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Summons issued in Club Juana case

The State Attorney's Office has issued a summons to the owner of Club Juana and three of his dancers for violating the a Casselberry nudity ordinance.

On Friday, May 28, the dancers challenged Casselberry's nudity ordinance by performing scenes from Shakespeare. The dancers and the Club Juana owner Michael Pinter claimed the performance was legitimate theater. Members of the City-County

Investigative Bureau and Seminole County Sheriff's Office forwarded investigative materials, including video tape, to the State Attorney's Office. After thorough review, the State Attorney's Office filed charges with the clerk of the court and issued summons to appear to the owner of Club Juana and three female employees.

According to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, all three women and Pinter, are being charged with violating the City of Casselberry's ordinance prohibiting nudity in an establishment licensed to sell alcohol. All four indi-

viduals are being charged with one count of violating the ordinance, a second degree misdemeanor.

Though Pinter claimed the performance of Shakespeare and other original works represented legitimate theater, Deanna Brown, public information officer for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, said the club and the dancers would have been in violation regardless of whether dancers performed Shakespeare or Madonna.

"This merely has to do with getting nude in an establishment that sells alcohol," Brown said.

No charges were filed at the time of the violation because the Sheriff's Office wanted the State Attorney's Office to make a judgment as to the validity of the of Pinter's claim, said Brown.

According to the Sheriff's Office, two of the four individuals have been served with a summons. Pinter (12-29-44), and dancer Christy McKee (11-13-78) have been served. The two remaining dancers, Sara Uffelman (6-17-79) and Margaret Morgan (9-6-75), have not been served will be served at a later time.

Longwood discusses road projects

LONGWOOD - Longwood City Commissioners will entertain additional road improvement project designs and their associated costs from the city's Public Works department at its next regular meeting Monday, June 7.

The City is currently in the midst of an aggressive street paving and facilities

improvement process, including renovation of the Community Building at 194 Wilma Street.

Among project designs expected to be discussed are the addition of stormwater drainage and sidewalks at East Palmetto between Grant and the railroad at an estimated cost of \$190,000. Other paving plans include: street paving improvements on Georgia Avenue between Wayman and Lakeview at an estimated cost of \$150,000.

The commission will also discuss street

paving improvements on Lakeview Avenue between Georgia and Orange at an estimated cost of \$130,000, improvements on West Pine between Millwee and the dead end at an estimated cost of \$180,000, paving on East Warren Avenue between Myrtle and Lakeview with an estimated cost of \$970,000, and resident requests for improvements at East Street between SR 434 and Wildmere at a cost of \$400,000.

Schools may raise parking fees

SANFORD - The Seminole County school board on Tuesday will consider a request to raise parking fees for high school students to pay for the cost of an additional security officer at each high school. The board may also approve revisions to its citizenship code.

Richard Wells, executive director of secondary education, is proposing parking fees for high school students of \$35 per semester. The primary duties of the added security officers

would be patrolling the outside of schools and parking lots.

Students currently pay from \$5 to \$10 per year for parking decals at most Seminole County schools.

The schools will continue to retain 20 percent of the parking fees to fund student activities.

The school board discussed charging a parking fee to cover the cost of additional security officers for each high school at its May 25 meeting.

Wolfgang Halbig, director of security, said much of the violence that occurs on campuses begins in school parking lots.

A \$50 fee was proposed at the May 25 school board meeting. Board chairman Larry Furlong and member Jeanne Morris said a \$50 fee is too expensive for students to afford. Furlong said the extra guards are not necessary.

Board members Sandy Robinson and Bob Goff said they were not opposed to the fee for extra security officers.

Other schools such as Montgomery County in Washington have adopted similar parking fees to pay for additional security officers, Halbig said.

County considers change on fees

SANFORD - The Seminole County Commissioners expect to go through their entire agenda on Tuesday morning with no afternoon or evening sessions.

They'll make decisions on issues ranging from an ordinance to prohibit the co-mingling of alcohol and nudity to passing an ordinance to waive water and sewer connection fees for public and private schools.

Elimination of the connection fee for water and sewer service could offer an economic incentive to be considered in the decision to expand or construct a school.

Because construction of the water and service lines is paid for from the county's water and sewer fund, others who pay into this fund will cover the cost of water and sewer connection for the schools.

Each 100 students equate to \$14,745 in connection fees that the Environmental Services will not receive as a direct service provider.

If the Board approves formation of the water and sewer fees ordinance, it would have to advertise the date for the required public hearing.

Those who had planned to attend the continuance of the Heathrow International Business Center hearing are advised that county staff has requested this item be continued. See County, Page 7A

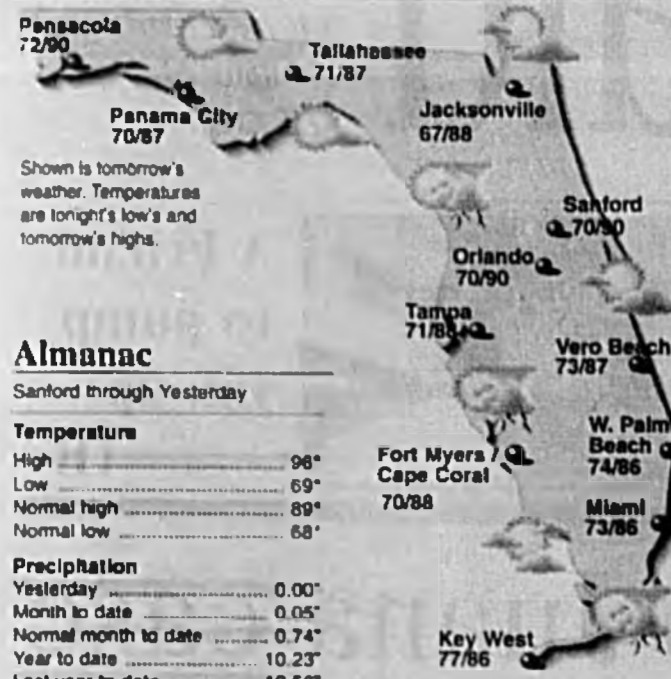

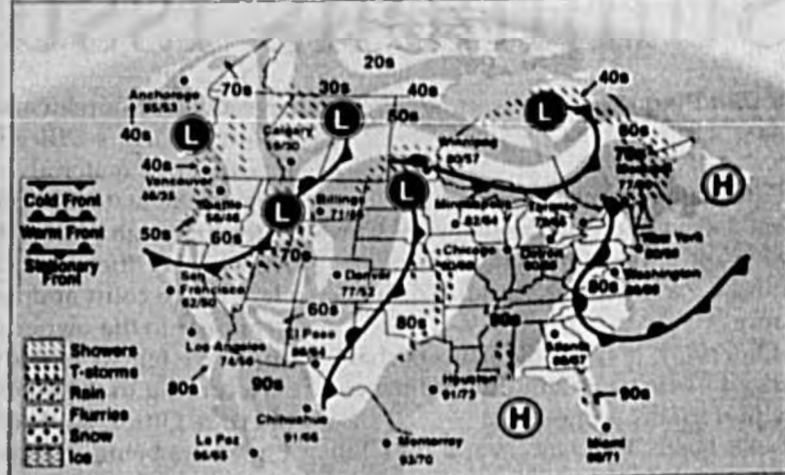

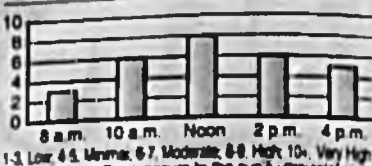

Those who attended Crooms Academy, Seminole High School or St. Paul Baptist Church, know and appreciate Maestro Minott's dedication to the pursuit of excellence in music and education.

How fortunate the Sanford community is that Minott, who was born in Miami, came to live here with his aunt (Joannah Moore) when he was a year old. By 9, Minott was playing the piano and acquiring an appreciation for inspirational music.

Minott was tutored by Gwendolyn Mathis, Sussie Hardy and J.N. Crooms. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music and a Masters in Educational Guidance at Florida A & M.

Soon, "The Maestro" came home to teach.

On the occasion of his 68th birthday on Friday, Minott talked about how important it was for today's students to be "committed to only the best music."

Minott said he is saddened by the "vulgarity" in the music that young people are hearing today. "Some of it is very disappointing," he said. "Sending out the

A child of The Depression Era, Minott was exposed to deeply inspirational music as well as to the great jazz performed by artists such as Duke Ellington, Count Basie and Louis Armstrong.

It wasn't that Minott disliked jazz - far be it. He said, "I never got into it much." His preference was classical works. He said he went to a concert by the

tenor soloist Roland Hayes and he always enjoyed hearing the classical soprano Marian Anderson.

Minott said he was extremely proud of the achievements of many of his own students. One favorite being Patricia Merritt Whatley.

"Patricia Whatley is a marvelous, marvelous soprano," Minott said. "We're privileged that she is here to teach at the Taijiri School of the Performing Arts. Her students are receiving only the best."

As you might expect, Whatley is extremely fond of the man she calls, "My love...my favorite teacher ever."

"Mr. Minott was hard, extremely hard but he was fair," Whatley said. "He wanted perfection, and accepted nothing less. He cared about your behavior, the way you looked, the way you carried yourself."

"He taught me three-times over - at Crooms Academy, at St. Paul's and at the Joe-Nott Studio on 13th Street. He introduced me to the music of Handel and Mozart."

"To this day, I teach the Taijiri students what Mr. Minott taught to me. His contributions to the community have enabled us to be in alliance to the Orlando Opera Company."

Whatley will be one of the many voices of the E.E. Minott Inspirational Choir paying tribute to "The Maestro" Saturday night at Crooms Academy on West 13th Street.

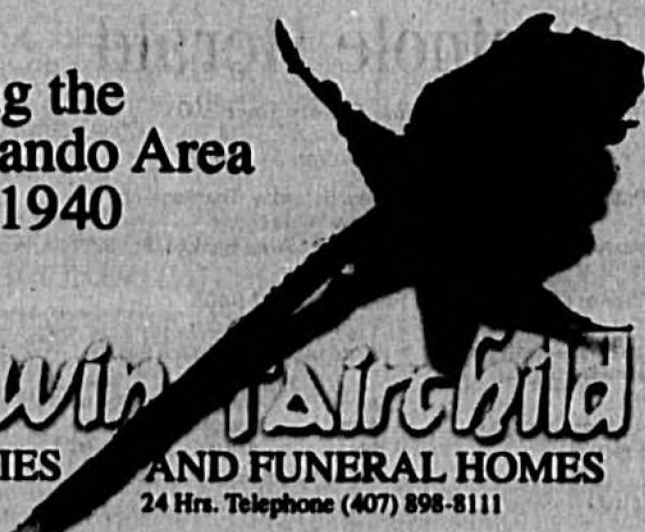

Our View

Two wrongs don't make a right

Judge O.H. Eaton Jr.'s dismissal of drug charges against a Sanford man earlier this week on the grounds that law enforcement officers used excessive force in apprehending him, sent a painful reminder to police and the citizens they are sworn to protect, that two wrongs fail to make a right.

The fallout from the incident, which occurred during last year's drug sweep labeled, "Operation Thunder Road," remains to be seen. Jason Dunn, hardly a model Sanford citizen with four previous drug arrests, walks away from a fifth charge as a result of Eaton's ruling. But he does so minus his spleen, removed by surgeons as a result of the beating he took at the hands of Orange County, Seminole County, and Sanford police while resisting arrest.

In his dismissal order, Eaton wrote, "The credible evidence establishes that the agents' use of force against the defendant was, to say the least, excessive, leaving him unconscious, or nearly so, bleeding from the mouth and with a shattered spleen."

His ruling concluded by stating, "While trial judges are understandably reluctant to dismiss criminal charges except in the most egregious cases, it is the essence of judicial duty to do so when appropriate. It is appropriate here."

Rulings of this nature inherently carry with them the opportunity to create a landscape that contributes to a "chilling affect" on law enforcement officers. Forcing them, in the heat of apprehending criminals, into the gray conundrum of "how much force is just enough force without risking the officer's well being or compromising the successful capture of a criminal?"

Akin to combat, most arrest situations seldom avail themselves of the opportunity for deep, reflective examination of all possible consequences.

We agree with Eaton's findings in this particular case. Just as there should be zero tolerance of those who would choose to violate our laws and endanger the public, there should likewise be zero tolerance of brutality from those sworn to serve and protect.

We would also implore our judiciary to pursue an equally vigilant sentencing policy, hopefully contributing to a law enforcement environment where our police are not forced to face the same criminals time and time again on the streets, inviting similar recipes for disaster. With a dramatic rise in the number of assault and battery cases on law enforcement officers by criminals, our judicial community should remember that criminals don't always play by the rules.

Look before you leap

There are a number of commercial buildings in Sanford, many along French Avenue, as well as elsewhere in the county, neat, clean, freshly painted, often with new signs, sitting empty for months and months. Someone's dream of a business has been quashed.

In many cases, a person purchases or leases commercial property, perhaps completely rebuilds existing structures, possibly repaves the parking lot and in essence, spends thousands of dollars in preparation for a business.

Then, upon investigating city codes, they find they cannot have that type of business or must spend thousands of dollars more to make changes required before the business will be granted an occupational license.

While we are pleased to see old business structures repainted and cleaned up, the concept that the business may never go into operation saddens us.

The problem is a lack of pre-planning. In a city the size of Sanford, many may not find it necessary to hire a feasibility study to determine if their business would be successful. Often, people, especially long-time residents, know what type of business is needed, or will succeed.

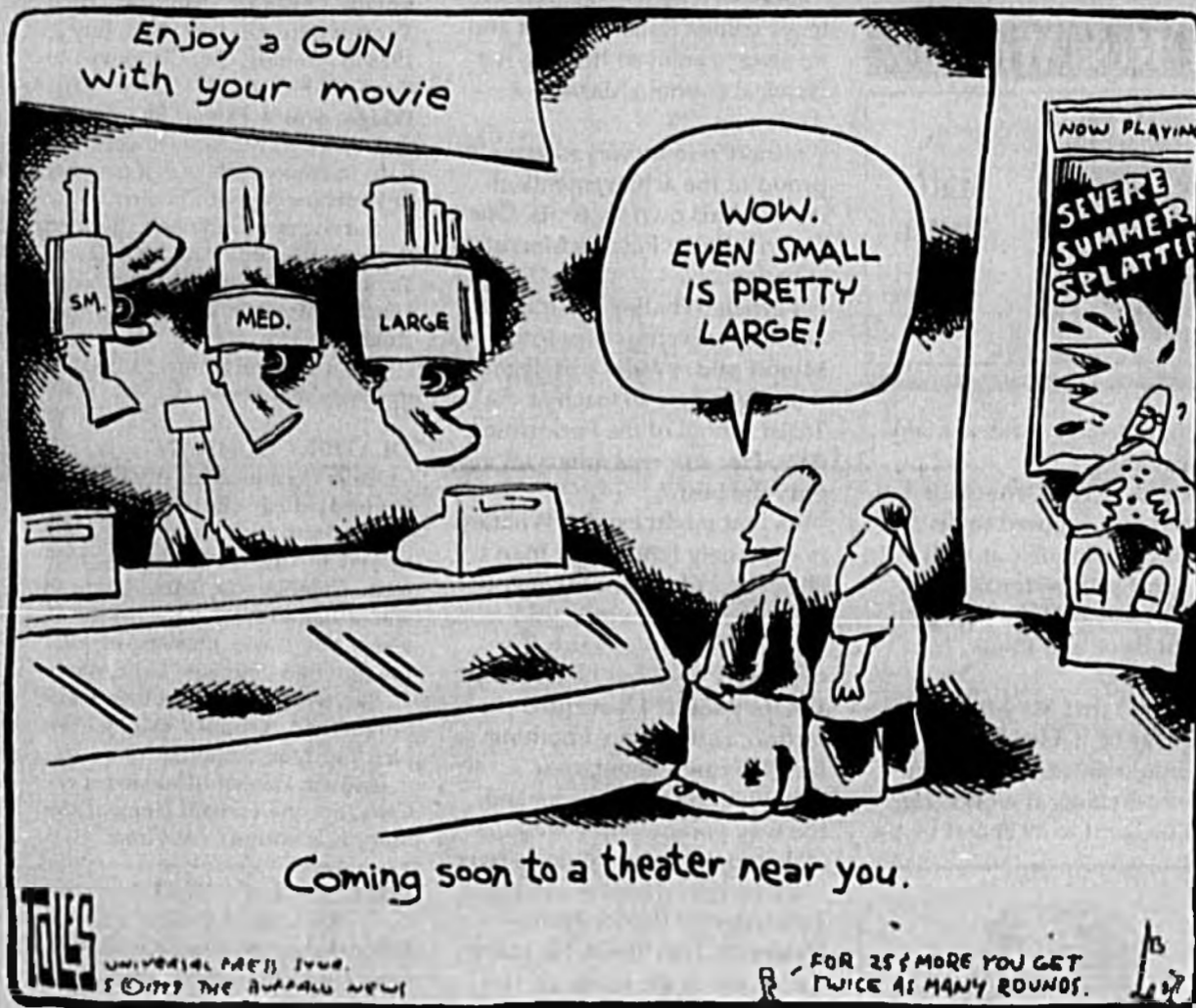
But the need to investigate code requirements should be a must on anyone's list. Just because a building exists doesn't mean it is within code. The former owner may have been able to operate because of "grandfathering", that is, because it was that way when the codes went into existence.

When a new owner comes along however, the grandfather clause usually ends. The new owner is responsible for making all the appropriate changes. There are many things to consider: how far is the building and/or parking lot from the city right-of-way? Are the signs within size limitations? What about set-backs, that distance required between the structure or paved area, to adjoining property? All of this, plus many more codes including fire safety (sprinklers, etc.), structural integrity and proper electrical wiring, sewers, water, ... on and on.

Some people believe a city's code enforcement people are only out to get them. They forget that these people are also out to help them. Codes are clear, but often need explaining when there may be some question by the prospective business operator.

Visit city hall. Make an appointment to discuss all codes, building, fire, safety, and other codes, with city planners, code enforcement officers or others.

There is no need to spend thousands of dollars in anticipation of having one's own business, if the location is not suitable for your use. Look before you leap. You may find the business is impractical, but think of the thousands of dollars you could save.



ACLU can't stop God's will

Something quite remarkable happened last week at a high school graduation in Calvert County, Maryland. It wasn't that the American Civil Liberties Union had intervened on behalf of a lone student who said he would be offended if a fellow graduate went ahead with her plans to deliver an invocation at commencement. The religious version of "ethnic cleansing" happens all the time, from the courthouse to the schoolhouse. Seventeen-year-old Julie Schenk, who wanted to deliver the invocation, compromised and announced that she would instead call for a "time for reflection" that did not mention God.

That seemed fine with everybody, including the ACLU. But when Schenk asked for 30 seconds of silence and the crowd of 4,000 roared, a single loud male voice began reciting the Lord's Prayer, which begins, "Our Father, who art in heaven." The prayer was quickly picked up by others in the audience until it rolled like thunder across the room.

The student who had protested the offering of an audible prayer, 18-year-old Nick Becker, walked out. When he tried to reenter to receive his diploma, he was barred by authorities under a school policy that forbids students from returning to an assembly once they have left. Becker has been described as having an independent streak. Last year he was forced to wash his hair when he came to school with it in spikes resembling the Statue of Liberty, and he had also refused to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance and was about to be disciplined when the ACLU intervened. He was put in a patrol car until commencement ended. Becker was also barred from a post-graduation boat cruise that was limited to those who had participated in the ceremony.

What amazes about this incident is that the audience reaction seems to have been spontaneous. Indeed, an ACLU spokesperson appeared frustrated when she noted the corporate prayer wasn't initiated by graduates or school officials. Nor did the prayer specifically mention "God,"

'Not in my back yard' is today's code for class discrimination

As I recall, we Americans decided that we wanted to help the nation's poor to help themselves. As I recall, we portrayed our dislike for welfare as a sign of our desire to help the poor avoid dependency. As I recall, we said we wanted help for the poor to come from churches and other private charities, not from government programs.

Isn't that what we said during the welfare-reform debate? So why do proposals from Habitat for Humanity to build houses for the poor continue to stir up resentment from more affluent neighbors?

Metro Atlanta's latest Habitat flap is centered in Gwinnett County, filled with affluent suburbs. The Gwinnett chapter of Habitat for Humanity has proposed building a cluster of 14 houses near a quiet, wooded neighborhood where homes are valued in the range of \$130,000. Were the Habitat homes to be sold on the open market, they would have a market value of about \$90,000.

Despite the modest gap in market values, some of the middle-class neighbors see a wider gulf separating them from prospective Habitat residents.

"If I wanted to live among low-income people, I would have moved (elsewhere)," said Glenn Lewis, president of the neighborhood homeowners association.

"These people are going to be leaving abandoned cars in their yards and letting the weeds grow." Resident Marion Kiker took a similar stance: "You just don't know the class of people coming in."

Those objections speak volumes about stereotypes and prejudices against the poor. (I'd hate for Lewis to see my lawn, where the grass sometimes grows knee-high before I notice.)

But the protests against poor homeowners also reveal a truth or two that run counter to the conventional wisdom: We do little to help the poor adopt our values and practices, despite continually preaching to them (from a safe distance, of course) that they must do so. We brag about American generosity and Christian charity, but those values are often overwhelmed by old-fashioned bigotry and selfishness.

Incidentally, this is not a race thing. Because Gwinnett County's population is only 5 percent black and 2 percent Latino, most of the residents of the Habitat development would likely be white. But even the white poor, it seems, are not welcome in this middle-class neighborhood.

Nor are prejudices against the poor the sole province of the white middle class. A few years

ago, a proposed Habitat for Humanity project was fiercely opposed by residents of a black working-class Atlanta neighborhood. Same deal: "Those people" will bring down property values, invite crime and generally mar the neighborhood. (Who said blacks aren't true, red-blooded Americans? We can be as narrow-minded as any other ethnic or racial group.)

Of course, nothing dire happened when that Habitat development was completed and families moved in. The Habitat organization screens very carefully, accepting only homeowners who can pay a small mortgage and a minimal down payment.

In addition, they are expected

to contribute 150 hours of work on a Habitat house, their own or someone else's. They are also required to attend classes on home maintenance and budgeting. Indeed, because of the requirement for shared effort in the homebuilding, Habitat homeowners may have a better spirit of community than residents in more affluent housing developments.

There is no guarantee that uplifting moral values are to be found in upscale gated communities, where children may build pipe bombs in the basement, parents might assault the Little League coach, and the homeowners association members may go to blows over the hiring of a tennis pro. But

there's a better-than-even chance a hardworking and grateful Habitat homeowner — trying hard to make it into the mainstream — would make a good neighbor.

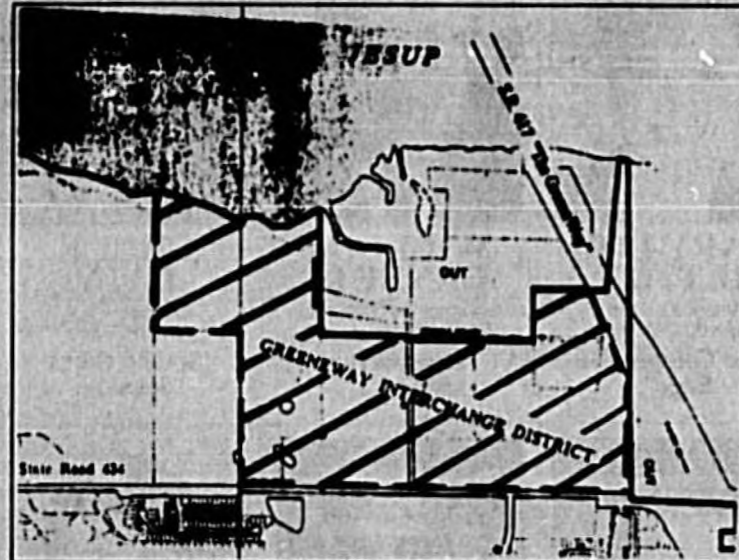

Wells said that the concept is not unique and has been successful in other districts.

For example, Wells cited a May article in *Education Week* saying that Nicolet High School in Glendale, Wis. uses grades as a factor in determining who receives a parking space. The article said parking permits at the high school cost \$100 per semester.

The school board is also reviewing changes to its citizenship code that governs the behavior of students who participate in extra-curricular activities.

Under the five-year old policy,

students can be suspended from extracurricular activities for drinking alcohol, taking illegal drugs, using false identification, or smoking. The code applies to both middle and high school students.

In January, the school board upheld the 30-day suspensions of two Seminole High School football players, a 16-year old sophomore and an 18-year old senior. The students were suspended from the team after participating in a Labor Day gathering with friends at New Smyrna Beach in which some students drank vodka.

The policy is being challenged

in district court by the students and their parents. The parents say the policy was not properly enforced, and that it is unconstitutional.

The students did not miss a game while the case was under appeal, although one of the students already had a season-ending knee injury. The suspension for the sophomore student will carry over into the next school year.

The revised code would eliminate the appeals process to the school board, giving the school principal final authority on the suspension of a student from extracurricular activities.

"This is all part of the City's overall beautification plan," Drago said. "We're finalizing a few more streets and putting striping on the streets."

Additional infrastructure improvements remain on the drawing board.

"We plan to package the water projects into one overall bid after October 1," Drago said.

Longwood's ambitious road project schedule has drawn the admiration of at least one colleague outside the city.

"Longwood's road paving projects are impressive," Lake Mary City Commissioner Gary Bender said. "Maybe we should examine what they're doing and follow their example."

Although the individual pro-

jects have various estimated timetables, current plans call for the majority of paving to be completed between now and November 30.

Commissioners are also expected to consider budget requests from the department of Public Safety to replace a number of vehicles. The Longwood Police Department is seeking the green light to replace four road patrol vehicles at a cost of

\$90,000.

The city's Fire Department will submit a request for a new, fully equipped ambulance at a cost of \$190,000 as well as the addition of three new fire fighters at an estimated cost of \$90,000.

Monday evening's meeting takes place at the Longwood City Commission Chambers, located at 175 W. Warren Avenue beginning at 7:00 p.m.

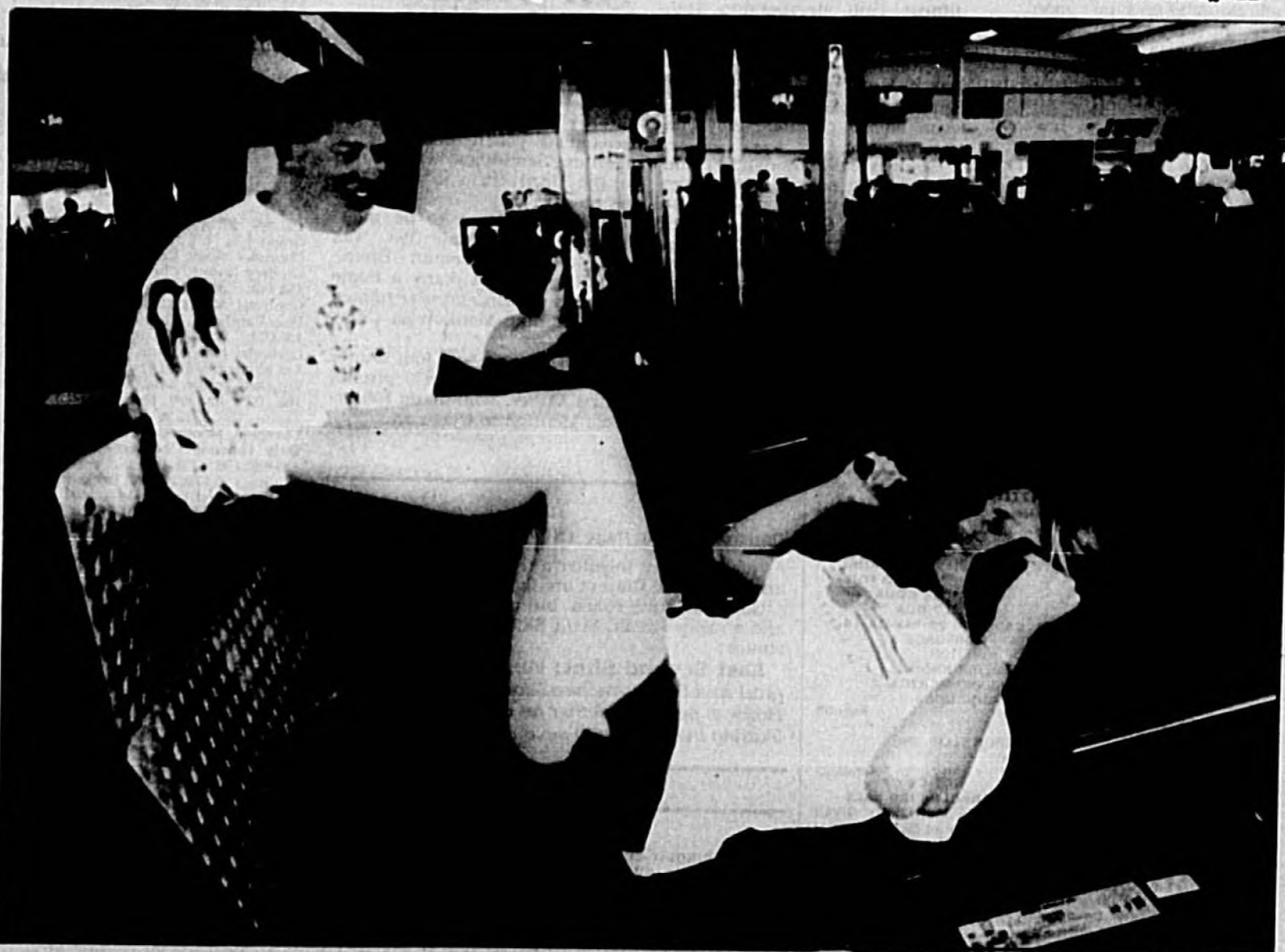

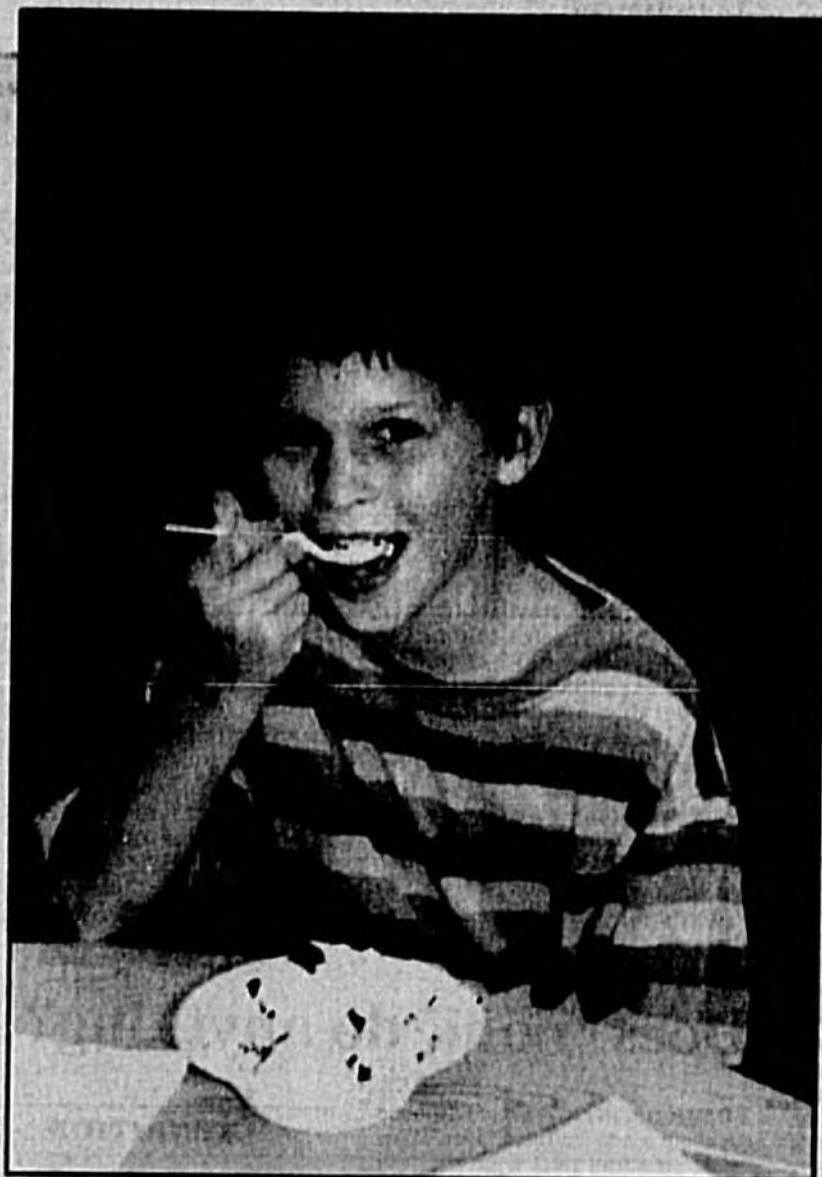

What is Kids House of Seminole, Inc.?

Kids House of Seminole, Inc. is a non-profit Florida corporation controlled by its member agencies and organizations for the purposes of protecting abused children in Seminole County. Those agencies include: Altamonte Springs Police Department; Casselberry Police Department; Child Protection Team; Department of Children and Families; Seminole County Friends of Abused Children, Inc.; Guardian Ad Litem Program of Seminole County; Lake Mary Police Department; Longwood Police Department; Office of the State Attorney, Eighteenth Judicial Circuit; Oviedo Police Department; Sanford Police Department; Seminole County Mental Health; Seminole County Sheriff's Office; and Winter Springs Police Department.

Kids House's mission is to aid abused children by providing all necessary services for child abuse cases from report and investigation through treatment and prosecution in a friendly, nonthreatening environment. To accomplish this mission, Kids House will provide a child friendly facility for information gathering and treatment of victims of child abuse.

The facility will be used primarily during the investigative process. It will be a place where investigators from law enforcement, the Child Protection Team, and the Department of Children and Families can bring a child to be interviewed. Specialized interview rooms will be set up where children will be interviewed in a less threatening environment than might otherwise be available. The interview rooms will be outfitted with advanced video and audio recording devices to gather the best possible evidence for use at trial.

The Child Protection Team (two investigators) will be located at the facility and Kids House

will provide additional administrative staff for its operation. The facility will eventually be used to offer follow-up counseling and support services for victims and their families. Optimally, we would like to add medical examination rooms, but considerable funding sources will be necessary before this can happen. While the facility will be available for use around the clock, we do not plan to staff the facility 24-hours a day or offer any type of overnight housing for victims.

Funding for Kids House is through grants, donations, fund

raising efforts, and other sources. We have recently added a part-time Program Manager who is responsible for these efforts. The Kids House movement in Seminole County has progressed since 1993 - albeit slowly - to the point where we have in-place the organizational structure to be successful, such as being incorporated, having IRS 501 (c) 3 status, and an Investigative Guideline for all Seminole County agencies to follow. We believe we can now support the physical structure - the facility and become operational in short order.

Does 'noni' do anything?

DEAR DR. BLONZ: I recently found out about a new "miracle" juice called "noni." It's fruit juice from the noni tree in Tahiti and supposedly heals arthritis and other medical products. I'm concerned because this product is only sold through one company (which appears to be a pyramid company), and I haven't found any research articles on this juice in prominent medical newsletters. If you have any insight on whether this juice is effective and safe, it would be greatly appreciated. - T., Nashville, Tenn.

DEAR T.: When you are active in a number of online nutrition-related newsgroups, you tend to hear about every new product that comes down the pike. I was immediately skeptical of the noni product, thinking it was yet another too good to be true product being promoted through multilevel marketing. After checking my initial concerns were justified.

The botanical name for the noni plant is *Morinda citrifolia*, and it has a long history of use in Hawaii and Polynesia. A study in *Plant Medica* reports that noni extracts have analgesic (painkilling) and sedative properties, which jibes with the plant's folkloric names of "headache tree" and "painkiller plant." Claims about anticancer and immune stimulant properties have little if any evidence to support them. There is a small amount of animal research, but it's preliminary, at best.

The bottom line is that noni is yet

another unproven "natural product" being foisted on the public. The plant may indeed have healthful properties, but there may be dangers as well. A basic tenet of toxicology is that "it's the dose that makes the poison." With the lack of information about this product, how do you know what you're doing to your body?

If you are still interested, read about how the attorney general of the State of California took issue with the way Morinda Inc. has made unproven claims at the following Web site: www.caag.state.ca.us/press/98.109.htm. There is also more information about noni at www.hawaii.nation.org/nation/canoe/noni.html.

Be sure to arm yourself with as much information as possible before you decide. Personally, I would stay away until more is known.

The way we were — New settlers come to Sanford

This is taken again from the chapter, "The Sanford Grant," in Florida for Tourists and Invalids, written by George Barbour in 1884.

The settlers on the Sanford Grant were mostly recent arrivals who had come from all parts of the country. Several prominent gentlemen owned groves.

Three miles from Sanford was Belair, the special grove of General Sanford, a fine estate of 125 acres, all fenced and under the highest cultivation. Here were thousands of orange,

lemon and lime trees, pineapple plants and hundreds of other foreign and native tropical plants, fruits and shrubs.

General Sanford lived much abroad so the management of his vast estate and other interests fell upon the resident agent, Mr. J.E. Ingraham, a native of Wisconsin. He had come to Florida a few years before supposedly in the final stages of consumption, but he was presently enjoying vigorous health. Mr. Ingraham was also president of the South Florida Railroad.

Beginning in Sanford, the South Florida Railroad ran southwest 22 miles to Orlando, the county seat. The first spadeful of earth in the grading of the line had been turned by General Ulysses S. Grant on January 10, 1880. (There is an historical marker noting this downtown on West First Street.) This railroad had the

further distinction of being the only "newspaper railroad" in the world, it was built and owned by the owners of the Boston Herald. It was a narrow gauge road (three feet between the rails) and was well constructed and equipped and was destined to be a great railway system.

Although the railroad ended at Orlando, preparations were being made for its extension southwest. Its ultimate destination was Charlotte Harbour on the Gulf Coast. Several branch lines were also projected.

Another enterprising citizen of Sanford at the time was Mr. George H. Sawyer, originally of Massachusetts. He had been a Boston resident since 1875 and was owner of the City Hotel as well as one of the finest gardens in the state. During the entire winter, his hotel tables were loaded with the best of squash, cabbage, celery, cauliflower, peas, etc., culled daily from his garden. His efforts on displaying the Orange County resources at the 1880-81 State Fair in Jacksonville had a great effect in directing the tide of

immigration that was presently flowing into the county.

In February 1881 there was a county fair in Sanford which was described in detail in a report by Dr. J.L. Richardson for the Mt. Sterling, Kentucky Democrat. Here is an example: "There were turnips measuring three feet in circumference, cabbage weighing 12-15 pounds, and radishes as large as nine pounds. Heads of lettuce that would cover a dinner plate looked fresh and crisp while onions, kale, parsnips, etc., lay around in great profusion.

Potatoes planted on Christmas Day were of fine size for table use. All together it would be difficult to imagine a more splendid and attractive show of garden vegetables maturing in the open garden, while all the other states lay congealed in the icy chains of winter."

Change the quality of a day

Most of those in the high school graduating class I was addressing on this night would not, I knew, be going on to college. Some might attend a business or vocational school. But the majority would begin job hunting in a week.

I felt this was not the occasion for one of those "the future of the world is in your hands" commencement speeches. Yet even if these graduates were not in a position to change the world through academics, an even greater opportunity lay before them. Thoreau put it best. The 19th century American writer said: "To change the quality of a day — that is the highest of the arts."

Maybe it is good to aim high in life and to have lofty goals. Maybe we need to have our sights raised to great possibilities for the future.

But there is something we need even more: to see the possibilities in each 24-hour day in our life. It is easy to sit and dream of the future. But to change the quality of a day — that takes an extraordinary person. Yet anybody, regardless of background or IQ, can do it.

I decided to tell these graduates sitting before me what a wonderful opportunity was theirs if they would remember just three things:

— There is something greater than greatness.

People who aspire to greatness can become blind to the fact that greatness isn't the greatest thing in the world. It may change the world, but it seldom changes the quality of a day.

Goodness is one of those things that is greater than greatness. When we think of the people who have meant the most to us, we are ready to admit they have not been the most successful, or the best read, or the wisest, or the best conversationalists.

Certainly they might not be, for the most part, people whom the world would call great. Yet we wouldn't trade them for all the great people in the world, because they are the ones who have brightened the days of our lives. They are good people who cared. We can strive to be like them.

— Little things mean a lot. Little things like kindness and patience and honesty. Little things like saying "I love you" — three little words that have changed the quality of more days than any others. One of the reasons so many marriages fail today — or fail to be what they might be — is that we have forgotten to say those three little words.

— Someone is watching you every day of your life, taking notice of the way you live.

(and in others), they put together a life of their own. If our outlook and behavior are attractive, others will tend to incorporate those qualities into their lives.

It also works the other way. When I was serving as foreman of a grand jury, I heard criminal cases that involved people who saw nothing but crime and degradation all day long, every day. And from what they saw, they put together a life of their own that turned out to be, unfortunately, very much like what they saw around them.

By this point in my speech, I was hoping that my young audience was getting my drift — that, while it might be out of their power to change the world, it was very much in their power to change the quality of a day.

That, when we stop to think about it, may be the best way to change the world.

A. Yes, such a TV movie was shown in 1986, starring Charles Bronson, Ellen Burstyn and Wilford Brimley. And, yes, a video is available.

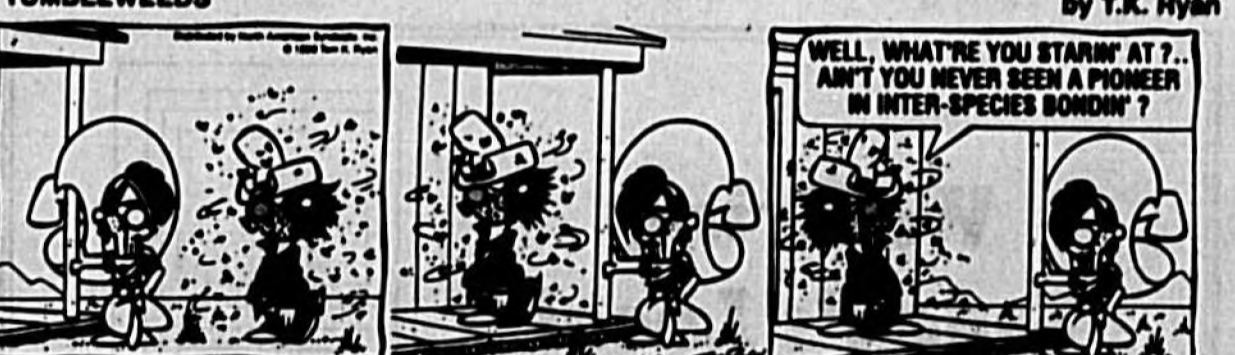

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WIN AT BRIDGE

Never close your eyes

What, according to Dr. Samuel Johnson, is the happiest part of a man's life? For many, it is while sitting at the bridge table. Today's declarer was a happy man — until noticing he had misplayed. The deal was described by David Huggett in the April issue of Bridge Plus.

What would you have done? Against three no-trump, West leads the heart six: three, king (curses!), 10. East returns the suit, your queen and dummy's ace falling with a silent thunder-clap. What now?

Needing to take the next eight tricks, South logically went after five clubs and three diamonds. He led the club two to his ace, then finessed dummy's eight. There was good news — the finesse won — and bad news — East discarded. South played a diamond to his ace, repeated the club finesse, and ran the rest of the suit. But now declarer was stuck in the dummy,

unable to take the diamond finesse. In desperation, he cashed the diamond king, but the queen didn't fall: one down.

Did you spot South's error? At trick three, he must lead the club eight (or nine) to his ace. When the 10 drops, declarer can continue with his seven. When that wins, he is still in hand to take a second club finesse. After running the clubs, declarer crosses to his diamond ace, then takes the successful diamond finesse, squeaking home with an overtrick, not an undertrick, when the diamonds split 3-3. Watch those spots!
