GULFPORT, Miss., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Rescued by the officers and crew of the Waterman freighter Hastings, after drifting 65 hours in a disabled motorboat between Miami, Fla., and Bimini, Bahamas Islands, Nell Andrews, 31, of Miami Beach, and Charles Key, 33, of Key West, were brought here yesterday on the Hastings, with their salvaged 35-foot motorboat parked on the steamer's deck.

Andrews, owner of the launch, and Key, his only companion on the Miami-Bimini venture, told a story of helpless drifting northward in the current of the Gulf stream, battered by rough seas, whipped by a stiff northeaster, with rudder gone and no oars or sails to aid them.

An ailment that caused Mrs. Gibson to collapse while attending court 10 days ago is now diagnosed as kidney stones. Her condition was reported to have improved after blood transfusion Friday, but Dr. Charles Kelly, one of the physicians attending her holds that this apparent improvement is only a natural phase of the disease, and of great significance, as it may be reversed very suddenly.

Mrs. Gibson's doctors declare that the transfusion was made to relieve an anemic condition in the event of a sudden turn for the worse soon after the transfusion. Dr. Kelly believes that an operation that is followed by a high percentage of fatalities would be necessitated. He considers her health to be as good now as it ever will be, and feels that she probably has only a short time to live, regardless of the operation.

Mrs. Gibson was taken to the Somerville hospital after her collapse, when physicians there declared she would be unable to testify for several weeks. Special Prosecutor Alexander Simpson had her removed over their protests to the Jersey City hospital where she is now. Physicians there however confirmed the opinion of Somerville physicians, and after the transfusion when they said it might be possible for her to testify early this week.

Mrs. Gibson claims to have been riding a mule in search of corn thieves on the night of the murder, and to have seen Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, widow of the slain clergyman, and her two brothers Henry and Willie Stevens who are now on trial for the murder of Mrs. Mills.

Genuine Pearl Was Selected Only Twice

The genuine pearl was number 19, on a card which was placed in the window of the store. Twenty-eight votes were cast for number 23; 34 votes for number 44; 34 votes for number 40 and 23 votes for number 99. Twenty-five of the imitation pearls received only two, or less votes each.

More Revelations About Marriage Annulment Stir New York Social Circles

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The authorities of the Protestant Episcopal Church and Society were stirred today by further revelations regarding the annulment by the Catholic Church of the Episcopal marriage of the Duke of Marlborough and the former Consuelo Vanderbilt, of New York.

Bishop William Manning, head of the Episcopal diocese of New York thinks the annulment "amazing and incredible." The marriage was annulled by a decree of the diocesan court at Southwark, England, which was upheld by the tribunal of the Rota in Rome.

Announcement that annulment was granted on a plea of the former Duchess has added to the stir. She divorced the Duke several years ago and now is the wife of Col. Jacques Balsan, divorced, of France. A report that Mrs. O. H. Belmont, who divorced William K. Vanderbilt, father of the former Duchess, appeared with other relatives before the diocesan court and testified that duress was used in obtaining the consent of Miss Vanderbilt to her marriage with Marlborough has not been confirmed.

No comment has been obtainable from Mrs. Belmont. Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, sister of Consuelo and other members of the Vanderbilt family, have refused to be interviewed.

When Marlborough and Consuelo Vanderbilt were married both were Episcopalians. After their divorce the Duchess married Col. Balsan, a Catholic. The Duke married Miss Gladys Descon, of Boston who was a bridesmaid at the Marlborough wedding, and who is a Catholic.

It is reported before the Marlborough marriage that Consuelo's father opposed the union but that Mrs. Vanderbilt insisted upon it. From the \$2,500,000 given by Mr. Vanderbilt as a marriage settlement the Duke is still receiving an income of about \$1,000 per week. The agreement provided that the Duke and Duchess were to receive the income from the dot, and that on their deaths the income was to go to their heirs. Nothing concerning a divorce was contained in the marriage agreement.

Last April Mrs. Belmont in a letter to Bishop Manning said: "I am still a divorced woman." The letter in reply to an appeal for funds for the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, said that the bishop had refused to permit her name to appear in the Trinity Church year book as head of a church philanthropy. The bishop is a foe of divorce.

MEXICAN PLOT IS REVEALED IN KILLING OF NINE

Rumors That General Fernan-...
dez Was One of Leaders...
Of Proposed Revolution Is...
Denied by Federal Chief

Nine of Rebel Band Are Admitted Slain

Scouts Report That Attack...
Upon Juarez Was Planned;...
Seven Hundred of Rebels

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Plans for a revolutionary movement in northern Mexico are believed to have been partly revealed by the slaying of nine rebels by federal troops in the state of Chihuahua.

Rumors that Gen. Nicholas Fernandez, former chief of staff for General Francisco (Pancho) Villa, was one of the leaders of the proposed revolution, have been denied by Gen. Ramon Lopez, commander of the Mexican federal garrison here. The reports credited Gen. Fernandez with leading a small detachment of heavily armed men into Mexico Nov. 1. This, it was said, was part of a scheme to mobilize thousands of Villa's followers who located on Chihuahua ranches when the bandit leader was slain.

Gen. Lopez admitted that detachments had been ordered to search for the rebel band; last night he declared nine of the band had been killed. According to official reports and that Maj. Jose Florez, his chief of staff, was hunting for the others. He declined to state who was in command of the rebels.

Shooting of two Mexicans held on charges of transporting munitions to rebel factions, when they attempted to escape last week from federal troops, was the first indication of extensive investigation of rumors of a revolt. Lino Delgado, slain when he attempted to escape Friday, told of assembling arms and ammunition, Gen. Lopez said.

Gen. Lopez's scouts reported that the rebels were planning a surprise attack on Juarez. It was persistently rumored that 70 men were ready to attack Juarez as soon as a five day payroll was available. A former follower of Adolfo de la Huerta, was said to have been recruiting men. He was reported to have ample funds, which was given as the reason for postponement of former revolutionary plans.

Many Mexican residents here believe that an outbreak is unlikely at this time. They claim a serious revolt would be more apt to occur after crops have been harvested to provide for the rebels and money for munitions.

Dyess Fined \$500 On Liquor Charge

Constable E. E. Walker arrested I. M. Dyess of Markham Saturday while the latter was said to have been on his way to deliver an order of "prohibition liquor." Dyess was cowering over a small creek when the constable approached him. The officer brought Dyess and the bootleg liquor to Sanford, where a charge of possessing liquor was made against him. Dyess pleaded guilty and was fined \$500 by Judge J. G. Sharon this morning.

The constable also arrested Charles Ford, negro, in an automobile at Markham shortly before he arrested Dyess. Ford was alleged to have had liquor in his car. He pleaded not guilty to the charge and his bond was fixed at \$500 with trial set for the next term of court. Bond was furnished.

Scripps-Howard Buys News-Scimitar And Merges It With Memphis Press

MEMPHIS, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The Memphis News Scimitar, afternoon newspaper has been sold to the Scripps-Howard Publishing Company interests according to announcement today by Bernard Cohn, publisher of the News Scimitar.

The News Scimitar, a member of the Associated Press, will be taken over by the Memphis Press, Scripps-Howard daily, Mr. Cohn said. Paul Block of New York, owner of the News Scimitar, the transfer is expected to be made within a few days. The financial consideration was not announced. Rumors of anticipated sale of the News Scimitar have been current here for many weeks.

REMOVED IN FRANKLIN AREA

Other Zones Where the Cat-Head Tick Has Prevailed Are To Be Freed of Restrictions Next Spring, Say Officials

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 15 (AP)—The report from the United States Department of Agriculture that a new area in Florida that had been freed of cat-head ticks had been released from quarantine, according to Dr. J. Y. Knapp, state veterinarian.

The work of eradication, carried on in Franklin county by the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, has resulted in the government lifting the quarantine placed over the area because of tick infestation, Dr. Knapp said.

Zones 14 and 16, consisting of Holmes county, west of the Choctawhatchee river, Walton, Okaloosa and Santa Rosa counties, in Zone 14, and Escambia county, in Zone 16, will be released in the spring, the state veterinarian stated.

Lifting of the federal quarantine for Franklin county was made simultaneously by the government with other tick-free territory in Arkansas, Texas and Virginia, equivalent to about 15 counties in all, the Department of Agriculture's report said. The official act releasing the new tick-free territory from quarantine was Bureau of Animal Industry Order No. 300, signed on November 5 by R. W. Dunlap, acting secretary of agriculture.

The new order was made effective Dec. 1. It designated the quarantine areas in the South still infested with cat-head ticks, and also the island of Porto Rico.
