Iwice a year thousands crowd the streets snaring traffic yet bringing a lot of firm to those who make their way around the area. Every autumn for the last two decades or more the Longwood Historical Society has hosted a huge art testival. And each spring, the Longwood Historical Board pats on a more intimate testivid of the arts.

We re not nearly as big, but we do really well. Bob Lomax. a member of the board, said-

The Spring Festival, which will take place this year on-Saturday and Sunday, March 14 and 15 is known as the Founders Day Arts and Crafts Festival, though Lomax said it is not connected to any cele bration of the city's founding

Regardless of that fact, the Historical Board is dedicated to maintaining and improving the downtown bistoric district. All proceeds from the event are used to help with such prop-

The board has seen to the placement of new bricks along Church Avenue between the Longwood Police station at Milwee Street and State Road 427 and, most recently on Wilma Avenue between City Hall and the Community Building. They have placed six benches throughout the downtown area. And they are looking to purchase some street lamps that in replicas of the kind used in Longwood during her heyday

"We're getting there " Lornax

Tomax and his wife Sandy were on the committee that started the Founders Day event three years ago. Residents of langwood for a quarter of a century they wanted to find a way to help improve the downtown area. They believe the art festival is the way to do it. It is starting small, but Lo-

max believes they are doing

"We're not Winter Park but were getting there " he said The first event drew about

100 artisans and a steady crowd last year there were a lew dozen more crafters and the streets were full from open until close, Lomax said

"This year we have about 189 crafters signed up for the event." he noted "And I think we can expect really good crowds again."

In addition to the artisans and crafters, Lomax said, the testival will feature a food court with a wide variety of tasty treats and entertainment provided by Walt Disney World musicians and dancers.

"This should be our biggest year ever." Lomax predicted. We're expecting big crowds, The vendors should all be happy with this years event and I think it'll be a big crowdpleaser as well."

Death by stab wound in neck

Preliminary autopsy reports on the 68 year old Oviedo woman stabbed to death at her home Tuesday morning indicate that she died from a stab wound to the neck that hit an

Jonathan Arce, 14, a student at Oviedo High School, ts being charged with first degree imirder. Arce's story, according to Lt. Dale Coleman of the Oviedo Police Department, is that Stillman had asked lim to come into her home. Arce said that she wanted to talk to him about her home. Aree told police that the woman pulled a knife, and, in self-defense, he grabbed the knife from her and stabbed her repeatedly.

A handyman, who was a close friend of Stillman and was coming over to conduct repair work at her home, found Arce in the murdered woman's car. Arce supposedly went home to change his clothes and then came back to the scene. The handyman then held Arce once he saw the body of the slatn woman.

Arce is said to be a quiet, slight young man by his peers at Oviedo High School. A fellow student described Arce as 'not physically in-Please See Murder, Page 4A





Drowning prevention How to protect your child

In Florida, drowning is the leading cause of death from intury for toddlers. Florida's drewning rate is almost 150 percent that of the country as a whole. Unfortunately, these grim statistics have qualified Orlando Regional Healthcare System (ORHS) staff as experts on drowning and submersion injuries.

Tammy Horvath, R.N.C., B.S.N., C.P.N., ORHS Coordinator for the Greater Orlando SAFE KIDS Coalition, offers the following tips for preventing water tragedies:

Always supervise children in and around water.

Stall four-sided, five-foothigh fencing with a selfclosing, self-latching gate around pools and spas to prevent direct access from the house.

 Always wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved Personal Floatation Device (PFD) when on a boat or natural bodies of water.

 Never leave a young child alone or with a sibling in the bathtub, not even to answer

* Never swim in unguarded areas, such as quarries, canals or ponds.


 Know CPR, and how to reach your Emergency Medical Service: keep a phone outside near pools and have emergency numbers posted.

 Children should follow the four key rules for swimming: 1. Swim with a buddy, never alone; 2. Don't dive or Jump into bodies of water, always wade in first; 3. Don't push or jump on others; 4. Be prepared for an emergency.

*Of course swimming pools are where most submersion injuries occur, but small children can drown in less than an inch of water -- in a matter of seconds--making even 'kiddie pools,' bathtubs, buckets and toilet bowls a potential hazard," said Horvath. "By simply taking a few simple safety precautions, parents can significantly reduce their child's chance of tragedy."





The Nature Conservancy currently holds the property title. At a later date, the USFWS will purchase 629 acres as part of its Lake Wales Ridge National Wildlife Refuge. According to Tom Follrath, USFWS senior realty officer, protecting this area has long been a top priority for the Service. The state of Florida will use Preservation 2000 funds to purchase 890 acres, which will be managed by the Florida Game and Freshwater Fish Commission. The Nature Conservancy will retain and manage 16 acres.

"The leadership of DEP and USFWS made this project possible, resulting in the protection of this rare habitat unique to Plorida," said Bendick.

Carter Creek is part of the more than 35,000-acre Lake Wales Ridge Ecosystèm project, which has been at the top of the state's Conservation and Recreation Lands Priority Projects List for three years. Located northeast of Sebring along Arbuckle Creek Road, the 4,700-acre Carter Creek site comprises rolling hills of ancient scrub forest, depression marsh, sandhill lakes and a scepage stream system. The area provides habitat for 22 of the 28 state and federally en-dangered or threatened species found on the Lake Wales Ridge. Species include Bald eagles, sand skinks, Florida scrub-jays and rare plants like the Avon Park rabbit bells (Crotalaria avonensis), Garrett's scrub balm (Dicerandra christmanii) and Carter's warea (Warea carteri). These plants occur nowhere else in the world outside the Lake Walcs Ridge.

The mission of The Nature Conservancy is to preserve plants, animals and natural communities that represent the diversity of life on Earth by protecting the lands and waters they need to survive. To date, the Conservancy and its members have protected more than ten million acres in 50 states and Canada. With the support of 46,000 individuals, foundations and corporations, the Florida Chapter has protected more than 700,000 acres across the state since 1959.

Learn the ancient art of calligraphy

LAKE MARY - Much like the monks, who, before the printed word, copied the Bible in black letter hand. Judith Leitch spends hours in her home studio practicing the art of callig-

raphy. Judith is a graphic designer and one of the charter mem-

bers of the Central Florida

Scribes, a calligraphy guild founded in 1984. The practice of the fine art takes up most of her free time. And if she is not creating for her own pleasure, she is teaching for the pleasure of others. 'I have a real love of (calligraphy) and I like to share

it with people." "Calligraphy comes from the Greek word meaning beautiful writing," said Judith. "The early manuscripts were done in black letter and then that evolved, as time went along, into a freer hand, so we had something that was called book hand and then it evolved into the Chancery cursive, or the italic calligraphy, that most people do now."

The medieval art found a resurgence in the United States in the 1970s. When people take calligraphy, usually, for the first time, they're taking something to address their wedding (invitation) envelopes, certificates, diplomas, so they learn the Italic hand.

We, as a calligraphy group, we have learned just about every hand there is. There are about 13 hands, said Judith, "Not all of them are used today." There is a black letter, a dark Gothic; uncial, which is Gaelic or Irish-looking: cooper plate, Spencerian script which used to be taught in school as a typical cursive; italic, a freely written script: Romans and rustic, which is very hard to

"Someone who is very interested in calligraphy or letter forms can just continually learn," said Judith.

The Central Florida Scribes meet once a month, usually the second Sunday, at the Maitland Art Center. The scribes also attend seminars and workshops to become proficient in their

The group is sponsoring "CalligraFun '98" this weekend, March 14 and 15, from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., at the Maltland Art Center. The annual show includes classes taught by members and demonstrations. The event is free to the public, but there is a charge of \$5 for any class offered.

The guild is about a hundred members from all over Central

Florida, "professional calligraphers down to beginners, every step along the way," said Judith. "A lot of our members are just people that don't necessarily do calligraphy but are interested in all things calligraphic. We are just a real nice group so people like to join and get involved in what we

More than simple lettering on paper, Judith's calligraphy is a multi-media presentation. She uses various implements with opaque inks on acrylic or gouache backgrounds. Judith three-dimensional creates presentations for her calligraphy. She made a fan fold book to illustrate a poem her 6-yearold granddaughter wrote about birds she saw on her vacation.

An art form that can be used in various ways, Judith said, "It seems that once somebody knows you do calligraphy. there's always something to be done.

"Sometimes people do it just for the relaxation. To learn calligraphy takes a lot of pracfice...just like playing the piano. But once you get some beautiful letter forms on your paper, you get excited, and you want to go a little bit further."

Judith teaches at Seminole Community College, as part of the Community Education Programs and offers classes at Creadle Art Center in Winter Park. For more information on CalligraFun '98 or the Central Florida Scribes, contact Judith at 322-4669 (evenings).



Energy healing won't do much

DEAR DR. GOTT: I haven't felt well, but medical tests fail to show that anything is wrong. Would I be advised to try energy healing?

DEAR READER: Including a variety of techniques called "biofield therapies," energy healing is one of the newest forms of alternative medicine. Its proponents believe in a "healing force," which is channeled through healers to patients by an unearthly entity, such as God, the cosmos or prayer. For example, using a method called Reiki, practitioners are convinced that they can funnel spiritual energy into a person by placing their hands on the person's body, Similarly. practitioners of therapeutic touch think that all people are vibrating fields of energy that must be brought into balance with the energy fields that surround them. This is accomplished by a ritual of hand movements, such as holding pressurepoints and using their hands to connect "entities" or "polarities" within the patient's body.



body. Unquestionably, it is safe — and usually feels good - but there are no medical studies proving its usefulness. One type of pressure point therapy is reflexology, in which specific areas of the feet are believed to be connected to particular parts of the body. Other types are shiatsu, jin shin do and jin shin jyutsu, each of which involves different levels of pressure over varying areas of the body.

Chronic headaches are often the result of stress and muscle tension, which can be helped by massage, acupuncture and pressure point therapy. Therefore, if your doctor has tested you for serious causes of headache for instance, high blood pressure, migraine and sinus intection - and has diagnosed muscle contraction as the cause of your problem, you could try pressure point therapy.


