Internationalism

Much is hoped for the approaching conference of nations at San Francisco. But whatever good is accomplished will depend on the spirit of the delegates and their attitude toward each others' countries.

There is no reason why representatives of the United States and Russia should put on airs just because they happen to be the strongest nations in the world. We should be, and will be, treated respectfully. But it is an old American idea that no citizen should humble himself unduly in the presence of any other citizen.

It is probably safe to say that if the powerful countries, especially the United States and Russia, are careful not to swagger, and not to look down on representatives of small nations, and not to assume any international rights or privileges closed to other nations, then the conference will be successful.

Sports For Humans

As the Allies overrun the territory of our enemies, the personal attitude of our troops becomes very important. The military commanders will doubtless have the situation pretty well in hand, but there is no harm in putting in our two cents' worth of advice about fraternizing.

The natural tendency of Americans, who are a sporting race, is not only to let up when the other fellow is licked, but to treat him as if we thought the whole operation, including his part in it, was just nice, clean fun.

The difference comes to a large extent from the fact that the Germans in general have seldom been brought up in athletic games which teach sportsmanship, as is the case in England and America.

Trip To The Moon

The next territory to fly the American flag may be none of the suggested new air or naval bases scattered around the world, but the moon. The advance in the knowledge of rockets which the war brought has made more feasible the long-proposed sending of a rocket to the moon.

Both the United States Rocket Society and the British Interplanetary Society have been working on the problem. Not long ago Willy Ley, a German who has been studying rockets for years, wrote an optimistic book about them.

Things haven't got that far yet, but with the ever increasing knowledge about rockets, it might happen.

Too Late To Classify

I'm confident that if a careful check were made, it would be found that not one Miamian out of ten thousand ever visits the night clubs and gambling dens and if such establishments had to depend on local support they would fold up in a week.

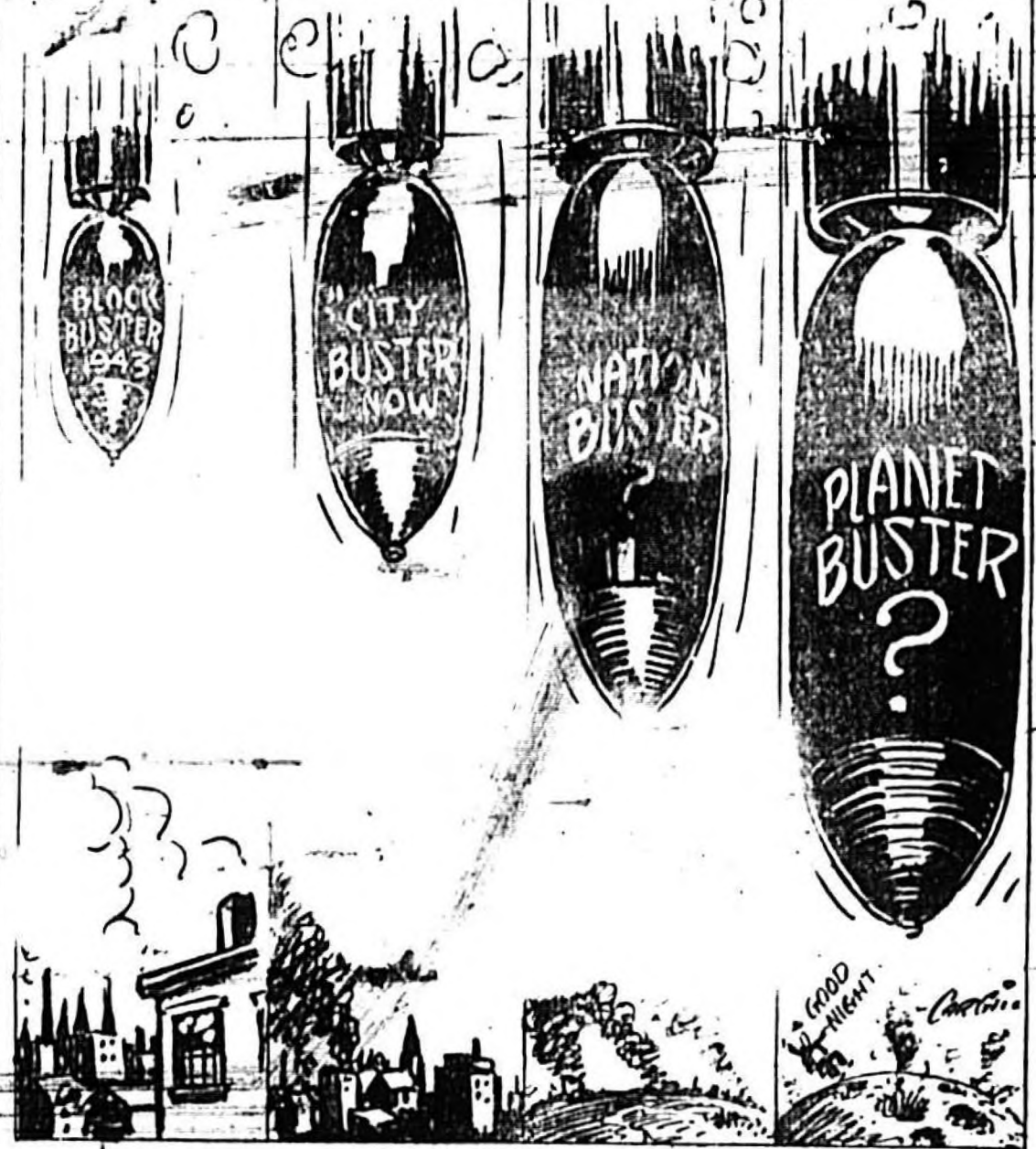

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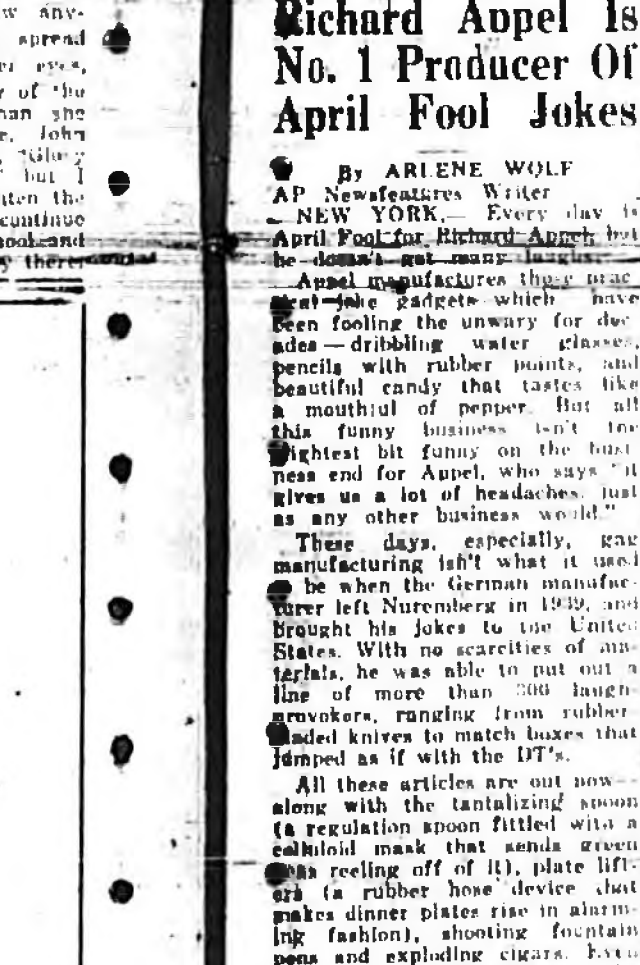

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Russia's Back Door Armed and Ready For War

Development of South Florida Seen As Helpful

LEWISTON, Fla., Mar. 29. (Special)—South Florida is being developed as a "back door" for the nation's war effort, according to a report by the United States Sugar Corp. which is developing the Everglades area.

What military installations are being developed in the Everglades area are not being revealed by the report. But fragments of news and authoritative reports indicate a major military base is being developed in the area.

The machinery building in this case primarily shipbuilding plants in the city of Komsomolsk have increased output by 50 per cent during the last month, as it does at Khabarovsk and other cities.

The North Pacific has been primarily sought for by the Soviet Union, the Lord Leake Administration revealed in 1942. Time nearly one-third of all American shipments to the USSR were being sent to Soviet vessels from the Soviet Far East.

Much of this equipment, primarily war materiel, is being sent to the Soviet Far East military stores. Regular winter freight tonnage has been established between Vladivostok and ports on both coasts of Alaska.

The military importance of this area is obvious. The Kamchatka Peninsula, particularly, has been singled out as of great importance in that its war materials were going there from the U. S.

Although fishing in the main industry of Kamchatka, there are an increasing number of oil wells on the coast north of Petropavlovsk and coal in mines on both coasts.

It was announced only recently that Russia had set up a vast Far Eastern network of airlines, operating from permanent air bases in the Kamchatka Peninsula and Kolyvan, northeastern corner of Russia.

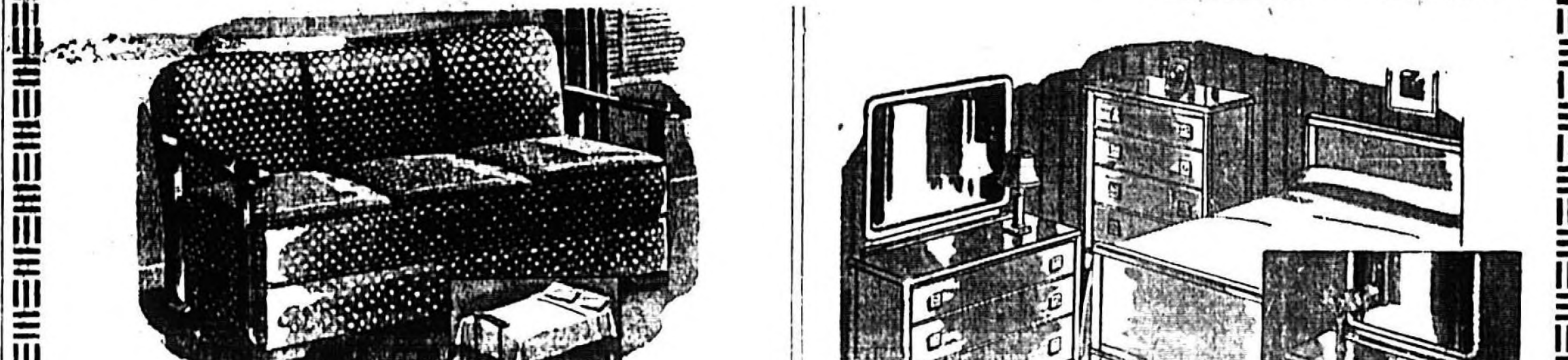
