3-state coke ring smashed

CASSLEBERRY - The arrest here of a Casaleberry man accused as a cocaine supplier in Florida and two other states, breaks a reputed drug ring that had "significant impact, not only on our community but in West Virginia and Ohlo," City County Investigative Bureau Commander Donald Eslinger said Tuesday night.

James Limotta, 42, was arrested along with his roommate Windy Sartin, 29, when CCIB agents searched their house at 813 Woodstream, Casselberry, Monday

The search and arrests came after a seven month CCIB joint investigation, which included the U.S. Drug Enforcement Adminstration and Orange County Sheriff's Department, CCIB agent John E. Negri lead the extensive investigation, Eslinger said.

Arrested in connection with the same case Monday night in Orange County were lawyer Scott L. Richardson, 30, whose Orlando apartment was also searched. Arrested locally too, was Martin Alan Melton, 37, of Orlando.

Two other accused ring members, David Lechiara of Morgantown, W. Va., and Donald Stratton, of Columbus, Ohio, were arrested in their home states, Eslinger said.

All are charged with conspiracy to possess and distribute cocaine. The local suspects were arraigned in federal court in Orlando Tuesday and have been freed on \$25,000 bond. They had been booked into the Seminole and Orange county

Eslinger said Limotta was allegedly a primary link in the distribution system, with cocaine being delivered to him from South ☐ See Coke, Page 5A

School board OKs

two-mill tax hike

SANFORD - Despite a proposed two-mill increase in property taxes, 27 percent higher than last year, to help support the building of Seminole County schools and the programs in the buildings, the majority of speakers at last night's public hearing spoke in favor of the district's \$295.7 million budget.

The two mill increase is only a one-year solution to the construction woes facing for district. The board plans to seek alternative solutions to paying for the growth of the

The school district will have 2,500 new students when schools open in three weeks. Many of the schools are overcrowded, like Stenstrom Elementary School, 1800. Alafaya Woods Blyd., Oyiedo, which will have 1,400 students in a facility designed to accomodate less than

The state has only given the district a 5.6 percent increase over last year's budget.

"This is a status quo budget," Supt. Robert Hughes. We have, in effect, \$3,000 to spend on 50,000

Following the public hearing, the board unanimously approved the tentative budget for advertising. They also approved, with a similar 5 to 0 vote, to allow the school operations to begin for the new year despite the fact that the budget will not formally be adopted until Sept. 12.



Two Florida utilities to buy generator

MIAMI — Florida Power & Light Co. and Jacksonville Electric Authority announced plans Tuesday to buy an 846-megawatt, coal-fired power generator from Georgia Power Co. for about

Under the agreement. FPL, the state's largest electric utility, will own 76 percent of Unit 4 of Georgia Power's Robert W. Scherer plant near Forsyth, Ga. Jacksonville Electric will own

Scherer plant near Forsyth, Us. Jacksonvine Securic was own the remaining 24 percent.

FPL said the two utilities will acquire the generating unit in stages beginning in 1991. The purchase will be completed in 1995. In the meantime, FPL said it will buy 300 megawatts from Georgia Power beginning in November.

FPL said it also has signed a contract to acquire 150 megawatts from Jacksonville Electric beginning in 1991.

Jacksonville Electric currently buys that power from the Southern Co. of Atlanta. Georgia Power's parent company.

Man pleads quilty in DEA bombing

PORT MYERS — A drug trafficker pleaded guilty for his part in the St. Patrick's Day firebombing of a Drug Enforcement Administration office that caused severe damage, federal

prosecutors said Tuesday.

A pipe bomb tossed through the window of the DEA field office in Fort Myers destroyed the 6,000-square-foot structure, causing \$4 million in damage. No one was injured in the biast or ensuing fire.

Jeffrey Matthews, 23, also pleaded guilty Monday to charges of running a drug trafficking ring, cocaine possession and homicide in furtherance of his drug trafficking activities.

His pleas were scaled until Tuesday "for law enforcement purposes," said U.S. Attorney Robert Genzman.

Soda bottles confiscated

MIAMI - More than 2,000 bottles of a Colombian soda were confiscated in Dade County Tuesday, as health officials scurried to find all of the product shipped with the cocaine-laced drink that left a Miami man in a coma.

Of the more than 20 bottles of Pony Malta de Bavaria tested by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration so far, three have been tainted with cocaine and all of those came from the home of the victim, said Estela Brown, an FDA spokeswoman.

Maximo Rene Menendez, 25, has been in a coma since drinking the beverage Thursday. Menendez's neurological condition improved Tuesday, but he remained in critical condition, said Dr. Armando Bienes, a neurologist at AMI-Kendall Regional Medical Center.

Dade County health officials hit the streets Tuesday searching for bottles of the malt beverage among mobile food vendors. The drink is similar to heavy non-alcoholic beer and is popular among Hispanics.

Topless doughnut shop closes

FORT LAUDERDALE - A topless doughnut shop denounced as a symbol of raunch and degradation has closed its doors three months after the death of its founder.

Gary Emery, son of the late founder Andy Emery, said Tuesday the family could no longer run R-Donuts from their home in New Jersey. They hope to sell it to one of several potential buyers.

The elder Emery, who was 75, died of a heart attack April 9 after joining his waitresses to deliver doughnuts and coffee in the pouring rain to sailors on yachta in the Whitbread Round the World Race.

"Obviously, he's not here to enjoy it anymore," Gary Emery

Singleton guilty in camera theft

TAMPA - A man convicted of raping a 15-year-old hitchhiker and hacking off her arms in the California desert pleaded no contest Tuesday to a charge of stealing a \$10 camera and was sentenced to 60 days in jail.

Lawrence Singleton, 62, of Tampa was scheduled to go to trial Tuesday on the petty theft charge, a second-degree misdemeanor. But he changed his innocent plea to no contest, saying he did not believe he could get a fair trial.

Hillsborough County Judge Debra Behnke imposed the maximum sentenc allowable under Florida law, citing Singleton's criminal record.

Bertha riptides ravage beaches

NEW SMYRNA BEACH — Riptides blamed on Hurricane Bertha killed one man Tuesday, sent at least three other neardrowning victims to the hospital and sent lifeguards plunging into the surf to rescue 75 others, officials reported.

"It's been extremely heetic. We've had more rescues today than we've had in years." said Joe Wooden, captain of lifeguards in Daytona Beach.

Chief lifeguard Tom Renick said waves kicked up by Hurricane Bertha over the weekend tore holes in offshore sand bars. As water rushed out through those holes on Tuesday, it created riptides, that dragged

littles Lawrence of the National Hurrican Center in Coral Gables said Bertha produced heavy swells along the upper Florida coast after forming as a tropical depression on

By Tuesday, the hurricane had moved to within 450 miles of Halifax, Nova Scotia. and was threatening Canada's maritime provinces with its 75 mph winds.

Nelson LeJune, 59, of Branch, La., drowned about 10:15 a.m. Tuesday on an unguarded stretch of beach near New Smyrna Beach, the Volusia County beach rangers reported.

The man's stepson was in trouble. He went out to assist him, and he subsequently

drowned, and the stepson was also a near drowning and taken to the hospital." said Renick.

The stepson, Robert Perry, 18, was in guarded condition at Fish Memorial Hospital

Candidates confused over partisan school elections dates, opponents

SANFORD - Barbara Kuhn, like many of her fellow candidates in this year's school board races, wants some answers to basic

questions like who her oppenents will be and when the elections will be.
"It's like the old Abbott and Costello routine," she said. "I want to know who's on first and what's on second."

A Republian candidate in District 4, she said she is currently facing only one opponent, Noreen Hatton, a Democrat.

The confusion which has plagued the school board races from the start stems from a law suit brought against the board by District 1 candidate Bill Kroll, former candidate Wes Pennington and the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee. The law suit sought to have the non-partisan school board declared unconstitutional.

Circuit Judge Kenneth Leffler ruled in June that the school board elections for the three seats up for election this year, in Districts 1, 4 and 5, would be partisan, but he stopped short of declaring the non-partisan board unconstitutional, thus putting all seats up for election on the partisan

ticket this year. Under Leffler's ruling, the seats in District 2 and 3, as well as the superintendent's

seat, would be contested as partison in 1992, at the time their present terms expire. Last week, the state Supreme Court ruled that in the case of Palm Beach County, the

district could remain non-partisan because their special act which authorized nonpartisan elections came before the county's charter was put in place.

Seminole County's special act was also put in place prior to the adoption of a county charter. The school board will file a motion tomorrow morning to have Leffler reverse his earlier decision and make Seminole County's school board, once again, nonpartisan.

If. as expected, Leffler reverses the decision, a special one-day qualifying period will have to be established so candidates can qualify for a non-partisan election. Others, who did not meet the qualifying deadline last month, might be able to do so on that day.

So where does that leave me?" Kuhn asked. "I could suddenly have other opponents that I haven't planned for. I don't know if I need to take White Out to my signs

and literature to remove all mention of the Republican party. And I don't know if I'm still not running until November or if I have to run in September or October."

M.L. "Sonny" Raborn, a Republican candidate in District 5, agreed.
"None of us know where we stand," he said. "The district has to wait for a ruling. If they get it, the supervisor of elections has to wait for direction from the state. And we don't know when we're running."

According to Raborn and Kuhn, because the special qualifying date will come some time in August, if the elections return to non-partisan, candidates will not participate in a primary until Oct. 2. Candidates in other races will run in a Sept. 4 primary

"So our first primary will be everyone else's second primary and if we need a run-off it will be during the Nov. 6 general election." Kuhn said.

Some of the candidates met informally at last night's public hearing on the school district budget and agreed on one thing.

"We don't know what we're supposed to do," Kuhn said, "We picked a heck of a year to get into politics."

Pugh: Party switch made long before qualifying



Brennan's legacy

More than any other justice, William J. Brennan Jr. was the creative force of the Warren Court, a man who believed, with Oliver Wendell Holmes, that experience, not theory, was the Me of the law. As such, he regarded the Constitution as a living instru-ment that could grow with the needs and conditions of each generation, not as some-thing frozen in the 18th century. His intelligence was such that long after the Warren Court had become the Burger Court and even the Reagan Court, he remained a powerful voice for individual liberty and

equality of opportunity.

Parting with his Harvard mentor, Felix Frankfurter, Brennan laid the groundwork for the court's one-man, one-vote decision, which required the states to apportion legislatures

according to population, not acres.
In the case of the New York Times vs.
Sullivan, he made it clear that the First Amendment's guarantees of freedom of the press meant little if public officials could recover huge libel awards for every minor journalistic error.

In a sense of affirmative action decisions, he came to gripe with the fact that constitutional guarantees of equal protection were hollow promises if the law was helpless in righting the collective effects of historic employment discrimination against minorities.

And, in what were the most controversial social issues of his time, Brennan, though a social issues of his time, Brennan, though a Catholic, was an articulate defender of a woman's privacy right to an abortion, a strong supporter of the court's ban on official prayer in the public schools and a believer that eventually the country would join him in the conviction that the death penalty was both cruel and ineffective in deterring crime.

Given Brennan's enormous stature, it

Given brenner's enormous stature, it would be hard to replace him under any circumstances. Given the political strains — a court as divided as this court has been and the emotional issues that it confronts - the task becomes even more difficult. But both political pragmatism and judicial common arguments from anti-abortion extremists and those on the far right that only one of their own will do.

The president must know that the effects of last year's Webster decision have been as divisive and damaging to his own party as they have been damaging to abortion rights. In view of that, he not only promised to impose no litmus test on abortion but quickly chose a nominee, federal appeals court Judge David Souter, about whose abortion views he says he knows nothing. In so doing, he obviously hopes to avoid turning the confirmation process into the "bloodbath" that Senate Minority Leader Robert Dole said would follow any attempt to appoint anyone with clearly stated views on the issue.
It's too soon to evaluate Souter's qualifica-

tions. But there's no doubt that what the court now needs is not an idealogue — not a Robert Bork or an Antonin Scalis — but a moderating, centering influence who both respects precedent and understands that the Constitution cannot be shriveled back into what it was before Roe vs. Wade, before the prayer decisions and before the great civil and rights decisions of the '50s and '60s.

"The genius of the Constitution," Brennan said in a speech in 1965, "rests not in any static meaning it might have had in a world that is dead and gone, but in the adaptability of its great principles to cope with current problems and the current needs,"

Brennan served that ideal for nearly 34 years, longer than all but five judges. In the court of that tenure, he helped to shape the Constitution to serve real people and real conditions, not old abstractions. That in itself ought to be a standard for those who would succeed him.

Souter: formula for success

BOSTON - From the moment William J. Brennan Jr. resigned his seat on the Supreme Court, the choice of a new Justice sounded more like the topic for a chemistry exam than a political pop quiz.

"I hope President Bush does not go for a single-lasue litmus test" said Sen. Arlen Specter. Abortion "shouldn't be the single litmus test in picking a Supreme Court Justice" concurrred Sen. Robert Dole.

And when the President introduced his candidate, David H. Souter, to the press, Bush said he hadn't quizzed the Granite State lawyer on abortion because — surprise — "It is not appropriate — to use any litmus test."

So if goes. Whatever else happens, it appears that the Senate will not be able to dunk David Souter in water until his true colors show. The frugal, funny, brainy bachelor from the state whose motto is "Live Free or Die" can't be easily ready on any of the major social issues of the day.

The White House got what it was looking for: someone who is fuzzy. Not fuzzy as in "warm and fuzzy." Fuzzy as in, well, "out of focus." Souter haan't left a clear traceable, trail of footprints to let us know where he stands.

Indeed the first computer search of law journals turned up only one Souter byline, a eulogy to a former New Hampshire judge. An earlier questionnaire asking Souter to list his speeches contained this answer: No Speeches.

As any licensed purveyor of common political wisdom can tell you, this is now considered to be the best formula for success. Especially on as hot an issue as abortion. If. after all, Bush picked a candidate known to oppose Roe v. Wade, he as asking for what Dole described as a "blood bath" in the Democratic Senate. If on the other hand, he chose some known to waffle on the constitutional right to privacy that underscores Roe, the conservatives would have boited.

It was all in the chemistry. Or the lack of it. David Souter's only brush with the abortion issue doesn't say much about his stand on Roe: He concurred in a ruling that said a doctor had the responsibility to inform a pregnant woman of the possibility of birth defects and the availability of abortion.

At the moment, the biggest rap against Souter among civil-rights advocates is that John Sununu is for him. As one White House staffer put it happily, "I think the President has finessed the abortion issue."

That, as the editorial writers always say. remains to be seen. But we do have more proof that the road to success is paved with DON'Ts. DON'T write any provocative law articles. DON'T express any grand theories. DON'T give speeches on the great public issues of your

In short, I give you Justice Fuzzy. The making of a Justice becomes more and more like aiming for the highest elective office: It's

better to be bland.

"There's definitely an incentive to play it safe." agrees Kathleen Sullivan, a Harvard Law professor who testified in the confirmation hearings of Robert Bork. "This is very much a feature of our public discourse. In public life 'the vision thing' is to be avoided."

The classic il lustration of the problem was Robert Bork himself. He did more than leave a paper trail for the Senate Judiciary Committee. As an academic and theorist, he cut a paper swath across the law.

The Bork hearings lest behind the message that someone who's ambitious is better off hiding any views he's unfortunate enough to have inside generalities. Bork himself has chimed in with advice to Souter: Don't discuss your

The problem with Bork, he keeps forgetting. wasn't that he said too much, but that what he said was too much for most Americans. His record provoked a constitutional debate and he lost. That's the stuff of democracy.

But in much of our political life, the point increasingly is to avoid controversy instead of engaging in it and resolving it. Our politicians are more than risk-aversive. They have become decision-aversive. So, in turn, has the public. Fewer and fewer of us vote.

Judges however, do decide. While we can't ever know how anyone will rule over the next decade of issues, the public gets only one look at the candidate before the lifetime appointment. We have a right to more than a glimpse of ankle.

David Souter has not felt compelled to be publicly, or it appears, privately, engaged in the great debates of our era. That itself says something about a man. But in some perverse way, this is now a political plus, a qualification for the Supreme Court. How curious, that success today carries the sound of silence.

Federal workers above the law?

WASHINGTON — Rep. William Ford, D-Mich., is the champion of the federal worker. He should be. In his last re-election campaign, he took \$55,215 in contributions from unions and associations of government employees. So far this election year, they have given him more than \$30,000. Ford has kept federal workers happy by hammering on a simple, reasonable message — federal salaries should be comparable to those in the private sector.

But when it comes to forcing federal employees to pay their debts. Ford nings a different tune. For the last two sessions of Congress Ford has bottled up bills in his committee that' would allow courts to garnish the wages of government workers.

That means if you aue your neighbor and he or she just happens to work for, say, the Central Intelligence Agency, you can win, but you will have a heck of a time collecting your money.

The court can't order the federal govern ment, as it can a private employer, to take the money out of your neighbor's paycheck.

Ford thinks the status quo is just fine. He says it would cost too much money to allow garnishment of federal wages.

It might cost Ford some money to support garnishment. The employee unions might not be so generous with him at election time. Ford wouldn't talk to us about the connection between campaign money and the bill, but his press secretary said that money was "not a reason" for Ford's opposition to garnishment. "He doesn't have any kind of guilt over political contributions," the spokesman said. Apparently not. The policy against garnishment of federal wages dates back to 1846 when the Supreme Court ruled that the federal government couldn't be sued without its consent. The archaic precedent was set so that agents of the federal government could also not be forced to fork over their due in a lawsuit.

Only in domestic cases - alimony and child support - can federal employees be regarded as individuals acting on their own. The courts can and do garnish their wages for family obligations. But even at that, the federal record is not impressive. Last year, the Health and Human Services Department revealed that 65,000 federal employees were behind on their child support payments by about \$250 million. The blanket protection has been waived for a few government agencies, including the Postal Service and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. Their workers' salaries can be garnished for any reason. But the vast majority of federal employees, including the military, are protected. A judge can't garnish the paycheck of a member of Congress either. Rep. Andy Jacobs, D-Ind., introduced the bill to change that in the last session of Congress. But it died in Ford's committee. This year Jacobs introduced it again, and it probably will die in committee too.

But Jacobs refuses to let the issue go unnoticed. "It is an indisputable outrage that Uncle Sam should shield deadbeats." he told our associate Paul Zimmerman. "It's an insult to all federal employees to imply that they need such protection. I myself am embarrassed by it. Another Capitol Hill source told us, "Ford is saying the government cannot afford to practice the good citizenship that it demands of other private employees."



LAKE MARY - Though it has been enforced during three previous summers, a contract signed between Lake Mary High School and the students who participate in extracurricular activities there have come under

scrutiny recently. According to Don Reynolds. Lake Mary principal, about two weeks ago, a group of students rented a limousine and were driven around while they consumed alcohol. This, Reynolds believes, was a violation of their

contract. At Lake Mary High School, a contract voluntarily signed by most students who participate in extracurricular activities states "I thought we had a good that they will submit to periodic contract." Reynolds said. "No eight weeks of family counseling if they are caught using drugs or

Ryan notches 300th win

MILWAUKEE - Twenty-two years and 11 days after earning his first big league victory. Nolan Ryan - at age 43 - notched No. 300.

The right-handed Texan, throwing 146 pitches over 7 2-3 innings, some of them clocked as high as 95 mph, became only the 20th pitcher in major league history to reach that plateau, guiding the Texas Rangers to an 11-3 victory Tuesday over the Milwaukee Brewers.

"Honestly, I'm relieved it's over with," said Ryan, who was admittedly disappointed after failing to win No. 300 in his first attempt, July 25 at Arlington Stadium.

Ryan was pulled with two out in the eighth after Milwaukee closed within 5-3 on two errors by second baseman Julio Franco. Ryan was charged with one earned run on six hits. He struck out eight to increase his all-time record total to 5,219.

Ryan improved his career record to 300-267. and won his sixth straight decision to improve to 11-4 this season. Chris Bosio, the opposing starter, was just 5-years-old when Ryan notched his first career victory in 1968 with the New York Mets.







New ways to prepare a beautiful vegetable

There is one vegetable in our garden that is undaunted by weather conditions or anything else for that matter, it just keeps producing: that is the eggplant. I'm continually searching for new and different ways to prepare this beautiful vegetable. Most commonly it is peeled. Most commonly it is peeled, aliced, dipped in an egg wash, then crumbs or meal and pan fried or deep fried. The Greeks and Italians have other interesting ways of preparing this bland vegetable, using herbs and spices. The preparation of eggpiant lends itself very well to the microwave. The outer peel provides its own wrast or covered provides its own wrap or covered container for some recipes. In other recipes the peel is removed and the egsplant is chopped or sliced and incorporated with other food stuffs. Both methods will be used in these microwave

Lamb or beef can be used for this spicy Mediterranean dish.

1 med. eggplant (1¼ lbs.) 1/2 C. chopped onion 1 clove garlic, minced 1 lb. ground lamb

1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce W tap, instant chicken bouillon

4 C. dry bread crumbs 14 C. water

1/2 - 3 tsp. curry powder 1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. pepper 2 Tosp. dry bread crumbs 14 tsp. paprika

Wash egaplant and pierce skin several times with fork. M/W on 100% power 3-4 minutes or until hot, turning eggplant over once.

Set aside. Combine onion, garlic and crumbled lamb/beef in 11/2 quart casserole. M/W on 100% power, uncovered, 5-6 minutes or until no longer pink, stirring once. Stir to break up meat into small pieces; drain. Slice eg-gplant in half lengthwise. Scoop out pulp with spoon leaving a 4-inch thick shell. Chop pulp and combine with meat mixture.

Cover with casserole lid. M/W on 100% power 3-4 minutes or until eggplant is tender, stirring once. Mix in tomato sauce, chicken bouillon. 4 C. bread crumbs. water, curry, salt and pepper.

Cover. Microwave on 100% power. 5-6 minutes or until heated. Divide mixture evenlybetween the two shells. Arrange on microwave serving plate. Combine bread crumbs and paprika, sprinkle over meat mixture. M/W on 100% power. uncovered. 7-9 minutes or until heated and shells are softened.

Combine with garlic, onion and margarine in 1-qt. casserole. Cover. M/W on 100% power, 5-6 minutes or until eggplant is tender, stirring once. Stir in cracker crumbs, olives, parsley, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Turn eggplant halves cut-side-up in dish. Spoon vegetable mixture into each half. mounding as necessary. Top with chopped tomato and cheese. M/W on 100%, uncovered, 31/2 - 4 minutes or until heated through.

DEAR READER: Probably the same thing they said 50 years ago: Nail-biting is a nervous habit that leads to ugly nails and, in some people, repeated infections of the fingers. I advise nail-biters to try and overcome the habit by keeping their fingers out of their mouths, using protection (cotton gloves) when possible or applying bitter substances (many of which are available in drugstores) to their

fingernails to discourage biting.
Although you don't specify
what "problems" you experience from cutting your nails. I suspect the major difficulty is infection. When the nails are trimmed too short, bacteria can enter the flesh at the nail corners, leading to painful infec-tion. You can easily avoid this uncomfortable situation by be-ing careful not to cut away too much nail. Nail-trimming should not hurt: if it does, you're removing too much.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a




