

Federal Probe Ordered In Train Collision

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP) - A federal agency has ordered an investigation to determine the cause of a collision between an Amtrak Metroliner and a Penn Central commuter train which injured 25 persons.

"It did not seem to be any tremendous blow, but it was a jolt," said Jay Goldenberg of Philadelphia, a passenger aboard the Metroliner. "We knew we were hit immediately. The lights went out. Nobody yelled. There wasn't any panic or anything like that. Most of the people

The northbound Metroliner, carrying 300 passengers, had stalled three miles north of the Wilmington station because of a brake problem about 5 p.m. Friday when the commuter train rammed it from behind, authorities said.

Rail Clerks End Strike

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Nearly 8,000 railway clerks in seven Western states have obeyed a court order by returning to work after a one-day strike against the Southern Pacific Lines over work rules.

The strikers returned to work Friday afternoon vien U.S. District Court Judge Oliver J. Carter granted the railroad's request for a temporary restraining order

The railroad claimed the strike was illegal under the current contract and was costing the company \$1 million a day. It said the walkout jeopardized mail shipments and the transport of military supplies, fresh fruit and

Harrises Want 'Political Trial

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The two fugitive companions of heiress Patty Hearst want a "political trial" and say they hope to disqualify the judge - known for handing out prison sentences rather than probation.

The political angles and legal attack on the judge arose Friday as William and Emily Harris, self-avowed members in the decimated ranks of the Symbionese Liberation Army, pleaded innocent to 11 counts of kidnap, assault and robbery.

Judge Homer Bell of Superior Court set trial for Nov. 24. Observers said it is likely legal maneuvers will delay proceedings, particularly since the defense says it wants a higher court to remove Bell.

U.S. Ties To Spain Vital To People

The execution of five assassins in Spain has triggered a reaction in Western Europe and Latin America which the facts do not seem to warrant. There is more than a hint of political bias in these humanitarian protests.

The five had been convicted of murder in Spanish courts. Killing policemen is also against the law in all the countries which are now recalling ambassadors or otherwise expressing their concern over the executions. Some of those countries have terrorists in their own jails.

There has to be a further explanation when erea Pone Caul VI uses the harshest forme to condemn the action of a government known for its Catholic sympathies. We can sense that critics of Francisco Franco, and they are numerous throughout the world, are seizing the moment to help force the issue of change in the Spanish government's attitude toward political dissent.

The aging Franco himself must accept partial blame for creating the atmosphere in which extremists given to random shooting of police can go to their deaths as heroes in the eyes of so many. Franco put wheels in motion to give up his power, naming Juan Carlos to assume the vacant Spanish throne and promising more political rights to the people. There was reason to hope for a stable

Franco regained his physical strength, and the "apertura" - the opening of the political process which had been anticipated materialized. In fact, the activities of extremists like the Basque separatists and the Patriotic Antifascist Revolutionary Front promoted Franco to clamp down on political dissent.

Many of the European governments now protesting so vehemently are responsible for the artificial isolation which has been imposed on Spain since World War II, when Franco's sympathies with the Axis cause made him a pariah to the allies. They have accepted Spain as a trading partner while excluding the country from the Common Market. They have relied on U.S. bases in Spain for their defense, while putting off the logical entry of Spain into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Now, while trying to show sympathy with the cause of political freedom, they are isolating Spain even

Will these tactics hasten political reform in Spain - or hasten the collapse of the country into the kind of near-anarchy that has followed the end of the dictatorship in Portugal?

President Ford is not joining the pack at Franco's heels, nor should he. What is wrong, as he expressed it recently, is the "cycle of violence" that results when political dissidents resort to terrorism in any country. The United States of America has kept a line open to Spain through all the controversial postwar years. It should be kept open now as the Spanish people enter what appears to be the most critical period in their history since the civil war of the 1930s that brought Franco into

Indian Security Tightened

By Prime Minister Gandhi

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's government has tightened India's internal security act in an attempt to keep courts from freeing political prisoners.

A presidential ordinance amending the Internal Security Act was issued late Friday, saying the government no longer must disclose to anyone, including the judiciary, reasons for arrests made under the act. The ordinance was made retroactive to June 29 to keep persons already in jail from challenging their arrests. The ordinance was issued after various Indian courts decided to hear challenges of such arrests, despite the government contention that arrests on internal security grounds were beyond judicial review.

Zionism Declared Racialism

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - A U.N. full membership committee has declared Zionism a form of racial discrimination, an action which the United States warned "places the work of the United Nations in jeopardy." By a vote of iv-2s with 2r abstentions the social affairs committee Friday night recommended to the General Assembly an Arab and Communist-backed resolution asserting that the assembly "determines that Zionism is a form of racism and racial discrimination." Zionism is the movement for a Jewish national homeland in Palestine a homeland that came into existence with the creation of Israel against Arab opposition. Israel said the resolution was a "clear expression of racism" and condemned it as "against the basic right to nationhood of the Jewish

Giscard Flies To Paris

MOSCOW (AP) - French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing flew home to Paris today after a five-day official visit to the Soviet Union. Giscard was seen off at Moscow's Vnukovo by Communist party leader Leonid Brezhnev, President Nikolai Podgorny and Premier Alexei Kosygin. Giscard and

Brezhnev seemed in good humor. During the visit, the French and Soviet sides laid heavy stress on French-Soviet cooperation in bilateral fields and in international affairs. They emphasized the need for realizing the principles of the Helsinki document ending the conference on European security and cooperation.



Little Black Cloud Can't Stop Hard Luck Seminole Turf Club

The little black cloud that cried would shed buckets over the plight of the Seminole Turf Club. Doomed from the start, financial backers of the night harness racing facility in Casselberry simply refuse to buckle even at the severest setbacks. It has been three seasons now that the track has

been trying to make a breakthrough, under financial foresight of Canadian Paul Bowlen. Somehow, general manager Neil Makin plans to struggle through the last few weeks of this split meet. And hopefully, the breakthrough will come next spring and summer.

Some say the Central Florida area isn't ready for harness racing. Some say it is, and that Bowlen is sitting atop a gold mine, soon as the main vein is

The history of the Turf Club would make a great fictional novel. No one would believe possible Lings which have nappened.

A sinkhole developed right in front of the grandstand, and for a while it was feared the entire track would be lost. In 1974, six key performances were lost because of electrical and mechanical difficulties. Last year, lightning and mechanical troubles knocked out four crucial nights. This year, lightning struck in the same place

twice, forcing postponement of performances. Thursday night was the clincher. A truck driving through the parking lot struck a guy wire to an electrical pole and knocked out power for and hour and one half. The first race started at 9:15.

Is The Place Jinxed?

"People out here say the place is jinxed," says track publicist Herb Holiday. "I don't believe in jinxes, but after all the things that have happened,

One local legend has it that the track was built on a Seminole indian burial ground, and the track won't succeed until the bones of the dead are dug up and buried elsewhere.

Checking Seminole County historical sources, there is no evidence of an Indian burial ground in Casselberry. In fact, Jane Casselberry, whose 6 family owned the Turf Club property at one time, says the burial ground theory is "a lot of baloney." That place has been dug up to build a midget auto racing track and a track for horse racing, and there are no bones."

Mrs. Casselberry does admit to plenty of spirits in the area, but none of the Indian variety. She recalls hearing of roaring 20's mobsters who hung out at a local restaurant, and flashed machine guns, horses often scared by bursts of gunfire. The very location of the track, a full three miles off Highway 17-92, was its first woe. Seems R. J. Reynolds built the track originally back in the 1920's on the premises that 17-92 would would be built farther south. But when the road was constructed at its present location, he was left out in

The track was used as a training facility for harness racing, and also had a fling at quarterhorse and thoroughbred racing.

Snakes Alive; Tornado Too

There have been other difficulties. Last year a flash tornado struck between races, blowing over judges towers on the turns, one with a judge in it. Track photographer Ken O'Brien has fought off advances of a water moccasin and tote men who work in the small building on the infield behind the odds board have carried on running battles against

If it seems the track is trying to return from the dead, and if Holiday has undying confidence in the future of the Turf Club, consider what happened to him Jan. 22, 1974 in New Orleans.

Back From The Dead

He was announcing races at the Fairgrounds track that season and was involved in an automobile accident which nearly threw him hthrough his windshield. Police arrived, and finding no heartbeat, didn't even bother to call an ambulance. A good rule of thumb used by many mortgage lenders is that a buyer can generally not afford more than 25 per cent of his gross monthly income for housing expenses. This would include principal, interest, taxes, insurance and possibly also general maintenance expenses. Thus a person earning \$600 a month couldn't afford much more than \$150 per month for gross housing There is another rule, also commonly applied, that a buyer

should not purchase a home in excess of 21/2 times his gross annual income; thus a person earning \$12,000 per year should purchase a nome for \$30,000 or less.

F.H.A. and V.A. qualifications follow a more liberal approach than these general guidelines and such things as job stability, indebtedness, financial reserve and many other areas play a role in determining the merits of any specific case. Usually in the lower price ranges, the ratio of monthly housing expenses to income will be much greater than those who have higher incomes and a more affluent way of life.
