Inside Dr. Death's frightening world

A new villain emerged in our society in the 1990s. His name is Jack Kevorkian. He is known to many as Dr. Death.

Last week, 60 Minutes showed a tape of Dr. Kevorkian killing a man. Dr. Death has been performing these physician-assisted suicides whenever the opportunity presented itself in the last eight years. Until now, no one has been capable of stopping Kevorkian's killing spree.

The meaning of the word *euthanasia* is painless, happy death. This, Kevorkian, insists is what motivates him. It is the just, humane way of dealing with persons dying of incurable, painful diseases. Experts say he is paving the way for much worse.

"What's so sad is that Dr. Kevorkian has a distorted idea of what's good and bad," says Father Al Fornace, a prominent physician for 50 years who recently was ordained a priest and serves at All Souls Catholic Church in Sanford.

Father Fornace said there was no mention of *euthanasia* when he was studying medicine in 1944. "It's a term that cropped up in recent years," Fornace said. "I can not deny that patients and their families have asked physicians to end lives for many years."

Until Kevorkian came along, tooting his own trumpet of mercy killing, the subject was kept quiet. "A good doctor's intent should be to relieve the pain," Fornace said. The medical establishment and clergy have an uneasy relationship with Kevorkian. Some label Kevorkian "a reckless instrument of death."

Yet a number of jurists have disagreed with the American Medical Association's assessments and a prosecutor in Michigan lost his job because of his failed attempts to put Kevorkian behind bars. The efforts were a waste of taxpayer's dollars.

The effects of physician-assisted suicide, once legalized, would have a profound and pervasive effect on the medical and nursing professions.

Father Fornace has dealt with the realities of *euthanasia* as a physician, husband and now priest. His wife, Roberta, was in immense pain as she was dying of stomach cancer. He gave her only a third of the pain medication the law allowed. This not only gave her sufficient comfort but a chance to say good-bye to her children.

"She would have died without those wonderful good-byes," Fornace said.

Father murders Kayla, formerly of Casselberry

CLERMONT - The prodigious search for little Kayla McKean ended Monday after her father, 24-year-old Richard Lee Adams, confessed to her murder. He told authorities that he dumped her body in a remote area of northeast Lake County.

The 6-year-old girl was found

Monday afternoon in what family and friends said was her favorite place - near a creek southeast of Alexander Springs Recreation Area in the Ocala National Forest.

In a 911 tape released by the police, the father sounded calm. "This is Richard Adams," he said. "My daughter (Kayla) hasn't come back yet. She should have come back home two hours ago."

Hundreds of volunteers joined several law enforcement agencies in a massive search for the girl. Seminole County sent its aviation and K-9 units to the area where the girl lived. Lake County authorities also were alerted that Adams had a nasty arrest record in Seminole County.

Records show that Adams had arrests for burglary, aggra-

vated battery and violation of probation on his Seminole County record. He threw a bike at an 18-year-old man in the

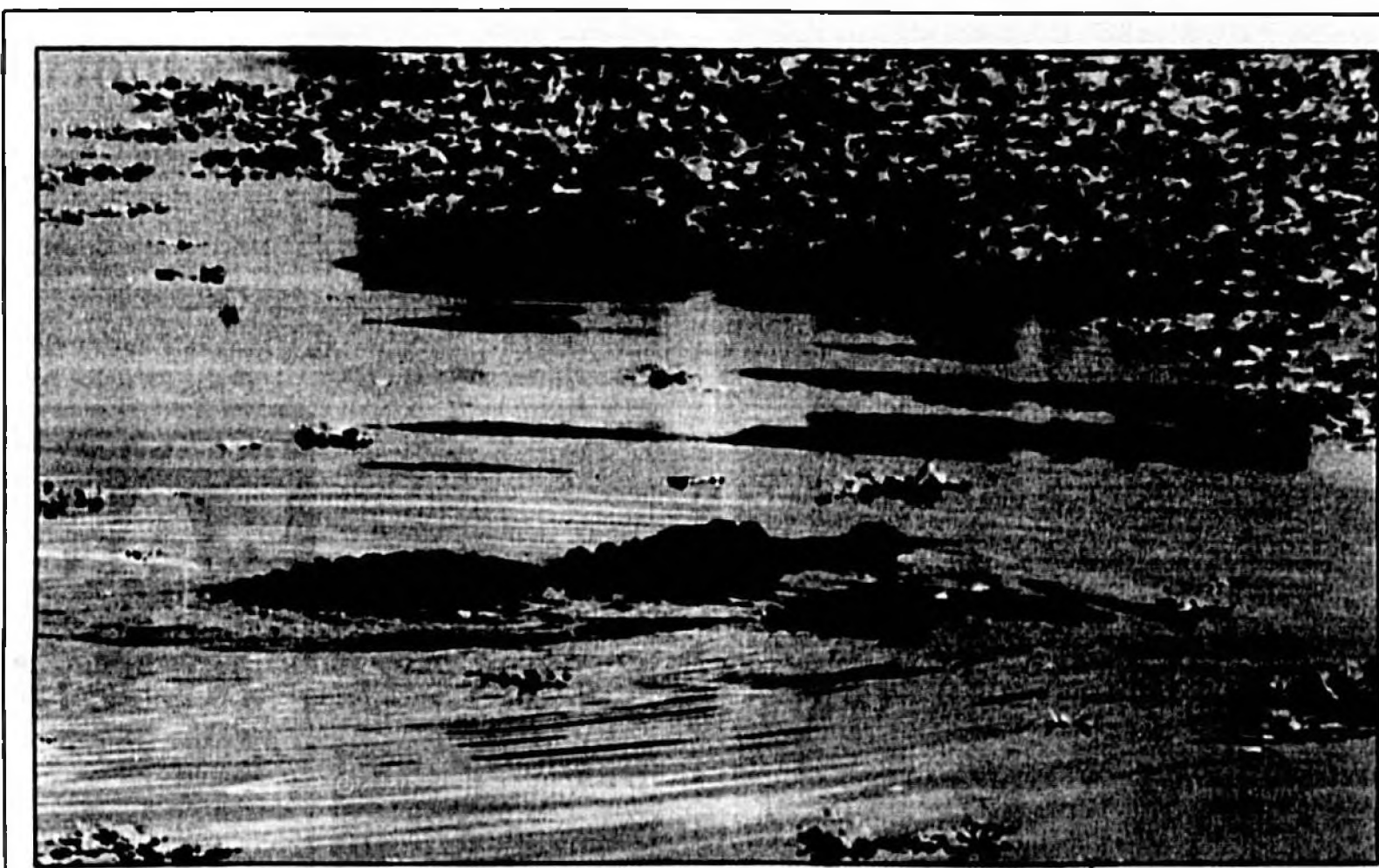
Casselberry area and tried to run him over with a car.

"In a delicate situation as this was, you don't need to infer that a family member was involved in the girl's disappearance," said Seminole

Popular flight leaves Sanford

SANFORD - Officials at Orlando Sanford Airport aren't singing the Biloxi blues about the loss of a once popular flight from Sanford to Gullport/Biloxi, Miss.

Three times a week, Casino Air Link catered to the whims of individuals eager to try their luck in the gambling halls of Biloxi. As many as 300 made the round-trip each week, according to airport officials.

The Gullport/Biloxi service won't be available from the Orlando Sanford Air Port after mid January. But in its place will be three time weekly flights to and from Memphis, Tenn. that will allow passengers to enjoy both Memphis and the nearby gambling facilities in Tunica, Miss.

"We look at this as a big plus," said Ray Wise, marketing director at Orlando Sanford Airport. "Adding Memphis to our schedule is going to open up both our inbound and outbound traffic."

Family members charged with abuse

WINTER PARK - Three family members are charged with abuse and neglect of an 87-year-old man in Winter Park, who was found by Seminole County Sheriff's deputies locked in a bedroom suffering from severe dehydration and malnutrition.

Ledlie Berry, 36, and Jerry Camp, 32, turned themselves in Monday afternoon at the John E. Polk Correctional facility. Kenneth Camp, 47, was arrested Sunday. Deputies and investigators responded to 2644 Lake Howell Lane in Winter Park to find the elderly man, weighing approximately 115 pounds and surrounded by fecal matter. His bedroom

only had access to a bathroom.

The elderly victim resided at the home along with his daughter, Berry, and her boyfriend Jerry Camp, deputies said. Berry's brother, Peter Berry, called police on Thursday after checking on his father's well being, deputies said.

Kenneth Camp was asked to care for the victim while Berry and Jerry Camp went to the Keys for a week, Seminole County Sheriff's spokesperson Deanna Brown said.

"(Kenneth) Camp says he checked on the victim twice a day and fed him," Seminole County Sheriff's spokesperson Deanna Brown said. "But, (he) claims to have

Boy drowns saving dog

SANFORD - Johnny Jackson, a popular Crooms Academy 8th grade student in Sanford, died a hero on Saturday afternoon giving his life while trying to save a friend's pet dog. Today his friends, family, and the city are dealing with grief while struggling to learn from the tragedy.

Johnny, 15, drowned at approximately 3 p.m. at James L. Dunn Park trying to rescue a friend's dog in the center of Lake Gem, a small lake within the park.

Many students at Crooms Academy were upset Monday morning when the announcement about Johnny's death was made at the school, math teacher Brendan Bess said. Counselors were available to students wishing to share their feelings concerning the tragedy. Classmates wrote poetry and made cards for the family. Bess

said Bess said Johnny was an outstanding young man, always respectful, and a hard worker.

"He was always willing to help anyone and never said anything bad about anyone," Bess said. "He was very friendly and well-liked."

Bess first met Johnny three years ago when he taught the teen in summer school. Since that time, Bess said Johnny would always make sure to say hello.

Bess said he and other 8th grade teachers will attend memorial services for Johnny. Hardy-Blake said the school's JROTC will also take part in the memorial services on Saturday.

Johnny's body had been under water at Lake Gem for approximately 30 minutes before rescuer's located him, according to the police report. Johnny was transported to Columbia Medical Center in Sanford.

There is no substitute for a real Christmas tree

Finding the right Christmas tree for your house is something you can enjoy every year. There is nothing like the smell of a pine tree inside your house. Even if you have one of those artificial trees that you can use every year, there is no substitute for a living Christmas tree.

What tree should I buy? There are many types of trees that are available for your particular taste and budget. In general, the Christmas tree should be cone-shaped, have an attractive green color, and a dense growth, with little empty spaces. The most popular trees are Scotch and white pines, Douglas and Balsam Fir. Whatever you prefer, just make sure that you buy a tree that is fresh, the more recent the tree has been cut, the better. The longer they stay on display, the more likely the tree will not make it until Christmas. Florida's warm weather will dry up a pine tree very quickly and the needles will start dropping very soon after you buy your tree. It may be so severe that you may have to buy a second tree before

Christmas.

Living trees need water: In order to avoid that your Christmas tree dries up too soon, keep the tree in water. Buy a stand that holds enough water to keep your tree watered for a long time. But, the most important thing that you need to do when you bring your tree home, is to cut the stem at least one half inch or more above the original cut, to expose the water-conducting tissues of the stem to enable the tree to take up water. If the tree runs out of water, a seal will form on the cut surface of the tree trunk and the tree will not be able to take up water anymore, even if you add water later on. It will be

very difficult to make another cut to the trunk once it is decorated and in place. The trees can take up a lot of water per day, make sure there is ample supply of water in the stand's container.

Christmas tree farms: A fun way to buy your Christmas tree is to go to a Christmas tree farm, where you can select and cut your own tree. Most farms will provide you with saws for cutting down your tree, but make sure before you go. Be prepared to do some exercise, wear work clothing, and you may need your old shoes to move around the place.

Buying and caring of your living Christmas Tree:

*Select a tree that keeps the needles longer, such as Douglas Fir or Scotch pine.

*Buy the freshest tree you can find and avoid any trees with brown needles.

*Bounce the butt of the tree on the ground, if many needles fall, do not buy that tree.

*The bottom of the tree stump should have a moist and sticky sap, not hard or dry.

*Cut the bottom of the tree

stump an inch or two diagonally, for better water uptake.

*Place the tree in water and keep the water level by checking it every day.

*It may be useful to add a floral preservative to the water to keep the tree fresh longer.

*The tree should be placed far away from heating units, vents or fans that will dry out the tree.

*Make sure that all the wiring of your Christmas tree lights are in good working condition.

*Do not overload lighting circuits.

*Never use open flames near the tree.

*There are flame retardant sprays for Christmas trees, you may want to use one this year.

*Never, but never, leave your home or go to sleep with the tree lights on.

County Chief Deputy Steve Harriet this morning. "You hope for the best while checking out everything."

On Monday, Adams told police that he had killed his daughter on the night before Thanksgiving by hitting her repeatedly and throwing her up against a wall at their Clermont apartment. The girl had been in her first-grade classes at Minneola Elementary School on Tuesday but was absent on Wednesday.

Adams was charged with murder and jailed without bond. Kayla's stepmother, Marcie Adams, was charged with improper disposal of a body, a misdemeanor. She led the police to Kayla's shallow grave, authorities said.

The girl had lived with her mother, Elizabeth McKean in Casselberry, until she moved in with her father and stepmother last April. Adams lived at the Grandview Apartments,

about 20 miles west of Orlando.

McKean, who clutched a teddy bear given to her by a friend, did not talk to reporters after the grizzly discovery was made Monday. She had repeated before that she was confident the girl was going to be OK. "Everyone is doing their best to find her," she said. She said that Adams "was a good father."

McKean did not explain why Kayla began to live with her father last April. Adams and McKean were high school sweethearts who never married. They had an informal arrangement for Kayla. McKean said she had not seen her daughter since two days before Halloween.

Searchers plan to gather today to hold a candlelight vigil for Kayla. Few could believe that a father could take his own child out of this world. The searchers are gathering at 8 p.m. tonight in a field where Kayla once played.

never noticed the conditions the victim was living in: fecal matter on the floor, his bed, the bathroom, soiled adult diapers strewn around the room."

Peter Berry told deputies he looked through a sliding glass door in the house, into his father's bedroom, and observed him laying on the bed. Peter Berry said when he was unable to arouse his father by knocking on the glass door, he called 9-1-1, according to the police report.

Deputy Juan Bailey was able to awaken the victim by knocking on the glass door. He removed a window screen and opened the unlocked window, the police report said. Bailey and fire department personnel entered the residence, and the victim was transported to Winter Park Hospital.

Medical staff in the emergency room discovered an unknown growth present on the victim's left foot, the police report said. Staff had to forcibly remove socks from his feet. Staff also observed the early stages of bed sores on the victim's buttocks, the police report said.

Bailey said the victim's bedroom was approximately 10 feet by 11 feet, the police report said. Bailey found soiled diapers in the bedroom, and human feces in the bedroom and the bathroom. The shower curtain appeared to be growing mold, and the bath tub did not appear to have been used in some time, the police report said.

The only evidence of food in the bedroom was empty boxes of cereal, the police report said. Bailey discovered the bedroom to be locked from the outside. There was no television or radio for entertainment, the police report said.

Berry, Jerry Camp, and Kenneth Camp are charged with aggravated abuse/neglect of an elderly/disabled adult, Brown said.

Berry and Jerry Camp are being held in the Seminole County jail without bond until their first court appearance today.

Berry and Jerry Camp bonded out at \$2,000 from the Seminole County jail at 4 a.m. this morning, according to jail officials. Kenneth Camp is under the pre-trial release program.

The park is located on 24th street near Mellonville Avenue, about a mile from Johnny's Summerlin Avenue home.

"It's a tragedy," Crooms Academy principal B. Hardy-Blake said. "Johnny was very quiet and reserved. He had made tremendous strides in math. He was such a hard worker. Everyone here speaks fondly of him."

Hardy-Blake said that after touring Lake Gem on Sunday with police, she believes a lack of safety features around the lake may have contributed to the incident.

"It's sad to see the place that open within a residential community," Hardy-Blake said. "You look at the swings nearby, and then there's water. The depth and the mud in the lake makes it unsafe. Visually, with the swings, it looks inviting. But, there is nothing to protect a child."

City Manager Tony VanDerworp conducted a safety inspection of Lake Gem on Monday.

"It's well maintained in a safe manner," VanDerworp said following his inspection. "We've got nicely maintained, sandy, very gradual side-slopes around the lake. The water quality is well maintained. There is a (warning) sign posted at the entrance on 24th Street. As a city, we're doing everything we can to make sure the lake is safe. It's tragic when something like this happens."

Additional warning signs will be posted near the lake this week, VanDerworp said. If residents in the surrounding community request a fence around the lake, he said the city would respond to their request.

"The only other thing we can do is put a fence around it," VanDerworp said. "Normally, for aesthetic reasons residents

don't like to have lakes fenced. If we receive numerous requests from residents to fence the lake, we'll look into it."

Lake Gem is "an old sink-hole," VanDerworp said. He added that the lake receives drainage from the neighboring community.

"It's unfortunate we have to have these retention ponds at these properties," VanDerworp said. "The other one we have is Lake Corolla. Our goal is to make them as safe as possible. This is the only accidental death we've had in a public park that I can recall. We have staff that have been here 25 years, and they can't recall another one."

The most recent previous safety inspection of the lake had taken place in 1990. VanDerworp said the lake met all the state and federal safety standard regulations.

A little safety afield wouldn't hurt a bit

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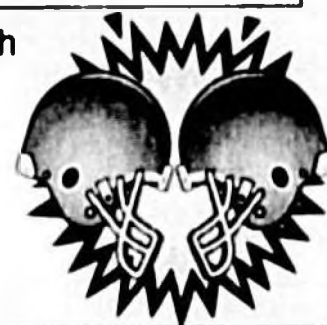

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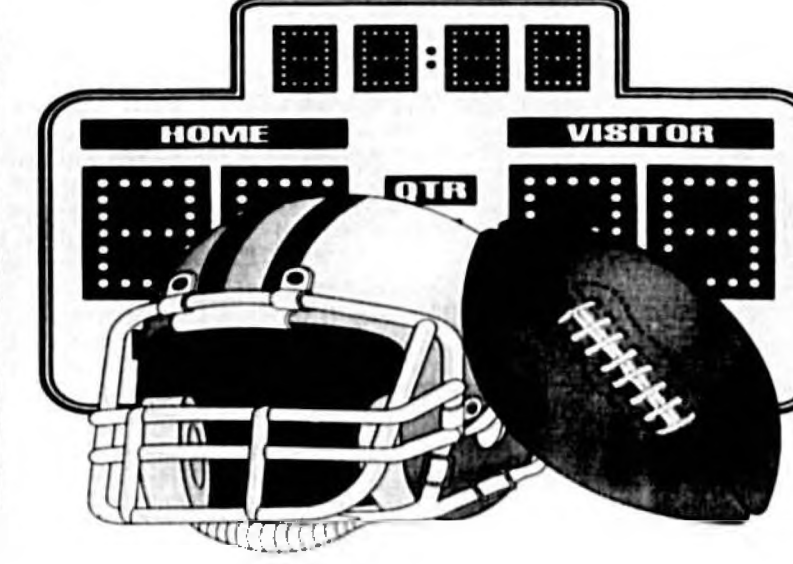
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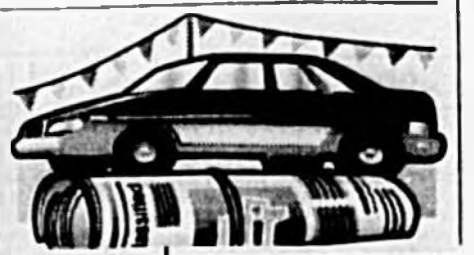
