magnify 200,000 times. With the electron instrument, researchers scan fractured composites to see what broke first—the fiber or the bonding compound, the matrix.

The bonding microscope can look at samples in depth and can be used to take pictures. The depth of field advantage makes it superior to conventional microscopes with a short field of focus.

Some of the fibers being studied are made of carbon, boron, silicon carbide, glass, steel and silicon nitride.

Initial research by the Air Force indicates the composites have three to five times the stiffness and strength of ordinary structural materials, yet are one-third the weight.

The best known composite, made of glass fibers and plastic, is used for sports equipment, boats and car bodies.

"Suspension bridges twice as long as today's longest and sky-scrapers five times as high as the Empire State would technically be possible," says Dr. John Calfee, Monsanto scientist in charge of the research program.

Obvious military advantages would be aircraft made of lightweight composites that would have 30 per cent more range or double the payload capacity, even with existing engines and fuels.

Dr. Stephen Tsai, Washington University professor in charge of the research laboratory, says "We need strength to carry weight and stiffness to prevent collapse."

Hong-Kong Violence Concerns U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — State Department officials concerned about the rapid growth of violence in Hong Kong will not comment on what understandings, if any, exist between the United States and Britain for defense of the crown colony off China.

Legal authorities at the State Department make it clear there is no formal commitment by the United States to defend Hong Kong. But the extent to which there may be a private understanding is not being disclosed.

State Department press officer Robert J. McCloskey was asked if there is a U.S. policy in the event Hong Kong is attacked from the Chinese mainland. He said there is such a policy but the situation has not arisen and he would not discuss it further.

There are approximately 6,000 Americans who are residents of Hong Kong and there is a so-called floating population of 1,000 to 1,500 more Americans visiting there in Hong Kong.

McCloskey advised U.S. tourists Tuesday that it would be prudent to take into account the present turmoil before visiting the island. At this point there is no ban on travel there.

Legal experts said that while there is no written understanding between the United States and Britain comparable to the defense treaty between the United States and Nationalist China, Hong Kong has been discussed in a confidential basis.

It is believed there is an exchange of views between President Johnson and British Prime Minister Harold Wilson on the subject during their meeting here last month.

Hearing Set On Credit Costs

WASHINGTON (AP) — House advocates of the so-called truth-in-lending bill, approved unanimously by the Senate, say the House will begin hearings on the measure in three weeks.

The controversial legislation cleared the Senate 92 to 6 Tuesday after only 2 1/2 hours of debate.

House sponsors said hearings will be conducted by one of the bill's strong backers, Chairman Lamar K. Sullivan, D-Mo., of the Consumer Affairs subcommittee.

Some opposition generated by retailers, bankers and others met in the Senate after several compromises were made in the bill's provisions.

Many of its fees also became reconciled to its passage in some form during the lengthy consideration starting after former Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., introduced it in 1960.

The bill would require disclosure of the cost of loans of more than \$100. A lender financing a \$200 automobile for installment payments of \$75 a month for three years would have to tell the borrower the payments included a \$50 financing charge and a 16 per cent annual interest rate.

Consumers would have to be told two things on most debt transactions — the annual percentage interest rate and the total finance charge in dollars and cents.

The biggest type of borrowing covered would be auto loans, now totaling more than \$3 billion. Also affected would be \$20 billion of personal loans, about \$20 billion of second mortgages, \$19 billion of loans for appliances and other consumer items, \$7.8 billion worth of one-time payments loans, and \$7.6 billion worth of repair and maintenance loans.

'Soft' Approach Plaguing Strongman Of South Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Prime Minister Balthazar J. Vorster's "softer approach" toward some of South Africa's problems is bringing him trouble from elements of his own party.

Vorster has headed the government for nine months. He has been trying to improve this country's image abroad against critics of the apartheid racial segregation policy that prevails here.

He represents the Nationalist party, which has been in power since 1948. It is based on political dominance by the Afrikaner section of the electorate, those of Dutch ancestry who often have lived with people of English heritage.

Now some of the Nationalists are complaining of liberalistic tendencies and unfaithfulness to the Afrikaner cause.

Vorster took over the premiership last September after Hendrik F. Verwoerd was assassinated.

For years Afrikaners favored Verwoerd's inflexible to condemnation elsewhere of this country's racial policy. They were solidly behind his efforts to entrench Afrikaner leadership in South Africa's political, economic and cultural fields.

Verwoerd's reluctance to tone down the rigid laws of apartheid or how to high criticism after the Sharpeville massacre of 1960 brought him wide criticism among the Afrikaner group.

During the past nine months Vorster has endeavored to ease the "jauler" image thrust on him by some English-language newspapers. He has encouraged friendly relations with South Africa's immediate neighbors, Lesotho, Botswana and Swaziland, all landlocked territories economically dependent on the republic and all led by blacks.

Some staunch upholders of apartheid view any divergence as a softening of the Afrikaner racial doctrine, complete racial segregation and an undermining of Afrikaner dominance in the country's affairs.

Those dedicated to the Verwoerd policy of total Afrikaner domination question the desirability of uncontrolled immigration, which is boosting the English-speaking population and some religious groups competitive with the Dutch Reformed Church.

There is discontent at Vorster's attempts to bring liberal-minded English speakers into the Nationalist fold.

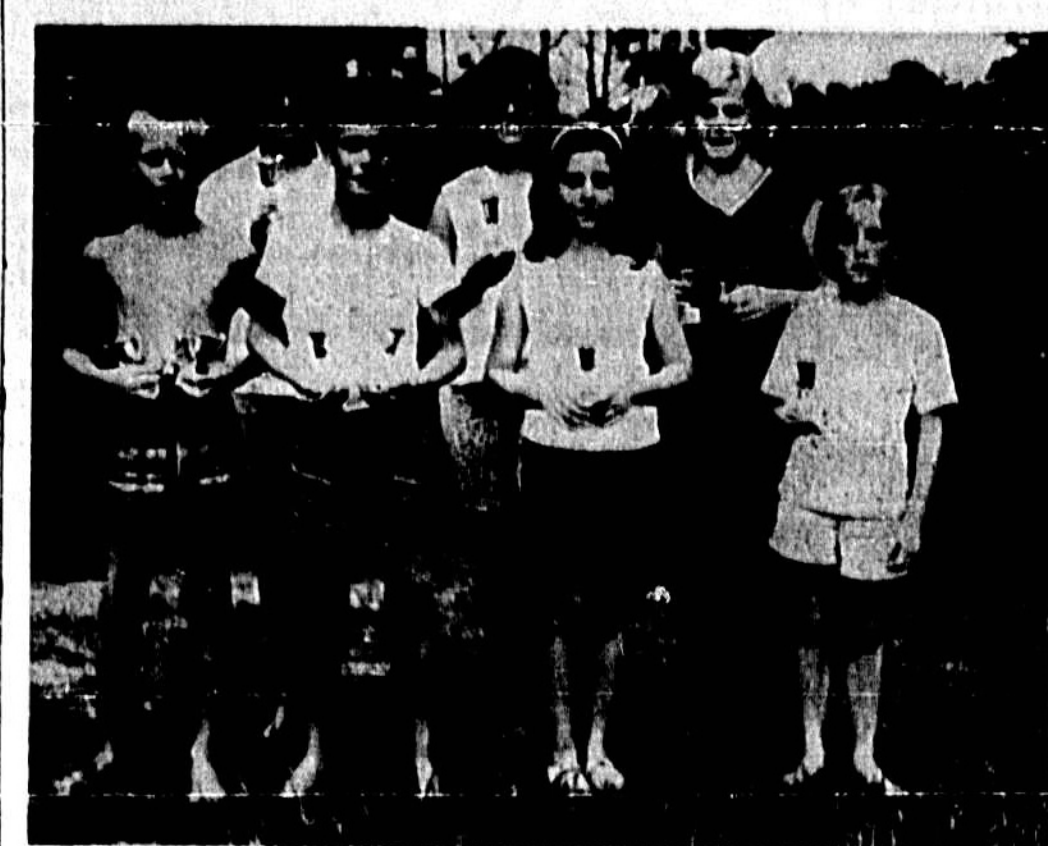

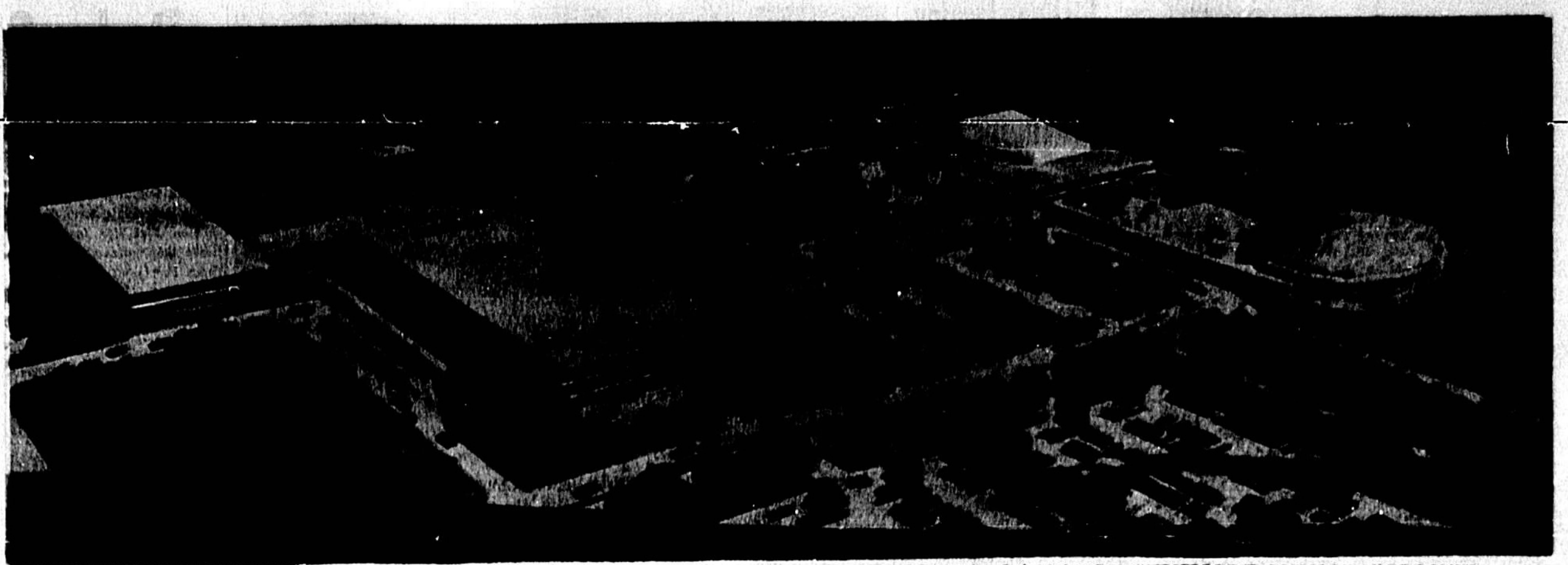

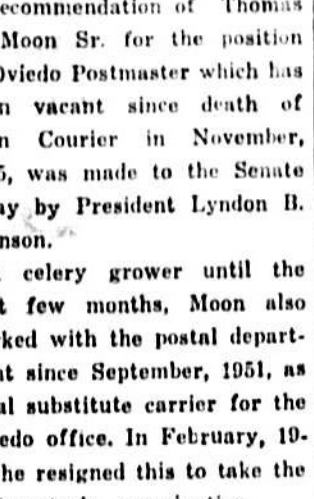
