Explains New Code As Applied To Seminole

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Restoration of war time wage levels, sought by transportation bodies in 1924 and 1925 is the objective of a new campaign started here. The Western Joint Association of general chairmen of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and the order of Railroad Conductors, meeting here has approved proposals centering on a return of wages in effect after rates had been advanced to meet prices as they expanded during the war. Such increase would involve more than \$25,000,000 a year when applied to the 200,000 yard and train service employees. The war time levels, cut 12 per cent by the United States Railroad Labor Board in July, 1921, ranged from \$6.40 a day for switch tenders to \$7 a day for passenger conductors. In 1924 brought about 5 per cent of the 1921 reductions. The proposals of the Western group will go before the Southern Association in Washington Tuesday and a working schedule may go before the railroad board it was stated. The proposals may go before the railroad board in thirty days, it was estimated.

11 SURVIVORS OF WRECKED VESSEL BROUGHT HOME

Two Wrecks in Past 2 Weeks Known to Have Claimed 17 Lives; Search For Three Prominent Men is Continued

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 5.—(AP)—While numerous boats and men were searching the coast of Lower North Carolina and South Carolina for the bodies of three victims of one yacht disaster, 11 survivors of another disaster were recovered in a harrowing experience of yesterday. These two episodes at sea of the past two weeks have been enacted off the southern Atlantic coast in which at least 17 persons are known to have lost their lives. South Port, N. C., at the mouth of Cape Fear River, on the North Carolina coast, today was expecting the arrival of Maj. Harry Van Seiver, a representative of Governor Robinson of Delaware, in the search for the bodies of Secretary of State Wm. G. Taylor and E. R. Pusey, Wilmington, Del., ship builder. Sylvanus Stokes, Jr., of Warrenton, Va., owner of the \$80,000 yacht together with his guest, J. B. Clarke, also of Warrenton and nine men were rescued yesterday off Vera Beach, Fla. The Delaware official, Mr. Pusey and an unnamed man were sailing from Fredericktown, Md., to Miami, Fla., by the inland route when their craft burned to the water edge near Georgetown, S. C. The identity of their boat, the "Bunny" had been determined by a ship's captain who examined it. No traces of the men or their bodies have been found and the search is being pushed with all vigor. Mr. Stokes, and his party were enroute from Boston, Mass., to Miami when they grounded on a shoal Tuesday night. They spent the night and Wednesday aboard the Genesee in the hopes of floating her with high tide. A heavy squall springing up, however, forced them to alter their plans. They sent up distress signals and were rescued by coast guardsmen late Wednesday. The vessel, it was said probably will be a total loss.

Salesmen Arrive In Daytona Shores For Big Inspection

DAYTONA, Fla., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Twenty-five salesmen from the Miami office of Daytona Shores, arrived here last night for a completion inspection of the "Coral Gables" of the Halifax County, the 2,800 acre townsite being developed by Daytona Shores, Inc. Frank H. Smith, Miami sales manager of Daytona Shores, led the party here. The trip was made in one of the 20 Daytona Shores parlor Pullman buses. Mr. Smith was formerly a leading division sales manager for Coral Gables. He is one of the best known real estate sales executives in the State. Accompanied by C. Louis Allen, executive vice-president and general sales manager; T. F. Flanagan, assistant sales manager and advertising manager; and John H. Uhl, Florida sales manager, the party left for the Daytona Shores development just north of Ormond early this morning. A general get-together sales session was held at Daytona Shores Lodge, an enlarged and remodeled roundhouse on the contract. Following a luncheon at which the visiting sales office force were the honor guests, the party spent the afternoon inspecting almost every inch of the "Fifteen Miles of Waterfront" subdivision. The salesmen were congratulated on the exceptional showing made by the Miami office in the first ten days of the sales campaign. Officers of the league will report tonight on the general aspects of the crisis faced by prohibition. The nation is watching Chicago's action against it and Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the league, said in a radical speech for delivery today before the University of Chicago divinity school. "Two beer runners are justly serving their time in jail now and the public is watching to see whether the sentence of Judge Wesley Westbrock and Chief Hoffman will be executed when the case is called. Wheeler said, "bootleggers and rum runners are the criminal vermin of society but the public users are worse."

DEVELOPMENT OF BIG TRACT IS ANNOUNCED BY COMMISSION

Eight Hundred Acres Lying Near Golf Course Bought By Local Syndicate Which Plans Improvement Project

Island And Canals To Be Constructed

Plans for the complete development of an 800-acre tract, lying southwest of Sanford, comprising the DeForest property, Bel-Air Grove and several smaller adjacent tracts adjoining the municipal golf course, were announced Wednesday by Edward Higgins and Wight Inc., which negotiated the transfer of the tract to a syndicate of local business men. Among the features of the development is the construction of an island in Amory and DeForest Lake on which will be surveyed 64 acres, facing the property approximately 85x125 feet. Construction of the island will be made possible, it is announced, by extensive dredging operations in the several lakes included in the tract. Another feature of the development will be the construction of a series of canals connecting the lakes. This undertaking, it is estimated, will give the property 15 miles of navigable waterways. Other plans call for the bulkheading of all lake front property. The first section of the property, which will be offered for sale within the next few days, comprises 82 acres, facing the country club road and lying opposite the DeForest home site. For the past few months this section has been undergoing work that has changed it into what is declared one of the most attractive residential properties in Sanford. Streets have been opened, piping for water have been installed and many decorative plants and shrubbery have been set out. In connection with the sale of the property, Mr. Higgins, who will personally supervise the campaign, announced that downtown offices will be maintained as well as connections with prominent firms in many south central Florida cities. A field office will be erected on the property, it was also announced. State-Wide Advertising Planned A state-wide advertising campaign, featuring Sanford in general and the development in particular, will be conducted at once. The campaign have already been mapped out, it is said and call for its inauguration within a short time. Several large pullman busses will be operated by the company between Sanford and other state points. The first of these has already arrived and will be placed in operation at once, it is declared. The bus accommodates 24 passengers. Among the points touched by the bus will be Fort Myers, St. Petersburg, Tampa, Lakeland, Clearwater, Plant City, Bradenton and other cities. Offerings of the company are expected to attract a large number of investors. In connection with Wednesday's announcement, Mr. Higgins stated that R. R. Deas, for several years with the Sanford Truck Growers Exchange, will be connected with the sales department as head of the field salesmen. It was also announced that J. R. Emory, formerly of A. W. Conroy, a merchant of Co'sa Switch, was electrocuted this morning at 5:50 o'clock at the state prison here.

Wild Ducks Menace Large Rice Crop In State Of Arkansas

STUTTGART, Ark., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Wild ducks are menacing a 13,000,000 rice crop in this section to such an extent that growers are planning to take action to have removed all restriction on shooting the fowls. The ducks are tearing up sheafs from the shocks and exposing the grain to wet weather, which is delaying the harvesting of the crop. Heavy rains have made many of the rice fields in this section impassable. Arkansas county laws place the bag limit at 15 ducks per day. State game officials have announced that they have no authority in the matter and that the farmers must apply to the United States Biological Survey if they want the restrictions removed. The bag limit is regulated by the migration bird law. Approximately 10 per cent of the crop remains to be cut but growers are of the opinion that most of this can be harvested soon if the rain ceases. The harvested portion, perhaps 75 per cent of which is in shocks, is suffering the most damage. Five cases constituted the docket in Municipal Court Wednesday morning by Judge W. E. Wheeler. C. N. North, arrested for speeding, failed to appear and estreated a \$10 bond. Jesse Mabley forfeited \$10 when he was not present to answer a drunkenness charge. W. H. Botch was fined \$3 for violating the parking ordinance and Eddie Patterson, up for disorderly conduct, who was the only other person to appear at court, was discharged. R. E. Johnson estreated \$5 bond for traffic violation. More than 95 per cent of land and 91 per cent of factories have been restored in the French devastated regions, according to a report.

Not Guilty Verdict Overruled By Court In Stephenson Case

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Nov. 5.—(AP)—A defense motion asking Judge Will M. Sparks to instruct the jury to return a verdict of not guilty in the murder trial of D. C. Stephenson, Earl Gentry and Earl Klench, was overruled by the court today. The motion was predicated on the ground that the state had failed to make a case. Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in Indiana and his two bodyguards are charged with being responsible for the death of Miss Madge Oberholzer, Indianapolis girl, who took poison following alleged abduction and assault. Twenty-five witnesses are called by the state in prosecuting the case. Ever since he was arrested last April Stephenson has asserted that only one side of the case had been aired and that he would be vindicated when he chose to "put the facts before the jury and the public."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Creation of a Bureau of Civil Aeronautics in the Department of Commerce with broad powers to regulate and promote all civil and commercial flying in the United States forms the central recommendation of the commission on civil aviation which was asked by the department and the American engineering council last June to make an exhaustive study of the question. The commission of which Walter Drake assistant secretary of commerce is chairman, declares it will make available the development of commercial aviation in the United States which can be realized only through a definite and continued program of government assistance for the industry. The lack of this and of a definite legal status and government control for flying, it found, have been the chief causes for its failure to keep pace with the development in Europe. Responsibility of Public. The provision of essential air navigation facilities such as properly marked air ways off both day and night flight and emergency terminal landing fields, the commission holds to "public responsibility." Government aid has taken this form with adequate provision for research work in aircraft design and use by the government departments and not that of administering. "In this connection the direct subsidies granted by European governments to civil aid had not worked to the best interests of the country." The commission endorsed these and other purposes of the bill which was favorably reported to the last session by the commerce committee of the house. Ratification by the senate of the international air navigation convention drawn up in Paris in 1919, was urged by the committee in order that the United States should not suffer from the restriction imposed upon non-contracting states in its reception of a nation's exercise over air service. Summarizing conditions in the industry, the report declared that "notwithstanding past and present handicaps the inquiry has survived and made progress under adverse conditions." There is no doubt it added, "that under really favorable conditions, its great possibilities will be realized."

Church Council Head Claims Treatment Of Religion Will Cause International Trouble

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Danger spots for the whole world are being created by the treatment of religious minorities in some of the European countries, said Dr. Charles S. MacFarland, general secretary of the Federal Council of Churches in the report to the administrative committee, following the extended visit to churches in Europe.

Transylvania, which was given to Rumania by the Versailles treaty, with the exception of Asin Minor, Dr. MacFarland declared presented the most serious situation in Europe today and to meet this and other conditions the League of Nations should readjust or reinterpret the Treaty of Versailles.

"The most sensitive point is that of the confessional schools and, while the Rumanian government will find sympathy for its efforts to develop a public school system, the manner in which it is taking over the confessional schools and properties, involving the sudden dispersment of both faculties and pupils, is the serious thing.

"There is probably no doubt but what these Hungarian populations are obviously very far from being whole-hearted, loyal citizens to Rumania, and it is quite probable that men associated in a responsible way with the churches are participating as a bloc in political affairs. It can also hardly be denied that on previous occasions, Austria-Hungary pursued a similar course with alien minorities. The difficulty is that apparently Rumania is continuing the old method of revenge, repression and force.

Hungary Will Put Money On New Gold Basis This Winter

BUDAPEST, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Creation of a new currency, the establishment of the federal budget on a gold basis and the adjustment in reevaluation, are three problems to occupy the attention of the Hungarian Parliament when it reconvenes this fall.

Decision as to what shall be the unit of currency must be made first. Some favor the shilling, now used by both Danzig and Austria, as the monetary unit. Others believe that the crown should be brought back to its pre-war value.

The budget question will be easily satisfied after the new currency has been selected. For the present the budget, while balanced, is still on a paper crown basis.

In reevaluating the war loans and other securities in which the people invested before and during the war, the Hungarians will be guided in a great measure by the experience of Germany with her reevaluation loans.

Sails Used As Power In Plowing Contest

BRIGHTLINGSEA, Eng., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Sails were introduced as an aid to ploughing in a soil tillers' match near this little seaside resort of which many of its residents are yachtsmen as well as farmers. The wind at times aided the horses in dragging the plough along but at other times puffs blew the implement to one side and spoiled a straight furrow which hindered the contestant's chance of winning first prize.

Chicago Civil Code Requires City Home

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Home moving day for many city employees may be a political sidelight in a change of city administrations. Employees under the civil service code have been told by the corporation counsel that they should live within the city limits. As a result, hundreds of them are confronted with losing their jobs or moving their homes from the suburbs back to the city. The city's legal adviser reversed an opinion handed down under a previous administration.

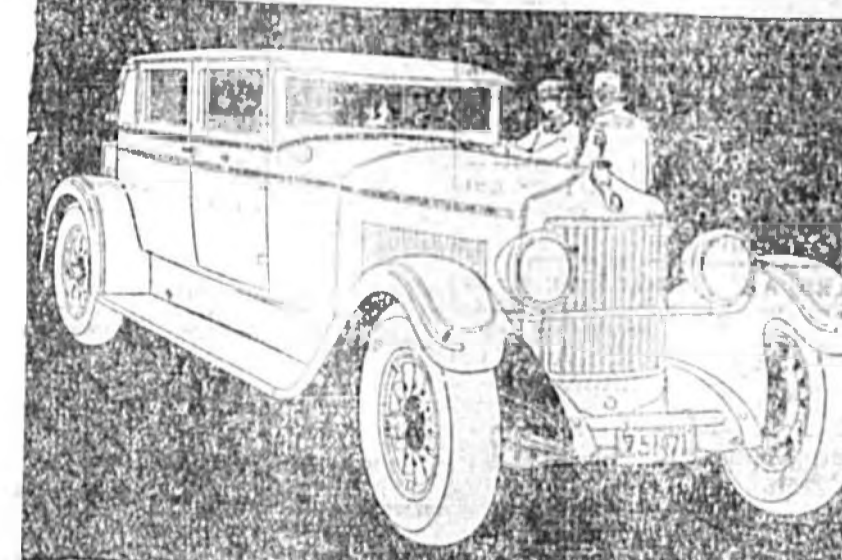

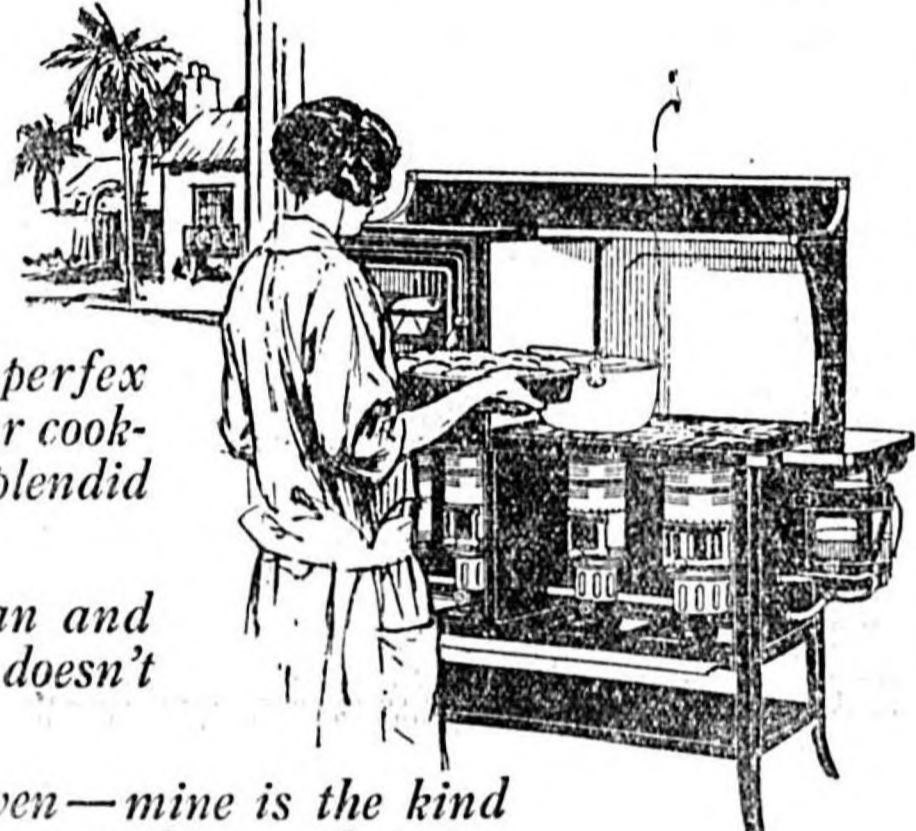

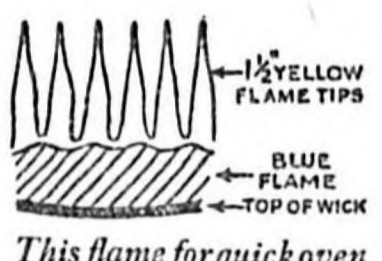

FLORIDA FACTS

The first railroad through service in the state of Florida to run from New York was begun in August, 1886, according to J. E. Ingraham, formerly vice-president of the South Florida Railroad, in a bulletin issued by the state department of agriculture.

In 1886 all the lines of states in the southern territory or the territory lying south of the Ohio and east of the Mississippi river changed their tracks from the standard gauge of five feet two inches to four feet eight and one-half inches.

The former gauge had been used as standard in the south, the latter became the standard gauge throughout the country. The South Florida Railroad changed at this time from the three foot gauge to the new standard gauge. Through pullman cars were then run from New York to Tampa and Port Tampa.

The Tampa Bay Hotel was then built on the west side of the Hillsborough river in the midst of beautiful trees, flowers and foliage. It was built by Henry E. Plant, who established the Plant Line railway through Florida, and run a high class tourist hotel.

The same year Mr. Plant personally represented the South Florida Railroad at the Paris Exposition and exhibited many Florida products.

From 1881 to 1886 the Jacksonville-Tampa-Key West railroad had been extended from Jacksonville to Palatka and then to Sanford making connections with the South Florida Railroad.

This railroad was later bought by Mr. Plant as was the Florida Southern from Palatka to Brooksville and then the Sanford and St. Petersburg. The latter had a northern route from Sanford to St. Petersburg.

During 1884 the South Florida Railroad was extended from Bartow to Pemberton Ferry, through Dade City and Lakeland. It connected with the Florida Southern at Pemberton Ferry (now called Trilley).

In 1887 the Plant extended the railroad to Port Tampa on the Old Tampa Bay where he constructed wharves for 26 steamers and providing ample truckage for cars to be unloaded directly on the ships. Phosphate was the chief commodity shipped and Port Tampa became the greatest phosphate port in the world.

Sanford Needs a Y. M. C. A.

In an article telling what the Young Men's Christian Association is doing in the United States and Canada, the Literary Digest in a recent issue, points out that crims cost the United States three billion dollars in 1924 while in the same period, the Y. M. C. A. cost only slightly more than fifty-one million dollars

Comparison of the cost of these two institutions is drawn because of a recent remark of P. Whitehill Wilson, noted English journalist, who summed up the work and aim of the organization when he declared, "Fill the Y. M. C. A. and keep the prisons empty"

As a builder of boy's character and as an institution providing good, clean, wholesome environment with all the influences of home, the Young Men's Christian Association has become the outstanding organizations of its kind in the world

Dr. Howard B. Grose, in a recent review of the association's work during the past year, tells us:

"Operating expenditures of the Association Movement in North America in its year 1924-25 were divided as follows: 23 per cent. for administration, 18 per cent. for activities, 21 per cent. for property and endowments, 28 per cent. for business features, dormitories, restaurants and camps, and 10 per cent. on the services of the National Councils and other agencies of the National Councils and other agencies including the work in foreign lands, costing \$2,761,900

"It is notable that expenditures by the American public for service to young men and boys, through the North American Y. M. C. A.'s, have doubled since 1918, when we were in the war

"The total income for the year, \$51,874,400, which was \$40,000 less than expenditures, was derived as follows: About 26 per cent. from contributions, 12 per cent. from membership dues, 12 per cent. from tuition fees and other departmental activities, 7 per cent. from property and endowments, and 43 per cent. from business features, dormitories, restaurants and camps

"Nearly 100,000 business and professional men directed this fifty-million-dollar service, giving their time without compensation on boards and committees of local associations, State and national organizations, and training-schools"

The number of men and boys engaged in Bible study in Y. M. C. A. classes has increased from thirty-two thousand in 1900 to nearly two hundred and forty thousand for last year. The increase in this item in the last association year was small, but is to be compared with the exceptional gains in the previous period. Continuing a study of the work of the association, Dr. Grose says it would be interesting if we could know how the Bible study in Y. M. C. A. groups compares with that in the Sunday Schools in imparting knowledge of the Bible and bringing its truths to bear upon life

Facts about the Y. M. C. A. and its work are especially interesting to Sanford citizens at this time since there is a plan afoot, sponsored by the Kiwanis Club, to secure a branch of the organization here

The Young Men's Christian Association is needed in Sanford. It would fill an important place in this community just as it has in every other community where it is located. The Kiwanis Club should have the support and co-operation of every civic organization and every individual in the city in bringing a Y. M. C. A. to Sanford

Let's Have the Curb Market

Some time ago The Herald advocated the establishment of a curb market in Sanford where farmers might bring their products and where the tourists and home-folks might purchase, fresh from the farm, vegetables, butter, eggs and other foodstuffs

We talk a lot about our farms and what they mean to the community. We tell people in the north about the wonderful celery, the lettuce, and the other vegetables of which we are so proud and yet we don't think much about establishing a place where the farmer and the consumer can meet and do business together

The Herald hopes the coming winter season will see some facilities provided which will make it possible for the people who live here to buy direct from the farmer some of the products for which this city is so famous

If the plan is successfully used in other parts of the country, it would without doubt be doubly successful here. At any rate, the idea is worth trying

VALUE OF CREDIT MIAMI NEWS

That credit has become almost the key-stone of the arch in our economic structure is strikingly illustrated by the latest figures published by the National Automobile Dealers' Association, which show that over 5,000,000 people in this country purchased automobiles on time payments in 1924

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE promised "specific recommendations for farm relief when Congress meets"

The President does not believe that the only relief for a farmer is to sit around and "let nature take its course," which means letting railroads, jobbers, wholesalers and foodstuff gamblers get the profit while the farmer plows, milk the cow and carries the mortgage

A nation which finds it easy to help railroads out of trouble by increasing rates and compelling the public to pay out to help farmers, without whom the railroads would be bankrupt, and cities into starvation

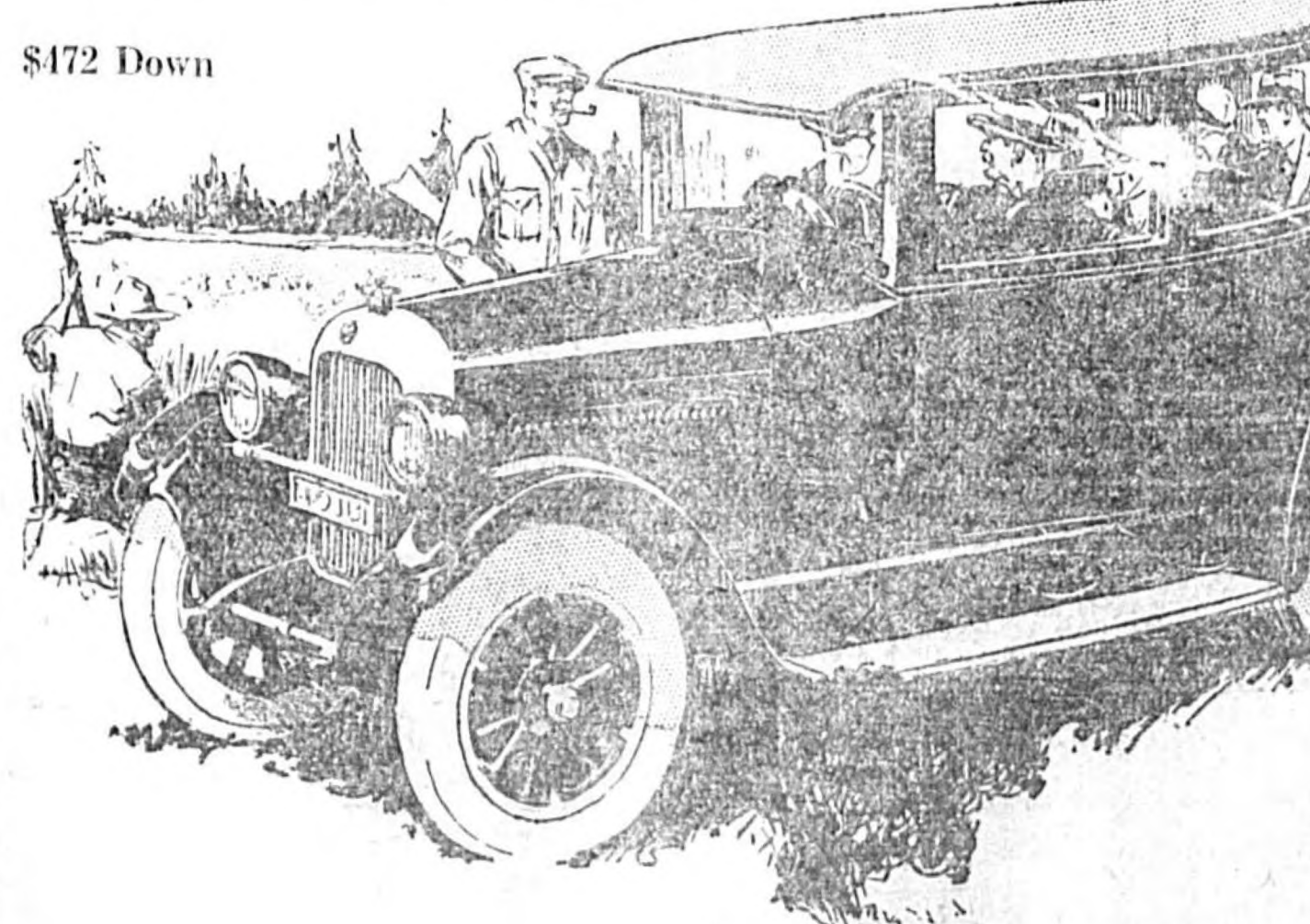

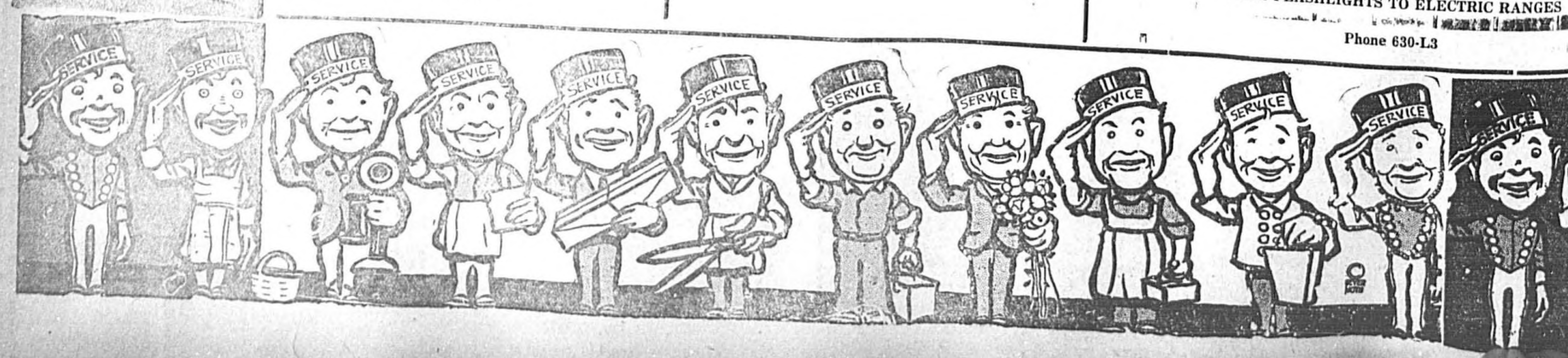

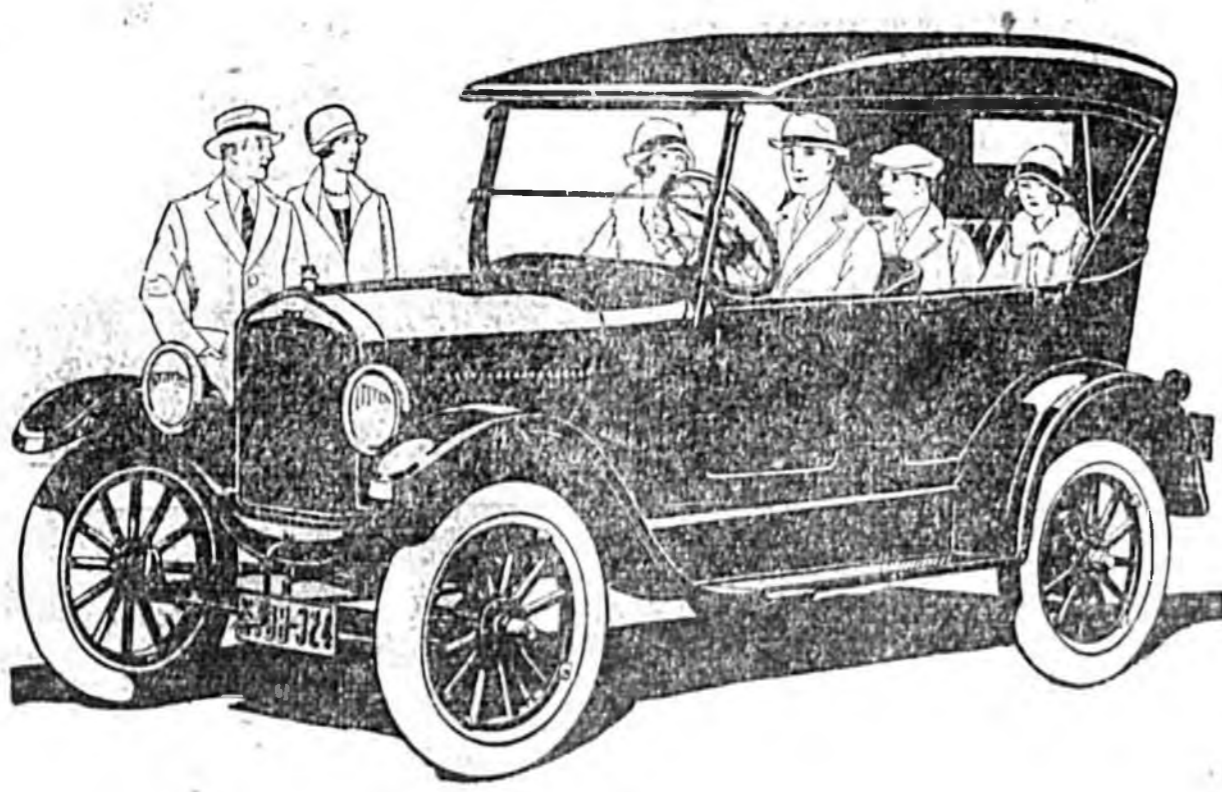

Professional Ranks Lure Star Amateurs By Attractive Offers

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The lures of the professionalism in the modern era of high pressure athletics are becoming harder to resist than ever before among the amateur talents. Opportunities are widening for the amateur stars to capitalize their prowess and many are promptly seizing them. The list of former All-American football players now wearing mole-skins is impressive.

Many of the Fall's stars probably will be offered lucrative professional places when they close their college career.

The attraction of professionalism has cut heavily into the ranks of women swimming stars. The leading mermaids of America's last two Olympic teams now have forsaken amateur ranks with the declaration of Aileen Riggan and Gertrude Ederle togo to professional posts.

They have followed in the footsteps of Ethelda Bleibtrey and Helen Wainwright.

Golf reflects similar signs of the time, although here the movement is not so marked. Bobby Jones, two times amateur golf king, has been approached by professionals but he intends to remain a simon pure. Big Bill Tilden was linked with rumors of a professional career at the time of

his connection with the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association when he played. No amateur athlete in history probably has withstood any more pressure to turn professional than Paavo Nurmi. He was offered a place at a million dollars for the sake of his amateur career.

Thirteen Horses and Four Bad Breaks Kill French Race Starter

MARSEILLES, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Thirteen horses and four false starts in the same race killed Marcel Blinou, for more than 20 years official starter at the Marseilles racetrack.

turned to their owners at a charge of 4 percent of their value. Jewelry, "except anything having no intrinsic value," is redeemable on the same terms. The "no intrinsic value" clause is expected to kill a very promising publicity field in the matter of lost jewelry. For every other article, new or nearly new, two francs will be charged; for everything else, one franc.

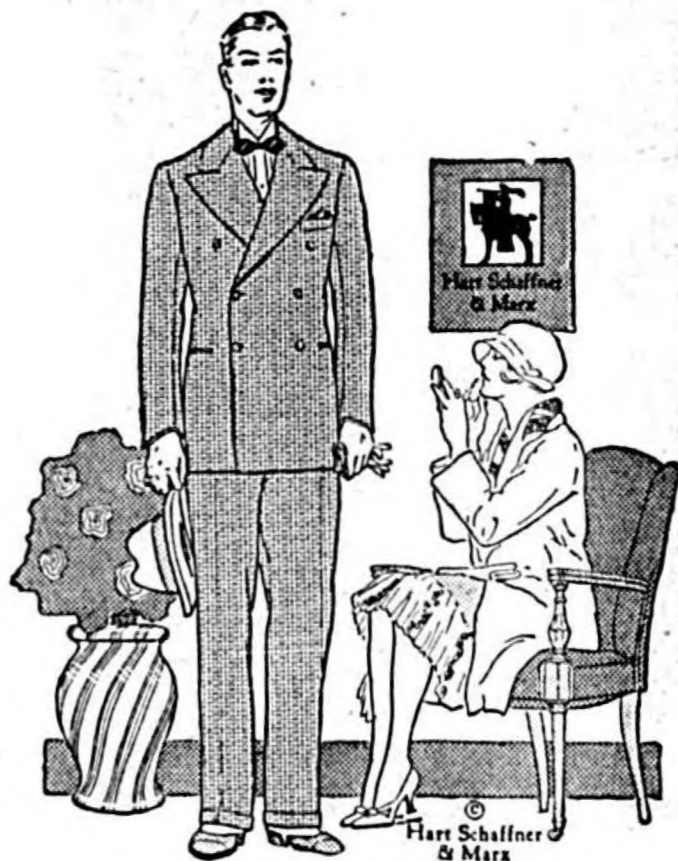

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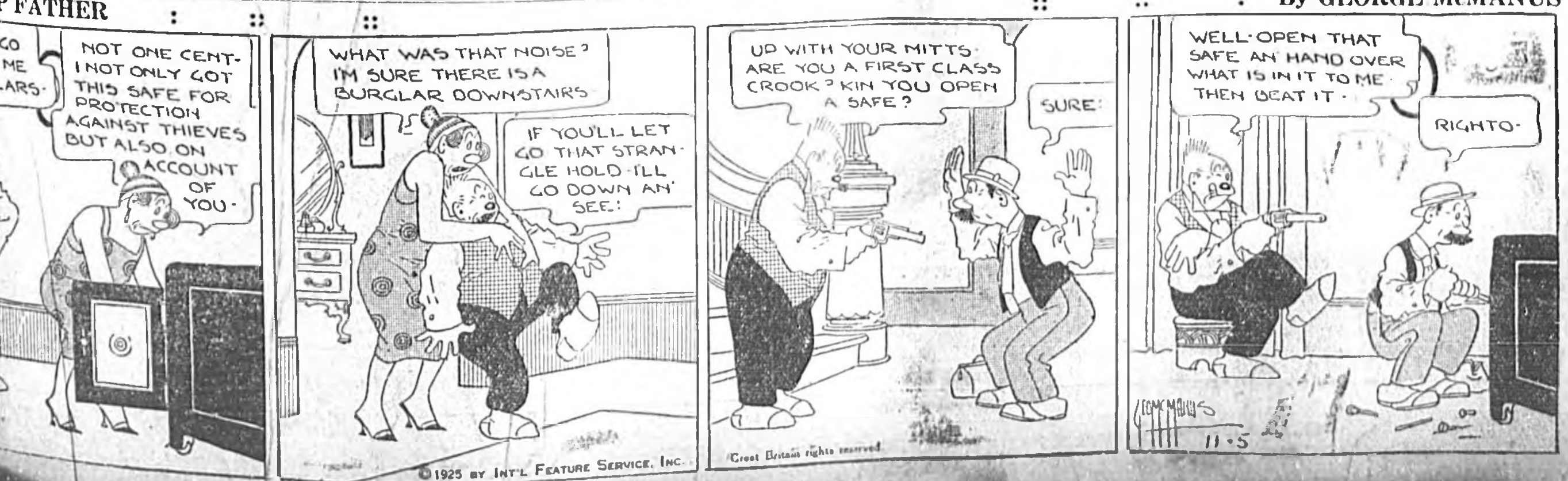
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
